

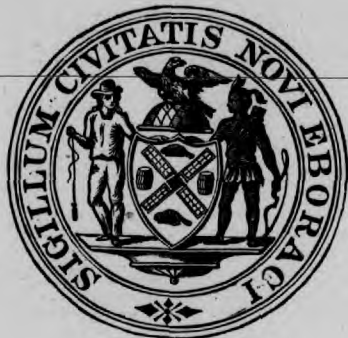

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York:

The Public Administrator in the City of New York, pursuant to section 29 of article 1, entitled "Of the Public Administrator in the City of New York," title 6, chapter 6, part 2 of the Revised Statutes, herewith exhibits to the Common Council of the City of New York, a statement on oath of the moneys received by him for commissions and expenses, and the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which he took charge of and collected any effects, or on which he administered on any estate during the year 1882, with the name of the deceased, his occupation, the place of his residence at the time of his death, where known, and the country or place from which he came if he were not a resident of this State at the time of his death.

And, in compliance with the Revised Ordinances of the Common Council, he also transmits a transcript of such of his accounts as have been closed or finally settled during the year 1882.

The statement heretofore referred to, shows in what estates any money was received by him during the past year, and the amount so received.

The balance of moneys standing to the credit of the Public Administrator and the Comptroller on the 1st day of January, 1883:

In the Importers and Traders' National Bank was the sum of seventy-nine thousand two hundred and thirty-four dollars and twelve cents (\$79,234.12), and in the Continental National Bank the sum of seventy-one thousand one hundred and seventy-eight dollars and seventy-six cents (\$71,178.76), making together the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand four hundred and twelve dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$150,412.88), which includes interest allowed by said banks on deposits.

Total amount of moneys which came into the hands of the Public Administrator during the year 1882, was the sum of one hundred and twelve thousand six hundred and eighty-two dollars and eighty-one cents (\$112,682.81), and the amount distributed by him for expenses, payments to creditors, and to next of kin, etc., was the sum of one hundred and twenty-six thousand two hundred and seventeen dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$126,217.79).

The total amount paid into the City Treasury during the year 1882, was the sum of nineteen thousand and eighty-nine dollars and seventy-six cents (\$19,089.76), being for commissions and intestate estates.

When the undersigned took possession of his office, he found that the account of the Public Administrator and Comptroller with the Guardian Savings Institution, showed a balance due from that bank of fourteen thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$14,233.60).

The undersigned has made diligent efforts to collect the amount from the Receiver of the said institution, and has succeeded in collecting the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), leaving a balance still due amounting to the sum of twelve thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$12,233.60), exclusive of interest.

By reason of such uncollected balance, a number of estates cannot be finally closed.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

41. One Hundred and Sixth street and Third avenue, basin on northwest corner of.
42. One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Madison avenue, basin in northeast corner of.
43. One Hundred and Eighth street and Fourth avenue, basin on southwest corner of.
44. One Hundred and Fifty-third street and Ninth avenue, basin on northwest corner of.
45. Eighty-sixth street and Madison avenue, basin on northeast corner of.

46. Seventy-fifth street, paving with Belgian pavement from First avenue to Avenue A.
The foregoing assessment list being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb, gutter, and flagging Eighth avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street to Harlem river, with award for damages and objections of Wm. Astor, John McDermott, Ward Hunt, Manhattan Railway Co., Mary G. Pinkney and others; also an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation in regard to the proposed assessment for the work, which were received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated December 30, 1882.

Mr. James A. Deering, attorney, was heard in behalf of the Manhattan Railway Co., in opposition to the apportionment of the assessment.

Mr. T. H. Baldwin, attorney for Hubert Mason and Thos. C. Higgins and others, objected on the ground that the assessment should have been laid with reference to the valuations of property at the time of the completion of the work.

The Secretary of the Board of Assessors made explanations of the action of the said Board. The opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation was then read, after which, on motion, the objections presented by Mr. Baldwin and others as to the time of laying the assessment were overruled. On motion, the further consideration of the assessment was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

The assessment list for sewers in Mangin street, between Broome and Delancey, and Rivington and Stanton streets, and objections of Anderson Price, attorney for premises, Ward No. 749, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of December 30, 1882.

After hearing Mr. Price, and Mr. C. H. Myers, of the Bureau in Charge of Sewers, on motion, the list was laid over.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating and grading, setting curb-stones and flagging sidewalks, four feet wide, in Ninety-eighth street, from west curb-line of Third avenue to east line of Fourth avenue, and objections of the Manhattan Railway Company and others, filed by Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of December 30, 1882.

The Board of Assessors, in their communication, state that the objections above-mentioned were considered and an allowance made.

Mr. Baldwin said that in consideration of the reduction of the assessment made by the Board of Assessors he made no objections to the list.

On motion, the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for extension of sewer in Eighty-first street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, from end of present sewer west of Fourth avenue, and objections of Fanny Keary and Jonas Silver, laid over at the last meeting of the Board were, on motion, taken up and considered.

A communication of the Health Department to the Department of Public Works, with application of Mr. Silver for the extension of the said sewer, which was also transmitted by the Board of Assessors was then read. No one appearing in opposition, after due notice to the parties interested, on motion, the said objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving with stone blocks One Hundred and Fifteenth street, from Third avenue to Avenue A, and obstructions filed by Wm. H. Klenke, attorney for John O'Brien and others, also a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, in reply to the said objections, which were received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 30, 1882.

After hearing E. W. Tyler, as representative of Mr. Klenke, on motion, the objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving with granite-block pavement, Ninth avenue, from the westerly line of the Boulevard to Seventy-seventh street, and objections of the executors of James Brown, deceased, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 29, 1882.

After hearing T. H. Baldwin, attorney, in behalf of the executors of Mr. Brown, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over.

The assessment list for planting elm trees on the Boulevard, from the circle at Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and objections of J. J. Astor, Chester A. Arthur, John McCloskey, Chas. L. Tiffany, and others, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 27, 1882.

No one appeared in opposition. After due notice to the persons interested, on motion, the objections were then considered and overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.
