### Report of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the Quarter ending June 30, 1904.

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Charter, I respectfully submit the following report for the second quarter of my administration for your consideration.

In submitting same, I desire to call your attention to the very large increase in the percentage of the volume of business during the quarter as compared with the same period in 1903, and also to the very gratifying work which has been done and is now being performed in the way of improvements and to the enormous building operations now in progress in this borough.

The report of the financial transactions of the several bureaus comprising the Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending June 30, 1904, shows that of the \$1,067,409.67, balance available April 1, 1904, of the amount appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, there is still available \$595,870.85. During the quarter vouchers for \$272,924.94 have been forwarded to the Comptroller and the outstanding liabilities amount to \$198,613.88. The vouchers sent to the Comptroller for the payment of bond issues amounted to \$1,043,177.80, making a total of vouchers sent to the Comptroller during the quarter of \$1,639,048.65. For the various purposes for which this money was expended, I refer you to the detailed reports of the various bureaus.

The report of the financial transactions of the Bureau of Buildings shows that of the \$150,000, appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, there is still available \$79,643.15. The report of the Superintendent of the Bureau of Buildings shows that plans and specifications were filed in that bureau during the quarter for 1,664 new buildings at an estimated cost of \$12,345,595, and for alterations to 780 buildings at an estimated cost of \$1,267,218, making a total estimated cost of \$13,612,813, an increase of more than 85 per cent. over the estimated cost for new buildings and alterations during the same period of 1903. The building operations this year will be the most extensive in Brooklyn's history; the estimated cost of same the first six months of the year exceeds \$21,000,000.

Practically all of the preliminaries, such as the examination of and the location of streets, advertising and the other prescribed work in connection with the preparation of contracts have been completed in connection with the appropriation of the \$1,200,000 appropriated for repaving purposes for this year. By vigilant prosecution of the work of repaving during the quarter, the lack of accomplishment of repaving during the first quarter of the year when weather conditions were such as to absolutely prohibit work of this character has been more than offset.

The report of the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways shows a completed paving and repaving mileage of 12.35, an excess of 58 per cent. over the mileage for the same period in 1903. The percentage of cobblestone streets eliminated during the two quarters just passed exceeds the percentage eliminated for the same period last year by over 70 per cent.

The work of macadamizing King's highway is progressing steadily and its completion will inaugurate a fine suburban driveway from the Shore road to East New York. Surf avenue, an important improvement much needed, is now being executed.

It is also to be noted that during the quarter 9,854 miles of sewers were completed, as against 6,113 miles of sewers during the same quarter last year, an increase of over 61 per cent., increasing the mileage of sewers of the borough to approximately 716 miles.

The report of the Hon. John C. Brackenridge, Commissioner of Public Works, shows in detail the character of the contracts and of the work performed by the various bureaus subordinate to him.

The Assistant Commissioner of Public Works report shows that 55 contracts were entered into during the quarter, representing an estimated cost of \$784,453.25, an increase in the number of contracts awarded of 25 per cent. over the same period of last year.

The report of the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways has attached blue-prints showing all streets upon which work has been carried on by his Bureau, and has set forth the detailed information in a complete and legible form.

In the map room 27 assessment maps and lists in duplicate were prepared during the quarter, in addition to 170 plans for regulating, grading, repaving, etc., and 511 miscellaneous maps. Ninety-one preliminary estimates and maps on Local Board matters were furnished, representing work on which the estimated cost is \$1,426,600.

A reduction in the pay-roll of the Repair Division of the Bureau of Highways has been effected to the extent of almost 25 per cent. without the sacrifice of any of the important or necessary work of the Division.

The report of the Superintendent of the Bureau of Sewers shows that there are 53 contracts now in force under which the contractors are either already at work or ready to begin work. The estimated cost of these contracts is, in the aggregate, \$4,330,791.75. In addition to this, 17 contracts have been forwarded, in order that bids may be advertised for them in the corporation newspapers and the CITY RECORD, and these contract forms are either in the office of the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form, or in the Comptroller's office for registration. The estimated cost of the work to be done under these 17 contracts is, in the aggregate, \$281,950. The report furnishes a concise summary of the work of the Bureau, as detailed in the reports of the Chief Engineer of Sewers and the Superintendent of Maintenance, and contains a tabulated statement in regard to the status of all the work being prosecuted by the said Bureau and the value of the said work.

The report of the Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices shows that the work of reconstructing the Hall of Records has steadily progressed and is now completed excepting the patching and repairing of the old part of the structure. The alterations to the plumbing in the Kings County Jail, under an appropriation of \$20,000, have been contracted for. Five floating baths have been entirely renovated and placed in position for their summer business. The Montrose avenue interior bath building, the Huron street public bath and the Duffield street public bath have steadily progressed, and present indications point to the completion of the first named bath in August and the second and third in September. The work on the Gates avenue court-house is well in hand. The Disciplinary Training School, Magistrates' and Municipal Courts, Court of Special Sessions and the Wallabout Market Administration building have all received attention.

In the General Administration office 445 petitions for local improvements were received, 409 resolutions were adopted at meetings of Local Boards of Improvements, and 43 such meetings were held during the quarter.

I submit, as part of my report, the attached reports of the Commissioner of Public Works and of the Superintendents and Chief Engineers of the several Bureaus.

Dear Sir—I beg respectfully to submit herewith the reports of the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, the Chief Engineer of Highways, the Superintendent of Sewers, the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices and the General Book-keeper for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

Assistant Commissioner.

The Assistant Commissioner's report shows that fifty-five contracts were entered into during the quarter just ended, representing an estimated cost of \$794,453.25, and showing an increase of 25 per cent. over the same period last year in the number of contracts awarded. These contracts were divided among the Bureaus as follows:

#### Bureau of Highways.

The report of the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways shows a completed paving and repaving mileage of 12.35, an excess of 58 per cent. over the mileage for the same quarter in 1903. It might be added that the vigilant prosecution of this work and the favorable attendant circumstances during the last quarter has offset to a considerable extent the lack of accomplishment in repaving during the first quarter of this year, when weather conditions were such as to absolutely prohibit work of this character. Last year over two miles of paving were completed during the first quarter, and this year nothing; the 12.35 miles laid during the second quarter exceeds the mileage of the first and second quarters last year by over 27 per cent. The percentage of cobblestone streets eliminated during the first six months of your administration exceeds the percentage of elimination for the same period last year by over 70 per cent.

Paving work is now in progress on 72 streets, exclusive of the work being done under the maintenance and repairing contracts. On this latter contract four gangs have been kept at work putting in good condition the asphalt streets where the contracting companies' guarantees have expired.

Practically all of the preliminaries, such as the examination of and the selection of the streets, advertising, and the other prescribed work in connection with the preparation of contracts, has been completed in connection with the apportioning of the \$1,200,000 appropriated for repaving purposes for this year, and the contracts registered are shown in the Chief Engineer's report. Surf avenue—an important improvement, much needed—is now being executed.

I beg to merely refer in passing to the prices bid for laying asphalt this year, the lowest being \$1.03 per square yard for binder and topping.

In the map room 27 assessment maps and list in duplicate were prepared during the quarter, in addition to 130 plans for regulating, grading, repaving, etc., and 511 miscellaneous maps; 91 preliminary estimates and maps on local board matters were furnished, representing work on which the estimated cost was \$1,426,600.

During the same quarter over four hundred thousand (400,000) square feet of sidewalk was laid in various parts of the borough.

The Topographical Division of the Bureau of Highways was very busy during the three months, as is indicated in the Chief Engineer's report, wherein is fully shown the varied character of the work.

In the Repair Division the work is proceeding systematically and efficiently and complaints of citizens regarding pavements, as well as those repairs which the Police and our own Inspectors report, are receiving prompt attention.

The work of macadamizing Kings Highway is progressing steadily, and its completion will inaugurate a fine suburban driveway from the Shore road to East New York.

A reduction of almost 25 per cent. in the pay-rolls of the Repair Division of the Bureau of Highways has been effected without the sacrifice of any of the important and necessary work of the division, in substantiation of which statement, I submit that 2,984 water, sewer and gas connections were repaved this year, as against 1,913 last year, and 3,338 defects in pavements remedied, as against 1,704 last year.

The work done on the dirt roads of the suburban sections has resulted in a better general condition of these thoroughfares than heretofore, and I believe the increased time and attention is justified.

The Chief Engineer of Highways has attached blue prints showing all streets upon which work has been carried on by his Bureau, and has set forth the detailed information in a complete and lengthy form.

#### Bureau of Sewers.

The report of the Superintendent of Sewers furnishes a concise summary of the work of the Bureau, as detailed in the reports of his Chief Engineer of Sewers and his Superintendent of Maintenance.

It is to be noted that 9.584 miles of sewers were completed during the last quarter, as against 6.113 during the same quarter last year, an increase of over 61 per cent., increasing the mileage of sewers of the Borough of Brooklyn to approximately 716 miles.

During the quarter, the Sixty-fourth street tunnel was opened, and provides drainage for the New Utrecht section. The Ninety-second street tunnel work has progressed well, as well as the large sewers in Sixtieth street, in Nineteenth avenue and in Foster avenue, all of which should be well towards completion during the third quarter, if not wholly completed. The much needed New Utrecht avenue sewer is also rapidly nearing completion, and the Paerdegat basin sewer will be operative during the third quarter, which will effect a discontinuance of discharging at the foot of Flatbush avenue the sewage now being carried to that point from the entire Flatbush section. In addition to the above relief to the outlying section, the conditions in the heart of the city will be bettered upon the completion of the relief sewers to supplement the service of the Greene avenue sewer, upon which relief sewers work was pushed steadily during the last quarter. Detailed description of this work and other work aggregating a total estimated cost of almost \$5,500,000, is set forth in the attached reports.

I am glad to report that the work of the Maintenance Division has proceeded actively and economically. The activity is shown in the detailed report by an increase of 1,577 over the number of basins cleaned during the same period last year, and a similar increase of 179,514 feet of sewers examined, and 22,170 feet of sewers cleaned, for the same periods, while the economy is indicated by a reduction from \$1.68 to \$1.63 per basin for cleaning, and by a reduction in the cost of removing deposit from \$1.17 to \$1.10 per cubic yard. Blue prints accompanying the Bureau of Sewers report graphically set forth its work.

#### Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices has been steadily pushing the work of reconstructing the Hall of Records and, as stated in the attached report, all the work is completed except the patching and repairing in the old part of the structure. The electrical conduits are installed, and the stage of completion of the other details is set forth in the report.

Alterations to the plumbing in the Kings County Jail, under an appropriation of \$20,000, have been contracted for, and the five free floating baths have been entirely renovated and placed in position for their summer business. The Disciplinary Training School, the Magistrates' and Municipal Courts, the Court of Special Sessions, the Wallabout Market Administration Building, have all received attention.

The work on the Gates Avenue Court-house is well in hand; the Montrose Avenue Interior Bath Building, the Huron street public bath and the Duffield street public bath have steadily progressed, and present indications point to the completion of the first-named bath in August, and the second and third in September.

#### Bureau of Incumbrances and Permits.

The Bureau of Incumbrances and Permits report indicates regular and efficient work and needs no comment.

This synopsis of the work under way is most gratifying, and I believe that the activities and interest of the individuals of all the bureaus that have assisted in securing the advancement of effective work of such proportions are deserving of sincere commendation.

Dear Sir—I submit herewith report of the operations of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

The weather during this quarter has been very well adapted for highway work, and the work of paving and repaving has progressed very favorably, so much so, indeed, that during the quarter there have been laid the following miles of pavement:

This is very satisfactory, as it is more pavement than has ever before been laid during this same quarter. It is 4.54 miles more than was laid in the corresponding quarter of 1903, or 58 per cent.

## TOPOGRAPHICAL DIVISION.

The work of the Topographical Bureau has been progressed, and is now well in hand.

## Determination of Street Lines.

Surveys and computations for the determination of street lines were made as necessity arose.

## Changes in the Established Street System.

During these three (3) months the work has consisted largely in entirely new items. The section known as Catonville required perhaps more time than any other. Here a map has been prepared and placed on file, showing in detail precise block dimensions and angles; and the further work is now in progress for placing in the ground the needed monument stones for the fixing of the streets.

## Street Opening Work.

Most of the requests for street opening work were on matters that had already progressed to some extent. Very few new street opening proceedings have been initiated. With the method now instituted to prove an easement to streets or to get cession to streets, street opening proceedings are in many cases avoided.

## Records of Topographical Work.

As far as time permitted the usual records were kept, but much more time could have been profitably expended in this kind of work.

## Employees.

The total number of employees is forty (40), the same as for the end of last quarter.

## Work Accomplished.

The work completed during the three (3) months is given in detail below. A more thorough and systematic effort was initiated for the care of monument stones. Considerable time was used in the determination of street lines about the old city line of Brooklyn for the laying out of Malbone street. The investigations cover the area bounded by Eastern parkway, Utica avenue, East New York avenue and Rogers avenue. Changes in lines of streets cover mostly items that have not come up before.

The work accomplished comes under four divisions, and is as follows:

1. To retain, determine and fix on the ground the lines of the existing street system, and to fix the new street lines as they are adopted.

This work consists also in properly preserving or replacing all monument stones and in placing them in position wherever they are needed. It necessitates the surveying and computation of traverse lines for the determination of block distances and angles—the determination of standards of measurement—and the compilation and care of monument records and maps.

## A—Field Work.

Accurate traverses have been carefully run as follows:

(a) For the determination of street lines.

No new completed large traverses have been run, but a number of former traverses had to be subdivided by new intersecting lines.

(b) For the determination of street lines and property lines.

1. Fulton street, Herkimer street, East New York avenue and Atlantic avenue.

2. Kings Highway, Flatbush avenue and Coney Island avenue.

3. Eighty-fifth street, Third avenue, Eighty-sixth street and First avenue.

Precise survey lines have been run for the determination of the following streets: Brooklyn avenue, Albany avenue, Nostrand avenue, Linden avenue, Kingston avenue, Troy avenue, Gravesend avenue, West street, Morgan avenue, Sixty-fifth street, East New York avenue, Canarsie avenue, Avenue C, Vernon avenue, Snyder avenue, Fifth avenue and Seventh avenue.

## Monument Stones Fixing Streets.

Eight monuments were accurately referenced. A line of levels was run on monuments in Avenue L, from Ocean parkway to Flatbush avenue.

A party of Laborers engaged in this work raised 19 monuments, lowered 4; in their search for 42 monuments, 26 were found; 28 monuments had to be uncovered.

## B—Office Work.

The surveys of this division were fully worked up only as specially needed for maps for adoption and for filing or for street opening maps; for the more general work very little time could be spared. Traverses are plotted in the office as soon as received, and a record is kept of all monument stones found.

2. Maps affecting changes in the established street system of the city.

This division includes all work affecting changes in lines of existing streets, parks, closing and laying out streets, and changes in the established elevation of streets; it necessitates the preparation of maps for adoption and filing and miscellaneous maps.

## A—Field Work.

This comprises the following:

(a) Surveys for changes in lines of streets.

1. Additional work on sections known as Catonville.

2. Stillwell avenue, from Neptune avenue to Surf avenue.

(b) Surveys for changes in elevations of streets.

No surveys made.

## B—Office Work.

Maps were completed as follows:

I.—Maps forwarded for adoption.

(a) Maps affecting changes in lines of streets, closing and laying out streets and public parks.

8. Closing Johnson's lane, near Avenue S.

9. Laying out Henry street (Hamlin street), from Neptune avenue to Canal avenue.

10. Laying out Church avenue, from Thirty-sixth street to Ocean parkway.

Laying out Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-sixth street to Church avenue.

Laying out Beverly road, from East Second street to Church avenue.

Laying out Chester avenue, from Story street to Church avenue.

Closing Fourteenth avenue, from Thirty-sixth street to East Second street.

Closing Story street, from Thirty-sixth street to West street.

Laying out Thirty-fifth street, from Fourteenth avenue to Church avenue.

11. This map is the same as the map above (10), except that Church avenue is here made 80 feet wide instead of 100 feet wide, as on the above map (10).

12. Narrowing Stillwell avenue, from Neptune avenue to Surf avenue.

13. Laying out Silliman place, from Second avenue to Third avenue.

14. Closing Condit street, from Railroad avenue to Nichols avenue.

(b) Maps affecting changes of the established elevation of streets.

1. East Twenty-first street, from Cortelyou road to Dorchester road.

II.—Maps forwarded for filing.

This includes a number of maps of different kinds that are used in condemnation proceedings in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Corporation Counsel's office.

## A—Field Work.

The field work consists of surveys by field parties for the maps, as given below. Another item of field work consisted, as heretofore, of the inspection of every street when the draft damage map is completed, and just before it is delivered.

The necessary surveys were made for the maps noted below as completed. Besides these, the following surveys were also made:

1. West Thirteenth street, from Avenue U to Gravesend avenue.

2. Brooklyn avenue, from Clarkson street to Canarsie avenue.

3. Additional for Stillwell avenue.

4. Additional for Dahlgren place.

## B—Office Work.

This comprises:

(a) Rule maps in triplicate and technical descriptions of land to be taken in street opening proceedings.

(b) Draft damage maps, which give dimensions of every plot of land to be taken; encroachments on the streets, property owners, and any information of service to the Commissioners.

(c) Draft benefit maps, showing every lot included within the limits of the assessments for the opening and giving dimensions, and block and lot numbers.

(d) Final damage maps in duplicate and final benefit maps in triplicate.

(e) Rule maps and technical descriptions for closing avenues and streets.

(f) Profile surveys made in connection with street openings.

(g) Inspection and testimony.

(h) Amendments and additions to street opening maps.

(a) Rule maps and technical descriptions.

These maps are made in triplicate and have technical descriptions showing the land taken in street opening proceedings. They are used by the Corporation Counsel in his application to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners for Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title to streets.

No rule maps requested and none furnished.

(b) Draft damage maps.

These maps are used by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to determine the amount of award for land and buildings taken in the opening of the street. The maps give every plot taken in street opening proceedings, together with its dimensions, encroachments on the street, names of property owners, and all other information obtainable that tends to prove any title or easement to the street that has been acquired by the City.

## (c) Draft Benefit Maps.

These maps show the limits of assessment for opening a street, and give block numbers and block dimensions; within the limits of assessment is shown every lot with its number, dimensions, property-owner, etc. The maps are used by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to determine the amount of assessment to be paid on every lot. These maps are compiled in a large measure from the maps of the Department of Taxes and Assessment, but additions and corrections are made as may be found to be necessary.

The maps are kept in book form, bound with the Commissioners' report, which is placed on file at the confirmation of a street opening proceeding.

Profile maps were made from surveys; they are used as an aid in the determination of awards to be paid property-owners affected by the opening of streets.

  2. Seeley street, from Gravesend avenue to Nineteenth street.
  3. Butler street, from Rogers avenue to Nostrand avenue.

## (g) Inspection and Testimony.

Whenever a draft damage map of a street was completed it was taken on the ground and the existing conditions were carefully inspected and compared with the map.

In a few instances it was found necessary for this bureau to give testimony at sessions of Street Opening Commissioners.

## (h) Amendments and Additions to Street Opening Maps.

As circumstances required it, amendments and additions were made to street opening maps that have been previously forwarded; the work usually consisted in adding new subdivisions to draft maps and to final maps, or in adding large sketches or other new information to the maps. This work was given the preference over all other work in the office.

The work covered the following streets:

## 1. Draft Damage Maps.

1. Dahlgren place, from Eighty-sixth street to United States Government Reservation.
2. Sherman street, from southerly side of Reeve place (formerly Adams street) to the line dividing the land formerly of the Windsor Terrace Land Association from the land of the late Thomas Murphy.

## 2. Final Damage and Benefit Maps.

No maps of this nature were requested.

4. To keep a record of everything pertaining to the items of topographical work.

The record kept of all current work includes besides the usual records of letters sent and received, one copy of every map forwarded from the office. One of the three certified copies of official maps adopted by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is also now kept on file in this office in accordance with the provisions of the Charter.

Our notes on street openings, changes of lines, etc., and of grades of streets are undoubtedly the most complete that can be obtained.

The records have been very frequently consulted as heretofore by employees of every department of the City Government, private surveyors, lawyers and the general public; a large amount of time was required to accede to requests for such information.

The incompleteness of the records as formerly kept and placed on file, is proving a constant source of delay to different branches of our work.

Summary of work for the three (3) months ending June 30, 1904:

No special requests were made, except as they were involved in other items of work. The results of the work were embodied in the maps for adoption and for filing and in street opening maps.

On April 1, 1904, there was a total of 129 proceedings pending for acquiring title to streets. In the course of the three months, one proceeding was initiated, one proceeding discontinued, and for three proceedings the report of the Commissioners was confirmed. The total number of proceedings pending on June 30, 1904, is 126.

## Repair Division.

I quote herewith from report of Mr. E. J. Fort, Assistant Engineer in charge of this work:

"Complying with your instructions, I transmit herewith a report of the work done by this division of the Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1904. The work done during the corresponding quarter in the year 1903 is also given.

Our pay-rolls during this quarter amounted to.....	\$61,153 69

There has been, therefore..... \$21,807 78

—less spent in wages this season than during the same time last season.

"The amount of work done is considerably less. We have laid about 20,000 square yards less of pavement, but we have done considerable more work in the suburbs. The money saved in wages is much greater proportionately than the discrepancy in the amount of work done; so that, on the whole, I think our record is a better one than that of 1903.

"We have now employed about 450 men of all classes outside of the office force. You may think that this force will bear increasing slightly soon. When our work on Hudson avenue starts I think we should have at least one additional gang of men to grade the street, lay the concrete, etc. We have not, so far, laid any concrete foundation, but shall start doing this work shortly. At the present time we are laying more pavement than we did at the same time last season, and we are doing this for less money. This is partially due to the fact that last season we were running a concrete mixer and stone crusher the money spent for which did not add directly to the number of square yards of pavement laid.

"The general condition of the pavements throughout the borough is improving steadily, although the number of complaints received is still large. It is noticeable that these complaints refer to much smaller matters than did the complaints of former years, and the majority of requests made are easily complied with. We are not able always to promptly comply with every request, but every reasonable request is, I think, attended to within a reasonable length of time. If there is at present any cobblestone or granite pavement that has not been disturbed by other improvements being made on the street, that may be said to be in dangerous condition, I do not know where it is. There are many pavements that are rough, but none that are full of bad holes, as was the case a few years ago. We are almost in sight of the point where we shall be able to say that the pavements of this borough are all in good condition.

"In the suburbs we have done much more work in repairing dirt roads than has ever been done before, because the organization of our men is much better. We have three steam rollers at work laying macadam pavement. A very small amount of this work has been finished, because the contract for broken stone was only recently certified. We are receiving stone faster than we have ever received it before, and the coming quarter should show a large amount of this work done.

"On Kings Highway, between Flatbush avenue and Eastern parkway, a distance of three miles, which we contemplate macadamizing, we have covered the roadway with stone for about three-quarters of a mile. This pavement, however, is not finished for this distance, because the delivery of screenings and stone has been very slow on this particular street. When this roadway is completed, Kings Highway together with Seventy-ninth street and the Shore road, will make, without doubt, the finest driveway in the borough.

"The macadam pavements are being kept fairly clean and in better condition than ever before. If we had had the same arrangements as at present several years ago the present condition of our macadam streets would have been much improved.

"The repairs to asphalt pavements are almost finished. Six days of work with the present force would finish all repairs. Several streets are, however, almost ready for further repairs, so that the work will not stop entirely for some weeks. We have spent up to date for asphalt repairs \$29,341.53, which is a much smaller sum than that spent last year during this same time. I do not see how it can possibly be necessary to spend as much more as we have spent during the present season."

## Chemical and Physical Testing Laboratory.

A summary of the number of samples of machine examined is as follows:

The number of separate tensile tests of hydraulic cements made during the quarter was 7,760. The tensile tests have been supplemented by normal pat tests, tests for "time of set" and determinations of "fineness." Accelerated pat tests have been made on samples which acted abnormally under the tensile and normal pat tests. This method has proved very satisfactory and has revealed defective material in many cases which would have passed the tensile test requirements. Tests of asphalt pavement mixtures have been carried on from day to day, samples being taken directly from the work in progress and tested in the laboratory. Whenever defective material has been found the contractor has been immediately notified to make the necessary change in formula, and new samples are taken immediately thereafter and tested. This work has been supplemented by a careful inspection of the plant where the materials for the mixture are severally weighed in the presence of the chemist, and the proportions used made to conform with the specifications. In addition, samples of the ingredients before mixing, and of the resulting mixture, are taken, and the exact reason for any defect traced. In this way, a satisfactory explanation of the cause of the discrepancy, wherever it has existed, has been arrived at promptly. Samples of refined asphalts, asphaltic cements and miscellaneous samples have been tested, and the results recorded for reference.

Hon. JOHN C. BRACKENRIDGE, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit a report of the business transacted in the Bureau of Sewers during the second quarter of the year 1904.

I hereinafter place a tabulated statement of the financial transactions of the bureau, giving the balance of the appropriations available on the first day of the quarter, the amount in money of the vouchers audited from this office and forwarded to the Comptroller for salaries and supplies, and the balance available for each appropriation account at the beginning of the third quarter of the year.

You will also find the amount of moneys received for permits issued for connecting with sewers, and the amount of money collected in payment for the old Third avenue and old Knickerbocker avenue sewers, as set forth in special acts of the Legislature of the State of New York.

You will also find listed in said financial statement the amount of money in vouchers audited from this bureau in payment for contracts under assessment proceedings, etc.

I append reports of the Chief Engineer of Sewers and the Superintendent of Maintenance, giving information in detail in regard to the construction of sewers and to the maintaining of the sewerage system in this borough during the period of this report.

Your attention is called to the report of the Chief Engineer of Sewers, which embodies a brief description of the work performed in construction, as well as setting forth contracts which have been completed during the quarter, contracts entered into, and giving in full detail the status of the work at hand.

Your attention is also called to the report of the Superintendent of Maintenance, especially to a clause in which he states that the cost of cleaning sewer-basins has decreased from \$1.68 in 1903 to \$1.63, the smallest amount for which the basins have been cleaned in the past seven years. The cost of removing deposit from the same shows a decrease from \$1.17 per cubic yard in 1903 to \$1.10 for this quarter.

Fifteen (15) contracts were entered into during the quarter for sewer improvements, the estimated cost of which you will find to be \$125,315.

Twenty-four (24) contracts were completed and the accounts thereof closed in the books of the bureau. The total amount of moneys paid for same was \$88,647.42.

In addition to this, four (4) contracts have been completed in construction, but the accounts of same are still open in our books, under the retained percentage clause of the contracts calling for any necessary repairs to be made within a period of six months after their completion.

The total amount of work in money performed on these contracts is \$179,943.15.

Fifty-three (53) contracts are in force, having been consummated, and are in the status of actual construction, or ready to begin work, which are estimated to cost \$4,330,791.75.

The estimated amount of work already performed on these contracts is \$2,413,220.05.

In addition to this, seventeen (17) contracts have been forwarded from this bureau for bids to be advertised for in the corporation papers and the CITY RECORD, which are in course of execution, either being in the Corporation Counsel's hands for approval as to form of specifications, or in the Comptroller's office for registration. Said contracts are estimated to cost \$281,950.

There has been authorized by the City authorities also twenty-seven (27) sewer improvements, for which plans and specifications are in preparation, in order that contracts may be entered into for same, to an amount of \$586,440.

A tabulated statement contained in the Chief Engineer's report gives other items in regard to the status of all work being prosecuted by this bureau, and the value of said work.

Your attention is drawn to the statement of the mileage of sewers constructed, made by the Chief Engineer, and from other pages of the report, after careful study, it is to be believed that this bureau has been working under top pressure during the second quarter of the year, and that very much has been done for the improvement of the borough in the direction of sewer improvements.

Brevity estops me from writing at length upon many details which could be elaborated upon.

I had occasion in my last report to compliment the employees of this bureau for the efficiency of the work performed by them, and it is with pleasure that I can state that during this quarter the same zeal and industry has been shown by them.

Dear Sir—In submitting the second quarterly report of the transaction of affairs in the Engineering Division of your Bureau for the year 1904, I have the honor to state that during this period 9,854 miles of sewers were constructed, said mileage giving the different classes of sewers, whether pipe or brick, the mileage of sewers contained in the borough, both at the beginning and end of the quarter; also the number of sewer basins built during the quarter, with the number connected with the sewerage system on March 31, 1904, upon the last day of the second quarter of this year, and the total number of said basins existing in Brooklyn is tabulated as follows:

The second and third quarters of the year are more favorable, as is well known, for the construction of sewers, due to weather conditions, than the remaining period of the year.

The above mileage of the constructions performed during the second quarter of the year is, therefore, interesting, considering the large brick sewers that have been in course of construction; when I state that 6,113 miles were constructed during the second quarter of the year 1903, the length of brick sewers during said former period being 2,822 miles, of sizes equal in comparison. It therefore appears, from the amount of work on hand, that the total construction of sewers in the borough during the year 1904 will be of materially greater length than the year 1903.

Tables are appended to this report giving the status of all contracts, and setting forth the items of work performed in detail. I find that work estimated to cost \$5,413,144.23 is being supervised in construction and the preparation of plans. The amount of work for which plans are being prepared is represented by an amount of \$586,440.

Fifteen (15) contracts have been entered into during the quarter, at an estimated cost of \$125,315.06.

Notwithstanding the number of rainy days which have occurred during the quarter, the construction of sewers has actively progressed throughout the borough; in fact, I know of no time within my experience when the engineering forces have been so busy in supervising the construction of new sewers.

The Sixty-fourth street tunnel sewer was opened for drainage on about the 10th day of May, thus providing for the connecting of many houses throughout the New Utrecht section of the borough. So great was the demand for drainage for houses that



the sewer was used before the contract was completed. We were able to accomplish this by making a temporary connection immediately at the shore line by a wooden flume extending into New York Bay. This contract will soon be finished, very active work having taken place upon the triple outfall sewer extending from the shore line 1,000 feet, about, into New York Bay.

The Ninety-second street tunnel sewer has been progressed with such rapidity that there remains less than 1,000 feet to complete same. The tunnel itself will, without question, be finished during the third quarter of this year, and I believe that the outfall triple sewer extending into the bay, with the overhead sewers and minor constructions called for by the contract, will be completed before the end of the year.

A 156-inch sewer in the contract, extending in Sixtieth street from Fourteenth avenue to Fifty-ninth street, will also, I believe, be completed during the next quarter of the year, as well as all the 138-inch and 144-inch sewer in the contract in Nineteenth avenue, from Fifty-seventh street to Bergen lane, to Foster avenue, to East Ninth street.

There remains to be built not more than 800 feet of the 120-inch sewer in Foster avenue, in the contract extending from East Ninth street to Flatbush avenue. A complicated connection of three sewers with this sewer will take place at the junction of Flatbush and Foster avenues, and it is my opinion that this contract, including several streets I have not mentioned, will be completed during the third quarter of the year.

The extension of the Ninety-second street tunnel sewer, called for in two contracts, for which bids were procured and contracts entered into during the first quarter of the year, the first contract extending through the northern portion of Dyker Beach Park, from Eleventh to Fourteenth avenues, with a sewer 120 inches in diameter; the second extending in Fourteenth avenue, from the first contract mentioned to Bath avenue, to Twenty-first avenue and thence to Benson avenue, have been ordered on in construction, and the contractors are now busily engaged upon same, the sizes of sewers in the latter contract ranging from 120 inches in diameter to 78 inches in diameter.

The New Utrecht avenue contract, a main sewer 60 inches in diameter, extending from Sixtieth street to Fifty-second street, will be completed in a short time, affording drainage to a wide territory adjacent to the Borough Park. The completion of this sewer will also result in the removal of impounding waters at street pockets, which have been of much inconvenience for many years past.

The Coney Island avenue main, awarded in contract during the first quarter of this year, will be begun in construction in about a week's time. This sewer, 60 inches in diameter, will extend from Foster avenue to Beverly road. Smaller pipe sewers are to be built in conjunction therewith, and its completion will be another step towards the very desirable one of changing the sewerage system of Flatbush from one caring for house drainage only to one caring for both house drainage and rainfalls.

The main sewer in Eastern parkway, from Foster avenue to Ditmas avenue, thence in Ditmas avenue to East Fifth street, to Vanderbilt street, to enter the Windsor Terrace section of the City, to provide for a well built-up section, with a combined sewerage plan, is progressing nicely, work being prosecuted in two places on the 72-inch main and the 60-inch main.

Just four days ago the 90-inch main reached Flatlands avenue, its outlet in the contract for sewers in Avenue G, from Coney Island avenue to Flatbush avenue, thence in Flatbush avenue, Nostrand avenue, Avenue F, Avenue G and Paerdegat avenue. By so doing we were able to open up the Avenue F sewer at East Twenty-sixth street, which drained the territory of South Midwood by the operation of a private pumping plant pumping into the old Flatbush avenue sewer. Prior to the point of outlet being reached, it was impossible to care for this drainage through the new sewer, as it was also impossible to tap the old Flatbush avenue sewer at Avenue G, and to build a short length of new sewer in Flatbush avenue, near this intersection, because the entire drainage of Flatbush was being conducted through a 48-inch main discharging at the foot of Flatbush avenue.

The temporary silt and trap basin at the outlet of this main sewer at Flatlands avenue has progressed materially towards completion. The entire contract will, no doubt, be completed within the next quarter, and when such is done the discharge of sewage at the foot of Flatbush avenue will be discontinued.

The Flatlands avenue sewer, to extend from the Paerdegat basin to East Fortieth street, etc., a main 120 inches in diameter, to discharge into this temporary silt and trap basin of the contract just before mentioned, until the pumping plant and other sewers can be built, has been progressed, but not to the extent that it should have been. The contractor promises, however, to now rush this work, and is confident that he can finish it within the time. Said contractor having both the former contract and the contract which I am now writing about, explains that it was his desire to complete the first contract first.

The relief sewers, to provide an adequate outlet for the Greene avenue sewer, its defects having been described in former reports, is progressing materially also, the first of which, extending in Fourth avenue from Butler street to Degraw street, and in Degraw street to the Gowanus canal. The Fourth avenue length has been completed, excepting the short length of about 12 feet at Douglass street, which cannot be completed, as a 48-inch main crosses our sewer at this point, supported in a sling of chains. Said sewer will be supported until we can connect same with the new sewer, which cannot be done until the trap basin at the foot of Degraw street and the length of sewer in Degraw street is completed. This contract has been pushed during the last quarter.

The second relief sewer contract, providing for material alterations of the old silt and trap basin at the head of Gowanus canal, with a 72-inch sewer extending through Butler street to Nevins street, to Baltic street, to Third avenue, to Dean street, to Fourth avenue, there tapping the so-called Greene avenue sewer, then extending through Dean street to Fifth avenue, to Pacific street, to divert the drainage of a territory adjacent to the Park Plaza and extending to the Flatbush depot, and providing for the extension of the subway through Flatbush avenue, has also progressed, the sewer having been constructed in Butler street, Nevins street and Baltic street almost to Third avenue, and in Dean street from Fourth avenue almost to Fifth avenue.

Much difficulty has arisen in the altering of the trap basin, due to the congested condition of the canal and to tide-water work. To care for the active sewer to provide for its continual discharge during storms, has also added to the difficulties at this point of the contract. Strikes, due to the eight-hour law, have also hampered us in this construction, and it is not out of place for me to here state that the enforcement of said law has recently retarded our construction work.

The many and large gas-mains in this section of the city connecting with gas tanks constructed along the canal have caused considerable trouble to the construction of these relief sewers.

It is a pleasure to know that at last rights of way have been procured for the relief sewer to extend from the Morgan avenue sewer to the basin of the Newtown Creek Canal, situate between Stagg and Meadow streets, as well as for the procurement of the old Vandervoort avenue sewer, as a relief sewer for the old Knickerbocker avenue main, which has repeatedly surcharged. Said contracts were only recently registered by the Comptroller, due to the delay in procuring the rights of way I have mentioned. No time has been lost in ordering the work begun in construction, both contractors having been so notified. There is no doubt in my mind that the alterations necessary to the old Vandervoort avenue sewer near its old outlet, including the construction of about 120 feet of sewer, will be completed during the next quarter of the year. I expect also that the Morgan avenue relief sewer, to discharge into the basin I have mentioned, will also be completed. It is to be earnestly hoped that extraordinary rainfalls will not occur this season, because as we now stand, with all the relief-sewer contracts in course of construction, property would again be flooded.

Plans for the alteration of the Knickerbocker avenue sewer, extending from George street to Johnson avenue, and thence in Johnson avenue to Humboldt street, whereby an invert is to be built of such shape that a self-cleaning sewer will be obtained, are rapidly nearing completion, and will be forwarded in a short time for advertisement for bids from contractors. This sewer, due to its flat bottom, collects silt to such an extent that at least 40 per cent. of its efficiency has been lost, due to such cause.

For brevity, I will not mention the many other sewers which are in course of construction and being superintended by my corps of 52 Inspectors, more than to state that work on same is progressing satisfactorily.

My corps have continued to show the zeal that I spoke of in my last quarterly report, and my thanks are again due to them for such.

Hon. ARTHUR J. O'KEEFFE, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—I beg leave to submit my quarterly report of work done and materials used from April 1 to June 30, 1904, inclusive, for maintaining the sewerage system in the Borough of Brooklyn. In connection with the same I desire to call your attention to the report of the corresponding quarter of 1903. We have cleaned 1,577 more basins than was cleaned same quarter in 1903, and removed 2,467 cubic yards of deposit from the same in excess of 1903. One hundred and seventy-nine thousand five hundred and fourteen feet of sewers were examined and 22,170 feet of sewers cleaned in excess of the same quarter in 1903. The cost of cleaning sewer-basins has decreased from \$1.68 in 1903 to \$1.63, the smallest amount for which the basins have been cleaned in the past seven years. The cost of removing deposit from the same shows a decrease from \$1.17 per cubic yard in 1903 to \$1.10 for this quarter.

The telephone switchboard, which regulates all the telephone service of the Borough President's offices, was removed from the Corporation Counsel Law Library to the room adjoining the private office of Superintendent of Buildings Collins in May and inclosed with a hardwood partition; in room 31, occupied by the Building Inspectors, clothes lockers were constructed, a number of tables repaired, the ceiling kalsomined and the sidewalls painted; a portion of the furniture in the office of the Clerk of the Appellate Division, Supreme Court, was altered and repaired; the rooms of Appellate Division, Supreme Court, Justice Jenks, which were recently damaged by fire, were repaired and renovated generally; awnings were placed in all the windows of the building and general repairs to the plumbing throughout the structure, costing approximately one hundred dollars (\$100), were made.

## Municipal Building.

The steam-pipes and plumbing throughout this building were thoroughly repaired during the quarter; window ventilators were placed in several offices; the sanitary condition of the rooms of the Deputy Receiver of Taxes, in the basement, were improved by substituting removable windows for the old-fashioned air-precluding sashes formerly in use; clothes closets for employees were constructed in several offices; electric fans in the various offices were overhauled and placed in working order; the rooms of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on the third floor, were altered to suit Mr. De Varona's convenience and thoroughly renovated; the adjoining rooms, occupied by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, were enlarged, the sidewalls painted, the ceiling kalsomined, the floors covered with linoleum and rugs; new stationary closets were also constructed in these offices; in the first floor office of the Deputy Receiver of Taxes a new wire cage for the Cashier was erected; the offices of the Bureau of Sewers, on the top floor, were thoroughly renovated, a new floor covering and considerable new furniture placed therein; the rooms occupied by the Bureau of Electricity, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, were repainted and a new combination lighting fixture installed; considerable repairs were made to the roof of the building; the iron gate leading to Livingston street was repaired and awnings placed on all the windows.

## Kings County Court-house.

The doors leading to the building were recovered with pantasote and otherwise repaired; a new combination chandelier was placed in the District Attorney's office; the sidewalls of the toilet-room, adjoining room 39, were repainted and the ceiling kalsomined; a new document-case was built in the office of the Commissioner of Jurors; filing-cases in the office of the Chief Clerk of the Supreme Court were reconstructed; an old and dilapidated partition, in the doorway leading to the yard of the building, was removed and a new entrance-way substituted; in the office of Judge Gaynor's Secretary a filing-case, removed from rooms 27 and 39, was placed after being thoroughly repaired; the lettering of the signs over the doors leading to the various branches of the Supreme Court were altered to suit present conditions; the steam-pipes and steam-pumps in the building were thoroughly renovated; four new washout water closets, with marble partitions and floors and hardwood doors, were installed for the convenience of the Supreme Court Justices; awnings were placed on all the windows of the building.

## Hall of Records.

The equity room of the County Clerk's office was furnished with new record-cases and numerous repairs were made to the plumbing.



The general work of reconstruction on this building is well advanced. In April the plastering was begun, and, excepting the patching and repairing in the old part of the structure, is now completed. The installation of electric conduits was started in May, and is now complete in the new part of the building and in some parts of the old building. The old grilles inclosing the elevator shafts and the new iron stair strings and treads have been put in place, while the stair balustrades are now being erected. When the latter work has been finished the interior ornamental iron-work will have been completed. The stairs to the Livingston street entrance and courtyard coping are complete. During May and June the terrazzo floors on the third and fourth story corridors were finished, and the setting of interior trim and doors on the third and fourth story is well high completed.

#### Kings County Jail.

Repairs to the plumbing of this building, costing approximately two hundred dollars, have been made during the quarter; the roofs and ventilators were thoroughly repaired; the walls of the civil prison were replastered; the men's prison dining-room repaired, and awnings placed on all the windows.

The much discussed proposition to thoroughly renew the plumbing and improve the sanitary conditions of this structure was finally arranged for after an appropriation of twenty thousand dollars had been obtained for the purpose during the quarter.

The lowest bidder in connection with the advertised contract was James Fay, of Manhattan, who agreed to do the work for about sixteen thousand dollars. Mr. Fay will undertake the work as soon as the contract is registered.

#### Disciplinary Training School.

Close on to one thousand dollars has been expended for needed repairs and improvements to this building during the last three months. The windows throughout have been reglazed, the steam pipes and boilers renovated, new ventilating shafts installed, steam boilers and engines overhauled, iron grating repaired, plumbing fixtures renovated, and a new high-board fence erected around the grounds.

#### Free Floating Baths.

Thoroughly renovated, the five free floating baths were towed to their summer berths at Noble, Conover, North First, Dock and Fifty-second streets, respectively, and opened to the public during the second week in June.

Thus far the patronage has been larger than during any same period in the history of the baths.

#### Magistrates' and Municipal Courts.

General repairs, as the occasion required, have been made to these buildings.

The contents of Municipal Justice Furgueson's Court-rooms, at Bath avenue and Bay Twenty-second street, were removed early in June to the new Court quarters rented for this tribunal in Paschall Hall, Third avenue and Fifty-third street, and I am now having prepared plans and specifications to place the new Court-rooms in a satisfactory condition.

#### Court of Special Sessions.

A new filing closet was constructed in these quarters, at an expense of about fifty dollars, during May.

#### Wallabout Market Administration Building.

Small repairs were made to the plumbing of this building, and the tower clock was cleaned and oiled.

#### Firemen's Hall.

This building entailed no expense whatever on this Bureau during the quarter.

#### Gates Avenue Court-house.

Since the first of April all the walls of this structure have been topped out and coped, the front stone work completed ready for pointing and carving, the floor of the Magistrate's Court filled in and settled, ready for concreting, and cinder foundation for the front sidewalk laid.

Rough floors have been laid throughout; the furring of the Municipal Court and of the second floor rotunda has been completed, and the walls of the front portion are furred and the partition set. The rough plumbing is about completed, and the gas piping is well along; the steam rises are partially installed and the electrical installation has been begun.

The iron stairs are in hand and the interior finish has been in the kilns for some time.

Within a few days the plastering will be begun.

#### Interior Public Baths.

The Hicks street and Pitkin avenue buildings, which have now been in operation nearly nine months, have demanded considerable attention in connection with small repairs to the plumbing work, but no extraordinary expense has been occasioned by either of these structures during the quarter.

Montrose Avenue—Since the first of April the Montrose Avenue Building has been inclosed; the cellar and vault work completed; most of the plastering finished; the rough plumbing completed; a large part of the heating work, including boilers and hot-water heaters installed; all the ventilating duct work, except the fan connections, completed, and the soapstone work in the two first-story bathrooms practically completed.

About all that remains to complete this building, after the plasterers are through, is the finishing up of the soapstone work, the laying of the terrazzo floors, the setting of plumbing fixtures; putting up the trim, hanging doors, sashes, etc.; glazing and hanging electric and gas fixtures, and the setting of the radiators and hooking up of the steam and ventilating apparatus.

Judging by the present progress of the work this building should be completed and ready for use before the middle of August.

Huron Street—The piling for this building was only half completed, and the rear walls only about three feet above the curb in the latter part of March. Since that time the piling has been completed, the balance of the foundation put in, the entire vault work finished up, rear walls carried up and topped out, and a portion of the front walls carried up to the second story, the fireproofing for roof of rear portion of extension completed, the galvanized ventilating duct work placed well under way, the front work started, and within a few days now the rear bathrooms will be finished, so that the soapstone workers can install their floors and stalls.

The progress of this work has been very favorable since the weather conditions permitted continuous operations to be carried on, and the work to-day is well done throughout. Under favorable conditions this building should be finished on or before the middle of September.

Duffield Street—This work, which during the previous quarter was hindered constantly by weather conditions, is now progressing rapidly. The first tier of beams is set, all the walls for the second tier and extension roof tier have been carried to beam levels, the limestone for the front is cut and ready to be set, and materials for the interior, such as soapstone, marble plumbing fixtures, etc., are now nearly completed.

I think it very reasonable to believe that this building will be ready for the public early in September.

#### Public Comfort Stations.

The six public comfort stations, which have accommodated nearly twenty-three thousand persons during the quarter, have required no little attention in the repair relation, but, comparatively, they have not been expensive charges.

I wish particularly to call your attention to the fact that the Borough Hall station has accommodated since the first of January close on to one and a half million of people—a record which is particularly interesting in view of the fact that the Charing Cross comfort station in London, the largest city in the world, accommodates only three million people a year.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
