COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 1 o'clock p. m., on Tuesday, July 31, 1906.

Present—Patrick F. McGowan, Acting Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; John H. Campbell, Deputy Chamberlain, and Elias Goodman, Acting President of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held July 18, 1906, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of space between the Wall Street Ferry house and rack and the westerly side of Pier (new) 13, East river, to the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company:

NEW YORK, July 16, 1906.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I beg to advise that after consideration I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would best be served by a lease to the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company of the following-described property:

Beginning at a point which is the intersection of the westerly side line of Pier 13, East river, and the bulkhead wall along the southerly side of the marginal street, wharf or place adjacent to South street; running thence southerly along the westerly side of Pier 13, 201 feet and 6 inches; thence westerly and at right angles to said line of Pier 13, 22 feet; thence northwesterly about 152 feet and 6 inches to a point which is 51 feet and 6 inches south of the bulkhead wall and 47 feet 3 inches west of the westerly side of Pier 13; thence still northwesterly about 52 feet to the bulkhead wall aforesaid; thence easterly and along the bulkhead wall 52 feet and 6 inches to the point or place of beginning.

The lease to commence August 1, 1906, and to be for a term of ten years, with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years. The rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$3,900 per annum, the rental for the second term to be 10 per cent. advance. The lessee to have the privilege of erecting upon the said land under water, in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks, a platform and shed, said platform and shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York on the expiration or sooner termination of said lease.

The lease to contain the usual clause included in leases now used by this Department providing that the Department may cancel the lease of the premises or the portion thereof necessary to complete the work of improvement under the "new plan," or at the option of the Commissioner of Docks to suspend the lease of the premises or portion thereof required to complete the work of such improvement for such time as the Department may require to complete such work of improvement.

The lease also to provide that the lease may, at the option of the Commissioner of Docks, be cancelled, in case the ferry from the foot of Wall street be abandoned, or in case the bulkhead between Piers (new) 12 and 13, East river, be used for other than ferry purposes.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in form of leases now used by this Department.

HON. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bensel, Commissioner of Docks, in a communication under date of July 16, 1906, requests the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to a lease to the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company of the following-described property, viz.:

"Beginning at a point which is the intersection of the westerly side line of Pier 13, East river, and the bulkhead wall along the southerly side of the marginal street, wharf or place adjacent to South street; running thence southerly along the westerly side of Pier 13, 201 feet and 6 inches; thence westerly and at right angles to said line of Pier 13, 22 feet; thence northwesterly about 152 feet and 6 inches to a point which is 51 feet and 6 inches south of the bulkhead wall and 47 feet 3 inches west of the westerly side of Pier 13; thence still northwesterly about 52 feet to the bulkhead wall aforesaid; thence easterly and along the bulkhead wall 52 feet and 6 inches to the point or place of beginning."

—and in relation thereto I would report:

The attached outline drawing of the locality in question shows it to be an entirely confined space lying between Pier (new) 13 (now under construction), Wall street ferryhouse and rack, and the bulkhead line of marginal street.

The area of the space is approximately 7,762 square feet, at a rental of \$3,900 per year, as provided by the proposed lease, equals about 50 cents per square foot per year.

Piers (new) 13 and 14 are now under a lease to the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company, authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 13, 1905, for a term of ten (10) years; and, as is evident from the diagram, the space considered in the communication of the Commissioner of Docks could not be of use to any other than this steamship company, I consider the proposed lease satisfactory.


I also consider the proposed terms of the lease just and reasonable.

The following was received from the Board of Education relative to a lease of premises on the northwest corner of Sixty-seventh street and Eighteenth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that it has received a recommendation from the Board of Superintendents that the building on Eighteenth avenue and Sixty-seventh street, Borough of Brooklyn, be rented for the purpose of relieving Public School 112.

The Superintendent of School Buildings reported that it will be possible to relieve this school building, which is overcrowded, by hiring the building above referred to, which was formerly occupied and known as old Public School 112.

The owner of these premises has agreed to execute a lease of the same for a period of two years, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$1,500, and to make all such repairs as may be needed to put the building in good tenable condition.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease of the premises on the northwest corner of Sixty-seventh street and Eighteenth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, formerly occupied as Public School 112, for a period of two years from September 1, 1906, or from date of occupation thereof, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$1,500; the owner, Mrs. Margaret V. McNulty, No. 201 Montague street, Brooklyn, to repair and kalsomine plaster; to replace missing hardware on doors; to paint exterior sash, window frames and doors; to replace defective portions of stoops, making same good; to rebuild cellar bulkhead; to replace cellar doors; to repair roof, making same tight; to repair gutters and leaders; to overhaul plumbing and steam plant, making same in good condition; and from time to time, and at all times hereafter during the period of said lease at her own cost to well and sufficiently keep in good tenable repair and condition, the said premises and every part and parcel thereof, and the appurtenances thereto belonging and appertaining; all of the foregoing to be subject to the approval of the Departments of Health and Buildings as to suitability for school purposes.

SIR—The Board of Education, at its meeting held June 27, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

“Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease of the premises on the northwest corner of Sixty-seventh street and Eighteenth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, formerly occupied as Public School 112, for a period of two years from September 1, 1906, or from date of occupation thereof, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$1,500; the owner, Mrs. Margaret V. McNulty, No. 201 Montague street, Brooklyn, to repair and kalsomine plaster; to replace missing hardware on doors; to paint exterior sash, window frames and doors; to replace defective portions of stoops, making same good; to rebuild cellar bulkhead; to replace cellar doors; to repair roof, making same tight; to repair gutters and leaders; to overhaul plumbing and steam plant, making same in good condition, and from time to time, and at all times hereafter during the period of said lease, at her own cost, to well and sufficiently keep in good tenable repair and condition the said premises and every part and parcel thereof, and the appurtenances thereto belonging and appertaining; all of the foregoing to be subject to the approval of the Departments of Health and Buildings as to suitability for school purposes.”

The Bureau of Buildings and the Department of Health have certified that the condition of the building is suitable for school purposes. The Superintendent of School Buildings reports that it will be possible to relieve Public School 112, which is overcrowded, by hiring the building in question, which was formerly occupied and known as old Public School 112. The rental formerly paid of \$1,500 is the same as now asked by the owner, and in my opinion is reasonable. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the premises on the northwest corner of Sixty-seventh street and Eighteenth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of two years from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$1,500, payable quarterly, the lessor to repair and kalsomine plaster, replace missing hardware on doors, paint exterior sash, window frames and doors; replace defective portions of stoops, making same good; rebuild cellar bulkhead, replace cellar doors, repair roof, making same tight; repair gutters and leaders, overhaul plumbing and steam plant, making same in good condition, and from time to time, and at all times hereafter during the period of said lease, at her own cost, to well and sufficiently keep in good tenable repair and condition the said premises and every part and parcel thereof, and the appurtenances thereto belonging and appertaining. Lessor, Mrs. Margaret V. McNulty.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease to the City from Mrs. Margaret V. McNulty, of premises on the northwest corner of Sixty-seventh street and Eighteenth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of two years from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$1,500, payable quarterly, the lessor to repair and kalsomine plaster, replace missing hardware on doors, paint exterior sash, window frames and doors; replace defective portions of stoops, making same good; rebuild cellar bulkhead, replace cellar doors, repair roof, making same tight; repair gutters and leaders, overhaul plumbing and steam plant, making same in good condition, and from time to time, and at all times hereafter during the period of said lease, at her own cost, to well and sufficiently keep in good tenable repair and condition the said premises and every part and parcel thereof, and the appurtenances thereto belonging and appertaining, —the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the payment of water bill for premises Nos. 407 to 419 East Thirteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied by the Board of Education:

July 30, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education has transmitted to this office a voucher in the amount of \$382.10 to the order of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for water rent of premises Nos. 407 to 414 East Fourteenth street, and Nos. 407 to 419 East Thirteenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a period from October 2, 1905, to March 22, 1906.

Part of this property is occupied by the City as a public school, for which the City pays no rent. A similar question arose last year as to the payment of water rent for the years 1902 to 1904, and it was recommended that a proportionate amount of the water rent be paid, in view of the fact that the average attendance in the building since 1902 has been about 160 daily, and it seems only fair that, inasmuch as the City pays no rent for the building, the owner should receive some equitable adjustment for the payment of the water bills while the City has been in occupation of the premises. The matter was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held May 16, 1906, in relation to the water bill against the premises in question for a period from December 20, 1904, to October 2, 1905, when the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized the payment of the bill in question, to wit, \$370.20.

The present bill is for a period from October 2, 1905, to March 22, 1906, the amount of which is \$382.10. I would respectfully recommend that the same procedure be adopted in the present matter and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to pay to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity the sum of \$382.10, being the amount of water bill for premises Nos. 407 to 419 East Thirteenth street and Nos. 407 to 414 East Fourteenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a period from October 2, 1905, to March 22, 1906, upon a voucher prepared by the Board of Education.

SIR—I request the consent and approval of your Board, pursuant to section 541 of the Charter, for a lease from E. M. Culp (residing at Seventeenth street and Eighteenth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn) of the lot, piece or parcel of land, in the Borough of Brooklyn, situated on the north side of Ovington avenue, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth avenues, 357 feet west of Eighteenth avenue, being 140 feet front on Ovington avenue and 140 feet at the rear, 142 feet on the east side and 147 feet on the west side, together with the frame stable thereon, for a period of five (5) years from the date of occupancy, at the annual rental of \$800, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay all taxes and assessments and the City to pay for the water used by it during the term of the lease.

The owner gives his assurance that there is no restriction against stables or the like upon any of the property within 200 feet.

SIR—Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication under date of May 15, 1906, requests the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 541 of the Amended Greater

New York Charter, for a lease of the premises located in the Borough of Brooklyn, situated on the northerly side of Ovington avenue, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth avenues, 357 feet west of Eighteenth avenue, being 140 feet front on Ovington avenue with a depth on the easterly side of 142 feet and a depth on the westerly side of 147 feet, together with the frame stable thereon erected, for a period of five years from the date of occupation at an annual rental of \$800, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay all taxes and assessments and the City to pay for the water used by it during the term of the lease.

The needs of the Department require that a stable shall be located midway between the present Department stable on Fourth avenue and another Department stable on Neptune avenue, at Coney Island creek. The Commissioner further states that the frame stable erected on the premises will accommodate seventy horses, and this stable faces a macadamized road and is on a block where there are other stables, being also opposite the City corporation yard, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

An examination shows that the rent asked is excessive. The owner has agreed to accept the sum of \$600 as an annual rent for the first three years of the lease and \$700 annually for the remaining two years. This price is, in my opinion, reasonable, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of the premises on the northerly side of Ovington avenue, 357 feet west of Eighteenth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, being 140 feet by 142 feet by 140 feet by 147 feet, for a period of five years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental for the first three years of \$600 and at an annual rental for the remaining two years of \$700, the lessor to pay all taxes and assessments; the City to pay only for the water used by it during the term of the lease. SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at their meeting held July 18, 1906, adopted a resolution assigning the southerly room on the top floor of the County Building at Jamaica, Borough of Queens, as the place for the holding of the Court of Special Sessions. Honorable John Fleming, Justice of the Court of Special Sessions, requests that the resolution be amended in order that the assignment of the room may be for the use of the Justice of the Court of Special Sessions residing in the Borough of Queens, instead of as a place for the holding of the Court of Special Sessions, as it is the intention to use the room only as a Judge's chamber, and the designation may interfere with the present place for holding court, which is entirely adequate.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend their resolution of July 18, 1906, by inserting the clause at the end of the resolution, "for the use of the Justice of the Court of Special Sessions residing in the Borough of Queens," instead of "as a place for the holding of the Court of Special Sessions."

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held October 18, 1905, authorized the Comptroller to have a survey made and an examination of the title to a plot of ground belonging to The City of New York on Salt Meadow, Staten Island Sound, north of Linoleumville, Borough of Richmond. An examination of the title was duly ordered from the United States Title Guarantee and Indemnity Company, and an examination of the title disclosed that the property had been in undisputed possession of School District No. 2, New Springville, S. I., since the death of Mathias Simonson, who conveyed the property in 1864. There appeared, however, to be a cloud upon the title, and in order to clear up the same, negotiations were entered into with Edward Scott Hand to obtain a quit-claim deed of the property. In a communication under date of July 16, 1906, he has offered to convey whatever interest he has in the property for the sum of \$50, together with \$1.50 for the expenses involved in the execution of the papers.

In view of the fact that the City will have a valuable piece of property after the Title Company insures the title to the City, and as it is absolutely necessary to obtain the quit-claim deed in question, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to pay the sum of \$51.50 to Edward Scott Hand, in order to clear the cloud from the title to property in question, said amount to be paid from the appropriation entitled, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Expenses of.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a sale at public auction of the interest of the City in certain property at Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, which it has by virtue of a lease from the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend to the City of Brooklyn (petition of Patrick Mulrenan):

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Mr. Patrick Mulrenan in a verified petition under date of May 10, 1906, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests a release of certain property, sold by the Supervisor of the former Town of Gravesend, now the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, for an unpaid assessment for the grading and paving of Neptune avenue. The property is known as and by the number 66 on the assessment map for the grading and paving of Neptune avenue. After due notice the interest of the former Town of Gravesend in said unpaid assessment was offered for sale at the Town Hall in Gravesend on August 9, 1894, the premises sold being owned by the petitioner and described in the petition, which is made part of this report; that upon said sale, no person bidding, the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend bid in said premises for the use and benefit of the Town of Gravesend for the term of one hundred years. That thereafter the said premises and the interest in the Town of Gravesend therein were conveyed by William V. B. Bennett, Supervisor of the Thirty-first Ward of the City of Brooklyn, later the Town of Gravesend, County of Kings, State of New York, to the City of Brooklyn by a certain indenture of lease bearing date December 24, 1896. The property in question is described on a map of 373 lots on Ocean Parkway, Coney Island, to be sold at auction on June 25, 1878, Jere Johnson, Jr., auctioneer, and filed in the office of the Register of the County of Kings as and by the Nos. 85, 86, 88 and the northerly half of Lot No. 87, situated on the easterly side of West Third street, 101 feet 7 inches north of Neptune avenue, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, having a frontage of 30 feet on West Third street, with a depth of 100 feet. The deed in question delivered contained a recital of the facts above set forth in reference to the sale of said premises, conveying said premises for a term of one hundred years.

It was provided in the original resolution of the Board of Supervisors that:

"If no person bid for any such parcel (at a sale held for such assessment) the Supervisors shall bid in the same for a term of not less than one hundred years, in the name and for the benefit of the town, and if not redeemed within two years thereafter he shall, as such Supervisor, execute such lease or conveyance to the town as the purchaser, and file the same in the office of the Register of Kings County; if not redeemed within two years thereafter, he may dispose of the same for the sum due, together with interest at 6 per cent. per annum from the time of sale."

The matter of the interest which The City of New York has by virtue of leases for the term of 100 years from the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend, whose title was derived from sales for unpaid assessments for certain public improvements, has been the subject of consideration by the Corporation Counsel in previous similar applications, and in an opinion, bearing date of June 28, 1900 (see Minutes, Sinking Fund, July 24, 1900, in re application of Marcus B. Campbell), he quotes section 16 of the act of the Supervisor of the County of Kings, passed June 13, 1892, as bearing upon the time when such property could be redeemed from such sales (which was two years thereafter), and decides that such time is past, and further states:

"The property under consideration became the property of the City of Brooklyn on the annexation of the Town of Gravesend to the City. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Kings was abolished by chapter 954 of the Laws of 1895. The body having authority in the City of Brooklyn to dispose of this class of property was the Common Council, that being the legislative body of the City, and no such power being vested in any other of the officers or departments thereof."

"By section 205 of the Charter of the Greater City, the power to sell the real estate of The City of New York is vested in the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. This section provides that the Board must sell City property at public auction for the highest marketable price, after due advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Board."

In accordance with this advice, it became necessary, in this instance, for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to appraise the City's interest in and to this lease for one hundred years. It is my opinion, however, that should the City receive the sums paid out by the former Town of Gravesend, with interest on the same to date, together with a sum sufficient to pay for the expenses which have been incurred on account of this unpaid assessment, such as the advertisement of sale, expenses of sale, drawing and recording of the deed and the further expense now incurred by the sale of this property, that the interest of The City of New York will be fully protected without hardship upon the property owner. This course has been pursued and adopted in all previous cases that have been acted upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a sale at public auction of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to property which it has by virtue of a lease from the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend to the City of Brooklyn, which lease is dated December 24, 1896, and recorded in the Kings County Register's office December 29, 1896, in Section 21, Liber 3, of Conveyances, page 146, the said property being situated at Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of West Third street, distant 101 feet 7 inches northerly from the northeasterly corner of Neptune avenue and West Third street; thence easterly and parallel with Neptune avenue 100 feet; thence northerly and parallel with West Third street 30 feet; thence westerly and again parallel with Neptune avenue 100 feet to the easterly side of West Third street; thence southerly along the easterly side of West Third street 30 feet to the point or place of beginning, and is known as and by the number 66 upon the assessment roll for the grading and paving of Neptune avenue in the late Town of Gravesend, which was sold to the Town of Gravesend at the sale for unpaid assessments, held August 9, 1894, for the sum of \$70.02, and which property was thereafter leased to the City of Brooklyn for a term of one hundred years, that the interest of The City of New York in and to the same be appraised at the sum of \$120.42, the purchaser to pay the auctioneer's fees and \$100 for the expense of examination, advertising, etc.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the property now being acquired by the City for park purposes, in the block bounded by Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, Borough of Manhattan:

July 17, 1906.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—A meeting was held at the Mayor's office on Monday, July 16, 1906, at 2:30 p. m., at which meeting was present the Commissioner of the Tenement House Department, the Commissioner of the Department of Parks, Mr. Bruere of the Citizens' Union and myself, the meeting being called for the purpose of devising some means whereby the conditions now existing in property owned by the City, especially in Chelsea Park, can be remedied. These conditions were the continued violations of the orders of the Tenement House Department and of the Board of Health, for which no remedy can be found under the present Charter, and after discussion it was finally left to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of the method which was suggested for the purpose of remedying the evil. That suggestion is that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall authorize the Comptroller, whenever a parcel of land on which there is a building erected, the same having been ordered vacated of its tenants by the Tenement House Department or the Bureau of Buildings (pending the time the houses are to be removed and sold at public auction, in accordance with the provisions of section 1553 of the Revised Charter) to employ a caretaker of such premises, and that the expenses of the employment of such caretaker be paid for out of the proceeds of the sale of the buildings. I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt the following resolution:

Whereas, The City is acquiring property in the block bounded by Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, for park purposes; and

Whereas, The City is the owner in fee of not quite one-half of the above described property; and

Whereas, The title to the remaining parcels of the above described property is not as yet vested in the City; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of the Department of Parks has stated that he cannot take over the property owned by the City for park purposes for the reason that he has no money to improve the same; and

Whereas, The Tenement House Department and the Building Department have filed violations against the property owned by The City of New York, and has ordered the tenants therein to remove therefrom, which will leave the premises vacant and liable to damage by marauders; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized and directed to take the necessary means to protect the interests of the City in the said vacated premises, and any cost and expenses which may be incurred by reason of such protection shall be paid for out of the proceeds from the sale of the buildings within the area above described, and the balance remaining after said sale shall be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of section 1553 of the Amended Greater New York Charter.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized and directed to take the necessary means to protect the interests of the City in the said vacated premises, and any cost and expenses which may be incurred by reason of such protection shall be paid for out of the proceeds from the sale of the buildings within the area above described, and the balance remaining after said sale shall be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of section 1553 of the amended Greater New York Charter.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$27,000 for furniture and furnishings in Squadron "C" armory in the Borough of Brooklyn:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held July 30, 1906, the following was adopted:

"Resolved, That an appropriation of \$27,000 be and is hereby made for furniture and furnishings in the armory of Squadron 'C' in the Borough of Brooklyn (including architect's fees); that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds to provide payment therefor, and that the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids or proposals for same."

This matter was reported upon by this Bureau under date of July 14, 1906, and it was recommended that the request under consideration at that time for \$32,871.50 for this furniture be returned to the Armory Board by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, with the recommendation that the specifications be modified so as to bring the cost within \$27,000.

At meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held July 18, 1906, this report was adopted, and the matter returned to the Armory Board.

Since the amount requested in this resolution, \$27,000, was the amount recommended in the report of this Bureau, I see no reason for modifying it at this time, and I therefore recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund concur in the resolution, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of \$27,000 for furniture and furnishings in the armory of Squadron "C" in the Borough of Brooklyn.

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting held in the Mayor's office on July 17 for the purpose of considering the treatment of tenement houses owned by The City of New York, and their condition, it was shown that something should be done to ameliorate those conditions.

At this meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund there will be presented a statement requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize me to protect the interests of the City, where the Tenement House Commissioner has ordered the tenants to remove from these tenement houses.

On Friday I visited the park site in the Chelsea District, and in three of the houses I found the conditions so bad that I am under the impression the buildings can be removed and fences constructed, thus doing away with part of the trouble. Premises No. 442, 444 and 446 West Twenty-eighth street, together with the three rear tenements, are constructed in such a manner that they can, I am informed, be removed without interfering with the party walls.

The resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund which authorized the sale of buildings at public auction, in accordance with section 1553 of the amended Greater New York Charter, required that the heads of departments for which the property was acquired to give at least sixty days notice to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund before the property would be turned over. In this instance, the Commissioner of the Department of Parks refused to ask for the property to be turned over to him, for the reason that he has no money to improve the same and does not want to assume any responsibility, and the course he pursues, from his standpoint, is undoubtedly correct. However, the houses are vacant, no revenue can be derived therefrom, while the City may obtain some money from the sale of the old buildings before they are completely gutted. I would therefore request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize me to sell at public auction the premises known by the numbers 442, 444 and 446 West Twenty-eighth street, in the Borough of Manhattan. The advertisement to be so worded that the contractors removing the buildings shall construct a fence along the street in front of the buildings in such manner that no accident can possibly happen to passers-by.

The other report submitted at this meeting is a general proposition on all City property.

Whereas, By the provisions of section 434 of the Greater New York Charter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may approve or reject the resolution of the Local Board opening any street or avenue; and therefore be it

Whereas, The premises west side of Columbia avenue, north of railroad crossing, Maspeth, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the saturated wooden flooring of the milk house, cow and horse stalls and stable and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected and that the entire stable and milk house floor be cemented or asphalted and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a properly trapped cesspool-connected valley drain; that each stall be provided with a movable wooden rack; that no more than one cow for each 600 cubic feet of air space be kept in the stable, and that the cows be turned out to pasture during the entire day, or else the air space in the stable allowed each cow be not less than 800 cubic feet; that additional windows and a suitable roof ventilator be provided in the stable; that the walls and ceilings of the stable and milk house be scraped, disinfected and sheathed with matched boards, and that said boards be painted; that a watertight manure box with a tight-fitting cover be constructed (at least three feet from the stable) sufficiently large to hold the accumulation of manure for not more than forty-eight hours, and that all manure be removed from the premises daily and deposited at a point at least 300 feet from the stable or any inhabited dwelling; that an adequate means of washing and sterilizing the milk cans, milk pails, milk bottles and other utensils be provided; that the cows be cleaned daily; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly clean before milking; that the men be clothed in white overalls and jumper while milking; that the ground about the stable and milk house be cleaned of all manure and rubbish, disinfected and kept clean at all times; that a milk house be constructed according to the regulations of this Department.

Whereas, The premises west side of Bowery Bay road, 125 feet north of Vandeventer avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the saturated flooring of the cow stalls and stable be removed, the space beneath the flooring be cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the entire floors of the stable be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all water and liquid matter into a properly trapped, sewer-connected valley drain; that each stall be provided with a movable rack; that no more than one cow for each 600 cubic feet of air space be kept in the stable, and that the cows be turned out to pasture during the entire day, or else the air space in the stable allowed each cow be not less than 800 cubic feet; that additional windows and a suitable roof ventilator be provided in the stable; that the ceiling of the stable be scraped, disinfected and sheathed with matched boards, and that said boards be painted; that the cows be cleaned daily; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly clean before milking; that the milkmen be clothed in white overalls and jumper while milking.


