Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding one thousand dollars, to meet the expenses for the proper conduct of the ceremonies attendant upon the opening of the new Athletic and Parade Grounds in Pelham Bay Park, Borough of The Bronx, on Saturday, July 16, 1904.

### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Wednesday, August 3, 1904.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of August 2, 1904, were read and approved.

Weekly report of the Chief Engineer for the week ending July 28, 1904, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated July 28, 1904, regarding granting leave of absence to veterans on Memorial Day, was received and ordered filed and the attention of the Secretary and the Chief Engineer called thereto.

Communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated July 29, 1904, transmitting, with his approval as to form, executed contract with Culgin & Pace, for stone wall boundary fences in the New Croton Dam Division, was received and ordered filed and the Secretary directed to transmit copies of the contract to the Comptroller and the contractor.

Communication from Thomas N. Cuthbert, Esq., attorney for Mr. Augustus Van Cortlandt, dated July 28, 1904, regarding the constructing of a drain pipe in Van Cortlandt avenue, and alleging trespass on the lands of his client, was received and referred to the Chief Engineer, who presented a communication on the subject dated August 2, 1904, which, with the communication from Mr. Cuthbert, was referred to the Construction Committee.

Resignation of Harry S. Bunner, Rodman, dated July 30, 1904, was accepted, to take effect from that date.

Report No. 1025 of the Chief Engineer, dated August 1, 1904, recommending that John S. Spietaler be appointed Rodman, was received and ordered filed and the following resolution offered:

Gregory be and hereby are appointed Axemen, provisionally, with salary at the rate of \$60 per month, to take effect when assigned to duty, they having been certified as eligible for such appointment by the Municipal Civil Service Commission July 30, 1904.

Communication from the Chief Engineer, dated August 2, 1904, recommending that Alfred Douglass Flinn be appointed a General Inspector, was received and Commissioner Curtis verbally reported that he had seen the Mayor and the Comptroller, and stated to them that the State Civil Service Commission had approved the placing of two General Inspectors in the exempt class, and that the Chief Engineer desired their services as his confidential assistants, and that both the Mayor and Comptroller said that if they were present they would vote in favor of the appointment of two General Inspectors, providing the Chief Engineer made a report nominating them and urging their appointment and taking the entire responsibility in regard to the nominees.

The following resolution was then offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, contained in his communication dated August 2, 1904, Alfred Douglas Flinn be and hereby is appointed General Inspector, with salary at the rate of \$3,600 per annum, to take effect August 15, 1904, the position of General Inspector (2) having been placed in the exempt class by resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, adopted March 31, 1904, and approved by the Mayor on that date, and by the State Civil Service Commission on July 15, 1904.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Communication from the Chief Engineer, dated August 1, 1904, transmitting papers and reports regarding claim of Pneumatic Engineering Company, with release executed by the Company, was received and ordered filed, and the Secretary directed to transmit the voucher and release to the Comptroller.

Communication from the Chief Engineer, dated August 2, 1904, submitting further information regarding Report No. 1009, dated July 11, 1904, asking authority to prepare plans for bridge to provide access to the ground immediately below the New Croton Dam, was received and referred to the Construction Committee, and the Chief Engineer directed to furnish the Committee with a map showing the location.

Report No. 1029 of the Chief Engineer, dated August 2, 1904, transmitting communication from Coleman, Breuchard & Coleman, dated July 13, 1904, regarding the closing of the openings in the New Croton Dam before its completion, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Telegram from Thomas E. Finucane, Transitman, dated August 2, 1904, stating that he would be unable to attend before the Commissioners on that day, was received and the President directed to notify Mr. Finucane that he would be given an opportunity to make an explanation at a meeting of the Commissioners to be held on August 16, 1904.

Communication from the Chief Engineer, dated August 3, 1904, returning applications of Joseph Barrett and others for rights of way, with an identification of the parcels involved, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Communication from the Chief Engineer, dated August 2, 1904, recommending George C. Honness for appointment as General Inspector, was received and laid over.

On motion, the Chief Engineer was authorized to grant a leave of absence, without pay, to veterans in the employ of the Commissioners desiring to attend the National Encampment at Boston on August 15, 1904.

David McClure, Esq., counsel for Coleman, Breuchard & Coleman, contractors for the New Croton Dam, appeared before the Commissioners in the matter of the advertisement for bids to be received on August 16, 1904, for the building of a concrete-steel bridge across the spillway of the New Croton Dam, protested against the consideration of such bids, claiming that under the contract of his clients for the building of the dam the mason work on such bridge should be done by the contractors therefor. Mr. McClure was requested to formulate his claims in writing, and the President was directed to transmit same to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion in the premises.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
