Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Miss Adelyne A. Kelly, of No. 668 Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan, as junior clerk in the office of the City Superintendent, at a salary of \$600 per annum, said appointment taking effect November 26, 1906, subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Amending subdivision 2 of section 67 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education in the last sentence thereof by striking out the word "two" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "six."

Amending section 42 of the by-laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto the following additional subdivisions (8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13, inclusive):

8. The Inspector of Ungraded Classes shall act as adviser to the Board of Superintendents, to the District Superintendents and to the Principals, with regard to all matters relating to the work with mentally defective children. Under the direction of the City Superintendent, and subject to his assignment, the Inspector of Ungraded Classes shall examine the work with defective children, report upon the same and instruct Teachers in the conduct of ungraded classes.

9. The Inspector of Ungraded Classes shall report to the City Superintendent at such times as he may require.

10. The Inspector of Ungraded Classes shall report to the Board of Superintendents on all applications of Principals for permission to organize ungraded classes, and upon the fitness of Teachers proposed for assignment to such classes.

11. The Principal of each school shall report to the Inspector of Ungraded Classes the name of every child reported as mentally defective by a Teacher, by the Director of Physical Training, or by a Physician of the Department of Health. The

Inspector of Ungraded Classes, assisted by a member of the physical training staff, who shall be a physician, shall examine each and every child proposed for admission to or removal from an ungraded class. The Inspector of Ungraded Classes shall make such examination of the child's mental power as will indicate the kind of school work best suited to his needs. The said member of the physical training staff shall make such physical and mental examination of the child presented as will show the child's condition with regard to specific disease or defect; he shall examine each child in an ungraded class as often as may be required by the City Superintendent, and shall immediately report to him the results of such examinations.

12. No child shall be admitted to or removed from an ungraded class without the approval in writing of the Inspector of Ungraded Classes or the permission of the Board of Superintendents.

13. Upon the recommendation of the Inspector of Ungraded Classes a Teacher assigned to an ungraded class may be given a leave of absence with full pay for not more than three months within the school year by the Board of Education, on the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, for purposes of study in a school for the training of teachers of defective children. A Teacher to whom such leave has been granted shall report to the Inspector of Ungraded Classes as the latter shall require.

Relieving the Committee on Elementary Schools from further consideration of the matter of the suspension of Estelle M. Lynch, a Teacher in Public School 43, Primary, Borough of Manhattan, by District Superintendent Lee, for neglect of duty, this Teacher's resignation having been received and accepted by the City Superintendent.

Approving the verdict of the Local School Board of District No. 13 that a Teacher in Public School 70, Borough of Manhattan, be acquitted of the charges of violation of the by-law prohibiting corporal punishment preferred against him.

Transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted November 1, 1906, amending resolution adopted October 10, 1906, approving of a lease by the Commissioner of Docks to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, of Pier 3, at Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, with the half bulkheads northerly and southerly thereof, by making the first term of the lease of the pier with the half bulkhead northerly "for a term of ten years from November 1, 1906," instead of "from October 1, 1906," and for the half bulkhead southerly of the pier from "November 1, 1908, to November 1, 1916," instead of "from November 1, 1908, to October 1, 1916." Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From December 9 to December 15, inclusive, 35 operations were performed at Bellevue, 12 at Gouverneur, 6 at Harlem and 8 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

In regard to the matter of additional Nurses for Ward 30, there is no question but that the service would be more efficient if there were more Nurses in that ward.

It is recommended that the wards of the Third and Fourth Medical Divisions, and the First, Second, Third and Fourth Surgical Divisions, be placed in charge of graduate women Nurses at a salary not to exceed \$50 a month.

In regard to the condition of the cellar of Ward 34, it is unlikely that the moisture has any effect on the health of the inmates, the population there being a constantly moving one.

The only ground available for additional dormitory space for the male employees of Bellevue Hospital is that south of the tennis court which has been loaned to the contractors of Pavilions A and B as a storage place. It is recommended that Parker & Co. be informed that the fence must be restored along the line of the driveway, thus making room for the erection of a dormitory.

It is recommended that the proposition of Langbein & Co. to repair instruments during 1907 for not less than \$2 or more than \$3 a dozen be accepted; also that of the Brown Insecticide Company to exterminate rats, mice and water bugs from the hospitals of the department during the year 1907 at the rate of \$27 a month.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That for the present three additional women Nurses be employed to take charge of male wards.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of making use of the space now occupied by Parker & Co. for storing materials be referred to the General Medical Superintendent with directions to have it vacated as soon as possible in order to make room on which to erect a dormitory for some of the male employees.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the estimates of Langbein & Co. on repairing instruments for not less than \$2 a dozen or more than \$3 a dozen, and the Brown Insecticide Company on exterminating rats, mice and water bugs from the hospitals of the Department at \$27 a month, during the year 1907, be and they hereby are approved and accepted.

Reports of Committees.

The committee to which was referred the matter of recommending candidates for the position of Admitting Physician recommended the appointment of Dr. J. N. Drury, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Dr. J. N. Drury be and he hereby is, upon the recommendation of the committee, appointed Admitting Physician to Bellevue Hospital at a salary of \$1,000 a year.

A communication dated December 11 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with certified copies of two resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate on December 7, the one transferring \$1,600 from the appropriation for rents and \$4,400 from the appropriation for supplies and contingencies to the appropriation for salaries, and the other vesting title on December 10 in the City to the property located in the block bounded by First avenue, Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, East river, for hospital purposes.

Unfinished Business.

Resolved, That the President be authorized to recommend the payment to P. J. Carlin & Son of forty thousand dollars on account, provided that the architect furnishes a certificate that the contractors' work in the hospital is completed except for the elevators.

A delegation from the East Side Citizens and Taxpayers' Association appeared before the Board for the purpose of advocating the maintenance of the present Harlem Hospital after the new building is in use. Mr. George Schmitt, secretary of the association, presented its views concerning the necessity of a hospital on the site of the present Harlem Hospital, and requested the Board to take action protecting the population of this neighborhood in the matter of hospital care. Upon the retirement of the committee, it was, on motion, duly seconded,

Resolved, That Mr. Sachs be appointed a committee of one to investigate conditions and confer with the representatives of the Sydenham Hospital and report upon the matter at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees.

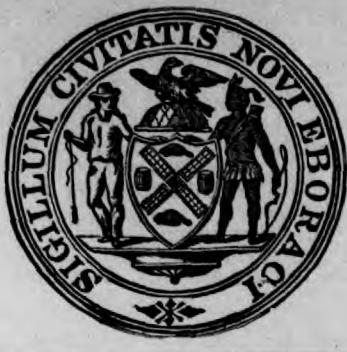

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
