Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made of the premises, and in accordance with the conditions four submits the following facts with recommendations:

Premises affected, (1) Albany, 13-15-17-19 Greene st.; appellant, Pure Baking Powder Co. 3—Additional exit, 5-story, non-fireproof; open lofts; used for mfr. baking powder; no sprinklers; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; occupancy above the 2d floor, 1 to 3. Exits: An interior unenclosed stairway at rear from 2d to 5th floors; at 2d floor this sty. connects with counterbalanced stairway, 20-inch, leading from f. e. balcony 2d floor to ground; an interior unenclosed stairway from 1st to 3rd floors at front of building; at rear of building connecting all floors is straight ladder fire escape; occupancy on 4th floor, 1 man; 5th floor used for storage.

Be it resolved that the Commission grant the variations set forth above with the understanding that said variations be effective during the time that the conditions remain as of this date.

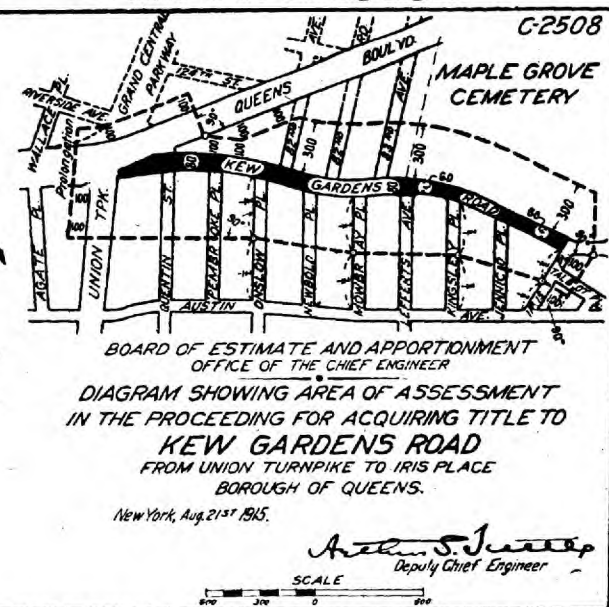

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may be at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon.

The breach of either of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale.

The placing thereof or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety, or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits therefrom.
