Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—At a regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Bronx Board of Trade, held on the 20th inst., the following resolution was unanimously adopted, and the Secretary authorized to send you copy of same:

Whereas, an ordinance, known as section 145, article 11, which provides for the keeping of a record by public cartmen of all transports and removals, has been introduced by Alderman Martin in the Board of Aldermen; and

Whereas, such an ordinance is necessary to protect our business men from losses, and enable our Federal, State and Municipal authorities to keep track of those who have been guilty of violating the law; therefore, be it

Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Authority to Purchase Wheels for Watson Bottom Dumping Wagons Without Public Letting.

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request that the Board of Aldermen authorize the purchase, without public letting, of 40 front wheels and 40 rear wheels for Watson bottom dumping wagons at a total expenditure not to exceed \$1,622 made up as follows: 40 front wheels at \$17.55 each, 20 rear wheels at \$21 each, 20 rear wheels at \$25 each.

Also repair parts for Kindling squeegee machines amounting to \$1,615.14 and parts for Hvass squeegee machines amounting to \$721.70.

Commissioner of Docks—Request Relative to the Fixation of the Wages of Foreman Dock Builder.

The City of New York, Department of Docks and Ferries, Office of the Commissioner, Pier A, North River, March 22, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—The Present per diem rate for foreman dock builder in this department is \$5; this rate is for an eight hour day and six day week, making \$30 per week for 48 hours' work.

The prevailing rate of wages paid since January 1, 1918, by firms constituting the Contracting Dock Builders' Association is, I am informed, \$6 per day, for an eight hour day and a six day week, with an allowance of four hours off on Saturday, making wages paid by these firms to foremen dock builders \$36 per week for 44 hours' work.

The rate paid by this Department at the present time has been in effect since January 1, 1915. In the meantime the wages of dock builders have been increased within the past year from \$4 to \$4.50 per day, and the present wages of engineer pile drivers are \$5.50 per day or 50 cents per day more than the foreman dock builder who is in charge of the work of the whole gang, including the engineer pile driver.

As this Department must depend very largely upon the ability and trustworthiness of the foreman dock builder in prosecuting the construction and maintenance work of the Bureau of Engineering, I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution establishing the position of Foreman Dock Builder in this Department at the prevailing rate of wages for that position, viz.: \$6 per day.

Gentlemen—Owing to the extraordinary condition of the asphalt market we find it impossible to secure bids in answer to our advertisement for asphalt and asphalt sand.

The asphalt companies inform us that they are unable to submit any bids, owing to the difficulty in securing supplies, as the Government has informed them that they anticipate taking over their ships for the transportation of oil.

They also inform us that the Government has requested them to cease manufacturing asphalt for the present, as it has decided that asphalt is a non-essential product and that the oils used in its manufacture will be required by the Government for fuel purposes.

As the companies have a small supply of asphalt on hand, which they will let us have on open market order, I would request that the attached resolution be adopted by your honorable Board as early as possible, permitting us to purchase asphalt and asphalt sand on open market order from April 1st to November 1st, as this will cover the period in which we can use this material. Sec. 4. Hours of service and other conditions of labor in the Department of Street Cleaning. 1. This section shall apply to all employees of the Department of Street Cleaning who are included in the "Labor Class" as provided for in the Rules and Regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

2. The legal day's work of such employees shall be of eight hours' duration.

3. No such employee shall be required to work longer than eight hours in any one day of twenty-four except that he be compensated for such overtime at the rate of time and one-half, such overtime to be calculated on the basis of a working day of eight hours' duration and of 313 working days in one year.

4. No such employee shall be required to work more than six days in any consecutive seven, except in case of snowfall or other emergency when such extra work on the seventh day shall be compensated for at the said rate of time and one-half.

5. No such employees shall be in any way prohibited, or restrained from forming organizations for their mutual interest and advancement as employees of the said Department.

6. The duly accredited representatives of such employees' organizations in their capacity as such shall in no way be prohibited or restrained from communicating or making trade agreements with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning in regard to any matter affecting the employment of those they represent and within the jurisdiction of the said Commissioner.

7. This section shall take effect immediately.

The bill for such care and treatment at such rates, when certified by the superintendent or other person in charge of such hospital and approved by the police commissioner or fire commissioner, as the case may be, shall be paid subject to audit by the comptroller.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 5 of article 1 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new clause as follows:

Nothing in this section shall present the issuance by the superintendent of buildings of a certificate of occupancy for the reception of persons for medical or charitable care or treatment, for any now existing building erected of non-fireproof construction as defined by subdivision 3 of section 71 of article 4 of this chapter, not exceeding 40 feet in height or 5,000 square feet in area, and enclosed on at least three sides by an open court as defined by section 135 of article 7 of this chapter, such court to be not less than 10 feet in width at all points, and provided that all interior stairways and all vertical shafts are enclosed in partitions of fireproof or fire resisting material, that all openings in such partitions are protected by self-closing fire doors or fire windows, and that proper exit facilities be provided and that boiler room, kitchen and bakery be separate and apart from the building proper and be constructed of fireproof materials.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—I desire to place before your body a request for the issuance of special revenue bonds in the sum of two thousand dollars, under the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter.

I have recently assumed the office of Sheriff of Bronx County and upon an inspection of the jail, which is under my care, found two conditions which called for immediate correction, in view of the responsibility which I have of keeping prisoners in safe custody.

The jail, as your body knows, is located in the Bergen Building, a privately owned building leased by The City of New York. Under my construction of the lease the obligation to make repairs is upon The City of New York, and the obligation to make new improvements is likewise upon The City of New York, and this judgment has been concurred in by the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York.

In December, 1917, there was a convict here who was sentenced to five years in prison. He made an effort to escape from the prison, and when sentenced confessed before the County Judge of this County that he received from the outside a saw with which he attempted to escape. The opportunity for outside aid comes from the fact that the cell windows are in the outer walls of the building, and, while the jail is surrounded by a high wall and fence, the fence is so close to the jail that any outsider could with the aid of a pole pass a pistol or blackjack or other weapon into any prison cell.

In view of the fact that this opportunity does exist, and that it was recently taken advantage of by the prisoner referred to, to whom a saw was passed by means of a rope, I feel that it is my duty to correct this condition.

I have accordingly determined to place around each one of the 131 windows in the prison a wire mesh, set in an iron frame, the size of which is 4 feet by 6 feet. I have bids from several reputable contractors, and base the estimate set out below upon their figures.

A short time ago there was left in a cell of one of the prisoners two metal spoons, the handles of each of these spoons were so remodelled by some one that it was possible to turn the cell lock with the aid of the spoon. If the man had escaped from the cell and tier, and if he was successful in evading or overpowering the guards, and then shot the keeper upon the main gate by means of a gun obtained from the outside, as above shown, there might be, if the other prisoners assisted in the escape, a jail delivery.

To correct this situation I have determined to place an iron door at the foot of the stairway and an iron door around the elevator, with a gate in each of these doors, the turn-key of each of these two new gates should always be with the man upon the main gate, and any escape as above described would be impossible.

To further prevent the bringing of contraband goods into the jail I have determined to erect a wire screen behind which all visitors must talk to prisoners. The present facilities in the jail are entirely inadequate in this respect.

In the face of such conditions we cannot long hesitate to correct these dangers and I would therefore request your Honorable Board to issue special revenue bonds to cover the cost of making the improvements above outlined, and thus aid me in the discharge of my duty; said cost will be two thousand dollars.

No. 372—Sheriff, Bronx County. Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$2,000, for the Purpose of Making Improvements to the County Jail.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee:

Sir—In accordance with your request of March 21, 1918, I have investigated the above request and report as follows:

The Bronx County Jail is located in leased quarters in the Bergen Building on the southeast corner of Tremont and Arthur avenues, Borough of The Bronx, where the Sheriff has three floors in the south building. The lease expires October 1, 1925, with the privilege of a ten-year renewal.

There are 106 separate cells arranged in five tiers in the rear end of the Sheriff's quarters. Each cell has a window which overlooks an areaway formed by the prison wall and a retaining wall which supports open lots in the rear, which are on the level of the third tier of cells.

It is possible to approach the fence which protects this areaway on three sides of the building. The windows have bars but no screens and the furthest distance from the surrounding grounds to the windows on the furthest tier is about forty feet. It would therefore be possible to throw things into any one of the windows from the adjoining property.

It is proposed to install wire mesh screens on the outside of the cell and corridor windows. No screens will be installed on other than jail windows. No screens will be installed on the outside of the jail windows.

At the main entrance to the jail on the first floor it is proposed to install iron grilles around the elevator entrance and the stairway leading upstairs to provide necessary additional safeguards for the prison.

In the laundry, part of which is to be used as a meeting place for prisoners and visitors, it is proposed to install a fine wire mesh screen partition to separate visitors and prisoners and prevent the passing of drugs and other articles to prisoners.

The lowest of two invitation bids received for this work, which is reasonable, is as follows:

Screen partition	115.00
Total	\$1,781.50

There was no request or allowance in the 1918 Budget for this work. On March 6, 1918, the Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion to the Sheriff that this work was not a part of this lessor's duty under the lease. Respectfully,

REPORTS:

Mr. George O. Eaton, Consulting Engineer of the Fire Department, appeared before the Committee and explained the necessity for the adoption of an ordinance effecting the renumbering of a section in an ordinance designated as "Liquefied Chlorine," which became effective September 18, 1917. In order to prevent any further confusion in regard to this matter, your Committee recommends the adoption of the following ordinance, for the purpose of effecting the correction referred to. AN ORDINANCE to amend article 17 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, by the change of a section number.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The ordinance adopted July 17, 1917, and effective September 18, 1917, relating to "Liquefied Chlorine," is hereby amended by having the section number thereof read "214a" instead of "214."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dear Sir—Last year there were two amendments to the Code of Ordinances adopted by the Board of Aldermen, both of which were designated as new sections, to be known as section 214.

One of these is: "Regulations governing the manufacture and handling of soda water and carbonated beverages," and has three subdivisions, Nos. 1-2-3. This was passed by the Board of Aldermen on June 19th, 1917, and became effective July 3rd, 1917.

The other ordinance, which created another new section, No. 214, is designated as "Liquefied Chlorine." This was adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 17th, 1917, and became effective Sept. 18th, 1917.

The above similar numbers for different ordinances have naturally caused confusion, and on Feb. 11, 1918, the Board of Hazardous Trades made a recommendation, which was approved by the Fire Commissioner, that the ordinance designated as "Liquefied Chlorine" be designated as No. 214-a.

I would therefore request that you have a new ordinance introduced for "Liquefied Chlorine," merely changing the number of the same from 214 to 214-a.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Referring to the Department of Health an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to the Manufacture and Sale of Flexible Tubing to Be Used for Gas Connections.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on March 12, 1918 (Minutes, page 604), the annexed ordinance to amend chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the manufacture and sale of flexible tubing, to be used for gas connections, respectfully

REPORTS:

The adoption of this ordinance, in its present form, was opposed by Dr. Harris and Mr. Featherston, representing the Department of Health, and also by Mr. George O. Eaton, Consulting Engineer in the Fire Department. The only appearance before the Committee in favor was Mr. Friese, representing the New York Gas Tubing Company.

Your Committee is of the opinion that this matter should be referred to the Department of Health, and recommends that the Fire Department be called in consultation by the Commissioner of Health, with a view of formulating an ordinance to cover the matter referred to, if, in their opinion, such an ordinance should be deemed necessary.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, by adding thereto an article 4, relating to the inspection of and sale of flexible tubing to be used for making gas connections in the City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new article, to read as follows:

Article 4.

Manufacture and Sale of Flexible Tubing to Be Used for Making Gas Connections

Section 45. No flexible tubing to be used for making gas connections shall be sold in the City of New York on and after thirty days after the passage of this ordinance, unless it conforms to the following standards:

1. Tubing suitable for use only on gas lamps shall consist of a metal core covered with a rubber jacket, or a fiber cover, over which shall be spread a compound of glue and glycerine 1-32 inch thick, impervious to gas. The outside shall be wound by a protective braid or in the alternative the core may consist of a rubber tubing over which shall be spread a compound of gelatine or other substance impervious to gas. The outside shall be wound by a protective fiber or braid of cotton or silk and to be fitted with standard metal ends.

Tubing for use on gas irons shall consist of a wire or metal core covered with a textile or fiber cover, over which shall be a cotton filling, on which shall be spread a layer of glue and glycerine 1-32 inch thick, impervious to gas, which in turn shall

be covered with a textile or fiber cover, over which shall be spread a layer of asbestos. The outside to be wrapped by a wire or metal spiral, or in the alternative the core may be a cotton inserted rubber tubing covered by a spiral steel wire, fitted with approved ends.

Not more than three grades of flexible gas tubing for gas heating and cooking stoves should be sold and should be constructed as follows:

a. One with a metal tubing core, reinforced with a layer of paper or fiber; then a cotton filler, on which a dip of glue and glycerine 1-32 inch thick is applied; then a second layer of waxed paper, and to be finished with a protective braid of cotton.

b. One with a steel wire spiral core, covered with a rubber jacket; this is to have a layer of glue and glycerine 1-32 inch thick, impervious to gas; this to have a layer of fiber or paper, a binding of cotton, finished with a protective cotton braid.

c. One with a steel wire spiral core, covered with a layer of fiber or paper; then a layer of glue and glycerine 1-32 inch thick, with two layers of fiber or paper and one layer of asbestos; this is finished with a binding of steel spiral wire; the latter will protect the tubing from heat.

The ends of all tubing to be used for lighting fixtures shall be made wholly of brass. The ends of all other tubing shall be composed of not less than 35 per cent. of washed and dried fine para rubber, and shall be not less than 1/4 inches in length and 1/4 inch at the thickest point. The connection between the rubber ends and the tubing shall all be of metal only.

All tubing shall be tested by the manufacturer before the same is offered for sale, under sufficient pressure to indicate any leak in the tubing throughout its length, and the said tubing shall be labeled with the word "Tested," with the manufacturer's name or trade mark thereunder.

2. **Penalty.**—For a violation of this ordinance, any tubing offered for sale, not conforming to the requirements above set forth, shall be confiscated, and, in addition, the person, partnership or corporation offering the same for sale shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and liable to a penalty of not less than \$ and not more than \$ for each offense.

3. **Inspection.**—It shall be the duty of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, from time to time, to inspect all tubing offered for sale within the city, and the said department is hereby authorized to empower its inspectors to confiscate any tubing found to be offered for sale in violation of this ordinance.

4. The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity is hereby authorized to appoint the necessary inspectors, not exceeding five, who shall be men duly qualified to inspect gas tubing, and the salary of said inspectors shall be \$ per year for each inspector.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance in Relation to the Wilful Destruction of Foods.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on March 19, 1918 (Minutes, page 645), the annexed ordinance in relation to the wilful destruction of foods, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee is of the opinion that any measure which tends to the conservation of food and the prevention of food wastage should be adopted. In these times, when the most destructive war in the history of the world is being conducted, and when the Federal Government at Washington is resorting to the most drastic measures to prevent the wastage of food products, your Committee believes that the proposed ordinance would go far to correct an evil which in some instances is probably more the result of carelessness than criminality, and recommends the adoption of this ordinance, to be known as section 9-A, chapter 27, of the Code of Ordinances.

It is the purpose of your Committee to further consider this proposition, and it may at a later date recommend certain amendments for the purpose of further strengthening the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section in relation to the wilful destruction of foods.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1, chapter 27, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

§ 9a. **Wilful destruction of food prohibited; term "food" defined; exception.** No person, firm or corporation shall willfully waste or destroy, or cause, suffer or allow to be willfully wasted or destroyed, any wholesome food fit for human consumption. The term "food," as herein used, shall be taken to mean and include meats, pork, fowl, vegetables, bread and bread rolls. Provided, however, the provisions of this section shall not apply where the willful destruction and waste of such food is regulated or controlled by the provisions of the United States Food Control Laws, or the New York State Food Control Laws. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50), or imprisonment for ten (10) days, or both.

This section shall take effect immediately and shall continue in force during the time the United States is at war and thereafter until the mayor of the City of New York shall declare that the emergency causing the enactment thereof no longer exists.

Sec. 2. The table of section headings of chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

CHAPTER 27.

Report of the Committee on Finance in Favor of Adopting Resolution to Authorize an Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$50,000, for the Purchase and Storage of Foodstuffs, to Be Sold Later to Consumers by the Commissioner of Public Markets.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on March 12, 1918 (Minutes, page 557), the annexed request of the Commissioner of Public Markets for Special Revenue Bonds, \$50,000, for the purchase and storage of foodstuffs to be sold to consumers later, respectfully

REPORTS:

That on this proposition the Committee heard Commissioner Day and Mr. Thomas Smith of the Bureau of Contract Supervision. Your Committee also has a report on the subject from the latter bureau, which is made a part hereof. While it may appear that the Comptroller has power to issue the bonds asked for under the provisions of the act creating the State Food Commission, the Committee is one of opinion with the report herein referred to, and to eliminate any doubt that may arise presents the accompanying resolution for adoption.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, and section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Commissioner of Public Markets

to purchase food and fuel and for the handling and sale thereof and for any incidental expenses incurred therein.

Gentlemen—Whereas, the State Food Commission has granted power to The City of New York to buy and sell food and fuel to the inhabitants of The City of New York; and

Whereas, the Board of Aldermen and the Mayor have named the Department of Public Markets as the agency for such purchase and sale; and

Whereas, the time has arrived when considerable quantities of foodstuffs would have to be purchased in order to get as nearly production prices as possible; and

Whereas, legally, the Department of Public Markets is without power to make purchases without money available to pay the amount obligated; and

Whereas, cash payments greatly facilitate purchases and cheapen prices,

I therefore respectfully request your Honorable Body to issue special revenue bonds in the amount of \$50,000 for use in purchasing for immediate consumption or for storage to be sold to consumers later, any foodstuffs which this department may find feasible or advisable to purchase; that the money so created be put into a special account for the use of the Department of Public Markets, either in the Department of Finance or as a special account in the Department of Public Markets, subject to direct oversight and audit by the Department of Finance; that I, as Commissioner of Public Markets, be put under bond in such amount as your Honorable Board may deem sufficient for the protection of the City to guarantee on my part faithful handling of such funds; that I be allowed to make such purchases direct and pay such commissions for purchase and sale as in my judgment may be just and proper.

I would respectfully urge speedy action on the part of your Honorable Body in view of the tremendous importance attached to this very vital matter of city administration. Very truly yours,

No. 344—Request of the Commissioner of Public Markets for Special Revenue Bonds, \$50,000, for Use in Purchasing any Foodstuffs Which the Department May Find Feasible and Advisable to Purchase.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—As requested in your communication of March 14, 1918, I have caused an investigation into this matter and below I give the facts in relation thereto.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 19, 1917, adopted the following resolution, in which the Board of Aldermen concurred on October 23, 1917:

"Be it resolved and certified, pursuant to the provisions of section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917, that on account of the deprivation of necessities of life in the City of New York, by reason of a shortage in the supply of, and excessive charges for, milk, meats, other foods and fuel, an emergency exists which requires that the City of New York purchase milk, meats, other foods and fuel and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants."

Section 14, referred to in the above mentioned resolution, reads as follows:

"14. Purchase and sale of food and fuel by municipalities. Any municipality in this state may, in case of an actual or anticipated emergency on account of a deprivation of necessities, by reason of excessive charges or otherwise, purchase food and fuel with municipal funds or on municipal credit, and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants in such manner and through such agencies as it may determine, but before the exercise of any such power or authority by any municipality it shall have the consent in writing from the state food commission to exercise such power. The mayor, if any, and the governing body or bodies of any such municipalities shall file with the state food commission a resolution and certificate stating that such a necessity has arisen in said municipality and otherwise satisfy the state food commission that such a necessity exists. The state food commission shall act upon the application as in its judgment the public interest requires and may prescribe such regulations and restrictions as it deems wise.

"Special revenue bonds may be issued by the city comptroller for the purpose of this section in any city which issues such bonds, and the same shall be issued in the manner provided by the city charter or other act applicable thereto."

Pursuant to the application mentioned above the State Food Commission on November 1, 1917, granted the application with the following restrictions:

"(1) Such consent is granted until further order of the Commission.

"(2) The City of New York shall make monthly, or oftener if required by the State Food Commission, a report of its operations pursuant to the foregoing consent to the State Food Commission. Such report shall be in such form as shall be prescribed by the Commission."

The Board of Aldermen, at a meeting held on January 7, 1918, designated the Commissioner of Public Markets of the City of New York as the agency for the purchase, storage and sale to the inhabitants of the City of food and fuel under authority of the above mentioned law.

The Commissioner of Public Markets, in order to alleviate the conditions as set forth in the resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, requests that the sum of \$50,000 be provided by the issue of special revenue bonds as a fund to permit him to purchase food and fuel for immediate sale to the public or for storage, to be sold later to the public. The Commissioner has stated that the plan of the Department of Markets for bringing food to New York and selling it to the public at the lowest possible prices will develop in its practical details, as the various conditions to be met might arise.

The Commissioner has been able to sell food sent to him on consignment and some acquired on credit, which was paid for out of the proceeds of the sales. In order that he might take advantage of the low prices afforded in cash sales and also to permit the purchase of food for storage at a time when low prices are afforded, to be sold later when public interest would be served, it would be desirable that such a fund be created.

It is suggested that the usual restriction in the resolutions recommending special revenue bond appropriations "that all obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918," be eliminated. The purpose of this is to permit the account to be a continuing one so that all credits might be applied back to the fund and without new authorization next year.

The procedure for the audit of bills for purchases and for the sale of food and fuel acquired is now being worked out by the Department of Finance.

It is questionable whether, under the provisions of section 14, above quoted, action by the Board of Aldermen is necessary, as the Comptroller appears to have power to issue special revenue bonds, but such action by your Board will remove any question in the matter. Respectfully,

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting Substitute Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Snow and Ice."

REPORTS:

Your Committee heard the introducer of the proposed ordinance and also the Hon. Frank L. Dowling, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Mr. A. C. MacStay; Mr. T. J. Murphy, representing the Corporation Counsel, and Dr. A. Korn, President of the Harlem Property Owners' Association, who favored the ordinance, and there were no appearances in opposition. It is the contention of those favoring the proposed ordinance that the provision relating to snow and ice, as formerly existed, should be re-enacted, because of the innumerable serious and fatal accidents that have occurred by neglect or failure of householders to remove snow as required by ordinance.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the proposed ordinance is desirable, but feeling that it should be modified, herewith presents a substitute ordinance, which it recommends for adoption.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to snow and ice.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§21. Property owners' duties.

1. Must clear sidewalks. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person, having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city, abutting upon any street or public place, where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within 4 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow [and] or ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of 4 hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow [and] or ice from the roadway by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the borough president of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said commissioner of street cleaning or of said borough president of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow [and] or ice, dirt, or other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other persons who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow [and] or ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow [and] or ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or vacant lot abuts, the [president of the] commissioner of street cleaning or the borough president of Queens and Richmond [in which such building or vacant lot is located] president of Queens and Richmond, as the case may be, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal, as to each particular lot of ground, shall be ascertained and certified by the said commissioner of street cleaning or the borough president of Queens and Richmond to the comptroller, and the board of estimate and apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required, for the said removal of such snow [and] or ice, [and snow] dirt, or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds, which shall be sold by the comptroller as provided by law.

The [president of the] commissioner of street cleaning or the borough president of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be, shall, as soon as possible after [the] such work is done, certify to the corporation counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property. The corporation counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, [together with \$3 penalty for each offense,] and, when so recovered, the amount shall be turned over to the city chamberlain, to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall, upon conviction thereof by any city magistrate, be fined for such offense not less than One Dollar (\$1) and not more than Three Dollars (\$3) and in default of payment thereof may be imprisoned for a period of one day.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the City for the removal of snow, [and] ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice [and] or snow, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law.

The said Borough President shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property.

The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of said expense, [together with Three Dollars (\$3) penalty for each offense], and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

REPORTS:

REPORTS:

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 21, article 2, chapter 25, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto, after subdivision 7 of said section, a new subdivision to be known as subdivision 7a, and to read as follows:

"7a. Boilers, permanent. The annual rate for water supplied in houses to boilers, except those used exclusively for heating purposes, shall be \$2.16 per boiler horsepower installed."

And by adding to said section, after subdivision 21 thereof, a new subdivision to be known as 21a, and to read as follows:

"21a. Ice Machines. For any machine or apparatus used in the production of ice or refrigeration a yearly charge of \$20 per ton shall be made for the actual capacity of the machine or apparatus."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of the Committee on Buildings in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Cellar Steps."

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on March 4, 1918 (Minutes, page 525), the annexed ordinance to amend section 164 of article 14 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to cellar steps, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the ordinance reasonable and proper, as its purpose is to save the City from damage suits and protect people walking along the streets from accidents.

It, therefore, recommends the adoption of said ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 164 of article 14 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to cellar steps.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 164 of article 14 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§164. Cellar steps;[] cellar doors.

Every entrance or flight of steps, now existing and projecting beyond the line of the street and descending into any cellar or basement story of any house or other building, where such entrance or flight of steps shall not be covered, shall be inclosed with a railing on each side, permanently put up, from 3 to 3½ feet high, with a gate to open inwardly, or with 2 iron chains across the front of the entranceway, 1 near the top and 1 in the centre of the railing, to be closed during the night, unless there be a burning light over the steps, to prevent accidents. *Where such entrance is covered by a cellar door such door shall be kept in good repair, and shall not be permitted to remain open except when in actual use for ingress or egress of persons or for the loading or unloading of things out of or into such cellar or basement story.*

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORTS:

That your Committee carefully examined the subject. It believes the proposed site to be suitable and appropriate for the purpose intended.

It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE selecting a site to be acquired for use as a refuse destructor in the Bureau of Street Cleaning, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects as a site to be acquired for use as a refuse destructor in the Bureau of Street Cleaning, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, the following lands described in metes and bounds, as follows:

All that certain parcel of land situated in Jamaica, Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, bounded on the Southeast by Catharine Street, on the Northeast by Church Street, on the Southwest by the South Side Railroad and upon the Northwest by the line dividing Lots 19 and 20, as the aforesaid streets and these lots are shown upon Map of Lots situated at Jamaica, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, N. Y., belonging to I. B. Remsen; surveyed October 11, 1898, by E. W. Conklin & Son; filed at the Queens County Clerk's office June 27, 1899, as No. 444, being more particularly described as follows:

The Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to prepare two similar surveys, maps or plans of said lands and premises and file the same, one in the office of this Board and the other in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens, in accordance with the provisions of section 1432 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
