LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY-APPLICATION OF CITY OF NEW YORK RELATIVE TO OPENING SUYDAM STREET AND WILLOUGHBY AVENUE

An adjourned hearing was held at 4:15 P. M., Commissioner Bassett presiding, upon the application of the City of New York for the determination by the Commission as to the grade of Suydam Street and Willoughby Avenue, to be opened from Irving Avenue to the borough line, Brooklyn, across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company. Appearances: Arthur DuBois for the Commission; L. J. Carruthers for the company; Archibald R. Watson, by John P. Dunn, for the city; Nelson P. Lewis, City Engineer; P. A. Ajas and John C. Coleman for property owners; Adam E. Fisher, a property owner, in person. Mr. Dunn placed in evidence the record in Case No. 1202 in regard to the application of the City of New York relative to opening Starr Street across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad. Mr. Carruthers and Mr. Dunn submitted remarks on the question whether Suydam Street and Willoughby Avenue had already been opened across the company's tracks and as to the jurisdiction of the Commission in the premises. 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LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY—APPLICATION OF CITY OF NEW YORK RELATIVE TO OPENING STARR STREET

An adjourned hearing was held at 2:30 P. M., Commissioner Bassett presiding, upon the application of the City of New York for the determination by the Commission as to the grade of Starr Street, to be opened from Irving Avenue to Wyckoff Avenue, Brooklyn, across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company. Appearances: Arthur DuBois for the Commission; L. J. Carruthers for the company: Archibald R. Watson, by John P. Dunn, for the city; Nelson P. Lewis, City Engineer; P. A. Ajas and John C. Coleman for property owners; Adam E. Fisher, a property owner, in person. A. S. Tuttle, Engineer in charge of the Division of Public Improvements of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, testified for the city as to the physical conditions of Starr Street and its intersection with the railread tracks and as to the estimated cost of construction and property damage according to the several plans of crossing advanced. Huck testified for the city as to the conditions at the intersections of Starr Street, Willoughby Avenue and Suydam Street with the railroad line and the need of constructing proper crossings at those intersections. Savage, Chief Engineer of the company, testified for it as to the feasibility and cost of the several plans of crossings at Starr Street, Willoughly Avenue and Suydam Street, and as to the amount and danger of train operation involved. Counsel for the applicant, the city, and the Commission and Commissioner Bassett discussed questions in regard to the apportionment of the expense of construction for the crossings and the powers of the Commission in the matter. BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY, GAS AND ELECTRICITY-COMMUNICATION AS TO POLE LINES ON FOURTH AVENUE. BROOKLYN-REPLY OF COMMISSION

The Secretary presented a communication dated February 10, 1910, from Henry S. Thompson, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the City of New York, requesting information as to the attitude of the Commission in the matter of jurisdiction over pole lines carrying electrical conductors on Fourth Avenue, Brooklyn, along the line of the Fourth Avenue Subway, together with a communication dated February 18, 1910, from the Counsel to the Commission, transmitting the following form of reply thereto, which the Chairman was authorized to transmit to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

"The Commission is obliged for your courteous letter of February 10th and irrespective of any question of jurisdiction regrets that one of its contractors has strung wires on the pole lines along Fourth Avenue without consulting your Department. Although a subway excavation requires a rather complete control of the street through which it passes the Commission desires to have its work interfere as little

as possible with the regulations of the city departments. "The poles to which you refer, if retained in their present position, would be directly over the pipe galleries to be constructed in conjunction with the subway and are therefore within the excavation lines. Other questions have arisen in regard to these poles and wires as to which the Commission would ask your consideration. As Regular meetings of the Commission are held every Tuesday and Friday at 11:30 a matter of general policy it seems preferable that wires should be placed under ground and in this instance the weight of these poles would bring an undue thrust

upon the pipe galleries which would be directly beneath them and would require a subcontract with the Cranford Company for the construction of the extension of are to be built in connection with the subway and both on account of the advantages which would result in the removal of the poles and wires from the surface of the Subway Construction Company and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company them in the duct lines. This the Commission is prepared to do in accordance with the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act.

Before taking any action, however, the Commission desires to know your views and to receive any suggestions you may wish to make. The Commission or its Chief Engineer will be glad to furnish you with any additional facts or details you may

PERMITS GRANTED BY CITY AUTHORITIES IN CONNECTION WITH VAULTS ALONG SUBWAY LINES-PROPOSED COMMUNICATION TO BOROUGH PRESIDENTS

The Secretary presented a communication, dated February 19, 1910, from the Counsel to the Commission, transmitting the following proposed form of communication, which the Chairman was thereupon authorized to transmit to the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx:

February , 1910

Sir:—On behalf of the Commission I desire to call to your attention certain complications which have resulted in subway matters from the issuance of permits and notices by various city departments with a view toward arranging a method of procedure whereby these complications can be avoided.

These complications are caused chiefly by the posting of unsafe notices, by the approval of plans involving the use of spread foundations and by the issuance of permits for buildings and vaults alongside of subways without the necessary steps

being taken to safeguard the subway.

It has been the practice of the Building Departments to post unsafe notices on buildings that were in slight danger, in many cases rather as a matter of precaution. This practice is doubtless justified as a matter of general practice but its results along the line of subway construction are unfortunate. For example, through Centre and Canal Streets where a subway was being constructed close to the buildings unsafe notices were posted quite generally despite objections by the Commission's engineers and despite the fact that the subway contractors were required under their contracts to underpin and protect abutting property. Formerly the only effect of this was to alarm those owning or living in the buildings but in view of the recent decision of the Court of Appeals in the Joralemon Street case holding that the city is liable for damage done to abutting property during the course of subway construction it becomes important that these notices be posted only where a building is in actual and immediate danger because it is obvious that in prosecuting a claim against the city considerable reliance would be placed upon an unsafe notice posted by a city department. It is suggested that except in emergencies unsafe notices be posted on buildings affected by subway construction only after consultation with the Commis-

The Commission is informed that in some cases plans for large buildings have been approved involving the use of foundations extending into the street. The effect of this, in the case of streets to be used for subway purposes is injurious to the city since steps must be taken either to cause the removal of the portion of the building in the street which would probably result in delay due to litigation or the foundations must be carried by the subway structure which in many cases would result in largely

increasing construction cost.

Difficulties have also been caused by the construction of buildings and vaults contiguous to subways. In some cases because of the lack of proper safeguards the subway structure has been injured. In other cases plans have been approved for buildings which by reason of their proximity to the subway would bring an undue thrust upon the tunnel. We suggest that care should also be exercised in granting permits for building alongside a street where a subway is in course of construction in order that the subway work may not be jeopardized, and that the Commission may be notified before the permit is granted. The Commission is in receipt of a communication from the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, the operator of the present subway, stating that the subway has been damaged by building operations under permits granted by city departments and giving notice that it will look to the city for reinbursement. The Commission has denied the liability of the city for these injuries but complications of this nature should be avoided so far as possible.

The Commission deems it advisable to call these matters to your attention at this time in order that they may be considered and steps taken to insure a more thorough co-operation. It has been the uniform course of the Commission to advise the various departments affected of the issuance of permits for subway construction and where time allowed to consult with them in advance of the issuance of permits and plans. It would seem that some such course as this should be followed in cases where the issuance of permits by city departments would affect subway work and the Commission will be glad to co-operate with you in arranging some means of

dealing with the situation.

SUBWAY BY OCCUPATION OF VAULTS UNDER CITY PERMITS—REPLY OF COMMISSION The Secretary presented a communication dated January 19, 1910, from Frank Hedley, Vice-President and General Manager of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, stating that the excavation being made for a new building at 18th Street and Fourth Avenue, Manhattan, would interfere with the platform wall of the subway station at that point, and that the company would hold the city responsible for any loss, damage or expense that might be caused to the subway in connection with the occupation of such spaces underneath the sidewalk along the line of the subway under licenses granted by the city, together with a communication dated February 19, 1910, from the Counsel to the Commission, transmitting the following form of reply thereto, which the Secretary was thereupon directed to transmit to the company:

"The Commission is in receipt of your letter of January 19, 1910, with regard to the excavation being made for a new building at the southeast corner of 18th Street and Fourth Avenue, in which you state that a license for a vault space underneath the sidewalk has been granted by the city to the owner of the building which will require the construction of a wall under the station stairway on the south and east sides to a depth of fourteen feet, necessitating the shoring of the stairway and kiosk and requesting that the Commission take such steps as may be necessary to secure the proper and safe support and protection of the station and railroad structure. You also state that in the event of the failure of the Commission to take such steps, the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will look to the city to save it harmless

from all loss, damage and expense which it may suffer. "While the Commission does not for a moment concede that the city is liable to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company for any loss, damage or expense which it may suffer by reason of acts done by private persons under permits for vault space issued by the city. I nevertheless desire to advise you that the Commission is sending to the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx a letter directing their attention to the difficulties which have arisen from the issuance of such permits for vaults under the sidewalks contiguous to the subway and suggesting that measures be taken to relieve the situation.'

The list of improvements completed prior to the close of 1908 and for which assessment lists had not been prepared or forwarded to the Board of Assessors up to the close of last year represents an aggregate value of \$1,362,576.16, and the records submitted show that it comprises the following:

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

1. Grading Exterior street, between East Sixty-fourth street and East Eightyhirst street-This improvement was authorized on May 15, 1903, at an estimated cost of \$115,760. The work was completed in 1906 at a total expense of \$192,720.27. On November 12 of last year the President of the Borough advised that the assessment for this work was being levied by a commission appointed by the Legislature.

#### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

2. Sewers in Wyckoff Avenue, Johnson Avenue and Flushing Avenue-This improvement was authorized on September 26, 1900, at an estimated cost of \$37,850. The work was completed in 1901 at a total expense of \$70,598.09. On November 3, 1909, the President of the Borough stated that the assessment list for this improvement was forwarded to the Board of Assessors in 1903, but was returned with the request that the area of benefit within the limits of Queens Borough he accurately defined before the assessment was levied. The Borough President advised that the lists were then in preparation in conformity with the latest map and would be forwarded at an early date. The records of the Board of Assessors do not show that the lists have since been returned.

3. Sewer in Gardner Avenue, between Johnson Avenue and Flushing Avenue-This improvement was authorized on June 19, 1901, at an estimated cost of \$4,000. The work was completed in 1902 at a total expense of \$7.349.58. On November 3, 1909, the Borough President advised that this improvement had not been assessed for a reason similar to that stated with reference to the sewer in Wyckoff avenue, Johnson avenue and Flushing avenue. It was then understood that the way had been cleared for preparing the maps and that they would soon be forwarded, but the records of the Board of Assessors do not show that they have yet been received.

4. Grading Kenmore Place, between Emmons Avenue and Voorhies Lane-This improvement was authorized on January 6, 1905, at an estimated cost of \$5,100. The work was completed in 1906 at a total cost of \$6,200.06. On December 17, 1909, a report from the Borough President was submitted showing that the assessment lists had not been prepared for this improvement for the reason that it had been carried out at a grade differing from that laid out upon the city map. At this time the Board decided to call the attention of the Borough President to the procedure which should be followed to permit of collecting this assessment and which was outlined in an opinion of the Corporation Counsel which appears on page 1827 of the Minutes of July 6, 1906. The Board of Assessors' records show that up to a recent date the assessment list had not been presented.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

5. Grading Tremont Avenue, between Bronx River and Eastern Boulevard-This improvement was authorized on September 30, 1903, at an estimated cost of \$205,000. The work was completed in August, 1908, at an expense of \$177,179.95. The list has not yet been presented to the Board of Assessors and no information has been furnished as to the occasion for the delay.

6. Paving White Plains Road, between Morris Street and the City Line-This improvement was authorized on July 7, 1905, at an estimated cost of \$290,300. The work was completed in 1908 at a total expense of \$235,516.07. The Assessors' records show that the assessment list was presented on February 3 last.

7. Grading Kossuth Place, between Mosholu Parkway and DeKalb Avenue-This improvement was authorized on June 28, 1907, at an estimated cost of \$12,700. The work was completed in August, 1908, at a total expense of \$6,119.32. The Assessors' records show that the assessment list was received on January 13, 1910.

8. Grading West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth Street, between Shakespeare Avenue and Boscobel Avenue-This improvement was authorized on May 19, 1905, at an estimated cost of \$10,800. The work was completed in August, 1908, at an actual cost of \$10,115.64. The records of the Board of Assessors show that the assessment list was received on January 13 last.

## BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

9. Sewer in College Avenue and in North Boulevard, Third Ward-This improvement was authorized on October 30, 1901, at an estimated cost of \$7,500. The work was completed in 1903 at a total expense of \$18,407.75. Under date of November 23 last, the Borough President advised that the assessment maps were then being prepared. Up to a recent date they had not been received by the Board of Assessors.

10. Sewer in Seventh Street, between Orchard Street and Ludlow Avenue-This improvement was authorized on December 22, 1903, at an estimated cost of \$7,100. The work was completed in 1904, at a total expense of \$7,351.40. At a recent date the Acting Borough President advised that the assessment list had been filed in his office and was then "awaiting the signature of the surveyor who prepared said list."

11. Sewer in Broadway, between Trains Meadow Road and Thomson Avenue and the Elmhurst Disposal Plant—This improvement was authorized on June 27, 1900, at an estimated cost of \$160,000. The work was completed in 1905, at a total expense of \$227,503.40. Under date of January 12, 1910, the Borough President advised that a contract was awarded in 1905 for the preparation of the assessment lists relating to this improvement, and that the work would probably be completed about the middle of February. The Assessors' records do not show that the lists have yet been

12. Sewer in Webster Avenue, between Fourth Avenue and Fifth Avenue-This improvement was authorized on April 14, 1905, at an estimated cost of \$1,000. The work was completed in the same year at a total expense of \$639. Under date of March 17, 1910, the Borough President advises that the Sewer Bureau "has no record of said maps ever having been filed by the surveyor who was authorized to prepare

13. Paving Ninth Avenue, between Broadway and Jamaica Avenue—This improvement was authorized on December 9, 1904, at an estimated cost of \$10,700. The work was completed in 1906 at a total expense of \$6,342.73. In a report presented by the Borough President under date of January 12, 1910, information is presented to show that in carrying out this improvement bluestone curb was substituted for the concrete curb provided in the original contract. This change appears to have led to objections on the part of the property owners and to the withholding of the final payment under the advice of the Corporation Counsel. It is stated that payment has been demanded and that the matter is under consideration by the Finance Department. In the meantime it is proposed to withhold the assessment lists until the claim is adjudicated.

14. Sewer in Third Avenue and in Tenth Street-This improvement was authorized on May 17, 1907, at an estimated cost of \$17,000. The work was completed in February. 1908, at a total cost of \$17,413.59. No information is presented to show the occasion for withholding the assessment lists, which, up to a recent date, had not been received by the Board of Assessors.

15. Sewer in St. Nicholas Avenue, between the Borough Line and Myrtle Avenue. etc.—This improvement was authorized on November 2, 1906, at an estimated cost of \$420,000. The work appears to have been completed in October, 1908, at a total expense of \$379,119.31. In a report presented to the Board at its meeting of March 4 it Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh streets.

was explained that this improvement was a portion of a large trunk sewer draining a territory partly within the limits of the Borough of Brooklyn and partly in the Borough of Queens, and that it was proposed to merge the expense in one assessment, which would be spread over the entire drainage district. It is understood that the Brooklyn work is nearly complete and that the lists for both Boroughs are now being prepared.

In the reports received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan no reference is made to the sewer improvements authorized on June 28, 1907, and on December 18, 1908, relating respectively to an extension of the East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street sewer to the Harlem River and to a sewer in West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Twelfth avenue and a point 275 feet easterly therefrom. It is informally understood that neither of these improvements has yet been placed under contract, and they have been so considered in the preparation of the list showing the present status of the improvements authorized. There appears to be some doubt as to the intention of carrying out at least one of these improvements, and it would seem proper to direct the Borough President's attention to the desirability of having the resolutions rescinded if the work is not to be done.

Information is presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn to the effect that the resolution adopted by the Board on June 26, 1908, providing for paving Lincoln place, between New York avenue and Brooklyn avenue, at an estimated cost of \$1,200, might properly be rescinded, as the work has been carried out by the property owners at their own expense.

A communication is also presented by the President of the Borough of Richmond showing that the property owners on Townsend avenue have graded this street and laid the sidewalks between Bay street and Centre street. He therefore suggests that the resolution authorizing this improvement, which was authorized by the Board on July 2, 1909, be rescinded. The work was estimated to cost \$600.

At the meeting of the Board held on December 17, 1909, the attention of the President of the Borough of Queens was called to the failure to include in the schedule of outstanding improvements which had been authorized, but not completed, one providing for the construction of a sewer in Gates avenue, between the Borough line and St. Nicholas avenue, which was authorized on March 12, 1909, at an estimated cost of \$1,200, and he was then requested to advise as to its status. In the accompanying communication, bearing date of January 12, 1910, the Board is advised that the Gates avenue sewer was built under an order given by the Commissioner of Public Works on January 17, 1908, and as a part of a sewer authorized in St. Nicholas avenue. He states that this treatment was occasioned by reason of the construction work then in progress on the St. Nicholas avenue sewer interfering with the operation of the old sewer in Gates avenue. He also advises that an expense of \$618 was incurred, which has been charged against the Street Improvement Fund and will be made the subject of an as sessment. I believe that there is some room for doubt as to whether this assessment can be levied under the resolution of 1909.

For the purpose of securing the presentation of the assessment lists to the Board Assessors for all improvements which have been completed prior to January 1, 1909, and at the same time clearing the record of any outstanding authorizations of improvements which are not to be carried out, I would recommend

1. That the President of the Borough of Manhattan be asked to advise the Board as to the present status of the sewer improvements in East One Hundred and Twenty fourth street and West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street.

2. That the resolutions relating to the paying of Lincoln place, Borough of Brook lyn, and to the paying of Townsend avenue, Borough of Richmond, be rescinded.

3. That the attention of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be again di rected to the desirability of completing the grading improvement in Kenmore place. 4. That the President of the Borough of The Bronx be requested to advise the

Board as to the occasion for delaying the assessment list relating to the grading inprovement in Tremont avenue, between Bronx River and Eastern houlevard 5. That the President of the Borough of Queens be requested to advise as to the

occasion for further delaying the assessment lists in the matter of the sewer improvement in Third avenue, and that he be asked to take such steps as may be necessary to secure the assessment lists in the matter of the Webster avenue sewer improvment and the adjustment of the Ninth avenue paving improvement.

6. That the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise the Board as to whether the resolution specifically authorizing the Gates avenue sewer improvement may now properly be rescinded, and as to the procedure to be followed which will insure the return of the expenditure.

-be and the same hereby is rescinded.

SIR-Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan, bearing date of January 15, 1910, requesting the approval of a modification in the drainage plans of Districts 29-J, 21-Y and 4-DV, these comprising the following:

District 29-J.

Sewer in Buena Vista avenue, extending from West One Hundred and Seventyseventh street to the summit south of West One Hundred and Seventy-second street. Sewer in an unnamed street (between Fort Washington avenue and Buena Vista avenue), extending from West One Hundred and Seventy-third street to West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-second street, extending from Buena Vista avenue to Fort Washington avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-third street, extending from Buena Vista avenue to Fort Washington avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, extending from Buena

Vista avenue to Fort Washington avenue. Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, extending from Buena

Vista avenue to Fort Washington avenue.

Receiving basin at the northwesterly corner of West One Hundred and Seventyfirst street and Fort Washington avenue.

District 4-DV.

Sewer in Tompkins street, extending from Rivington street to Houston street.

Sewer at the foot of Rector street, under Pier 8, North River.

The sewers proposed under the three modifications last described have been made the subject of Local Board resolutions, and the preliminary work required for carrying out the improvements in Tompkins street and Rector street has already been authorized by the Board with the understanding that the plan would be submitted for approval before the final authorization was given.

The remaining changes are intended to provide a drainage system for the territory between Fort Washington avenue and Buena Vista avenue, extending from West One Hundred and Seventy-second street to West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, this being in part outletted into the Fort Washington avenue sewer and in part into the one which follows the line of West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street. An examination of the plan would indicate that the sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street between the unnamed street and Buena Vista avenue might possibly be overtaxed unless a slight increase is made in its size.

With this exception, the plan appears to be a proper one and I would recommend its adoption.

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on January 27, 1910, initiating proceedings for the construction of a temporary sewer in Gaston avenue, between Arverne boulevard and Amsdell boulevard, at Rockaway Beach.

With the resolution there is submitted a map showing the sewer which it is proposed to build in this block of Gaston avenue, which is described as of a temporary character for the reason that the street has not yet been laid out upon the City plan.

There is also submitted information to show that the sewer is intended to have an outlet in a 24-inch sewer which is now being built by the Board of Health under authority of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 28 of last year, which provided for an issue of revenue bonds to the amount of \$7,500, the improvement having been designed to remedy the unsanitary condition which then existed. The sewer which it is proposed to build under the Local Board resolution is to have a diameter of 18 inches, is intended to replace an old 12-inch pipe sewer which is unfit for service, and is expected to remove the storm water which collects at the intersection of Gaston avenue and Arverne boulevard, this being the low point of an area extending several blocks in an easterly and westerly direction. Some of the property owners interested in this improvement assure me that severe rainfalls result in the formation of a pond at this intersection, and that a similar condition frequently results from overtaxing the sewer with the dry weather flow.

There seems to be room for grave doubt as to whether the relief now proposed will be an adequate one, inasmuch as neither the sewer to be built nor the one into which it is to outlet is sufficiently large to meet the drainage requirements, but there is no doubt that some improvement will be effected in the existing conditions.

Affidavits are submitted with the resolution to show that the street has been in public use for more than twenty years, and an inspection of the ground shows that the street has been approximately graded and that it has been partially curbed and flagged. The abutting property is partially improved. It is understood that the railroad company will consent to the construction of the sewer across their right-of-way.

The estimated cost of the improvement is \$3,300 and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$1,653,350.

Under the conditions noted I would recommend that the improvement be authorized and that the drainage plan be approved by the Board.

I would also suggest that the attention of the Borough President be called to the desirability of presenting a comprehensive plan providing for the drainage of the entire Rockaway Beach section.

The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 75 days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to nothing.

The work to be done comprises the following: 3-foot wooden barrel sewer.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$7,700.

2. Receiving basins at the southeasterly corner of Hillside avenue and Nagle avenue and on both sides of Nagle avenue, about 270 feet north of Dyckman street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 8, 1909, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$15,700. #### MISCELLANEOUS.

PROPOSED AGREEMENT WITH THE LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY, IN CONNECTION WITH THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE 72-INCH STEEL PIPE LINE ON LONG ISLAND.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity relative to the proposed agreement with the Long Island Railroad Company, providing for the acquisition of certain rights from that company in connection with the construction of the 72-inch steel pipe line on Long Island, and granting the railroad company certain rights in exchange therefor, which agreement was referred back to the Commissioner on March 18, 1910, for modification, if possible, by the elimination of the question of spur tracks:

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, New York, March 22, 1910.

JUSEPH HAMG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—In answer to your favor of March 19, stating that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 18, 1910, the matter of the proposed agreement with the Long Island Railroad Company was referred back to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for a modification of the proposed agreement by the elimination of the question of spur tracks, would say that at a meeting held at my office at which were present, President Mitchel of the Board of Aldermen, a representation of the Bureau of Franchises, a representative of the Corporation Counsel, representatives of the railroad and myself, the railroad company would not consent to the elimination of the guestion of spur tracks.

Would also say that there was read at the meeting, an extract from the minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment dated June 19, 1908, as follows: "After considerable discussion the representatives of the Department of Water Supply agreed that the lands now owned by the railroad company should be acquired in fee, subject to the use of the surface for railroad purposes not inconsistent with a pure water supply and it was further understood that the City would grant to the railroad company the necessary easements to construct additional tracks and to cross with spur tracks the lands which the City will require in order to reach commercial property needing railroad facilities and located on the south side of the land to be acquired by the City." Which shows that the Board of Estimate has already promised to give them the rights asked for in the proposed agreement.

I am also informed that the State Board of Water Supply has ordered that the railroad be given the right to cross this strip for commercial purposes on the south side of the tracks.

However, I wish to call the attention of the Board to the fact that there never was any agreement made in regard to crossing the strip on the north side of the tracks

I therefore return the original agreements for such action as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may wish to take. Would also state that it is a matter of utmost importance that this matter should be decided immediately as the City of Brooklyn is not only in urgent need of the water which this 72-inch pipe line will carry, but is also losing over \$600 per day interest on the amount of money already expended and which is now of no practical use.

It being covenanted that for and during and until the full end and term of ninety-nine years thence next ensuing from and after the date of execution of these presents, the said party of the first part shall pay to the party of the second part, its successors, legal representatives or assigns, yearly and every year during the said term hereby granted, the annual rent or sum of two hundred and fifty dollars lawful money of the United States of America, in yearly payments in advance.

Provided, That if the said rent above reserved, or any part thereof, shall be behind or unpaid on any day of payment whereon the same ought to be paid as aforesaid; or if default shall be made in any of the covenants herein contained, on the part and behalf of the said party of the first part, to be paid, kept and performed, then and from thenceforth it shall and may be lawful for the said party of the second part, its successors, legal representatives or assigns, into and upon the said demised premises and every part thereof, whoily to re-enter, and the same to have again, repossess and enjoy as in its first and former estate.

The said party of the first part does covenant and agree to pay to the said party of the second part or to its successors, legal representatives or assigns, the said rent in the manner and on the days and at the times hereinbefore specified,

The said party of the second part, for itself and its successors, covenants and agrees that the said party of the first part, paying the said yearly rent herein reserved, and performing the covenants aforesaid, shall and may peaceably have, hold and enjoy the said demised premises for the term aforesaid,

It is mutually covenanted and agreed between the parties to these presents that the party of the first part, at the end of the terms hereby demised, may remove and carry away all improvements and alterations (if any) put up by it upon said premises.

And the said party of the first part hereby covenants and agrees that the lands, interests in which are hereby granted, conveyed and demised, shall be used and enjoyed for purposes which are consistent with the sanitary protection of the water supply of the party of the second part, and if it be found that the work of the party of the first part, or any of the parcels of land hereinahove referred to, affects the quality of the water, and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the party of the second part notifies the President of the party of the first part in writing to that effect, and said party of the first part fails to remove the cause of complaint within twenty days after the receipt of such notice the party of the second part shall have the right to immediately cancel the lease of the parcel or parcels on which the work of the railroad affects the quality of the water, as aforesaid.

Second-The party of the first part does hereby grant, bargain, sell and release poses as may be required by the party of the second part for the purposes of water supply in and to certain parcels of land situate at Clear Stream; Hook Creek Pumping Station, Rosedale; Herse Brook Pumping Station, Rockville Centre; Rockville Centre Pumping Station, between Rockville Centre and Baldwin; Baldwin Pumping Station, Baldwin; Millburn Pumping Station, Baldwin and Massapequa Pumping Station, Massapequa, aggregating 0.5909 acres; the said property being shown on a certain map entitled "Map showing additional land desired by Long Island Railroad, Clear Stream," filed in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Brooklyn, being Plate No. 5234, filed in J-5, as Parcels Nos. 3 and 1, and "Map showing property of the Long Island Railroad in which subsurface rights are to be acquired by The City of New York," being Plate No. 5351, filed in J.5, the said property being more particularly bounded and described as follows:

this agreement, or on lands owned by the party of the first part and for the acquisition of interest in which condemnation proceedings have already, been instituted by the party of the second part, the physical work required for the protection of said tracks buildings, structures, aqueducts, pipe lines, etc., shall be done by the party of the first part, but shall be paid by the party of the second part at actual reasonable cost of said work within sixty days after presentation of bills; and it is also understood and agreed that should the work to be done by either of the parties hereto render it necessary to protect the tracks, buildings, structures, aqueducts pipe lines, etc., now existing or to be erected upon lands owned by the party of the second part and in which an easement or interests are granted to the party of the first part, the physical work required to be done to protect said tracks, buildings, structures, aqueducts, pipe lines, etc., shall be done at its own cost and expense by the party of the first part. In all cases the work to be done for the protection of the tracks, buildings, structures, aqueducts, pipe lines, etc., now existing or to be erected by the party of the second part shall be done to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the party of the second part, and in accordance with plans approved by him.

Fourth-The City of New York shall, upon petition in writing of any proprietor or lessee of property who desires that a railroad connection with his property be made, grant to the railroad company the right to cross the right of way of the City heretofore acquired for the purposes of water supply between Springfield Junction, in the County of Queens, and Amityville, in the County of Suffolk, with its railroad tracks for the purposes of affording to such petitioner commercial, industrial and railroad facilities, whenever such application shall be accompanied by a map showing the angle and direction of the proposed crossing and by the written approval of the railroad company, evidenced by the signature of its president or vice-president and the Chief Engineer, unless it shall appear to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the granting of such application would be prejudicial to the public interest.

For each such grant there shall be a reasonable annual rental paid to the City, such rental and period of time to be fixed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund

Each such petition shall contain a provision that in the event of the granting of such application the approval thereof by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall not be held to interfere with or diminish the right of The City of New York to enter upon and use the premises without unnecessary interference with the use thereof by the railroad company for the purpose of repairing, replacing or renewing the subsurface structure used for the purpose of water supply and laying additional subsurface

Every such crossing shall be made by the most direct practicable route between the railroad and the premises of the applicant and shall follow the route shown on the map filed with the application, and no such crossing shall be connected upon the City's property with any other crossing of the same or any other petitioner, under forfeiture of lease.

If any crossing is abandoned by the petitioner for a period of one year, it shall be taken up by the railroad company upon the demand of the City, and the property occupied by the tracks shall be put in good condition.

It is understood that each such applicant shall in his petition stipulate to provide such facilities for car storage upon his own property as shall obviate the necessity of car storage or the unloading of cars upon any of the lands of the party of the second part, which lands shall not be used for such purposes.

Fifth-It is agreed that the party of the first part shall bear the whole amount of the taxes which may be assessed for surface structures, railroad tracks and switches, or other property devoted to railroad uses upon the parcels of land and property hereinbefore described and mentioned.

Sixth-It is further agreed that should the party of the second part wish to la pip. lines to connect the conduits and pipe lines or their appurtenances on the north side of the railroad tracks owned and controlled by the party of the first part, with the pipes, conduits and appurtenances lying south of the said railroad tracks, or vice versa, the party of the first part shall grant permission to go across its tracks and property under the same terms and conditions hereinbefore stipulated.

Seventh-It is further agreed that the party of the first part shall not use any of the lands interests in which are by this instrument released to or confirmed in it for any purpose which shall not be consistent with the sanitary protection of the water supply of The City of New York, and if the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall give written notice to the party of the first part that he deems the use made by the party of the first part of any such parcels to be inconsistent with the savitary protection of such water supply, and the party of the first part shall continue | Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appear to use the lands described in said notice for a purpose inconsistent with the sanitary protection of the water supply for twenty days after receipt of such notice in writing, then and in such event such lands and interests therein shall be deemed to be forfeited to the party of the second part and the interest of the party of the first part shall thereupon cease, determine and be at an end.

### QUALIFYING NOTE TO BE PLACED ON SEWERAGE PLANS.

SIR-Under date of June 3, 1909, the Corporation Counsel, in response to a communication relative to the legality and advisability of including on all sewerage plans a qualifying note which was designed to limit the liability of the City in case of damage from flooding of sewers which might not have been designed to provide for excessively heavy storms or for an impervious area which would exist when the territory became thoroughly built up, approved of the suggestion and of the note which it was proposed to use. This communication was submitted to the Board at a meeting held July 2, 1909, and on that date was referred to a committee consisting of the Sewer Engineers of the different Boroughs, the Chief Engineer of the Department of Finance, and the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This Committee has fully discussed the form of this note, and at a meeting at which all of the members of the Committee were present except the Chief Engineer of Sewers for the Borough of Manhattan, agreed upon a form which it is believed can be used for all Boroughs, and the Committee has authorized me to submit the matter to the Board with the recommendation that the proposed form be adopted and that it be placed upon all drainage plans hereafter submitted. The form approved is as fol-

"The sewers shown on this drainage plan are intended to have a capacity adequate to the reasonable needs of the drainage district for a limited period, and are not intended to be of sufficient capacity to immediately remove storm water when the rate inches per hour continuing through of precipitation exceeds an intensity of per cent, of which will reach the sewers within that time. The

capacity of the system has been restricted for the purpose of keeping the cost within limits which it is deemed may now be properly assessed upon the property benefited. The rate of precipitation, the time through which it will continue, and the per-

centage of such precipitation reaching the sewer within that time, have been left blank, as the conditions in the several Boroughs, and in different parts of the same Borough. vary greatly.

On behalf of the Committee I would recommend that the Board adopt this note as a standard to be used on all drainage plans hereafter submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment,

Sir-Under date of March 1, 1910, through its attorney, Mr. Charles M. Scheaff, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company has transmitted for the consideration of the Board a plan showing a modification in the highway bridge to be erected over the tracks of this railroad at Main avenue, in Baychester, Borough of The Bronx.

This plan is intended to supersede one approved by the Board of Estimate on April 19, 1907, in accordance with the provisions of article 6 of the agreement of June 30, 1906, between The City of New York and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company. The proposed modification consists in providing an extension for the returns on the south abutment, part of which it will be necessary to build on land belonging to the City and forming a portion of Pelham Bay Park. This wall will retain the embankment where it adjoins the railroad right of way and will obviate any encroachment on private property located between the railroad right of way and the park lands. Provision is made for reducing the grade of this approach as indicated on the former plan by increasing the elevation at the southerly end from 8 feet to 10 feet. There is also indicated on the drawing a public roadway giving access to the bridge.

The plan is otherwise identical with the one heretofore adopted and as the modification meets with the approval of the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx and of the President of the Borough, I would recommend that favorable action

be accorded.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On March 26, 1909, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing a proceeding for acquiring title to the following streets, in the Borough of The Bronx:

Olmstead avenue, from Protectory avenue to the bulkhead line of Pugsleys Creek.

Odell street, from Protectory avenue to Unionport road.

Purdy street, from Protectory avenue to Westchester avenue.

Under date of February 3, 1910, the Corporation Counsel has forwarded for the approval of the Board the rule map, damage map and profiles which have been prepared

for the court record and for the use of the Commissioners to be appointed in the proceeding.

An examination of these maps shows that the Olmstead avenue proceedings will involve serious damage to, or the destruction of, a number of buildings located in the section between Westchester avenue and Unionport road. I am in some doubt as to whether the advantage gained by the retention of the street in its present position

through this portion of is length warrants the expense which will be incurred if the proceeding is here carried out.

The maps also show that buildings located on both sides of Purdy street will be seriously damaged, and there appears to be warrant for a belief that the cost of the proceeding might be materially diminished if the lines of this street were to be so

changed as to provide for widening the existing private street wholly on its easterly side.

I would therefore recommend that before these maps are approved the matter be drawn to the attention of the Borough President and that he be requested to advise

the Board as to whether changes could be advantageously made in the location of Purdy street and in that portion of Olmstead avenue between Westchester avenue and Unionport road.



The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read. and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and it no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak ing the estimate that the several matters stated

herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
The certified check or money should not be in-
