Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir—I would respectfully request the Honorable Board of Aldermen to pass a resolution approving of the setting aside by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of forty thousand dollars, (\$40,000) for the purchase of supplies for manufacturing purposes, at the Kings County Penitentiary, said amount to be provided for by the issue of special Revenue Bonds, in accordance with subdivision 8, section 188 of the revised Charter of the City of New York.

In regard to the request above stated, I beg to say that an appropriation of \$100,000 was asked for, for 1904, for supplies for the Manufacturing Bureau, and only \$60,000 was allowed. Calls for manufactured articles from the various City departments are increasing to such an extent that the additional \$40,000 is essential. I would state that all moneys appropriated for this purpose are returned to the City Treasury, with a profit of at least twenty-five per cent.

The money is expended for the purchase of materials for manufacturing brooms, brushes, shoes, bedsteads, mattresses, underwear, etc., which are furnished on orders from the different City departments.

The amount appropriated for 1904 (\$60,000) has been exhausted; orders are coming in daily, and these orders will necessitate the asking of this additional amount of \$40,000.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I beg to call the attention of your Honorable Board to the matter of rules, regulations and ordinances for the government of the public parks of the city, the need for which has become very embarrassing to this Department by reason of the failure of the Board of Aldermen of last year to sanction or pass upon the code prepared by the Park Board, and submitted for approval, as required by the provisions of the Charter, a number of months since.

I find in the proceedings of your Board of December 14 last, as published in the "City Record" of December 17, that the ordinances and rules referred to were considered on that day, but failed of approval by reason of an insufficient number of affirmative votes.

As these rules are indispensable to the efficient administration of the parks, and are called into question almost daily, and required for use in the courts, I beg to request that the matter may be again considered at as early a day as possible, with a view to approval of the rules, either in their present form, or, if objectionable to your Board in such form as they may be acceptable.

The Executive Committee on the Nautical School respectfully reports that it has carefully considered the recommendation of Superintendent Hanus, that the salary of W. M. Dreilick, Boatswain of the Schoolship "St. Mary's," be increased to \$100 per month, to take effect January 1, 1904.

Mr. Dreilick has served with faithfulness and efficiency on the "St. Mary's" during the past eighteen years, and has immediate charge of the instruction in marlinspike seamanship.

After twelve years' service in the Navy, a boatswain receives a salary of \$1,800 per annum at sea, and \$1,600 per annum when on shore duty.

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—I would respectfully submit for your consideration in addition to the matters stated by me in my recent communication asking that the compensation of the Stenographer of the County Court be fixed at an annual salary instead of on a per diem basis, the following:

The business of the County Court has been increasing rapidly, and in addition to the regular trial terms a motion term is held by me on each Saturday of the year except during the month of August. At this motion term equity cases are tried, and it has been the practice at those terms for counsel to furnish a stenographer of their own and pay him themselves. This is unsatisfactory for the reason that such stenographers may

or may not be competent, and I have determined that it is necessary for my own protection to have my official stenographer present at each of those terms. On the per diem basis this will add \$690 to the stenographer's compensation each year.

This sum added to the amount paid last year for per diem services and disbursements would exceed the sum of \$2,200 per year.

From the present condition of my trial term calendar it seems probable that an additional trial term will have to be held this year. This would bring the sum paid for that service up to the salary I have asked to be fixed.

The appointment I have made was taken from the State Civil Service list of stenographers eligible to appointment in the Supreme Court, and the appointee stood at the head of the list in the Second Judicial Department. An appointment to that Court would carry with it an annual salary of \$3,000.

I might with propriety add that the salaries of each of the stenographers in the County Court of Kings is fixed at \$3,000 and the salaries of the Stenographers of the City Court of New York at the same amount.

Hon. J. W. STEVENSON, Deputy Comptroller:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 23d inst., relative to my request that the Board of Apportionment authorize the Police Commissioner to pay additional compensation for certain positions in the Police Department:

1. Stenographer to Police Commissioner from \$1,200 to \$1,400 per annum, and you ask for statement of reasons for such proposed increase. I beg to state that the work of the Stenographer to the Police Commissioner is very onerous and his position is in the nature of assistant to the Secretary to the Commissioner. The hours are very long, extending often as late as 7 o'clock in the evening to complete the necessary work of the office.

2. Chief Engineer of steamboat Patrol from \$1,140 to \$1,500 and Assistant Engineer of steamboat Patrol from \$900 to \$1,320 per annum. You ask for comparative statement of salaries paid employees in similar positions. Investigation shows that the United States Quartermaster's Department, U. S. A., and Fall River Line pay Chief Engineer \$1,500 per annum, including food and quarters; the Department of Docks and Ferries \$1,500 no food or quarters; Department of Charities, \$1,600, food and quarters supplied. The Fire Department of the City of New York has a detailed Foreman receiving full salary, \$1,400, which, of course, cannot be compared to prevailing rate of wages. The Chief Engineer of the steamboat Patrol has no food or quarters supplied.

For Assistant Engineer the United States Quartermaster's Department and Fall River Line pay \$900 per annum, with food and quarters supplied; the Department of Charities, \$1,250, with food and quarters supplied. The Assistant Engineer of the steamboat Patrol has no food or quarters supplied.

From this it will appear that the increase for salaries of Chief Engineer from \$1,140 to \$1,500, and of Assistant Engineer from \$900 to \$1,320 will yet bring them within the



prevailing rate of wages for such positions, and it is urgently requested that the Board or Estimate and Apportionment will give this matter favorable consideration.

Andrew Haswell Green—A Memorial Address Given at the Request of The City of New York, by Henry Mitchell MacCracken, December 30, 1903, in the City Hall, Published by The City of New York.

#### PREFATORY STATEMENT.

Andrew Haswell Green died upon Thursday, November 12, 1903. Early in December the Mayor of New York and the Board of Aldermen of New York appointed a memorial service to be held the 30th of December, 1903. An invitation was issued after the following form:

The honor of your presence is requested at the services to be held by the City of New York in memory of the late Andrew H. Green, on the afternoon of Wednesday, the 30th of December, 1903, at 3 o'clock, in the Aldermanic Chamber of the City Hall.

Committee of Arrangements—Jacob A. Cantor, President of the Borough of Manhattan, Chairman; J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Joseph Cassidy, President of the Borough of Queens; Alderman James H. McInnes; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond; Alderman John T. McCall.

Upon the day appointed the flags over the City Hall were draped in morning; the Aldermanic Chamber was hung with heavy black cloth edged with a deep black silk fringe and looped against the walls with bows of black and purple ribbon. The Coat of Arms of the City was suspended above the presiding officer's chair and draped in black and purple. This chair and the desks were draped and the eastern windows entirely hidden in black draperies. A full length portrait in oil of Andrew Haswell Green recently completed, at the order of the City, was placed at the south end of the Clerk's desk. The chairs in the Chamber were occupied by a distinguished company of citizens, who were present by special invitation.

At a few minutes past three o'clock the President of the Borough of Manhattan, Honorable Jacob Aaron Cantor; the President of the Board of Aldermen, Honorable Charles V. Fornes; the Vice-President of the Board of Aldermen, Honorable James H. McInnes, together with the chaplains of the day, followed by the Mayor of New York, the Honorable Seth Low, and the speaker of the day, Doctor Henry Mitchell MacCracken, Chancellor of New York University, entered the Aldermanic Chamber.

The chairman of the Committee of Arrangements introduced the Mayor as the officer called to preside over the service. The Mayor, taking the chair, spoke as follows:

"We are here in honor of the memory of Andrew H. Green in grateful recognition of the obligations under which he laid the city by many services during his long life. As far as I have been able to learn this is the first occasion, at any rate it is the first occasion in very many years, that such ceremonies have been held under the auspices of the city, and this circumstance indicates how deeply the city was moved by the taking off of this good man without a moment's notice."

The invocation was offered by the Reverend Doctor Leighton Williams.

The Mayor thereupon introduced Chancellor MacCracken, who delivered the memorial address.

In the absence of Bishop Henry C. Potter, who had consented to pronounce the benediction but had been confined to his house by an accident, the service was closed by the Reverend Archdeacon George F. Nelson, his representative.

#### MEMORIAL ADDRESS.

A ruling passion of Andrew H. Green was this city of ours. In his early teens he became the lover of this "City of the Waters." He abated nothing of the fervor of his affection until the day when he fell under the stroke of a brutish assassin on the pavement of Park avenue. Of that venerable man, dying on a highway which is the property of New York City, it can be said in a profound sense, in which it can hardly be said of any other man, that dying there, he died at home.

A New York merchant and banker of my acquaintance, who is only five years younger than Mr. Green, told me not long since that a modest ring which I had observed upon his finger had never been taken off even for an instant since a certain day more than half a century ago when it was placed there by his young bride. Andrew Haswell Green never found any bride excepting this city of the waters, but she had bound him to her by a mystic bond more than three and sixty years ago and never had he loosed or put away her claim, even for an hour.

The boy, in his sixteenth year, first sees New York when he comes with his elder sister out and away from a New England farm along through the Sound by steamboat, around the Battery, up into the Hudson to the landing place. Could he have approached any city amid more beautiful surroundings? It is true that New York then was a sleepy little city. All her people together would not show a larger population than is required to-day to make two Assembly Districts as populous as the Thirty-fifth Assembly District away up in The Bronx. Manhattan Island was in 1835 like the sleeping beauty of the legend. We recall the picture drawn by the poet Tennyson, a picture of the sleeping New York resting upon the waters:

"She sleeps! On either hand up swells  
The gold fringed pillow lightly pressed;  
She sleeps nor dreams but ever dwells  
A perfect form in perfect rest."

Because Andrew H. Green, a youth of sixteen, and countless young men of whom he was a type, not only of American birth but natives of other lands, sought out the sleeping beauty on this island and gave her a young man's affection, it came to pass that the maiden who was sleeping was awakened to new experience of life.

Many people will doubt whether Andrew Green should be pictured as entering life with a mind possessed by anything that could be called idealism. Was his dream as a very young man of anything in particular except to make a living?

Well, the story he has left in his own words dictated to one of his nieces, telling of his coming to New York and of his early experience here, is as plain and matter-of-fact as anything can be. I quote it as follows:

"In 1835 he went with his sister Lucy by steamboat and stage to New York; was employed as errand boy in the store of Hinsdale & Atkins at \$50 a year and board; then as clerk with Lee, Savage & Co., wholesale cloth merchants and importers, where he was steadily advanced till reaching nearly the head position, when the firm failed in the mercantile embarrassments of 1837.



"After a severe illness and return to Green Hill for months of recuperation, he entered the employ of Wood, Johnston & Barritt, linen importers in Exchange place; then he went to the firm of Simeon Draper, where he was kept up nearly all night arranging for sales.

"Through a friend of the family he met Mr. Burnley, who had interest in sugar plantations in Trinidad. Through Mr. Burnley he went, when twenty-one years old, to Trinidad, where for nearly a year he was engaged on the plantation owned by Mr. Burnley. While in Trinidad he became familiar with the cultivation of sugar cane, the manufacture of sugar, molasses, etc., but, seeing how crude were the methods used, tried without success to introduce improved processes. Realizing that advanced ideas would not be adopted, he determined to return to New York, where he entered the law office of Mr. John W. Mitchell."

This is the whole story as told by Andrew Green himself of not merely his first coming into New York, but of the entire seven years of his youth from fifteen until twenty-two. Was that youth an idealist in the sense of having his mind full of some lofty conception of life to be fulfilled? I have before me a volume containing the life and letters of the brother next him in age. This brother, a physician by profession, spent most of his life as a missionary of the American Board on the island of Ceylon. Mr. Andrew H. Green writes the introduction to the volume, in which he gives a picture of the home in which his brother was reared, which also was his own home.

"It was not far from the city of Worcester, a plain wooden dwelling, two-storied but low in the ceilings, of ample length and breadth, and anchored by a chimney of needless proportions. It stood on a byroad or lane, which was but little frequented. About the premises could be seen evidences of taste struggling for a more emphatic manifestation, but confined by imperative demands upon a limited treasury."

This home had been first owned 150 years ago, in 1754, by the great-grandfather of Andrew Green, a physician, named Thomas Green; afterwards by his grandfather, Dr. John Green, also a physician; then by his father, William Elija Green, a lawyer, of whom his son Andrew writes:

"The father of the subject of this memoir resided here, with but brief intervals of absence, till his decease, in his eighty-ninth year, in the room where he was born."

He writes of his mother also that "she was the daughter and granddaughter of men of renown in civil affairs. She enjoyed the advantages of an accomplished family, being of good education, refined tastes and excellent principles, but of a rather slender constitution."

He writes of his "father ever the genial companion of his children," of "associations which became dearer with the lapse of time," "the very trees of the homestead embodying memories which greatly enhanced their value," of the "spacious garret, a heterogeneous museum of relics, affording inexhaustible amusement; of the library, rather scant, but of standard works, elevating, refining and well read."

He closes this sketch of his brother's and his own early home with a feeling word and a line from a poet:

"The ancestral homestead is the place where the survivors like best to dwell, or to linger in their visits.

"I see around me here

Things which you cannot see."

Must we not believe that the boy of fifteen, coming from a home of which he wrote thus when more than fifty years had passed away, was a boy of high ideals, that he was not narrowed in his aims in life to the shops in which he toiled for years, first as errand boy and then as clerk?

In this same book is printed the letter written him by this brother Samuel, next him in age, on the day when Andrew at twenty-one years of age sailed to the Island of Trinidad. The letter was not to be opened till he was out at sea, and his brother writes thus to him:

"You leave us now with the hope and expectation of getting wealth. If God sees it best that you become rich, He will send abundant prosperity. You have consecrated yourself to His service; let your light shine brightly among the moral darkness with which you will be surrounded."

Thus the youth of twenty-one was believed by the brother next to him to possess ideals; first, the prosaic ideal of himself as possibly in the future becoming a rich man, but also the higher moral ideal of himself as a servant of his generation.

Not very many weeks since in the last letter, excepting one, addressed to me by Mr. Green, he invited me to lend my name to his plan of establishing a monument here to the great poet and citizen, John Milton. He had from early life made Milton his first choice in the world of literature. John Milton's theory of life is found in that brief birthday poem, which he wrote when he was twenty-three years old, in which he vowed that whatever his life should be,

"Towards which time leads me and the will of Heaven."

It should be spent

"If I have grace to use it so

As ever in my great taskmaster's eye."

And Andrew H. Green, the young man, entered upon his career in New York with this ideal of life as a service. That this early ideal was also the abiding thought of his later years I will show further on from the very latest words which he spoke in public, which declare his theory of life at the age of eighty-three.

How harmonious with this philosophy of life was his first entrance upon a public office. He has made a modest beginning as a young lawyer and has passed his thirtieth year when he becomes a candidate for office and is successful. But for what office? His own record is as follows:

"He was elected by the people Trustee of Schools in the Fourth Ward. Thereafter he was School Commissioner and member of the Board of Education, then was made President of the Board, it having forty-four members."

He was by this time in his thirty-fifth year. The New York City which was Andrew Green's ideal was to be an educated New York. So much as was in his power he purposed that this City should be made intelligent. His family were educators. Of his brothers and sisters, no less than five were professional teachers, if we include among them the missionary physician out in Ceylon, who was indeed a teacher in a very important way, for he founded a medical school of his own in order to train physicians for the dark races in that out-of-the-way corner of the earth. Andrew H. Green made the education of New York a part of his life. Here again he was following after his hero, John Milton, who honored the teacher, being himself a schoolmaster.

Himself shut out from the walls of high school and college by his entrance upon business at fifteen, he yet excelled the majority of the men who have been helped by the college in his appreciation of such schools of learning. He had educated himself so well that he could rightly value colleges and universities as helps to education. The traveler who has trudged in youth alone and slow to the top of Mt. Washington in America, or of Mt. Pilatus in Switzerland, can best appreciate the mountain railway that carries another generation by tens of thousands swiftly to the magnificent prospect.

It was Mr. Green's lively interest in higher education that led to my own acquaintance with him. This became more intimate through his acceptance, a few years since, of a seat in the New York University Council. Here he proved himself to the last a punctual, wise and useful member. Two weeks before his death, being in attendance upon the annual meeting of this Corporation, he remained after its close to give information to the Chancellor which had important value for the University.

At 37 years of age Mr. Green became a Commissioner of Central Park, for which the movement had begun some years before. The discussion of the question, Who first suggested this great park? is but slightly interesting. The credit for this was not claimed by Mr. Green. What he claimed for himself is briefly stated in the following sentences, dictated by him not long ago to his niece:

"In 1857 he was appointed by the Legislature one of the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park, and became Treasurer of the Board, President and Executive Officer of the Board, that is, Comptroller of the Park, for about ten years. He had the complete supervision of the engineers, landscape architects, gardeners and the whole retinue of employees, sometimes comprising as many as 3,000 men.

"The office of Comptroller of the Park was created especially for Mr. Green, and on this account, that in the early year or two of the Park, there was constant friction with the then forming ring, and the Park Board were quite willing to leave the work to any one who would attend to it. At that time Mr. Green was made President and Treasurer. As the Park was developed and grew in popularity, some member intimated that one man should not hold two offices. As the Legislature had authorized the Board to attach a salary to either of the two offices, the Board fixed the salary

to the office of the Treasurer and elected Mr. Green Treasurer. Whereupon Mr. Green immediately declined to accept the office. He was elected President. The member who was elected Treasurer, with a salary, served for a few months without satisfaction. Upon this the office of Comptroller of the Park was created, with all the executive power of the Board unified to those of the Treasurer, leaving to the President the power of presiding at the Board meetings. Mr. Green was elected Comptroller of the Park, and continued as such for ten years, until the Tweed Charter of 1870 removed the members of the Board from office and turned the Park over to a department of the City Government appointed by A. Oakey Hall, then Mayor. Mr. Green was appointed a member of the new Board, but his associates were those with whom he had no relations whatever, and in 1872 he resigned."

I saw Central Park for the first time shortly after Mr. Green began his work. It was like a gem, or a group of gems, in extreme native roughness, not yet skillfully touched by the hand of the lapidary. By the hand of Andrew H. Green and his helpers that rectangular stretch of rock was to be made into a jewel which should lie on the bosom of his fair Manhattan. The most ancient book tells us how Bezaleel fashioned a decoration that was to lie against the very heart of the church in the wilderness, as that church was embodied in the person of God's High Priest. Bezaleel, you remember, made a four-square group of gems, selecting and cutting and polishing for the same the most precious stones—ruby and jasper, emerald and sapphire, topaz and diamond. So Andrew H. Green devoted ten years of his life helping to fashion yonder decoration that lies on the bosom of New York. For the emerald he set there the broad meadows and bright lawns; for the diamond, the sparkling waterfalls; for the topazes he set tulips; for amethysts, wistarias; for sapphires, violets; for jaspers, jessamines, and for rubies the red roses, while the lakes were made to reflect the brighter colors of the sunset sky. Such a jeweled decoration he placed on the bosom of the city which was his bride. He was a perfect workman of the elder day of art.

"In the elder days of Art builders wrought with greatest care

Each minute and unseen part; for the Gods see everywhere."

Mr. Green, by his care for Central Park, was led to care for related enterprises, as the Museum of Art, the Museum of Science and the Zoological Garden. He was constantly alive to the work of beautifying the City, whether by individual effort or as a member of one or another organization. A recent address at Frances Tavern declared that his thoughtfulness was "woven into the structure and visible aspect of New York. Here we see it in a reserve acre of greensward; there in the curve of a graceful line, like the beautiful span of Washington Bridge, and somewhere else in a sweet sounding name, like Morningside."

As one of the three executors of Samuel J. Tilden, he labored for a public library. Fortunately this movement enlisted the friends of New York libraries in general, including the greatest library builder of the ages, with the result that, securing the City Government as chief partner, they are making our City the library city of the world.

A third of a century ago a calamity befell this metropolis that has hardly had its parallel in the history of municipalities in modern times. A ring of pirates captured the government of this City and kept possession of it for almost three years, from 1869 to 1871. Their three prominent leaders were Tweed, Commissioner of Public Works; Connolly, the Comptroller, and Sweeny, the Commissioner of Parks. The office of Mayor was held by a man who was their easy tool. The Legislature of the State was, partly through ignorance and partly through bribery, their willing instrument. The leader of this ring of pirates had been in training for his leadership through a dozen years of office holding. He had not become suddenly the outrageous and utter pirate and thief that he now proved to be. Finally he, together with his comrades, was given by State law the exclusive legal power of making appropriation of all moneys raised for this City by taxes or loans and also with indefinite authority to borrow. The beginnings of their power dated as far back as 1857, but it was not till the so-called Tweed Charter was passed in 1870 that these pirates had things entirely their own way. A trustworthy historian says of the Tweed ring:

"The aggregate of fraudulent bills audited after the passage of the Tweed Charter was about \$12,250,000 in 1870, and \$3,400,000 in 1871.

"The percentages of the theft, comparatively moderate in 1869, reached 66 per cent. in 1870 and later 85 per cent. Tweed got 24 per cent., and his tools, shares proportioned to their real or supposed value to him. Over \$250,000 was sent to Albany to be distributed among the members of the Legislature."

This is not the whole story of the piracy that was practiced.

It happened that yonder court-house was the locality of their most outrageous robberies. It has been proposed that this Tweed court-house be torn down. Before this is done let us recall that the courts themselves did not unanimously resist those pirates. Samuel J. Tilden declared that "shameful perversions of judicial processes and judicial power characterized 1869." He said of the Tweed pirates: "The corrupt oligarchy whose tools these judges were seemed to sit enthroned over the prostrate people of our metropolis." Judges of the Supreme Court were impeached, found guilty and consigned to disgrace. Therefore, let the Tweed court-house remain a reminder forever to New York that trusted officials and exalted judges may be seduced by love of money to become betrayers of all that is most precious to the citizen. The rulers of Jerusalem, with Judas' thirty pieces of silver, built a cemetery of which the Sacred History says: "Wherefore that field was called Acedema, the field of blood, unto this day." So the rulers of New York, Tweed ring and judges, left us yonder court-house as a memento of their betrayal of the offices committed to their trust and of millions of stolen money, wherefore it is called the "Tweed Court-House" to this day, and I trust will remain forever as a warning to the citizens of this great city. The City Hall and Court-House robbers were as much worse than other pirates as a traitor who professes loyalty to his master and yet robs him is worse than a thief who professes nothing more than to be working for booty. Like Captain Kidd, who first trod the pavements of New York a trusted officer of the British Crown, but who betrayed his trust when he converted his vessel into a pirate ship, so Tweed was trusted. Not sixty days before his largest theft it was said of Tweed by one of the foremost editors of the City that he was "in a fair way to distinguish himself as a reformer," and that "he had put the people of Manhattan under great obligation." It is true that not everybody trusted Tweed. Many worthy citizens had long suspected him and his crew, but they had not been able to prove anything against him.

It was in July, 1871, that certain so-called secret accounts were copied from the records of the City Comptroller by one of the clerks and were given to the public. They indicated that enormous payments of moneys had been made somewhere for very small value received. By this publication there grew up a general conviction that robberies had been committed against the City on a large scale.

The disclosures occurring in the Comptroller's office, that officer began to suspect that he was to be offered up by his accomplices as a sacrifice to public suspicion. Growing alarmed, he was willing to seek a compromise with the most vigorous representatives of the defrauded public. He consented, in order to save himself, to permit one of their number to be made Deputy Comptroller with complete command of the office in his stead. The citizens who were urgently pressing their attack upon the pirates, among whom ex-Mayor William F. Havemeyer and Samuel J. Tilden were prominent, wanted a man who should take up this position inside the lines of the public enemy. The citizen whom they selected was Andrew Haswell Green. I quote from a record made by Mr. Tilden of the results which followed from Mr. Green's consenting to occupy the place of Deputy Comptroller. He says:

"The possession of the Comptrollership by the reformers was a fatal embarrassment to the ring. It created doubt and dismay in all their actions. It protected the records on which all civil and criminal actions must be founded. All the investigations were fruits of that possession; so was also the discovery of judicial proofs in the National Broadway Bank and collection of such proofs. It broke the prestige of the ring."

Mr. Green's adventurous entry into the office of the Comptroller and his achievements there, as thus summed up by one who was as fully possessed of the history of that day as any other man, bring to my memory an incident of history which I offer as an illustration and a parallel. I have been reading a recent notable biography of Commodore Paul Jones. A good many pages are given there to the history of the first sea fight ever fought by the navy of the United States. The American ship had come to close quarters with the British vessel, which was a much newer and stronger craft. Their rigging and their yardarms were interlaced. Various attempts had been made by the Americans to carry the opposing ship, but they had been fiercely re-



pulsed, and the result was doubtful. Then, by the command of the American Commodore, there was sent a young midshipman named Fanning up into the maintop and out upon the main yardarm into the very midst of the rigging of the enemy. From that point of vantage, the midshipman began to drop hand grenades down among the British. Finally he saw a partly open hatchway, at which he aimed his missiles. On the third trial he sent a grenade through the hatchway down to the lower deck. There was a pile of cartridges, with some loose powder, lying about. The burning grenade ignited the whole mass. An explosion followed. At once the lower tier of the enemy's starboard guns were silenced, one-half of the gunners and sailors having been killed or crippled by the explosion. This feat, the historian declares, decided the battle.

So Andrew Haswell Green, charged with the comparatively subordinate office of Deputy Comptroller, from that point of vantage threw the missile which shattered the Tweed ring. It is firmly established by the undisputed testimony of Samuel J. Tilden that there would not have been force enough in all the attacks that had been made by the public press, except for the facts that were furnished by Andrew Haswell Green. In Mr. Tilden's works, in an article which bears the title "Figures That Could Not Lie," is given an affidavit made by Mr. Tilden to the effect that, happening casually one day in the office of the Comptroller, he was consulted by Mr. Andrew H. Green, Deputy Comptroller, and was requested by the said Green to make some investigations. This investigation was to be in the accounts of the National Broadway Bank. Mr. Tilden goes on to say that from these accounts and from the books of the Comptroller's office, he was enabled to trace into the pockets of Tweed and his fellow pirates two-thirds of about \$6,000,000 that had been paid out fraudulently on certain bills, chiefly for this Tweed courthouse in this City Hall Park. Mr. Tilden says:

"This information converted a strong suspicion into a mathematical certainty; it furnished judicial proof against the guilty parties."

Thus Andrew Haswell Green, from his point of vantage, right in the midst of the pirates and in some sense from over their heads, threw the burning missile which shattered them. The story of that naval battle which I have quoted states that after the conflict was over those of the enemy who were taken prisoners declared that after the explosion had occurred they had no more stomach for the fight. In like manner, after the consternation that was created in the Tweed ring by the facts that came from the office of Mr. Green, there was no more fight left in their supporters. At the City election, held a few weeks later, the robbers were utterly overturned. Sweeney fled to Canada, Connolly was allowed to go free, but the captain of the pirates, William M. Tweed, was indicted, and notwithstanding all the obstacles and delays which his money and his legal advisers were able to devise, he was within two years sent to State prison and clothed in the garb of the felon. It is true that he was afterwards granted a second trial and enabled to escape to Spain; but even there he was arrested and brought back as a criminal, was held for further trial and died miserably in the public jail. Thus by the facts from the Comptroller's desk was the crew of pirates miserably destroyed. The work thus begun by Andrew H. Green was continued by him for five years, during which he was vested with the full power of the office. After the utterly loose and dishonest methods of his predecessors, he felt called to enforce in strictest fashion every possible measure against not only dishonest but even doubtful claims. He made enemies by this strictness, but the times justified the strictness. Mr. Green's fifty years of life had prepared him for the hour. He had learned economy by his struggle through many years for a livelihood. His first property had been acquired by such severe effort that he was likely to err on the side of ultra economy. He said to a friend that it was more difficult for him to give away ten dollars than it was for men of equal wealth who had inherited fortunes or made their money by easy methods to give away hundreds. Such a weakness, if it was a weakness, may be forgiven a man who consecrated so much of time and brain and labor to the service of the community entirely without expectation of pecuniary recompense.

This habit of extreme economy and careful valuation of every dollar helped make Mr. Green the man for the emergency of 1871. He was resolved upon giving the people full value for their money. The sin of public office and the sin of men who hold positions of trust in private corporations is that they trade upon the confidence which has been awakened in the minds of their fellow citizens. If William M. Tweed were living to-day he would probably state his case thus: "It so happened that I came into control of a court house property of which the market value was only a million dollars, but I was smart enough to capitalize this court house at fifteen million dollars, all of it being 'preferred stock.' I got the community of New York to take the whole fifteen millions of 'preferred stock,' paying for it in cash at par value. Granting that the profit to me and my partners was ten or twelve million dollars above all expenses, was this too great a reward for such financial ability as mine?"

This is one way of using a position of trust—Andrew H. Green would have none of this. He believed that he was bound to make good to others, to the extent of his ability, the value for which they paid.

William M. Tweed, who gave this City a one-million-dollar court house at a rating of somewhere from five to fifteen millions of dollars, is one type of man that grows up in a commercial city; Andrew H. Green, who gave the City a Central Park at exactly what the Central Park cost, is the other type of business man. Even if Tweed gave a charity \$100 where Andrew Haswell Green gave but a dollar, nevertheless, the one should be abased and the other should be exalted.

It will be six years day after to-morrow since the cities, towns and villages clustering about Manhattan Island were, together with that island, unified into a great municipality entitled "The City of New York." Thirty years before that date this notable consummation was proposed by Andrew H. Green in a formal report made to the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park. The report was called forth by the fact that, as Commissioner of Parks, he had been obliged to consider the laying out of public places in the north end of Manhattan Island. He found that the upper part of this Island, which then constituted New York City, was five miles further away from the City Hall than was the south end of the County of Westchester, which was then outside the City and connected with it only by poor and shabby bridges. He argued, therefore, for the acquirement by New York City of what is now the chief part of the Borough of The Bronx. He shows in his paper how in one township bordering the Harlem river were no less than twelve villages, in another township nine villages. He presented strong and seemingly unanswerable arguments for the acquirement of these southern townships of Westchester by The City of New York. This movement resulted five years later, in the year 1873, in the annexation to New York of Morrisania, West Farms and Kingsbridge, and to still further additions in the year 1895.

The facts which led the mind of Mr. Green to seek the extension of the City northward would not allow him to stop. He asked himself this question, "If Harlem river, a navigable waterway, ought to have both its shores under one city, why not the great East river? Why not the channel between Manhattan and Staten Islands?" His logic would have been just as ready to include the west side of the Hudson river had not the United States Constitution and the rights of New Jersey come in his way. He applauded the inclusion of the Jersey shore as a part of the port of entry of New York controlled by its Custom House and its port officers. He admits, however, in this report of 1868 that the North river, which stretches to 4,000 feet between pierhead lines, is a harder problem than the other waters that border Manhattan Island.

Finally he sums up by saying that the advantage accruing from a consolidation of a portion of Westchester with New York and Brooklyn, with one executive head, will soon force itself upon the public. He did not, however, at that time deem it wise to urge a consolidation to which very few people had as yet given any thought. He says a competent body may be constituted without territorial consolidation which may plan and build the public works needed by the several municipalities in common. He then adds, and he prints this in italics, the following sentence:

"It is not intended now to do more than direct attention to the important subject of bringing The City of New York and the County of Kings, a part of Westchester County and a part of Queens and Richmond, including the various suburbs of the City within a certain radial distance from the centre, under one common municipal government, to be arranged in departments under a single executive head."

This was in 1868—a generation ago. Twenty-two years later, in the year 1890, this plan of Mr. Green, which he had never forgotten, but had brought to the minds of the people as he had opportunity, was presented by him to the Legislature of the State in a private memorial. He had in the course of ten years served as a Commissioner of the Reservation at Niagara Falls and a Commissioner to consider the plans for a bridge across the Hudson. He had also been an original Commissioner

of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge. Thus, while not possessed of any engrossing or lucrative office, he was so placed as to keep before his mind as a chief thought the welfare of his City. It was no sudden or giant stride which brought him to the position which he appears to occupy in this memorial of 1890. He had advanced to it by steady, unflinching steps through more than twenty years.

Mr. Green's memorial of 1890 is a notable paper. The mind which produced it is felt by the reader to have sought after the whole truth. He has studied every island and cape and inlet and river of what is now New York, and knows the value and possibility of every acre of the territory. He has mastered the history of the chief cities of the world. He has worked out for himself the laws under which the great city evolves. He has possessed himself of the science of the great city. He does not argue with his reader; he is the farthest possible from the polemic in his method; he arrays the facts in such number and magnitude that you cannot but be impressed. He shows that many converging lines of facts require a Greater New York, for the highest welfare of the community, as surely as the converging tracks of the Hudson River or Pennsylvania railroads, as they enter the metropolis, require one great central railroad station to receive and shelter their thousands of trains and hundreds of thousands of passengers.

In the beginning of this memorial we have placed vividly before us the existing artificial divisions of what is now New York. In 1890 there were three counties, two fractions of counties, two cities and fifteen townships. He pictures their future should they continue as fragments of cities. Over against these disordered, discordant and often belligerent municipalities he presents the ideal of a single city government in which all the divisions are harmoniously combined. He takes up in succession the great material interests of this entire territory. In a striking way he treats of the water system, and shows that though commonly looked upon as designed to separate populations one from another, it really and effectively unifies them. He portrays the spoliation and injuries that are committed against the navigable waters of New York, and especially against the shores bordering upon them. Both the land and the water are wrongfully employed by marauders, from the giant corporations, who break the commandment, "Thou shalt not steal," down to the obscure captain of a garbage boat or mud scow.

He presents the case of great transportation companies building their railroads toward the City, which, while they are to be heartily welcomed, will also bear to be watched and are altogether too powerful to be resisted by any mere fraction of a municipality.

He catalogues the dangers to health and life arising from smoke and stench, from bad drainage and noxious manufactories which cannot be successfully met by municipalities when they are arrayed one over against the other. He turns our attention to the gangs of lawbreakers, rogues and criminals, showing how control of them is made far more difficult when they can pass in a few minutes from under the government of one city into that of another. He is entirely familiar with the subject of communications by bridges and tunnels, and shows how difficult each enterprise is made when two or more municipalities must join as partners in the construction. He does not forget the need and craving of a crowded community for breathing places, for parks and parkways, for open places for the little children and for walled-in cemeteries in which to lay away the dead. He proves how difficult it is to make use of outlying territory as it ought to be made use of for future populations, so long as there is no central municipality that is in control of the land. He demonstrates that the chief interest of New York City is not, as many suppose, her commerce with other lands, but is rather her manufactures and domestic commerce. The difficulties of meeting the wants of interior commerce and manufactures is vastly increased when each important question must be taken up and handled by rival municipalities. Private interests tend constantly in modern civilization to strengthen themselves and to facilitate their work by consolidating themselves under strong leadership; the community which must, from time to time, resist or control such consolidations commits a folly if it neglect to gather its forces under a powerful municipal government. By unanswerable facts Mr. Green showed how Brooklyn was striving to get near to New York and New York to get near to Brooklyn by every material device that the skill of man could achieve. He demonstrated how foolish, therefore, it was for the people patiently to bear the disadvantages of an incongruous and disjointed government. With his patient, comprehensive and kindly array of facts, he made it to appear as if the stars of heaven in their courses were all fighting in the interest of the Greater New York, while, on the other side, it was, in chief part, either the uneasy apprehension of harm to some particular neighborhood or of harm to the interests of some political leader that moved men to opposition. Mr. Green's arguments prevailed. Every one of the four counties concerned voted "yes" upon the question of consolidation, November 6, 1894. The Commission to draft the Charter was appointed by the State, June 9, 1896, with Mr. Green as chairman. Prominent among the other members was the present Mayor of the City, the Hon. Seth Low. By the fact of his nativity in the city of Brooklyn and his services there for four years as its Chief Magistrate, and his adoption afterwards of Manhattan Island as his residence and his position here in civic affairs, our present Mayor held an eminent place upon the Commission. The Charter thus drafted became a law November 4, 1897. The new City of New York began to exist January 1, 1898.

On the twenty-second of May, 1898, Mr. Green was invited by the City Legislature to accept congratulations for his work in the forming of the Greater New York. A thoughtful address was given by him in which he emphasized such facts as the following:

"More than any other community, we have had greatness thrust upon us. The question of the government of great cities is nowhere else brought to such a conspicuous trial. Our example will effect great interests throughout this country and the world. The great cities of Europe which are national capitals can give us little information for our needs; we occupy an original field. If there is legislation prejudicial to the City at Albany, it will have to be blamed on the lack of force of the twenty Senators and sixty Assemblymen that go up from New York, being two-fifths of the entire body."

On only one important question was Mr. Green seriously disappointed. He advocated a local legislature, consisting of two houses, each elected by popular suffrage. But three years' trial proved that the two popular legislative bodies were more than the City could endure. The Municipal Council was abolished, the Aldermen only were retained, while the Board of Estimate and Apportionment became practically an upper legislative house as well as a cabinet of administration. Andrew H. Green wanted popular self-government in the utmost possible measure. Two legislative houses give this, no doubt, more nearly than one, provided their members work not for themselves, but for the public. The result proved that it was asking too much of the community to provide two local legislatures who would do their strict duty as citizens and patriots. There was a general agreement that we should try to secure only one—namely, the House of Aldermen. To this House larger powers have been given by the amended charter. The importance and dignity of each seat in this body is thus greatly enhanced. The hope of the people is that in this House of Aldermen the ideal of Andrew H. Green of a wise, dignified, honest and efficient municipal legislature will fully be attained.

Although six years have now passed since the organization of the Greater New York, no public monument has yet been established in honor of that event. It is true that a gold medal was struck as a memorial and was presented to Andrew H. Green on the 6th of October, 1898. This, however, was done by a committee of citizens; nor can it be called in a true sense a public memorial. I am not, I hope, transgressing the liberty granted me to-day if I suggest the establishment of a fitting monument of Andrew H. Green and of the founding of the Greater New York. Whoever has studied the map of a great ancient city, Constantinople, or Athens, or Rome, has observed that the successive boundaries are marked by walls or traces of walls. On the map of Rome, one may trace the wall of Servius Tullius, of Aurelian, and possibly of Leo. Until thirty years ago the boundaries of New York City on every side were the tidal waters that surrounded the Island of Manhattan; but now through the successive movements, of which Andrew H. Green was the leader, the boundary lines have grown to full one hundred miles. Four-fifths of this great extent is grandly marked out by nature, by the tidal waters that encompass our City of the Waters. What nobler bounds of any city than the lower Hudson, the Upper Bay, the Kill Von Kull, the Staten Island Sound, the Arthur Kill, the Lower Bay, the open Ocean and the Sound. Any city of old, a Nineveh or Babylon, could surround herself with a pile of bricks. But what city, save New York, has girt herself for four-score miles with floods of mighty waters? There remain, however, seven miles from the Hudson to the Sound, and twice seven miles from the Sound to the ocean which



is not thus grandly marked out by nature. The line from the Hudson to the Sound has been tentatively and obscurely marked by ordinary street monuments, a few inches square, set by the City Engineers. The line across Long Island has not been indicated in even this inconspicuous way. Now we do not want walls to mark these bounds. The ancient walls shut out light and air and liberty of travel. But may we not appropriately define the utmost bounds of this city of ours upon its landward side by a memorial boundary road, to be called the Andrew Haswell Green Boundary Road, stretching seven miles from the Hudson river to the Sound, and twice seven miles from the Sound to the ocean—this boundary road to be a parkway of three or four rods in breadth, adapted as far as may be to local wants in the thinly inhabited region where it must run. A boundary line such as this could be readily reached at many points by boat or rail from all the city. Every one of the million scholars of our public schools could thus learn what are the City's limits. In Great Britain they preserve, in many places, a custom which is centuries old, of perambulating each year the bounds of the parish. Not officers only, nor children, but all the people turn out to march about the parish bounds. If the Andrew H. Green Boundary Road were established, as proposed, what a notable day might be enjoyed by New Yorkers, whether boys and girls in grammar or high school, or Aldermen, or Borough Presidents, or City Engineers, or private citizens, not a perambulation perhaps, but a circumvention of the bounds of our City—perhaps five or six hours on a swift boat over the eighty miles of water and two or three hours by wagon or on foot over the boundary road upon the land. To take such a course on some fine day of June or October, should be required of each student in the high schools, the colleges and the universities of the metropolis. More than half of the line of such a boundary road from the Hudson to the Sound would be identical with the north boundary of Van Cortlandt and Pelham bay parks. A large portion of it would doubtless be found identical with roadways now existing. The land to be purchased for the entire parkway, if made of modest width, would be hardly one hundred acres; its cost a mere trifle in comparison to the increase of value which it would create along its course. Such a monument would harmonize with the character and life which it would commemorate. It would have historic significance. It would join country and city as he loved to join them. It would better the condition of the remotest parts of our City. In the very last words which Mr. Green spoke in public he gave his view of the end to which life should be dedicated. Four days before being taken away, while attending as trustee the annual meeting of the Isabella Heimath, he made a brief address which was set down upon paper. He spoke of the work there done for humanity, closing with this noble sentence. I trust that when this municipality shall build his monument, whether it be the "Andrew Haswell Green Boundary road" or some other, that this sentence may be placed there, inscribed upon enduring granite. He said: "Let us then continue with zeal the work here so auspiciously begun, and secure to ourselves that richest of rewards—the satisfaction of having done what we could to better the condition of those about us."

Report of Committee on Laws and Legislation—  
No. 192.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on February 9, 1904 (Minutes, page 535), the annexed resolution in favor of closing City Departments on Saturday, February 20, 1904, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, Saturday, February 20, 1904, is a half holiday, immediately preceding Sunday, February 21, 1904, and Monday, February 22, 1904 (Washington's Birthday); and

Whereas, Many people are desirous of leaving town, and do leave, on the Friday evening preceding the dates above given and remain away until the Tuesday morning following; therefore be it

Resolved, That the heads of the several Departments of the Government of The City of New York be and they are hereby requested to close their offices on Saturday, February 20, 1904, and all other offices not by law required to be kept open for public business to be kept closed on said day.

#### SPECIAL ORDERS.

Alderman Marks called up Special Order No. 3, being a report and ordinance.  
No. 94—(S. O. No. 3.)

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on January 19, 1904 (Minutes, page 286), the annexed ordinance in relation to the removal of snow and ice, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed ordinance to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

ISAAC MARKS, JAMES COWDEN MEYERS, JAMES W. REDMOND, WILLIAM J. BOYHAN, DANIEL E. SICKLES, Committee on Laws and Legislation.

Alderman Marks moved that the ordinance be amended by striking out the last paragraph of section 1.  
Which was adopted.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalks in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

First—Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or person having charge of any building or lot (a lot meaning 25 front feet or fraction thereof) of ground in The City of New York shall within four hours after the fall of any snow, and within four hours after the forming of any ice on the sidewalk or in the gutter in the front of any such building or lot, remove or cause the same to be removed from such sidewalk or gutter under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge severally and respectively; but where said snow falls or ice forms between the hours of 8 o'clock in the evening and 5 o'clock in the morning, this ordinance will be complied with by removing or causing the same to be removed before 9 o'clock in the morning.

"The provisions of this section shall not apply to streets or avenues in The City of New York which have not been curbed, guttered or flagged."

Second—In case the ice or snow on the sidewalk shall be so congealed that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or person having charge of any building or lot of ground as aforesaid shall, within the time specified in the last preceding section, cause the sidewalk opposite his, her or their premises to be strewn with ashes or sand under the penalty of one dollar to be paid by the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge thereof, severally and respectively.

Third—All ordinances of The City of New York and of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting herewith in penalty or otherwise, are hereby repealed.

Fourth—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman McCall then offered the following substitute:

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Regulating the Cleaning of Streets and Sidewalks and Keeping Them Clean, and Removing Snow and Ice, Dirt and Other Materials Therefrom in The City of New York."

It is Ordained by the Board of Aldermen as follows:

Section 8 of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Regulating the Cleaning of Streets and Sidewalks and Keeping Them Clean, and Removing Snow and Ice, Dirt and Other Material Therefrom in The City of New York," adopted the 31st day of July, 1902, and approved by the Mayor the 6th day of August, 1902, as amended by an ordinance adopted the 10th day of March, 1903, approved by the Mayor the 23d day of March, 1903, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 8. Every owner, lessee, tenant or occupant of any building or lot of ground abutting on any street or public place, or any agent having charge thereof,

who shall fail to remove the snow and ice, dirt and other materials from the paved sidewalk in front thereof, as required by section 6 of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, either upon confession of the defendant or upon competent testimony, shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar (\$1), nor more than three dollars (\$3) for each such offense, or by imprisonment for not less than one (1) nor more than five (5) days.

Alderman O. J. Murphy moved to amend by striking from the first line of section 8 the word "tenant."

Alderman McCall moved that the whole matter be made a Special Order for the next meeting, at 3 o'clock p. m.

Building and Sanitary Inspection Company,

Hon. JOSEPH CASSIDY, President, Borough of Queens:

We report as follows the results of a sanitary inspection and survey of the Queens County Courthouse and Jail, made to your order on the 18th, 19th and 21st days of June and the 1st day of July, 1903:

In making inspections it is frequently found that some portion of the drainage system is located beneath floors, or behind walls, or is covered with casings and cannot be inspected; reference is made in the report to such conditions, and responsibility for defects in these hidden pipes is not assumed by the company. After the "recommendations" have been carried out there should be a reinspection, and if leaks are still developed, after all visible pipe has been made right, it will be necessary to have the hidden pipes uncovered.

A test with smoke and chemical under light pressure was applied to the drainage systems in the above buildings.

#### Leaks Disclosed by the Test.

1, 2, 3 and 4:

At couplings on basin traps in the jury room on the west side, in the jury room on the east side, in the main toilet room on the first floor and in the main toilet room in the basement. Such couplings depend on perishable washers for tightness and are not to be relied upon. These traps should be replaced by "S" traps, with screwed-in connections of iron pipe standard, and without couplings or unions.

5 and 6:

On the branch soil pipes between the cells on the lower tier in the section of the jail used as an administration building. There are two openings, one on each of the branch soil pipes, for the east and west sides of the building. These openings should be enlarged and threaded to receive iron plugs, screwed in, in red lead.

7:

Smoke escaped through all of the leader connections, indicating that these are not trapped. Leaders should be trapped by accessible traps, placed within the building and provided with one cleanout on the inlet side, closed by heavy brass or iron bodied ferrules, having heavy brass screw plugs with tapered threads of iron pipe standard.

Note.—Some of the drains for the leaders are exposed to frost. Incidentally to the placing of the traps the branch leader drains should be rearranged and run within the building up to a point opposite the foot of each leader.

Owing to the profuse escape of the smoke and chemical, other leaks, if any exist, may have remained undetected.

#### Obstruction Disclosed by the Test.

No smoke escaped through the soil pipe extending above the roof of the Court House at the southeast corner of the building. There is a long flat offset on the corresponding pipe on the west side, where it is exposed, and the presumption is that this pipe is somewhat similarly arranged, and that there is an accumulation of rust scale at the base of the vertical line where it turns at right angles to join the flat offset. This pipe should be cleared and it and the corresponding pipe at the west side should be rearranged. To prevent further obstructions, and if it is found not to be practicable to so alter these pipes, the portions above the offset should be replaced by pipe less liable to corrosion than iron. For this purpose lead-lined wrought iron or brass may be used.

The drainage system, where visible, is of extra heavy cast-iron pipe.

Some of the vent pipes are of black wrought iron. Generally they are poorly arranged. Many of them can serve as waste pipes in case of obstruction to the latter.

There is one interior private toilet room on the first floor, to which access could not be obtained, that appears to be without ventilation.

The basins are of poor type, with inaccessible overflows and the fixtures in the kitchen and their surroundings are bad. They are of wood, worn and saturated.

The water supply system is poorly designed and badly installed. The pipes are not covered and on one of the days of inspection water of condensation was dripping from most of them.

The pump is inadequate to supply the water needed, unless continuously operated at high speed, and under those circumstances it is very noisy. We are informed that on this account the pump cannot be operated while the Court is in session, and in consequence, at times the fixtures are without a water supply, and this is of particular importance, as the water closets in the Jail are not provided with cisterns to hold water in reserve for flushing.

There is a large and continual waste of water through defective stopcocks, valves and cisterns, which adds to the inconvenience caused by the inadequacy of the pump.

#### General Recommendation.

The water supply system should be renewed throughout under plans and specifications that will secure a good design. New pumps should be provided, of sufficient capacity. Steam pumps should not be used on account of their noise. Electric pumps of good design can be installed in such a manner as to be nearly noiseless, and if they are used the present storage tanks may remain, otherwise additional storage tanks will be required, and it is desirable that the water which is largely used for drinking purposes should not be kept stored in tanks for a long time.

The vent pipe system should be renewed throughout; the new work should be arranged to discharge rust accumulation and the branch vent pipes should be arranged above the outlets of the fixtures.

The above, and the repairs enumerated under the headings of "leaks" and "obstructions," and a considerable part of the repairs given in the itemized list appended, are essential changes.

The water closets and urinals in the Court House, while of modern types, are of a cheap class, with the exception of a few water closets and the cisterns; metal work and wood work in connection with them is in bad order, and cannot be repaired so as to be materially improved. Even after a considerable expenditure of money, little permanent improvement in their condition could be accomplished, and in a short time they would be as bad or worse than before the repairs. Many of the water closets are set on wooden floors.

The basins throughout are of poor type, already referred to.

Taking the foregoing into consideration, the fixtures should be renewed throughout, with the exception of the "Prompto" water closet. The new fixtures should be set open and free from enclosing or surrounding woodwork on marble floor slabs. The fixtures in the hall are in many cases in very bad condition. A number of stop-cocks through which they are supplied with water are bent and broken, and in consequence unflushed and offensive. Some of these stop-cocks can probably be repaired, but most of them will need to be replaced.

An important matter in both Court House and jail is the neglect of unused fixtures. There is a public toilet room in the basement of the Court House. The basement is not used by the public, and ample accommodations seem to be provided for them in the public toilet room on first floor; in consequence the toilet room in the basement is very little used. There is an unused sink in a store room in the basement. Whole tiers of cells in the jail and whole sections of cells in the administration building are unused. During periods of disuse the water seals in the traps of the fixtures in these cells evaporates, leaving direct openings through which drain air escapes into the building. At the time of inspection the traps of many of the fixtures were found to be absolutely dry, and in many other cases there was not enough water to form a seal.

The basement toilet in the Court House should be dispensed with and the openings into the pipe system closed by iron plugs, calked or screwed in.



The unused sink in the cellar should be similarly cut off.

With regard to the unused tiers of cells in the jail and the unused sections in the administration building, these if possible should be disconnected and the openings into the drainage system closed by iron plugs calked in. If, in anticipation of the need of these tiers and sections it is not deemed advisable to do this, it is imperatively necessary that the fixtures in them should have constant attention, be kept in repair the same as those that are in use and should be freely flushed with water at least twice a week. Unless one of these things is not done the sanitary condition of both buildings will be injuriously affected and a constant nuisance maintained, and the buildings will not be fit for occupancy.

The unused sections of cells in the administration building are not kept clean. The unused cells are littered with rubbish, soiled bed clothing, etc., and food has been left so long that it has become covered with mold. These sections of cells should be thoroughly cleaned and the accumulations referred to removed.

#### Roofs.

The mansard roof, extending from the level of the top floor to the flat roof, is of galvanized iron, in bad order, and we are of the opinion that it is past repair. It should be renewed and the new roof made of copper. The outlets to the leaders on the roof of the jail and the administration building are obstructed. Water stands in the gutters, in some places to the depth of nearly a foot, and this has caused corrosion. Through these leaky gutters much of the rain water soaks into the walls. This has already absolutely affected the latter, and they are stained and unsightly. The obstructions to the leader outlets should be removed, and new gutters provided for. The greater part and repairs should be made on the portions retained. Some of the leaders are corroded through. These should be replaced where defective. The small roof over the entrance at the east side of the administration building is littered with rubbish and water stands on it. This rubbish should be removed and the leader cleared if it is obstructed.

1. The house tank is not covered. Its overflow is directly connected to a waste pipe. The water of house tanks, which may be used for drinking, cooking and toilet purposes, should be carefully safe-guarded. The tank should be covered with a dust-proof cover, having a ventilator protected by wire gauze and cotton. The overflow should be dip-trapped to within a few inches from the bottom of the tank, with a small vent pipe at the crown to prevent siphonage arranged to discharge over the slop sink on the top floor, and provided with a flap-valve at the lower end over the sink. It would be advisable to provide a regulating device whereby the pumps might be automatically controlled.

2. The fixtures in the kitchen on the top floor of the Courthouse should be renewed by those of non-absorbent material, set open, and the woodwork about them should be removed and replaced by non-absorbent material. The local vent pipes for the soup kettles and other kitchen appurtenances are corroded through and no longer operated. A proper system of local vent pipes of copper should be provided for these fixtures, carried to an heated flue, or an air current should be maintained through them by means of a fan. The steam connections for the soup kettles and other kitchen appliances are leaky. These should be repaired or renewed as required.

3. The stop-cocks of the kitchen apparatus generally are leaky. These should be repaired or replaced.

4. Steam drips are connected directly to the drainage system. These should be disconnected and the openings closed by iron plugs, screwed in, and the drip pipes arranged to discharge into a cooling tank from which a valved outlet may be provided to the drain.

5. The joints on the house drain in the engine room have been injured by contraction and expansion, caused by the hot drips above referred to, and the drain itself is sagged and out of alignment. These joints should be remade with oakum and lead, and the drain should be restored to alignment and properly supported.

6. The trap of the Engineer's sink is not ventilated, and the trap itself is not worth repairing. It should be replaced by a new one with a 2-inch galvanized wrought iron vent pipe, connecting with one of the main vent pipes.

7. The floor pavement in the front part of the boiler room is broken. This should be repaired.

8. The lowermost tread of the iron stairs in the corridor is broken and in dangerous condition. A new iron step should be provided here.

9. Water finds its way into the cellar through the walls at several points. Part of this is probably due to the conditions of the roof gutters already described. Some of it may be due to lack of pavement and the improper grading about the building. If water continues to come through the walls after the roof gutters have been repaired, the ground about the building should be regraded and paved so as to discharge water away from the walls.

#### Heating and Ventilation.

There is no system of ventilation for the Courthouse, and natural ventilation is depended on for the jail. Air from outdoors is heated and blown by a fan into the court rooms, but no outlets are provided for removing foul air.

A system of mechanical ventilation should be installed for each building, whereby fresh air, warmed in cold weather, would be forced into the buildings and the vitiated air removed. Incidental to the installation of systematic ventilation, the heating system will need to be remodeled.

## QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1903.

To the Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending December 31, 1903:

## NORTH RIVER.

## Rector Street Section.

On the 16th of December, 1903, the Commissioner of Docks authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall in this vicinity for and at the expense of the owners of the property to be improved. Work has been begun by the inspection of rip rap to be placed over the bulkhead wall area. Temporary repairs to Pier 6 within the lines of this section are being made.

## Cedar Street Section.

By the action of the Commissioner of Docks of December 10, 1902, a section of the bulkhead or river wall was authorized in the vicinity of Cedar street, North river. This section will extend from about opposite the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets northerly to a point 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street, and is in accordance with the new plan for the improvement of the water front as determined by the Commissioner of Docks November 25, 1902, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 3, 1902. This work includes the removal of the old structures, including Piers, old 12, 13 and 14, together with the sheds thereon. Work on this section has been in progress during the quarter and substantial progress made, 90 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

This section includes Piers 10 and 11. Work on the construction of Pier 10, at the foot of Albany street, has been in progress, and a steel freight shed is being erected on the same. A contract has been prepared for the erection of Pier 11, but has not yet been let. A temporary approach to Pier 10 is being built and a sewer placed in the rear of the wall.

## Pier 22.

A contract, No. 805, has been awarded for an extension to the outer end of this pier, and work has been in progress during the quarter.

## Piers 27 and 28.

Test piles have been driven at the outer end of these piers to ascertain the nature of the river bottom preparatory to the preparation of a contract for extending the piers.

## Chelsea Section.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. Large property interests in this vicinity have been acquired and extensive work done toward the construction of the wall. Factories and other buildings occupying grounds recently condemned for the use of this Department have been sold at public auction and have been removed by the purchasers. The actual work of construction of the wall has been pushed and 439.12 linear feet of new wharfage room made. The old piers at Thirteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-first streets have been removed and the work of building a new pier at the foot of Twenty-second street is in progress. An isle of safety, at the foot of Twenty-third street, is also being placed and it is proposed to erect thereon an electrolier, a contract for which has been awarded.

## Fireboat Berth at Gansevoort Market Pier.

The office of the Fire Department was removed to the Gansevoort Market Pier from West Thirteenth street, under Bureau Order No. 1705.

## Pier West Thirty-first Street, No. 71.

An extension to the outer end of this pier is being built under Contract No. 806.

## Pier West Thirty-third Street, No. 73.

An extension to the outer end of this pier is being built under Contract No. 806.

## Pier West Thirty-sixth Street, No. 76.

An extension to the outer end of this pier is being built under Contract No. 813.

## West Forty-seventh Street.

An incinerator is being constructed by the Department of Street Cleaning in this locality under Commissioner's Order No. 194, and a platform built by the same Department under Bureau Order No. 972.

## Pier West Fifty-first Street.

The Commissioner of Docks having authorized under Bureau Order No. 1047 an extension of this pier from the outer end, work has been in progress during the quarter and has been completed. A shed is being erected on the pier by the Citizens' Steamboat Company, under Bureau Order No. 1510.

## Pier West Fifty-eighth Street.

The construction of a new pier at the foot of this street, under Contract No. 753, has been completed. This pier was completed with the exception of a small amount of work during the previous quarter, and the wharfage room made reported in the last Quarterly.

## West Fifty-ninth Street Section.

This section was authorized by a resolution of the Board of Docks of the 27th of June, 1900. Work has been in progress during the quarter.

## West Seventy-ninth Street.

A pier is being built at the foot of this street by the force of the Department, under Commissioner's Order No. 792. No work has been done on this pier during the quarter, as the work has been temporarily suspended.

## West Eightieth Street.

At this street a new pier has been in course of construction under Contract No. 807, and the work has been finished, making thereby new wharfage room amounting to 971 linear feet.

## Claremont Section.

The work at this section is being done under a resolution of the Board of Docks of the 16th of November, 1900. Progress has been made on this section during the quarter, although no actual new wharfage room has been made by the work done. Earth filling is in course of being placed in the rear of the wall at this section.

## One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street.

A platform is being constructed at this locality by Fred. Gegus under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## Spuyten Duyvil.

The old dock just north of Spuyten Duyvil was taken possession of and partially rebuilt by an order of the Commissioner of Docks, and piles were driven and physical possession taken of the land under water on the North river between Spuyten Duyvil and Riverdale under Bureau Order No. 1921.

## EAST RIVER.

## Peck Slip Section.

A section of the bulkhead wall in this vicinity was authorized by the Commissioner of Docks on the 14th of January, 1903, under Bureau Order No. 1000. Portions of Piers, old 24, 25 and 26, East river, and the sheds thereon are being removed to make way for the bulkhead wall and also for Piers, new 19 and 20. Work on the bulkhead wall has been under way and substantial progress made. This section includes Piers, new 19 and 20.

## Pier, New 19, or Peck Slip Pier West.

A new pier is in course of construction under Contract No. 795. The outer portion of this pier has been completed and 962 linear feet of new wharfage room made thereby.

## Market Section.

The only work done at this section during the quarter has been repairs made to the approach to Pier, new 29.

## Pier, New 34.

An extension was built to this pier under Contract No. 804 and 138.69 linear feet of new wharfage room made thereby. A steel freight shed was erected on the pier by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under a permit from the former Board of Docks. This latter work was completed during the quarter. A permit has been granted to extend the shed over the pier extension, but no work has yet been done on this part of the shed.

## Jefferson Section.

Under an action of the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1708, Pier, old 47, East river, was removed to make way for Pier, new 36, and a platform between Piers, old 49 and 50, removed to make way for Pier, new 38. A temporary row of piles was driven along the bulkhead line to support the inner end of Pier, new 38. The completion of Pier, new 36, adds 297 linear feet of new wharfage room made.

## Pier, New 38, or Montgomery Street Pier West.

A new pier is being constructed in this locality, under Contract No. 814.

## Pier, New 30.

The work of erecting a recreation structure on this pier has been in progress, under Contract No. 770, with the Snare & Triest Company.

## Pier, Third Street.

School fixtures were replaced on the promenade deck of the recreation structure on this pier by the Board of Education, under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries.

## Between Eighteenth and Twentieth Streets.

Asphalt pavement has been placed on the newly made land between these two streets by the Continental Asphalt Paving Company, under Contract No. 759, and the work completed.

## New Bellevue Section.

It having been found advisable to build a new section of the bulkhead or river wall outshore of the Bellevue section formerly built, the Commissioner of Docks authorized the same under Bureau Order No. 1859, and work has been in progress during the quarter.

## East Thirty-eighth Street Section.

The Board of Docks, by a resolution passed on the 4th of May, 1900, authorized the construction of the bulkhead wall in the vicinity of East Thirty-eighth street. Work has been in progress on this section during the quarter, and 69.69 linear feet of new wharfage room made. Earth filling is being placed in the rear of the wall and the new made land graded.

## Pier, Forty-sixth Street.

Test piles have been driven at the foot of this street, to ascertain the nature of the river bottom preparatory to preparing plans and specifications for the work of extending and raising this pier.

## Pier, Forty-ninth Street.

The construction of a new pier at the foot of this street has been in progress under Contract No. 773. The work has been completed and 359 linear feet of new wharfage room made thereby.

## East Seventy-fourth Street Section.

The work at this section, being done under a resolution of the Board of Docks of May 11, 1900, has been temporarily suspended.

## East Seventy-fifth Street Section.

The Commissioner of Docks on the 8th of October, 1903, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead or river wall in this vicinity. Dredging over the bulkhead wall area has been done for a distance of about 190 feet, and two temporary breakwaters are in course of construction, one at the foot of East Seventy-fifth street and one at the foot of East Seventy-sixth street.

Between One Hundred and Twenty-first, One Hundred and Twenty-second and One Hundred and Twenty-third Streets, Harlem River.

Test piles have been driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to preparing plans and specifications for proposed new piers in this vicinity.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second Streets, Harlem River.

Filling is being placed behind the crib bulkhead along One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Lexington avenue, under an order of the Commissioner of Docks.

## One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, Harlem River.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed at the above location by the Mott Haven Company, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth Streets, Harlem River.

The work of filling in behind the retaining wall at this location is in progress by the Rapid Transit Construction Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth Streets, Port Morris.

A retaining wall has been constructed around the coal pockets in this locality by the Central Union Gas Company, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## Blackwell's Island, East River.

An extension to connect the Metropolitan Hospital and Workhouse Docks has been built for the Department of Charities at this Island, and 101 linear feet of new wharfage room made thereby.



## Riker's Island, East River.

A new dock has been constructed on the westerly side of Riker's Island under Bureau Order No. 1667, for the Department of Correction, 137 linear feet of new wharfage room being made thereby.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Between Sixty-sixth Street and Wakeman Place.

A crib bulkhead with coal handling tower and intake tunnel are being constructed by the Edison Electric Illuminating Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1205.

Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets.

Five piers are in course of construction in this locality by the Bush Company, Limited, under permit from the former Board of Docks, under Secretary's Order No. 21424.

Between Fifty-first and Fifty-second Streets.

A new pier was built between these two streets under contract No. 777, and 1,060 linear feet of new wharfage room made thereby.

Pier, Fifty-second Street.

A new pier has been built at the foot of this street by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Atlantic Basin.

Extensive waterfront improvements are in progress in the Basin by the New York Dock Company, under various permits from the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Pier, Metropolitan Avenue.

The structure on the Recreation Pier at the foot of Metropolitan avenue has been repaired and painted under Contract No. 781.

Between Bay Forty-first Street and Twenty-sixth Avenue, Bath Beach.

The American Power and Construction Company are constructing a sheet pile bulkhead, marine railway and five buildings at this location under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Seagate, Coney Island.

At this locality the Seagate Association have built five groins from the bulkhead to about low water into the Atlantic ocean, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

West Eighth Street, Coney Island.

In this locality a sheet pile bulkhead, with two jetties projecting into the ocean, is being erected by W. B. Reynolds under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1893.

## BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Webster Avenue.

The Traitel Marble Company have erected a crib bulkhead in this locality under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1499.

Between Mills and Munson Streets, Astoria.

A retaining crib has been built by Stephen D. Halsey in this locality, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1971.

Lawrence Point, Astoria.

Two crib piers, with adjoining bulkheads, are being built by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company under Bureau Order No. 1620.

Winthrop Avenue, Astoria.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed in this vicinity by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company, in accordance with a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1356.

Bridge Street, Flushing Creek.

A crib bulkhead is being rebuilt in this locality by Augustus M. Ryan, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1907.

Rockaway Park, Jamaica Bay.

The work of filling in behind a retaining structure at this locality is being carried on by the Rockaway Park Improvement Company, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Commissioner's Order No. 159, and the West Rockaway Land Company are constructing a retaining wall and filling in behind the same and erecting a temporary bulkhead under permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Commissioner's Order No. 553.

Thetis Avenue, Jamaica Bay.

A sheet pile bulkhead is being constructed in this vicinity by the Queens Borough Gas and Electric Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1920.

Between Bond and Academy Streets, Rockaway Beach.

A bulkhead is being built in this locality by Jamieson & Bond, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Commissioner's Order No. 646.

Hammel Station, Rockaway Beach.

A protecting crib bulkhead has been erected in this locality by the Long Island Railroad Company under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1633.

Bayswater, Far Rockaway.

A new walkway in this locality has been constructed by the Bayswater Yacht Club, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1899.

## BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries. In addition a small pier was built at the foot of John street by Frank McWilliams, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Bureau Order No. 1809, and a wooden pier has been built at Rossville under Contract No. 809. Physical possession has been taken of the land under water at the foot of Tyson street, Bard avenue and Arrietta street, in the village of New Brighton, by driving a few piles over the area in each location, and test piles were driven at Summerfield avenue, Mariner's Harbor, to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to erecting a new pier.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North River.

Asphalt paving has been laid at various places along the North river, under order therefor where necessary to repair pavement already laid.

Pavement on the East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river water front as required, and new pavement laid between Eighteenth and Twenty-first streets with asphalt, under Contract No. 759.

Timber Basin, North River.

At the timber basin timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

Pile Basins.

The pile basins between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets, and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, on the North river, and at Sherman's creek, on the Harlem river, have been maintained in good order and condition.

Basin for Storage of Old Material, Brooklyn.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department Yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. Excavating and laying

pavement in the West Fifty-seventh street yard has been done. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

## Recreation Buildings.

Recreation buildings on the North and East rivers have been maintained and cared for, and repairs have been made where necessary. All the recreation buildings have been repaired and painted under Contract No. 781.

## Floating Property.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter, and has been repaired from time to time when necessary.

## Surveying Party.

All surveys of the waterfront and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been made. An extensive survey of the waterfront of the boroughs of Queens and Richmond is in progress. All the lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given as required. In addition to the above work an anemometer and weather vane, with the necessary supports, etc., has been erected on the roof of Pier "A," North river. In connection with the same an electrical register has been established and the records kept and filed.

## Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or private parties.

## Repairs.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

## Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the waterfront, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing, and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 6,790 linear feet.

Wharfage room destroyed by the City in preparing for new improvements is 1,251 linear feet.

The area of the City's piers has been increased by 155,782 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 2,726 linear feet.

The total number of visiting hours to the week will remain the same.

The matter of the suggested change for an isolated ward at Harlem Hospital has been investigated, and it is recommended that a Ducker portable cottage be erected to accommodate four patients, and that, when the building is ready for occupancy, arrangements be made with the Commissioner of Charities for the assignment of a Nurse during the day and one at night to attend the patients.

Part of the flue leading from the doctors' kitchen to the smokestack was recently covered with a supposedly fireproof material. The increased heat generated in the flue caused this covering to smoulder and char. Our fire department responded at once and tore away the covering, thus preventing any damage. An examination of the building shows that there was no danger of fire being communicated to it.

In accordance with your resolution, the matter of the need of a Graduate Nurse for the Out Patient Department of Harlem Hospital has been considered. Owing to the lack of funds it is impossible to carry out the suggestion. The idea is an excellent one, and perhaps later on, with the rearrangement of the appropriation, it will be possible to carry it into effect.

Two registered women Nurses, one from the Hudson Reformatory for Women and the other from the St. Lawrence State Hospital at Ogdensburg, have been secured to fill the positions, respectively, as Head Nurse in the Alcoholic Ward for Men and in the Prison Ward for Men. They will report for duty on February 1.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
