Committee of Fourteen—Offering Rules and Regulations to Govern Massage Operators and Massage Institutes, in Accordance with Ordinance No. 171.

The Committee of Fourteen, 27 East 22nd Street, New York City, November 21, 1916.

Hon. HARRY ROBITZEK, Chairman, Committee on General Welfare, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

My dear Alderman—In response to your invitation to offer suggestions relative to the Rules and Regulations which must be adopted by the Board of Aldermen before the massage ordinance can become effective, I beg to offer the enclosed. I have taken the liberty of submitting them to Mr. Meade, who was present at several of the hearings, representing, I understand, the medical gymnasts and masseurs and also the American Social Hygiene Association. Both, I understand, feel that they adequately cover the ground.

Rules and Regulations for Massage Operators and Massage Institutes, Made in Accordance with Ordinance No. 171.

#### Requirements—

No person shall be licensed by the Department of Licenses, in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 171—

(A) Who is less than 21 years of age.

(B) To whom objection is made on the grounds of character by the Police Department.

(C) Who does not present satisfactory references from (1) at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York; or (2) five reputable citizens residents of New York City.

(D) Who does not hold the occupational certificate of the Board of Health of New York City of freedom from communicable disease as of date not more than 30 days prior to the date of application.

(E) Who does not (1) present evidence by the affidavits of at least two reputable physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York; or of three citizens, that he or she has practised massage continuously for three years, last passed, or for at least three years within the last ten years; or (2) file a certificate that he or she has satisfactorily completed the full course of training given by a school of massage, duly recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses; or (3) if application to be licensed in accordance herewith is made prior to April 1, 1917, offer the affidavits of three licensed massage operators that they have examined the applicant and that he or she is qualified, in their opinion, to give massage.

#### Schools—

Certification—Schools of massage shall be recorded in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses upon receipt of a certificate signed by ten physicians licensed to practice in the State of New York, certifying that in their opinion the course of instruction in the school is adequate and the staff competent to give the necessary instructions in massage.

Recording—Such certification shall not be accepted and the school entered as of record until thirty days after the receipt of the certification, during which time notice of its receipt and the names of those signing it shall be posted on a bulletin board in the public office of the Department of Licenses. A copy of such notice shall be forwarded to the Commissioner of the Department of Health for his information. The Commissioner shall have power to refuse such applications to be recorded, or to strike any school previously recorded from the record, but only after, in each instance, a public hearing and a public statement of his reasons for his action.

Structural—No place shall be licensed as an institute which has not at least two rooms equipped with massage tables, with toilet facilities, having hot and cold running water adjacent thereto. These rooms shall have at least eighty square feet of floor area and at least six hundred cubic feet of space therein, with a window or windows with not less than eight square feet of surface opening upon a street, open court, light shaft or open air, with independent access to each room by a door opening from a hallway, and these rooms shall not be furnished or apparently used as bedrooms.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President pro tem. laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of Richmond:

No. 992.

President, Borough of Richmond—Request for Authority to Purchase Highway Materials for Maintenance and Repair of Roads During the Year 1916, Without Public Letting.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, Bureau of Highways, Borough Hall, New Brighton, New York City, November 18, 1916.

Hon. Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—On October 31, 1916, your Honorable Board adopted a resolution that in pursuance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter the President of the Borough of Richmond be and is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase highway material for the maintenance and repair of roads during the year 1916 to the extent of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) in the open market without public letting.

This is in connection with the concurrence and adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the issuance of special revenue bonds to the amount of eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000) for the maintenance and repair of roads during the year 1916 in the Borough of Richmond.

In furnishing the Bureau of Contract Supervision a supporting schedule for the purchase of highway material (1½-inch broken stone and screenings) we estimate that it will be necessary to purchase one thousand three hundred dollars (\$1,300) worth of additional stone to carry on the activities on the various streets as prescribed in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and I therefore request that, pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the President of the Borough of Richmond be and is hereby empowered and authorized to purchase said highway material in the open market instead of by contract and public letting, in the sum of one thousand three hundred dollars (\$1,300).

In view of the short space of time permitted to make the necessary repairs I will feel deeply grateful if you will give this matter prompt consideration.

**President, Borough of Brooklyn—Request for Authority to Purchase Three Steam Asphalt Rollers, Without Public Letting.**

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Office of Commissioner of Public Works, Brooklyn, November 17, 1916.  
*The Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, City of New York:*

Gentlemen—Your approval is hereby requested, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Charter of the City of New York, of entering into a contract, without public letting, for the expense incidental to the purchase of three (3) steam asphalt rollers, not exceeding in cost the sum of \$5,000 for the three.

This request is made for the reason that our experience in the past has shown that it takes considerable time to secure these articles by inviting bids at public letting and that it is a very difficult matter to write an open specification which will permit the various roller concerns to bid, and it is as economical, if not more so, to secure the rollers without public letting.

Some of our rollers are well worn and need overhauling, and, in order that we may not be compelled to lay off any of our gangs, it is essential that we secure substitute rollers to keep the men steadily engaged.

Your kind attention to this matter, as promptly as possible, will oblige,

**Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Resolution to Establish the Grade of Position of Launch Engineer in the Police Department.**

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Office of the Secretary, Municipal Building, November 20, 1916.  
*To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:*

Gentlemen—I transmit herewith certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 17, 1916, recommending the establishment in the Police Department of the grade of position of Launch Engineer at \$1,200 per annum for one incumbent.

The City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, Bureau of Standards, Nov. 9, 1916.

*To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:*

Gentlemen—On November 1, 1916, the Police Commissioner requested establishment of a grade of position pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—To establish the grade of position of Launch Engineer at \$1,200 for one incumbent.

"Reason—To permit of the transfer of Michael Noonan, who is now employed in a similar position in the Department of Docks and Ferries.

"Finding—A launch now in use in the Department of Docks and Ferries is to be transferred to the Police Department. It is proposed to transfer Mr. Noonan with the boat. This boat will be used to replace an old one now used by the Police Department in patrolling Jamaica Bay. The position is provided for at \$1,200 for 1917 in the Department of Docks and Ferries. This money will be transferred to the Police Department."

Recommendation—In view of the above report the Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment in the Police Department of the grade of position of Launch Engineer at \$1,200 for one incumbent. Respectfully,

The President pro tem. laid before the Board the following communication from the Fire Commissioner:

No. 995.

**Fire Commissioner—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$92,260.30, for the Purchase of Fire Hose.**

Fire Department, City of New York, November 15, 1916.

*Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:*

Sir—On May 29, 1916, I requested an issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$152,976 for the purchase of 208,336 feet of fire hose of various sizes, and stated that this quantity of hose was necessary to provide the proper quota for each company and to retire hose no longer fit for service, but which was still being used by some engine companies.

Acting upon this request, the Board of Aldermen granted only \$75,000 for hose, although both myself and Chief Kenlon stated to the committee as earnestly and emphatically as possible that the full amount was needed. The Bureau of Contract Supervision, in its report made to the Finance Committee of your body, recommended that my request be cut to \$75,000 and this recommendation was based upon the assumption that all hose in the department under eight years of age was reliable hose and should not be replaced. I stated to the Finance Committee at the time that this was not the fact and that we had considerable hose under eight years of age which the officers of the Fire Department who handle it do not regard as sufficiently strong and reliable for active use.

The present condition as to hose in the Fire Department is as follows:

The established quota of the various sizes of hose necessary properly to equip the different fireboats and fire companies is 67,600 feet of 1½-inch hose, 428,500 feet of 2½-inch hose, 99,150 feet of 3-inch hose and 45,250 feet of 3½-inch hose.

Of 1½-inch hose we have on hand 40,000 feet, which is 27,600 feet below the quota fixed by the Fire Chief as necessary for the department, and we have 3,250 feet of 1½-inch hose which is over eight years old. This makes a total deficit of 30,850 feet, but this amount will be reduced in a few weeks by the delivery of 10,000 feet of 1½-inch hose which is due on contract, leaving a total deficit of 20,850 feet of 1½-inch hose.

Of 2½-inch hose we have on hand 432,650 feet, which is 4,150 feet more than the fixed quota, but, as 91,500 feet of this hose is over eight years old, we have a total deficit of 87,350 feet. This will be reduced within a few weeks by the delivery of 36,500 feet of new 2½-inch hose which is due on contract, leaving a total deficit of 50,850 feet of 2½-inch hose.

Of 3-inch hose we have on hand 111,050 feet, a surplus of 11,900 feet, as compared with the fixed quota, but, as 54,350 feet of this hose is more than eight years old, we have a total deficit of 42,450 feet. Since we have 20,000 feet of 3-inch hose due on contracts, this deficit is reduced to 22,450 feet.

Of 3½-inch hose, we have on hand 36,650 feet, which is 8,600 feet less than our quota calls for, and since 11,500 feet of this hose is over eight years old, we have a total deficit of 20,100 feet. This will shortly be reduced by the delivery of 9,300 feet, leaving a total deficit of 10,800 feet.

The cost of the various sizes of hose necessary to bring our supply of hose under eight years old up to our fixed quota is estimated as follows:

I, therefore, respectfully, but urgently, renew my request made on May 29th, 1916, for revenue bonds, which request I beg to increase by the amount of hose which since that time has either burst at fires or has passed the eight year age limit. I, therefore, request an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$92,260.30.

The quantity of hose on hand in the department over eight years old is constantly being reduced by bursting at fires. Unless we are able to replace this hose with new hose, the quantity of hose bursting at fires is certain to increase, and the consequence of this happening at fires might be a great increase in the loss of property and even might result in the loss of life. Of course, the members of your Board realize the necessity of keeping the Fire Department supplied with a sufficient quantity of sound and reliable hose, and I earnestly urge your Board to take favorable action as early as possible upon this request. No allowance is made in the budget for hose, as it was understood at the time, as it has been for several years, that the appropriation for hose for this department be made in the form of revenue bonds. I again ask that the Board give this request favorable attention and at as early a date as possible. Very truly yours,

**Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals—Request for Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$16,000, to Meet Deficits in Appropriations for Fuel and Medical and Surgical Supplies.**

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Office of the Board of Trustees, 1st Avenue and 26th Street, New York, November 21, 1916.

*Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:*

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$16,000 to meet the deficits in the appropriations for fuel, and medical and surgical supplies.

The Department has entered into a contract for the purchase of No. 3 Buckwheat coal to be used in the power plant of Bellevue Hospital on the basis of completing certain boiler house equipment. The contractor for this work has failed to finish on time, and the Trustees under date of November 15th, declared the contract abandoned. As it is necessary to use until the new power plant equipment is installed some of the old boilers which cannot be heated effectively with No. 3 Buckwheat coal, it will be necessary to purchase No. 1 Buckwheat coal. The Department has no funds available for this purpose, and therefore requests your Board to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$4,000.

The General Drug Department of the Department of Public Charities has informed us that it is unable to deliver medical and surgical supplies required in the hospitals of this department as the appropriation for 1916 is exhausted. Funds for this purpose for 1916 for the use of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals were included in the 1916 Budget of the Department of Public Charities. As that department cannot furnish us with the medical and surgical supplies that are required, the Trustees request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$12,000 for this purpose. **County Clerk, New York County—Request for Authority to Purchase Office Equipment, Etc., Without Public Letting.**

County Clerk's Office, County of New York, New County Court House, New York, November 21, 1916.

*To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:*

Sirs—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, your approval is hereby requested of the purchase of steel filing cases, office equipment, furniture, etc., to the extent of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500), without public letting. It is absolutely necessary that I immediately order seventy-five steel filing cases for the proper custody of the records of the Supreme Court; also that I make exchange of some thirty typewriting machines used in recording work, the present machines being in very bad order; also the purchase of chairs, etc., which cannot be furnished by the State Prison authorities.

No provision was made for either of these items in either the 1915 or 1916 budget; and upon my request, the Presiding Justice of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, consented to, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by resolution adopted November 17, 1916, has transferred the amount of \$7,500 from appropriation made to the Supreme Court in the First Judicial District to the appropriation "Purchase of Equipment," made to this office for the year 1916.

In view of the short space of time in which to secure estimates and give the orders so that they will be chargeable to 1916 appropriations, it would be impracticable to secure these items by public letting.

#### Resolution Providing That Appropriate Committee Investigate and Report Upon the Advisability of Licensing Motor Trucks.

By Alderman Gutman—

Whereas, In the last few years heavy motor trucks have been operated through the streets of the City of New York; and

Whereas, These heavy trucks having been carrying loads of about twenty tons in weight, grinding the hardest granite pavements to pieces by these juggernauts, where formerly such pavements showed little wear after years of service; and

Whereas, Previous to the arrival of these monster trucks upon the highways of New York the annual repair of the City streets was about one-half of one per cent. in area, where to-day it is about 30 per cent. for the same area; and

Whereas, Highway maintenance is a costly item in the City's annual expense bill and is an imposition on the taxpayers for the benefit of a few to permit this destruction of their property; and

Whereas, These motor trucks are growing in numbers to such a great extent that new problems must be met by the authorities of The City of New York having jurisdiction over the highways; therefore be it

Resolved, That this resolution be referred to the appropriate committee, with a view of drafting suitable legislation as to the desirability of licensing these trucks, regulating the width of tires that will maintain a load without sinking into the pavement, the width of these motor trucks, so as to permit them to pass without interfering with each other going in opposite directions, and for such further remedial legislation as may be necessary in the premises.

Whereas, The living income of a wage-earner to-day will not be a living income through the cold winter months if the necessities of life are too costly to buy; and

Whereas, There appears to be a combination to control the production and distribution of coal in this city, leaving the people entirely at the mercy of the producers and distributors; and

Whereas, The citizens of New York are suffering severely from the burdens they carry for the support of the home and fireside and are willing to pay a fair, just and proportionate price for coal, and want relief from this imposition; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board request his Honor Mayor Mitchell to appoint a committee of ten business men, to be known as the Common Commodity Commission, to inquire into such conditions; and be it further

Resolved, That such Committee be hereby authorized to sit in the Aldermanic Chamber, or such other place as the Committee may select, and chose a chairman from among its members, and such other assistants as may be necessary, to take testimony and inquire into the fair selling price of this commodity, with a view of exposing the exorbitant price of coal demanded, so as to prevent a reign of extortion in this city this winter, by demanding that retail prices be kept to a fair level and to prevent the distress that is sure to come, and make such recommendation and report as the Committee may deem fit and proper.

#### An Ordinance to Amend Article 27, Chapter 5, of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Elevators, by Adding Thereto a New Section.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 27, chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to elevators, by adding thereto a new section.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:*

Section 1. Article 27 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to elevators, is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section, to read as follows:

§ 569. *Safety devices.*

*Every elevator moving in a vertical shaft, used for carrying passengers, now existing and in use, or hereafter constructed or installed, shall, within two years after this ordinance becomes effective, have placed thereon or attached thereto some mechanical or electro-mechanical interlocking device that will automatically prevent the elevator car from being moved in either direction until the shaft door or gate at which the elevator car is standing is safely closed and securely fastened.*

*The rules promulgated by the superintendent of buildings under the provisions of this ordinance shall fix the requirements for the devices prescribed by this section. The superintendent of buildings shall approve for use any device that may conform to the requirements of this section and the rules adopted thereunder, as soon as possible after such device or drawings of the same have been submitted to him, and no device shall be considered as meeting requirements until it has been approved by the superintendent of buildings.*

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

On November 2, 1916, the Police Commissioner requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer accruals in the sum of \$17,260 to meet estimated deficiencies in many of the same accounts for which revenue bonds are here requested. It is therefore necessary to consider these two requests together.

A careful examination of the accounts, the stock records and the actual stock on hand, indicates that the supplies and materials necessary for the remainder of the year are as follows:

The deficiency in these accounts is mainly due to the increased cost of all kinds of supplies and material. There has also been an increased consumption of many of the different kinds of supplies on account of the carmen's strike.

The accounts to be credited in the issue of special revenue bonds, with the total amount requested in both transfer and revenue bonds, together with the facts in each case, are as follows:

Code 1611, Fuel Supplies, \$2,955. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of gasoline used in the Police launches and the increased cost of coal used in the steamer "Patrol."

On November 9, 1916, this account showed a balance of \$6,939.14 unencumbered, but this will be hardly sufficient to buy the necessary coal for precinct station houses for the remainder of the year. The sum of \$2,955 is reasonable for gasoline for launches and coal for steamer "Patrol."

Code 1612, Office Supplies, \$11,000. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of this class of supplies generally, and especially paper.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$336.96 in this account. However, it has been necessary to already obtain forms, record books and paper which were absolutely essential in the police procedure and there are many supplies of a like nature that will be necessary before the end of the year, such as paper for finger print forms, typewriter paper and ribbons, and photo plates for the Detective Bureau, all of which will cost approximately \$9,500.

Code 1615, Motor Vehicle Supplies, \$8,100. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of gasoline and to the additional equipment which has been put into service since August of this year.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of only \$31.80 and gasoline, lubricating oil, batteries, grease, patches, etc., amounting to approximately \$7,500, will be needed for operation till the end of the year.

Code 1617, Office Equipment, \$250. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of filing cabinets for which the special revenue bonds were authorized on September 29, 1916.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$771 in this account. There is no urgent need for funds in this account.

Code 1621a, Motor Vehicles and Equipment, \$1,800. The deficiency in this code is due to the increase in motor equipment put into service since August, 1916.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of approximately \$300, and there will be needed in addition to this before the end of the year approximately \$1,500 for tires for motorcycles and automobiles.

Code 1624, General Plant Material, \$2,470. The deficiency in this code is due to the high cost of materials and to the increased number of motor vehicles put into service.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$21.62. The sum of \$2,000 will be needed for parts for automobiles, motorcycles and bicycles which will have to be overhauled before the end of the year.

Code 1632, General Plant Service, \$4,900. The deficiency in this code is principally due to the maintenance of gas lights by the Welsbach Co., which was not provided for in the budget. It was presumed by the budget examiner that this maintenance was unnecessary—should be discontinued and the department maintain the lights with their own employees. The Police Commissioner states that he was advised at the budget making that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity would look after the lights, but that when requested to do so they did not act in the matter and therefore outside service was continued.

There is no reason why the police employees should not maintain these lights at much less expense than the outside service is now costing and the department has agreed to do this after November 30, 1916. The sum of \$4,600 is needed for past service bills, rentals of premises, storage of motor patrols, storage of motorcycles to the end of the year.

Code 1633, Motor Vehicle Repairs, \$2,300. The deficiency in this code is due to the increase in equipment put into service and the extra amount of service constantly maintained since August, 1916. There is a balance of only \$2.34 in this account. The sum of \$2,300 is needed for repairs to two cars which have already been repaired on account of emergency at a cost of approximately \$500 each, two cars which are now under repair at an estimated cost of \$800, and several cars that will have to undergo repairs during November and December.

It will be seen from the foregoing that there appears to be need for an authorization of special revenue bonds to the extent of \$14,495, as follows:

The full time service is required in the various park activities, which are enumerated as follows:

Cleaning of large sewers in Central Park (at the large lake, 79th Street Yard and other points); also filter basins. Cleaning of walk and road basins.

The removal of mud, etc., from bottoms of pools at 77th Street, West Drive, 110th Street, Lenox Avenue, Ramble, the upper end of 110th Street Lake and the pool. To clear these places of aquatic plants, lilies, etc., which serve as a breeding place for mosquitoes, etc., in 110th Street Lake, interfering with boating.

Spreading manure on lawns.

Removal of snow.

Cleaning of ice for skating. Present force barely sufficient for cleaning walks and caring for comfort stations and could not be spared; would have to be kept on removal of snow from park walks and consequently skating would be delayed until all walks were cleaned.

Extra labor needed now to complete lawn restoration work leaves insufficient force for minimum maintenance needs for December.

The line items which require reinforcements in the mechanical force schedule are as follows:

May I urge prompt and favorable action on this request, so that the men may not be deprived of employment during the winter, especially as it would appear highly improper to place men on half time during the winter months when there is easily sufficient work in the department to keep them employed for the entire time if funds were available for the purpose.

This sum is necessary in order that the Bureau of Street Cleaning, this Department, may continue the collection of ashes, garbage, rubbish and sweepings until December 31, 1916. The available funds for this purpose will last until about November 15, 1916. The funds allowed this Bureau for the year 1916 are less by \$2,989.64 than was actually spent during the year 1915 for refuse collection purposes and for the employment of sweeping machines, and no provision was made in the 1916 budget for the additional work which this Bureau has been compelled to do on account of serving the increased population of the Borough.

From July 15th to September 30th, daily collections were made in sections of the Borough which formerly had tri-weekly collections, as a sanitary measure, due to the prevalence of poliomyelitis.

Trucks and teams were also employed during 1916 to a greater extent than had been anticipated, in order that better sanitary conditions could be maintained



at our dumping grounds, by covering garbage, etc., with sand and loam. It was also necessary to provide additional force not provided for in the budget to transport refuse to the new destructor at Maspeth, this place being at a greater distance from part of the collection area than inland dumps formerly used.

The following is a statement of our financial condition and the estimated cost of making refuse collections until December 31, 1916:

Code 717—Balance at hand, September 25, 1916, \$21,125.50; sum (estimated) needed from September 25 to December 31, 1916, \$36,546.92; deficit, \$15,421.42.

Dear Sir—On October 4, 1916, the President of the Borough of Queens addressed a communication to your Board requesting the authorization of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$32,600 to meet anticipated deficit in accounts Nos. 717 and 718.

At your request I have caused an examination to be made into this request and report thereon as follows:

The total of the unencumbered balances in Codes Nos. 717 and 718, as of November 3, 1916, was \$16,129.03. It is estimated that these available funds will be exhausted by the 15th of November, 1916. The request for revenue bonds is to provide funds to enable the hire of horses and carts and teams and trucks to be used in connection with the collection of ashes, garbage, rubbish and sweepings during the remainder of the year.

The depletion of the account is due to various causes. From July 15 to September 30, due to the prevalence of poliomyelitis, daily collections were made in sections which formerly had tri-weekly collections, the President of the Borough of Queens feeling that this was absolutely necessary as a sanitary measure. It is estimated that these daily collections involved an expenditure of \$8,000, which was not considered at the time of the preparation of the budget.

The depletion of the account is also partly attributed to the discontinuance of certain inland dumps, necessitating the employment of teams and trucks instead of horses and carts, due to the consequent longer hauls. The operation of the new refuse destructor at Maspeth has also entailed additional expenditure, the destructor being at a greater average distance from the area of collection than the several inland dumps which were heretofore used.

At the time of the preparation of the 1916 budget it was felt that possibly the stables at the Maspeth destructor would be completed, and if so, funds would be provided for the equipment and operation of departmental forces. If this plan had materialized, it is probable that ample funds would have been in the appropriation account to take care of the needs of the other sections of the borough.

An analysis of the records of the Bureau of Street Cleaning discloses that the following force will be required during the remainder of the year:

In arriving at the necessity of this amount of special revenue bonds, consideration was also given to the probable amount of refuse to be collected and the cost per cubic yard of collection. The records of the bureau reflect the cost per cubic yard for collection during the first and second quarters of 1916 was 36.2 and 36.5 cents. The total amount required for "Horse and Cart" and "Team and Truck" Hire from October 28 to December 31, namely, \$47,581.50, at 36.5 cents per cubic yard would provide for the collection of 130,360 cubic yards. The collections of ashes, garbage, rubbish and sweepings from October 28, 1915, to December 31, 1915, amounted to 116,449 cubic yards. The additional quantity to be collected during this similar period in 1916, as reflected by the increase in the collections of the months of January to August, inclusive, in 1916, in comparison with the collections of the months of January to August, inclusive, in 1915, indicates that the estimated collections from October 28, 1916, to December 31, 1916, will equal the 130,360 cubic yards to be provided for.

At your request, I have caused an examination to be made into this request and report thereon as follows:

Code No. 2069, Food Supplies.

On June 2, 1916, the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals addressed a communication to your Board requesting the authorization of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$47,000, to meet an anticipated deficit in this code. After a careful investigation, an allowance in the sum of \$26,000 was recommended. This allowance was based upon a careful analysis of the records of the department reflecting patient and employee census and the cost per capita.

The per capita cost allowances in the budget differed at that time from the actual cost allowances, due principally to the increase in the price of foods. In some of the hospitals, where the mess is general, the average costs have been somewhat higher than the allowances. The census figures upon which this recommendation for revenue bonds was based do not vary materially from the supporting data submitted by the department in connection with the present request. The need for an additional sum appears to be due to the fact that the revised costs which had been lived up to and which, at that time, were satisfactory to the representative of the department, are now found to be too low.

This present request was submitted at a time when the Bureau was employed on the preparation of the annual budget, and the investigation of this item has not been concluded. It is believed that some additional funds are needed, but to what extent has not as yet been ascertained. However, it has been disclosed that contract adjustments will make available the sum of approximately \$3,000.

It is suggested, in order to save time, and pending the completion of the investigation, that your Committee recommend \$25,000 of the request for this item, with the understanding that should the results of the investigation so warrant, the amount may be reduced by action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The request for revenue bonds to meet anticipated deficits in the various other accounts listed in the request should be denied, as an examination of the personal service accounts of this department disclosed available salary accruals in a sufficient amount to provide for the additional needs in these codes.

No. 922—Commissioner of Docks—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$49,200, for Purchase of Fuel, Etc., and General Repairs, Ferries.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Examination of this request shows that in each fund mentioned, the deficiency is due to the extraordinarily high prices now obtaining for both labor and material. The deficits cannot be met entirely by transfer of funds from other codes.

The facts relating to each account are as follows:

Code 2827B, Fuel Supplies, Ferries, Request \$34,000.

The total appropriations for this fund, including transfers and a previous special revenue bond appropriation is \$197,713.30. The transfer of \$5,643.30 to this fund from accruals in personal service appropriations has been requested. This transfer, if approved, will bring the total of the sum available for the year to \$203,356.60.

On October 28, 1916, there was a stock on hand and under contract, but undelivered, of 3464 tons of coal, for both the Staten Island and Brooklyn ferries. There also remained an unencumbered balance of \$25,056.70 of this stated total.

Based on experience, the consumption of coal by the ferries and terminals from October 28, 1916, to December 31, 1916, will be 14,564 tons, or 11,100 tons more than the stock on hand. Based on the lowest bid received on October 26, 1916, for 10,000 tons of No. 2 Buckwheat coal, which was \$4.97 per ton, the cost of 11,100 tons would be \$55,167. After deducting the unencumbered balance of \$25,056.70 and the amount of the proposed transfer, \$5,643.50, from this sum, there remains \$24,466.80 to be provided by the issue of special revenue bonds, in order to supply a quantity of coal just sufficient to last to the end of the year.

The request of \$34,000 was made on the basis of providing a stock on hand of 1,866 tons at \$4.97 per ton on January 1, 1917. This stock may be paid for with 1917 funds.

The Dock Department intends, if possible, to reduce the needs for the balance of the year by beginning the purchase of No. 3 Buckwheat for the Brooklyn ferries as soon as possible, it being expected that the blower installation on these ferryboats will be completed this month.

There appears to be need of approximately \$25,000 additional for this code.

2848. General Plant Materials, Ferries, Request \$13,500.

The appropriation for this fund, \$38,698.99, was exhausted on September 16, 1916, indicating expenditures at the rate of \$4,552 per month. At this rate the amount necessary for the remaining 3½ months would be \$16,000.

On October 13, 1916, a transfer of \$3,000 was made to the fund, but many repairs will have to be neglected if additional materials are not purchased.

2851. General Repairs, Ferries, Request \$1,700.

On October 28, 1916, the unencumbered balance in this fund was \$5,574.55.

Many repairs to the exterior of the hulls of the "Manhattan," "Bay Ridge," "Gowanus" and "Nassau" are needed. With the exception of the "Manhattan," these boats have not been in drydock since May, 1915.

The propellers of the "Bay Ridge" and "Nassau" have not been renewed since 1912, and those of the "Manhattan" and "Gowanus" are known to be so badly corroded that their renewal is necessary.

The unencumbered balance would probably have been sufficient for the purpose if prices had remained normal.

On account of the importance of preventing deterioration in the ferryboats through delay in making necessary repairs, I believe this request should be granted.

Summarizing, there appears to be need for additional funds, as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—When the budget for the Municipal Garage was made up for 1916 it was contemplated that the old cars turned over by the various departments would be taken in as cash by the companies from whom the new automobiles were to be purchased. This arrangement, however, did not seem practicable, since it was necessary, owing to the very great demands imposed upon the garage for service, to keep the old cars in use until such a time as complete delivery of the new ones could be made. It was then estimated that the probable allowance to be made in the exchange would be about \$6,000.

It has now been decided to sell the old automobiles at auction and while it is probable that the same amount will be realized this money, according to the Charter, must be credited to the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. This necessarily will reduce our purchasing power for equipment and repairs by this sum. It appears, however, possible at this time to slightly reduce this estimate.

I therefore beg to request that your Honorable Board, in pursuance of section 188, subdivision 8 of the Charter, recommend to the Board of Estimate and Appor-

tionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue special revenue bonds in the amount of \$5,000, to be divided as follows:

\$3,000 to Code No. 2790, Motor Vehicle Equipment;

\$2,000 to Code No. 2792, Motor Vehicle Repairs;

—thus increasing these items respectively from \$52,592.00 to \$55,592.00, and \$3,900.00 to \$5,900.00. Respectfully,

No. 924—Commissioner of Plant and Structures—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$5,500, to Replenish Accounts for the Conduct of the Municipal Garage.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—As requested in your communication of October 19, 1916, I have caused an examination to be made into this request for special revenue bonds.

There was provided in the budget for equipment for the Municipal Garage an appropriation of \$52,592. This sum consisted of \$43,000 for new automobiles and the balance, \$9,592, for tires, tubes and miscellaneous equipment.

It was estimated at the time that \$6,000 would be obtained for old automobiles exchanged as part of the purchase money, making the net cost of the new cars \$37,000. It was intended that this \$6,000, in addition to the \$9,592 referred to above, would be available for the purchase of tires, tubes, robes and miscellaneous equipment.

The department found it impracticable to make the exchange as originally contemplated. The new cars were purchased at a cost of \$42,079. Recently the department sold 41 automobiles at public auction for \$4,232.50, which sale included the cars that it was originally contemplated would be exchanged. This money cannot be made available, as the proceeds of this sale will have to be credited to the General Fund.

There are practically no funds available for the purchase of equipment for the balance of the year. At the present time there are outstanding bills for the purchase of tires amounting to \$1,028.13. From an examination of the records of the Municipal Garage, showing the date that the tires were purchased and the estimated mileage since that date, it appears that an additional sum of about \$1,150 will be necessary for tires for the balance of the year, \$434 for inner tubes, \$110 for miscellaneous equipment and approximately \$675 for automobile blanket robes for winter use. There therefore appears to be a necessity for an additional allowance of \$3,400 for equipment.

In Code 2792, Motor Vehicle Repairs, there is an unexpended balance of \$194.29. There are outstanding liabilities of \$234.41 for the month of October, \$225.36 for November, and, based on the average expenditure for the first six months of this year and considering the condition of the cars now in operation, it is probable that a further sum needed for the balance of the year will increase the total requirements to \$1,100 in addition to the present unexpended balance. To this account are chargeable automobile parts used in making repairs, and the cost of such repairs as must be made by private concerns, for which the Municipal Garage is not equipped.

It is believed that the sum of \$3,400 is necessary in Code 2790, Motor Vehicle Equipment, and \$1,100 in Code 2792, Motor Vehicle Repairs, a total of \$4,500.

There does not appear to be any available funds which might be applied to these accounts. Respectfully,

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. The security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, secretary or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
