The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment. Present—Commissioners Daniel Lord, Jr. (Chairman), Allan Campbell, Joseph Garry, and John W. Marshall.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of February 25 and 26, 1886, showing the publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meetings held on February 12, 16, 19 and 23, 1886, were read and approved.

Calendar.

No. 1319. Matter of Mary G. Pinkney—Assessment for Manhattan street regulating, grading, etc., from Twelfth avenue to St. Nicholas avenue; confirmed May 17, 1876.

James A. Deering, Esq., of counsel for the petitioner, presented additional evidence and rested his case. The further hearing of the case was adjourned.

No. 1999. Matter of Isaac T. Smith, executor, etc.—Assessment for St. Nicholas avenue regulating, grading, and superstructure, from One Hundred and Tenth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; confirmed February 3, 1876.

On motion of James A. Deering, Esq., counsel for the petitioners, the Counsel representing the City in opposition, the petition in this case was amended by including lots owned by the petitioners, known as Ward Nos. 18 to 22, and 47½, in Block No. 944.

From Edward M. Parker—Requesting permission to erect two derricks on the bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, North river, for the purpose of discharging coal. Referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

From Captain C. W. Davis—Requesting berth for steamer "City of Long Branch," on south side of Pier, old 23, North river. Referred to Dock Master George W. Wanmaker to examine and report.

From North and East River Steamboat Company—For permission to locate a tally-house on Pier 41, East river. Referred to Dock Master Edward Abel to examine and report.

From F. E. Perkins & Brother—Requesting permission to locate a five-inch cast-iron pipe through bulkhead from premises No. 405 South street, between Corlears and Jackson streets, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Counsel to the Corporation—Requesting to be furnished with the date when new Pier at Thirty-sixth street, North river, was shedded. The action of the President in advising the Counsel to the Corporation that the said pier is not shedded, and that no application has been made by the lessees, the New York, Ontario and Western Railway Company and the New York, West Shore and Buffalo Railway Company, for permission to erect shed thereon was approved.

From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessees West Shore and Ontario Terminal Company and West Shore Railroad—Requesting permission to repair bulkhead, ferry bridges, etc., at ferry premises, Forty-second street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Behrend & Triest—Requesting the Department to test a barrel of Portland cement and inclosing \$10 to pay the cost of same. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to test the said cement approved.

From Civil Supervisory and Examining Boards:

1. Reporting that John Stevenson was eligible for promotion from "Laborer" to Temporary Clerk, having received a rating of eighty-five and ten hundredths per cent.

2. Desiring to be informed if the boats of the Department are obliged to go below the "Narrows." The action of the President in replying thereto approved.

From Wm. Van Alst—Requesting permission to anchor a boat-house at foot of East One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Seventh avenue. Application denied.

From New Haven Steamboat Company, lessees—Reporting that the bulkhead north of Pier 26, East river, is obstructed by canal-boats, which prevents their steamers from occupying berth at said pier. The Dock Superintendent to be directed to examine and report, and remove canal-boats if necessary.

From Nineteenth Ward Bank—Desiring a portion of the deposits of the Department.

From Moody & Bracken—Requesting that the time for the completion of gas fitting on Pier A, North river, under Contract No. 227, be extended until February 27, 1886. On motion of the President the time was extended as requested.

From W. H. Brownson, United States Coast Survey—Requesting copy of the Rules and Regulations adopted by the Department. The President authorized to send copy of Rules, as requested.

From O. P. Raynor and others—In reference to and protesting against the float located and made fast to step of the Third Avenue Bridge, Harlem river. The action of the President in directing the Dock Superintendent to examine and report was approved.

From Joseph L. Liscomb, Dock Superintendent—Reporting that he had investigated the complaint of Orson P. Raynor and others respecting the float moored at Third Avenue Bridge, Harlem river, and finds the complaint true in every particular, and recommending that the said float be removed, and that the water in front of said bridge be kept free and clear of any and all obstructions hereafter.

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted, and the President authorized to notify the owner or owners of said float to remove same forthwith, and the President was also authorized to notify the Dock Superintendent and Dock Master John Callan of the action of the Board.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master—In reference to the application of C. McMonagle, for permission to erect and maintain a tally-house and scales on approach to Pier, old 42, North river, and reporting that the same would not interfere with traffic to and from said pier.

On motion, the report was received, the communications ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to notify Mr. McMonagle that his application has been granted, to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board, and located thereat under the supervision of the Dock Master.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending February 20, 1886.

3d. Reporting that the gas-fitting work under Class 2 of Contract 227, on Pier A, North river, was completed on the 18th instant, four days after the time for the completion thereof.

The action of the President in replying to the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, in reference to purchase of bulkhead and wharf property, from Nos. 40 to 55 South street, and interest in Piers 12, 13, and 14, East river, was approved.

The President, to whom was referred the claim of John Hannon, for \$134.42 for damage to truck on Pier at Fifteenth street North river, reported that he had investigated the facts in connection with said accident, and in the event of a trial the same would be detrimental to the interests of the City and recommended that the offer of Mr. Williams, attorney for John Hannon, to settle the same for \$104.42, including costs and interest, be accepted and the Comptroller notified of the action of the Board.

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted.

The pay-rolls for the month of February, 1886, amounting to \$7,935.84, were approved and audited, and the President authorized to forward them, together with proper requisitions for the amounts, to the Finance Department for payment.

The President, to whom was referred the application of Henderson Brothers, agents "Anchor Line," requesting permission to berth the steamer "City of Rome" at Pier, new 43, North river, reported thereon, and offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given, at and during the pleasure of the Board governing this Department, to Henderson Brothers to use the south side of Pier, new 43, North river, for the purpose of landing the steamship "City of Rome" at said pier upon the arrival of said steamship from regular trips in each month during the year 1886, and that said Henderson Brothers agree to pay for each and every day that said pier shall be reserved for and used by said steamer the sum of \$62.50, and that at least ten days' notice of the time as to when the said pier shall be used by said steamer shall be given to this Department; provided that said Henderson Brothers shall, within five days after a receipt of a copy of this resolution, signify their assent thereto in writing.

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty-four days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 98,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit. The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them that unless it is stopped the pressure in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.
