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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 6, 1882.

Present—William R. Grace, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Allan Campbell, Comptroller, and J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain.

The minutes of the meetings held July 14 and September 6, 1882, were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following report, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT-COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, 1 October 6, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Bonds and stocks of the City and County of New York, amounting to two million and fifty thousand three hundred and four dollars and forty-six cents (\$2,050,304.46), become due and payable on November 1, 1882, as follows:

Payment of these bonds and stocks from "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City t," is provided for by section 6 of chapter 383, of the Laws of 1878, as follows, to wit.:

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and empowered to call in, "pay and redeem any portion of the bonded debt, now a charge upon the treasury of the said City, "other than Revenue Bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, when they may deem "it to be advantageous for the interest of the City so to do. and any part of "It to be advantageous for the interest of the City so to do. and any part of "said bonded debt falling due, not exchanged for or redeemed from the proceeds of consolidated "stock as herein provided, may be paid from said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City "Debt," provided such "payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as in "the preceding section specified; and provided, also, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall "deem it to be for the best interests of the City that such payment shall be so made."

The moneys of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt will be sufficient to pay off said bonds and stocks without impairing in any way the preferred claims thereon; and, deeming it to be for the best interests of the City that such payment shall be made, I submit and recommend the adoption of a resolution for that purpose.

The following communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK-DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, NEW YORK, September 13, 1882.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor and Chairman of Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York .

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this date, the following resolution was adopted, to wit. :

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to authority vested in them, by subdivision 11 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and are hereby respectfully requested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the amount of (\$250,000) two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks."

Whereupon, the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on $\,$ motion, was unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Department of Docks, "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," to the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act relating to said Department, its powers and duties, the said sum being the amount of the requisition of the Dock Department, dated September 13, 1882.

The Comptroller submitted the petition of the Citizens Association of the Fourth Ward, Long Island City, that from the expiration of the present lease of the Thirty-fourth Street Ferry, November 1st, 1882, the fare on said ferry be reduced from four to two cents for each foot-passenger.

Hon. James W. Covert, Hon. John J. Cullen, J. P. Gleason, Esq., and John Higgs, Esq., respectively addressed the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in relation to the subject.

Laid over for consideration.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the application for lease of the franchise of a ferry from the vicinity of James slip, East river, to Bridge street, Brooklyn, submitted the following report, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, October 2d, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN:—The Comptroller, to whom was referred an application for a lease of the franchise of a ferry to run from a point near James slip, East river, to Bridge street, Brooklyn, respectfully presents the following

REPORT:

On October 15, 1863, a resolution was adopted by the Common Council, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, authorizing the Comptroller to advertise and sell at public auction, a lease for a ferry from the slip between Piers 32 and 33, East river, New York (adjoining James slip), and the foot of Bridge street, Brooklyn, for the term of ten years, from the first day of May, 1864, provided that the purchaser of such ferry lease shall procure, at his own risk and expense, the slips designated, and also suitable ferry boats for the accommodation of the public, and charge the usual rates of ferriage thereon.

Under this authority, the lease of the ferry was sold and made to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, for the term of ten years, from May 1, 1864, at a yearly rent of \$600.

When the lease expired, on May 1, 1874, the ferry was abandoned, and it has not been run since that time. As the authority to operate the ferry ceased when the lease expired, a resolution of the Common Council to re-establish it is now requisite.

The New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company hold a lease of the slip between Piers 32 and 33, East river, from private owners, which expires May 1, 1883.

The ferry-houses, racks, etc., are very much decayed, and are not now in a condition to be used for ferry purposes.

It is represented that a ferry between the points mentioned in the application for a lease of the franchise is greatly needed by a large and growing section of the City of Brooklyn, and that the property-owners, proprietors of factories and residents interested, are prepared to provide suitable landings and ferry-boats to accommodate the public and operate the ferry at moderate rates of ferriage, and to lease the franchise from the city for the term of ten years at a reasonable yearly reputal.

The application for the establishment of the ferry has been approved by his Honor the Mayor of Brooklyn and other public authorities of that city.

It is believed that the interests of the cities of New York and Brooklyn will be thereby materially

I recommend, therefore, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund request the Common Council to pass a resolution or ordinance, to establish a ferry between the points mentioned in the application for a lease of the franchise, and submit a resolution for that purpose.

Whereas, A large number of property-owners, manufacturers, and residents in the City of Brooklyn, have applied to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a lease of the franchise of a ferry between a point near James slip, East river, in the City of New York, and the foot of Bridge street, in the City of Brooklyn, and,

Whereas, A ferry is not now established by the Common Council of the City of New York between those points, and a lease of the franchise or right to operate such ferry cannot be sold or entered into until the Common Council shall establish it, and,

Whereas, It appears that the public interests will be promoted by the operation of such ferry,

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of New York be and is hereby respectfully requested to pass an ordinance to establish said ferry, and authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to sell and lease the same, as provided by law, and on such terms and conditions as will promote and secure the public interests, the ferriage to be fixed at reasonable and moderate rates, not exceeding two cents for each foot-passenger.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

A communication was received from John T. Hanemann, President of the German Hospital, in relation to extension of its lease, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller. W. H. DIKEMAN, Secretary.

Sir—There were 547 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 30, 1882, which is a decrease of 88, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 231 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending September 23, 1882, was 623, which is 60.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.15 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,288,074.

All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless under the written instructions of the Engineer-in-Chief.

No estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The right to decline all the estimates is reserved, if deemed for the interest of the Corporation, and showing the manner of payment for the work, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department, acopy of which, together with the form of the agreement, including specifications,

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED

for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the
Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks,
and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regula-tion, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalues thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the citv, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner. lessee, or occupant, No. 2—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or

maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, withcut a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall tail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfiert and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for exactive, erection or obstructure, and the such production of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3-No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4—All gender of placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-fuor hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each a

account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to such vessel, severally and respectively.

same, or any sucters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such sanow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14—The term "Board," when used in the fore going rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York."
