The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the Stated Meeting of May 23, 1905. On motion of Alderman Richter, further reading was dispensed with, and the minutes were approved as printed.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 1838.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, May 31, 1905

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution passed by your Honorable Body May 16, 1905, entitled: "Resolution requesting the Comptroller to pay Frank Rinschler for work done for Department of Public Charities."

It appears that on September 10, 1903, the Department of Public Charities entered into a contract with Frank Rinschler for the construction of a dormitory at the New York City Farm Colony in the Borough of Richmond, for the sum of \$48,525. Subsequently certain additions and modifications of the original plans called for some additional labor and materials, and several contracts for the same in amounts less than \$1,000 each, were awarded to Mr. Rinschler, although these contracts in the aggregate

exceeded the sum of \$1,000. I am informed that the Comptroller, acting upon the advice of the Corporation Counsel, has refused to pay this claim amounting to \$2,665 on the ground that the several contracts, involving in the aggregate an amount more than \$1,000, were not let after competitive bidding in accordance with the law, although there is no question but that the work has been fully performed by Mr. Rinschler.

This resolution authorizes and requests the Comptroller to pay the said claim of Frank Rinschler in the amount of \$2,665. I know of no power in the Board of Aldermen to settle and adjust claims against the City. If Mr. Rinschler has a legal claim against the City he has his remedy in an action in the courts. If, on the other hand, the law has been violated, there is no way by which the Board of Aldermen can pass an enabling resolution so as to allow Mr. Rinschler to collect this claim.

Under section 419 of the Charter the Board of Aldermen could undoubtedly have authorized the making of these contracts without public letting, but that section is hardly broad enough, in my opinion, to allow the adoption of a resolution legalizing a claim for work done under contracts which were let in violation of its provisions.

My bid for the same was the sum of \$570. Subsequently, on August 26, 1904, I was ordered to proceed with the work by letter from the Department of Public Charities, a copy of which is hereto annexed.

While the work on the above contract was in progress competitive bids were also invited "to furnish all labor and material as per plans and specifications drawn by the architects for stone area wall with coping around the male dormitory at the New York City Farm Colony." My bid for the same was the sum of \$850. Subsequently, on December 16, 1903, I was ordered to proceed with the work by letter from the Department of Public Charities, a copy of which is hereto annexed.

The above work has been fully performed by me and I have as yet received no payment therefor. The said work was also duly passed upon and approved by the Inspectors of the Department of Finance. No part of the money due and owing me under the said orders has been paid and there is still due and owing the full amount of the three orders, to wit, the sum of \$2,665.

I beg respectfully to ask that the Board of Aldermen authorize the payment of the sum of \$2,665 on the above orders.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, an ordinance entitled:

"An ordinance to prohibit exhibitions of dentistry in The City of New York."

It is provided in section 2 of the proposed ordinance that for each and every violation of its provisions, "the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a minor offense and upon conviction thereof by any Magistrate, either upon confession or by competent testimony, shall be fined in the sum of ten dollars, or stand committed to the City Prison; such commitment, however, shall not exceed five days."

The term "minor offense" hardly seems to be the proper one to use in this connection. A violation of a City ordinance constitutes a misdemeanor, but it is not necessary that it should be characterized as such in the ordinance. The State alone has power to say what offenses shall be misdemeanors. It is sufficient in an ordinance of this nature to provide a suitable punishment for the violation of its provisions, leaving it to the law of the State to determine the degree of the offense.

Furthermore, I have serious doubt as to the validity of an ordinance of this kind. While the Board of Aldermen have the power to regulate the use of the streets for certain purposes, I question whether they have the right to discriminate against a particular trade or profession in this manner. If the exhibitions referred to in the proposed ordinance prove in any way offensive to the public decency or injurious to public health, they should without doubt be forbidden, but in that event the adoption of this ordinance is unnecessary, for in my opinion the municipal authorities have already ample power under the existing laws to suppress nuisances of that character.

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit exhibitions of dentistry in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any dentist or other person practising dentistry, to ply his profession, in any of its branches, either for exhibition or for hire, in any of the streets, thoroughfares or public places of The City of New York.

Sec. 2. For each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a minor offense, and upon conviction thereof by any Magistrate, either upon confession or by competent testimony, shall be fined in the sum of ten dollars, or stand committed to the City Prison; such commitment, however, shall not exceed five days.
