#### No. 722.

Whereas, The members of the Municipal Assembly have been served with what purports to be a copy of a writ of mandamus, issued by Justice James Fitzgerald of the Supreme Court, July 21, 1899, commanding the Council and the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, by name, to forthwith assemble, and to authorize the Comptroller of The City of New York to issue Corporate Stock of said City, for the purpose of paying to one John Pierce the sum of thirty-four thousand two hundred and fifty-five dollars, and also with an order made by the Supreme Court on July 21, 1899, directing that the writ of mandamus issue, which last mentioned order recites a previous order granted July 12, 1899, requiring the members of the Municipal Assembly to show cause why such writ should not issue; and

Whereas, It appears that this writ commanding the members of the Legislative body of this City to vote, as the Court directs, on certain questions, which by the Charter are confided to their individual discretion, was issued without any notice to the individual members of the Municipal Assembly, without any opposition from the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, but apparently, by his consent; and

Whereas, With due respect to the Supreme Court of this State, this proceeding, directing the members of a Legislative body to vote in a particular manner, prescribed by the Court, upon a proposition involving the payment of public money which the people of this State have committed to the discretion of the Municipal Assembly, and for which the Councilmen and Aldermen are responsible to their constituents, without notice and without the knowledge of the Municipal Assembly, appears to be without precedent in the history of this City, and contrary to the spirit of the Constitution of the State, which provides for the separation of the Legislative, Judicial and Executive Departments of Government, and the exercise of such power by any Court or Judge tends to nullify the provisions of the City Charter and to abrogate the powers of the Municipal Assembly, of which the framers of the Charter say in their report to the Legislature:

"The Municipal Assembly, through its representatives, is the organ of the people in the various boroughs and in every part of the city. It is made its duty to see that the laws and ordinances of the city are faithfully observed by all departments and officers."

Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the writ of mandamus issued on July 21, 1899, commanding the members of the Municipal Assembly to vote for an issue of Corporate Stock of this City of New York, for the purpose of paying one John Pierce thirty-four thousand two hundred and fifty five dollars of the public money of this city, be referred to the Corporation Counsel, and that the said Corporation Counsel be directed to forthwith advise the Municipal Assembly and the members thereof whether, in his opinion, they are compelled to vote on the question of issuing the Corporate Stock of The City of New York for the purpose of paying Mr. Pierce, as directed by the Court, and without the exercise of their discretion as to whether such payment should be made or not, and whether an order of this description can be issued without notice to the members of this Municipal Assembly; and be it further

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be directed to forthwith report to the Municipal Assembly all the facts connected with the making of this extraordinary order, including all information in his possession as to the so-called claim of John Pierce, and all communications between said John Pierce, or his attorneys, and the Law Department of the city, and to report why the pendency of this proceeding to compel the payment of public money by this unusual method was not brought to the attention of the Municipal Assembly, and why the order for a writ directed to the members of the Municipal Assembly was consented to by the Corporation Counsel without notice of any kind to the Councilmen and Aldermen.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 194. Spitting upon the floors of public buildings, and of railroad cars and of ferry-boats is hereby forbidden, and officers in charge or control of all such buildings, cars and boats shall keep posted permanently, in each public building, and in each railroad car and in each ferry-boat a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors, and janitors of buildings, conductors of cars and employees upon ferry-boats shall call the attention of all violators of this ordinance to such notices.

And it shall be the duty of all persons or corporations manufacturing cigars or conducting the business of printing, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, in The City of New York, to provide, and they are hereby required to provide, proper receptacles for spitting, in proportion of one to every two persons employed by them, and that said receptacles be disinfected and cleaned at least once during each working day. That a copy of the second paragraph of this section be kept permanently posted in a conspicuous place in all cigar manufactories, and in printing offices where ten or more persons are employed.
