#### Carpenter's Report.

#### New Prison—

Repairs, October—Seven water closets, 4 wardrobes, 10 benches in chapel, 7 benches in kitchen, 24 windows, 6 with new sash cords, 4 locks on desks, carpenter's work bench, stand for glue pot in carpenter's shop, dumb waiter, 3 chairs, 4 doors, 1 book-rack and shelves, 2 boxes for engineers taps, partition and rack in carpenter shop, weather straps on Keepers' house in yard.

Repairs, November—Twenty-two windows, 11 with new sash cords, 2 closets in dining room, 4 doors, 4 tables, 4 shelves, 10 water closets, 12 benches in chapel, 9 chairs, 2 ladders, 2 horses for boiler room, 4 wardrobes, 1 bench in kitchen, freight elevator, 5 benches, 1 desk, dumb waiter, 1 signboard for front door, 1 ladder, 1 tool locker for Engineer.

Repairs, December—Two water closets, 1 storm door, 3 shelves in chapel, 4 chairs, 3 tables, 6 windows with sash cord, 2 doors, 1 ice box, 2 lockers, 4 benches, 1 lock, 1 strap on gate, 1 partition, 1 desk, 1 shelf on front gate, 1 shovel for kitchen, altar in Catholic chapel.

## Carpenters' Work.

At Second District Prison (by paid labor)—Putting in and hanging 119 pairs of window sashes throughout the prison; the same were made of 2-inch clear pine, glazed with double-thick American glass, hung with No. 8 sash cord; frames and sashes each received a coat of paint.

At Fourth District Prison (by unpaid labor)—Put on new roof on coal shed, put in 3 new windows in cells on first and second tier, 5 pounds finishing nails, 6 pieces of joist and 24 hemlock boards.

## Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison (by paid labor)—Repairing leak of Croton pipe in 10-day house; putting in 1 new grate and 1 set of rings and covers on Duparquet 6-foot range; putting in 1 bottom grate and 1 set of bricks on No. 8 Sam stove; putting in 10 lengths of 6-inch stovepipe on stove of Keeper's office.

At Third District Prison (by paid labor)—Put in new strainer in sink of kitchen, also clearing waste of trap; repairing closet in cell No. 16; repairing and clearing waste of trap, cell No. 1. Work done by staff—Construction of 75 feet of furnace pipe and put in same in place of old pipe; making new zinc stove fender for office stove. By paid labor—Changing lock on door of main gate and furnishing 6 new keys for same; repairing faucets in cells Nos. 4, 7, 21 and 22.

At Fourth District Prison (by paid labor)—Put on new piece of lead pipe and brass coupling on boiler, prison kitchen. By unpaid labor—Repairing and overhauling

stoves in hall of male prison, and putting in 16 lengths of 6-inch pipe, also put new  $\frac{5}{8}$ -inch brass faucet on sink in female prison; put on 2 new  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch brass faucets in cells on first tier.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Putting on new valve on toilet cistern; repairing faucet and clearing waste from basin, matron's room, material used, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch Jenkins globe valve; repairing steam pipes in basement, also repairing leaks of Croton pipe at wash trays, clearing waste of same, and put on new self-closing faucet in sink of 10-day house; material used to make repairs, 23 feet  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch extra heavy pipe, 1 2-inch by  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch extra heavy tee, 1  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch socket, 1 2-inch by 10-inch nipple, 2  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch brass unions, 9 pounds lead pipe, 4 pounds solder, 1 nickel-plated self-closing cock, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by  $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch brass bushings, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by 4-inch galvanized nipple, gasoline, 12  $\frac{1}{2}$  pounds putty, 3 days' labor plumber and helper; clearing waste pipes and repairing the floor of shower baths; material used, 5 feet of 2-inch extra heavy pipe, 2 feet extra heavy bends, 1 2-inch brass ferrule, 15 pounds caulking lead, 2 pounds oakum, charcoal and 2 pails Portland cement, 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  days' labor plumber and helper.

At Seventh District Prison (by paid labor)—Repairing steam pipes and radiators, packing all valves, clearing obstruction in waste pipe and toilets, repairing leaks of Croton pipes in laundry, and putting in new seats for toilet where necessary; material used, 6  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch steamfittings, 3 feet 1-inch pipe, 8 closet seats, 24 pounds putty, 3 pails Portland cement, 3 air valves, 28  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch brass bolts, 3  $3\frac{1}{8}$ -inch by  $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch brass bushings, 2 nickel-plated self-closing basin cocks, 6 coach candles, 2  $\frac{3}{4}$  days' labor plumber and helper.

## Miscellaneous Work.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Repairing Van No. 6, 2 plates and 4 rivets to pole, fastening clips, 2 new nuts and straightening step, setting 1 front tire, put in 4 new spokes, 2 felloes and 4 hub bolts. Repairing No. 2-92968 Remington typewriter.

## Mason Work.

At Third District Prison (by prison labor)—The yard on north side of prison, also the basement, received each a coat of whitewash. Materials used: One-half barrel finishing lime, 5 pounds ultramarine blue and 3 pounds calcimine glue.

## Painters' Work.

At Third District Prison (by prison labor)—Renovating and retouching the following parts of prison: Prison kitchen two coats of paint, 28 cells on female side of prison two coats of paint, dado painted two feet high painting railings, iron doors and wooden gate leading from street to prison two coats of paint each, given office ceiling one coat of oil the walls two coats of paint, woodwork and office furniture painted varnished and grained. Material used: 200 pounds white lead, 10 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds chrome green, 10 pounds venetian red, 10 pounds burnt umber and  $\frac{1}{2}$  gallon inside varnish.

At Fourth District Prison (by prison labor)—Painting male prison one coat of paint painting kitchen and hall one coat of paint. Material used: 200 pounds white lead, 5 gallons raw oil, 5 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds chrome green, 1 pound chrome yellow, 5 pounds burnt sienna, 5 pounds Indian red and 1 gallon liquid dryers.

At Fifth District Prison (by prison labor)—Painting female prison prison walls, iron railings, iron gates and windows, painting ten-day house, dining and reception rooms and toilet, painting and renovating office, varnishing woodwork and office furniture, painting kitchen and whitewashing corridor and breadroom. Material used: 400 pounds white lead, 20 gallons raw oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds burnt umber, 10 pounds lampblack, 10 pounds yellow ochre,  $\frac{1}{4}$  barrel finishing lime, 3 pounds ultramarine blue, 2 pounds calcimine glue and 5 pounds of Prussian blue.

At Seventh District Prison (by prison labor)—Painting and renovating interior of prison. Material used: 600 pounds white lead, 20 gallons turpentine, 20 gallons boiled oil and 20 pounds chrome green.

The prisons were cleaned of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, laundering, cleaning and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I herewith most respectfully submit the quarterly report for the months of October, November and December, as follows:

During the past three months the principal work, outside of routine duties, on which the prisoners have been engaged has been the making of a new road from the south dock to the principal points at the southern end of the island.

The contract has been completed on a bath tub and shower bath outfit and toilet room at the Branch Workhouse proper, Reformatory and Women's Prison. This has been a conspicuous improvement, which was much wanted, and conduces greatly to the cleanliness and comfort of the inmates.

Boilers Nos. 1 and 2 in the north boiler house have been thoroughly overhauled and placed in good working condition.

Three coal barges have been unloaded, and 75 tons of ice have been removed and stored. Two old buildings at the extreme north end of the Island have been torn down, and the materials (lumber, etc.) utilized for necessary repairs to different buildings.

The mechanics among the prisoners have been employed in plastering and painting work on the various buildings, while the laborers have been engaged in digging and storing vegetables, digging trenches, burying, etc., removing snow and general cleaning around buildings.

The Reformatory boys have carted stone to the stonebreaking shed, and assisted in loading and unloading freight.

The female prisoners have been principally employed in the cleaning of the various buildings, and those detailed to the Laundry have turned out 6,328 pieces, as specified among the annexed tables.

Appeal 9 of 1904—Alteration 9 of 1904, No. 715 Madison avenue, Manhattan, Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, architects and appellants.

"No. 1. This building must be treated as a hotel, and being over 35 feet high, must be fireproof throughout."

The provisions of the Building Code do not apply in this case.

That this building may be non-fireproof.

That as this building is to accommodate a store, doctors' and dentists' offices, a photograph gallery and possibly a few bachelors' apartments, and there will be no cooking of any kind done on the premises, and no cafe or public dining-room, this building does not come under the definition of a hotel (Building Code section 10), and is therefore not required to be fireproof throughout (Building Code section 105).

Mr. Arthur J. Horgan appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Mr. Neville reappeared before the Board, and submitted the following amendment, the changes indicated being marked on drawings:

January 19, 1904—It being further agreed that the cellar, ceiling and the ceiling of the first story will be covered with metal lath; and, also, that the half side of all hall partitions, as indicated with red ink on plans, will also be covered with metal lath. The appellants will personally superintend and guarantee that this work is done.

On motion, approved as amended.
