

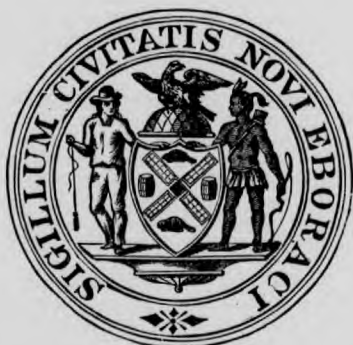

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending January 10, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending January 3, 1885.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register.

SIR—There were 677 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 10, 1885, which is a decrease of 32, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 80 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884.
