The 697 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.09 against 20.77 for the previous week, and 21.48 for the corresponding week of 1892. The decrease of 61 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 59 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, and of 23 from diseases of the digestive organs, partially offset by an increase of 12 in deaths from diseases of the nervous system.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, the 4 deaths from measles being in the Seventeenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards, and the 3 from scarlet fever in the Ninth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Wards.
