### BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

The Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor; Francis M. Scott, Counsel to the Corporation, the officers designated by section 66 of the New York Consolidation Act, met this day.

From the aggregate there has been omitted two items. First—That of the cost for extra copies. The number of such copies will depend upon circumstances that may develop during the ensuing year. If these circumstances could be accurately forecasted and an estimate made, the relative standing of the bidders would not be at all changed. The other omitted item is the charge for standing matter. This is fixed in the specifications at ten cents per 1,000 ems. Estimating the aggregate of this composition for the succeeding year at 40,000,000 ems, its costs under all the bids would be \$4,000. While it is probable that the quantities for 1896 will be in excess of those of 1894, it is not expected that the proportion of each class will be materially changed.

Each estimate shall state the name and place of residence of the person making it; if there is more than one such person, their names and residences must be given; and if only one person is interested in the estimate it must distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance, and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting, the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.
