BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Electrical Control, held at the office of the Mayor, in the City of New York, on Wednesday, January 25, 1893, at 12 o'clock M.
Present—Mayor Thomas F. Gilroy, President; Commissioners Jacob Hess, Theodore Moss and Walton Storm.
His Honor the Mayor, on motion of Commissioner Hess, seconded by Commissioner Moss, was duly elected President of the Board.
The minutes of December 16, 1892, were read and approved.
Mayor Gilroy directed the reading of the report of the Engineer of the Board, as follows:

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Board of Electrical Control:
GENTLEMEN—In reply to a letter under date of January 6, addressed by the Secretary of the Board to the various electrical companies operating in the City of New York, requesting them to make known their wants of subway construction in the city, to be built in the coming season, replies have been received from the
Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company.
Mount Morris Electric Light Company.
Edison Electric Illuminating Company of New York.

Manhattan Electric-light Company (Limited).
Harlem Lighting Company.
Empire City Subway Company (Limited).
United States Illuminating Company.
Brush Electric Illuminating Company.
The original letters are herewith submitted.

I would respectfully recommend that the Board authorize the construction of the various subways asked for, as it will facilitate the removal of lines of poles and wires in different parts of the city.

Heretofore it has been the custom of the Board to designate a certain portion of the city as a district, by number, and notify all the companies owning poles and wires in that district to make known their requirements for underground facilities in the subway, as the Board on a certain designated day would remove all the overhead poles and wires in that named district.

I would recommend that the Board designate a district from Fifty-ninth street, south, on either the east or west side of the city, and pass such resolution as they see fit in the matter; said district to be known as the Fourth Proscribed District.

The various applications for subway construction submitted herewith have been received by me so recently that I have not had time to investigate whether any of them are in streets that have been lately repaved, and so respectfully call the attention of the Board to the fact, so that it can make such restrictions as it may see fit in the matter, and at the same time I would suggest that the work be authorized, and, if possible, the location of the subway be made under the sidewalk where it is not found desirable to open the new pavement.

DEAR SIR—In response to your favor, handed me on January 12, I beg to say that it is the intention of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company this year to confine its underground development chiefly to those streets in which the Commissioner of Public Works intends to repave, and to those streets in which the immediate demands of the public require mains, in addition to which we intend to replace our two-wire mains—of which but 2.10 miles of the original 10.61 miles remain—with three-wire tubing, and to make some improvements in our feeder system.

As soon as the Board grants our application for mains as far north on Fifth avenue as Seventy-ninth street and the streets are open for construction work, we shall be prepared to furnish electric-lighting on the east side of Fifth avenue to Seventy-ninth street, should the city authorities desire. We inclose copy of our letter to the Subway Company, making the applications in due form.

Mayor Gilroy offered the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:
 Resolved, That all these applications be granted, subject, however, to the provisions of chapter 263 of the Laws of 1892, in which it says that the Board shall require any corporation or individual making such application for the construction of subways, before such construction of subways shall be entered upon, to furnish the corporation which shall be ordered to build such subways satisfactory security for the occupation by it of the subways which shall be constructed as requested and the payment of the established rentals therefor, subject, moreover, to the rule that no newly-paved street shall be disturbed after the pavement is laid.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to furnish to every one of the applicant corporations a copy of this resolution.

Mayor Gilroy—With reference to the selection of the district for the purpose of clearing away the poles and wires, I notice by the report of the Engineer that he recommends a district to be created south of Fifty-ninth street, either on the west or east side. I hardly think we have sufficient information before us to enable us to determine on which side that district shall be located, and I suggest the matter be referred back to the Engineer, with instructions to report which spot he thinks for the best interests of the public should be selected.

On motion of Commissioner Hess, it was so ordered.

On motion of his Honor the Mayor, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to notify the Commissioner of Public Works of the action taken here to-day, designating the new subways which are to be built, so that he may notify all the electrical companies in New York that they must get in the streets ahead of the repaving.

The Electrical Expert submitted to the Board various applications of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company approved by him.

The Board (after hearing the Expert), on motion of his Honor the Mayor, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the applications of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company for overhead telephone connections, recommended by the Electrical Expert, be granted, wherever the extent required to be built does not exceed two hundred and fifty feet over the street or highway.

Resolved, That the applications of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company for construction a mile or more in length be referred to the Electrical Expert, with instructions to report specifically upon them at the next meeting.

Resolved, That the applications of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company for running cables short distances across one street be referred to the Electrical Expert, for report to the Board in writing.

The Board, after favorable verbal report of the Electrical Expert, granted the following applications:

An application of the North River Electric-light and Power Company, dated January 16, 1893, to run one circuit on existing poles on One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from Third avenue to Brook avenue, and make all necessary connections with station.

An application of the North River Electric-light and Power Company, dated January 17, 1893, to set two poles in front of station at One Hundred and Fortieth street and Rider avenue.

An application of the North River Electric-light and Power Company, dated January 19, 1893, to erect line of poles and run two circuits on same, on the east side of Vanderbilt avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to Kingsbridge road, for city lighting, and to make all necessary connections with station.

Mayor Gilroy—I move that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet on this day week (February 1) at 12 o'clock.

Motion adopted.

Mayor Gilroy—We will take up the application of the Thomson-Houston Electric Company of New York at the next meeting.

Whereupon the Board adjourned.

BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, February 3, 1893, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to the usual notice.

The roll was called, and all the members were present and answered to their names.

The minutes of the meeting of January 27, 1893, were read and approved.

The matter of the application for a public place on Twelfth avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, was then taken up for consideration by the Board.

Mr. James A. Deering, on behalf of the petitioners, spoke at length upon the matter.

Mr. Frank Loomis, on behalf of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and Mr. John C. Shaw, on behalf of many property-owners along the line of the land required, strongly opposed the application.

After a full and patient hearing of the matter, the Board declined to grant application, and the Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the application presented to this Board for a public place on Twelfth avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, be denied.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

The following report from the Commissioner of Public Works, relating to the opening of West One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Edgecombe and Amsterdam avenues, was presented and read:

Under chapter 185 of the Laws of 1885 your Board has power to take proceedings to open said street, and it is recommended that the prayer of the petitioners be granted.

As to regulating, grading, etc., the power is with the Common Council after the street is legally opened.

A petition from the Fox estate, to open Stebbins avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Boston avenue, was presented, and, on motion, was referred to the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, for report thereon.

On motion, the Board adjourned, subject to the call of the chair.

A GENERAL INVITATION IS HEREBY extended to architects to furnish competitive designs and plans for an armory building for the use of Troop A, of the National Guard of the State of New York.

The building to be erected on the ground 200 x 100 feet in the rear of the Eighth Regiment Armory, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and fronting on Madison avenue. Building to be lighted by electricity and gas. Heated by steam. Ample provisions made for drainage.

Plans to be submitted, to be drawn scale 1/8 inch equal to one foot with a perspective drawing, rendered in black and white.

The entire cost of building, as called for in these specifications, shall not exceed \$140,000.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
