Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, June 3, 1912.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees; excused, Messrs. Drummond and Farley. The minutes of the meeting of May 20 were approved.

Bills amounting to \$9,871.73 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of May, 1913, was as follows: Bellevue, 1,208; Gouverneur, 157; Harlem, 163, and Fordham, 168.

A request has been received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor for authority to advertise for supplies for a four months' period, and the approval of the Board is asked.

The committee appointed to purchase motor ambulances without public letting, composed of Commissioner Drummond and the General Medical Superintendent, recommended the appointment of

has decided upon a White gas car and two Lansden electrics.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to authorize an advertisement for bids for supplies for a period of four months, beginning July 1, 1913.

The report in regard to the selection of motor ambulances was approved.

Reports of Committees.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Louis C. Schroeder as Resident Physician on the Children's Service for a term of one year. This report was approved and Dr. Schroeder appointed accordingly.

The Conference Committee of the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital, recommended the appointment of Dr. Stanley H. Mellen, Dr. Serafino Genovese and Dr. Margarete Darvas as Assistant Physicians to Out Patients. This report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of

The committee further reported that the money was available in the salary appropriations.

Resolved, To approve of these increases in salary, and to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to revise the salary schedules to meet these changes, to be effective as of June 1, 1913.

Communications.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital held on May 6, were presented. The nomination of Dr. J. E. Donnelly as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, was referred to the Conference Committee, and action was deferred on the nomination of Internes, pending the receipt of information as to the medical school which they attended and the date of their graduation.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on May 27, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the question of establishing night clinics for genito-urinary diseases, which was referred back to the Executive Committee by the Medical Board, in view of the protest by the Physicians' Protective League, was referred to the Committee of the Month. The nomination of Dr. Trevor C. Yates for reappointment as Assistant Physician

to Out Patients, tuberculosis night clinic, was approved. The recommendation that a tuberculosis clinic for children be held two days a week, following the adult clinic, was approved, and the nomination of Dr. Charles G. Herberman, Jr., as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients was approved.

A communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of May 23, requesting the preparation of the departmental estimate for the Budget for 1914, was presented and referred to the Finance Committee.

A communication was presented from the John H. Parker Co., requesting approval of the amount of insurance placed on Pavilions I and K, in accordance with their contract. A letter from McKim, Mead & White, under date of May 29, was also presented, stating that in their opinion the amount of insurance placed on Pavilions I and K (\$94,000) was sufficient to cover the work already erected, and that they did not consider it necessary to increase the insurance. In accordance with the recommendation of the architects, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the request of the John H. Parker Co.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, stating that the Department has received no corporate stock for almost two years, except for road building, and that he cannot include among them the appropriation for the new small park in front of Gouverneur Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

Three resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 6, were presented, (1) selecting site near Gouverneur Hospital for new dispensary, power house and Nurses' home, (2) authorizing

Robbins, Trustees, and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Ex-
cused, Messrs. Farley, Sachs and Stern.

Bids were received for the following supplies: fresh meats, poultry and smoked meats for the four months ending October 31, 1913; soaps and laundry supplies, dry goods, x-ray plates and electric bulbs for the six months ending December 31, 1913; gauze for the three months ending September 30, 1913. The bids were opened in the presence of the bidders, a representative of the Comptroller's office and several Clerks of the Department. After all the bids were opened and called off, all except the members of the Board of Trustees withdrew from the staff room. After the bids on lines 761 to 780 were tabulated, a communication in regard thereto was presented from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, and in accordance with his recommendation, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To accept the lowest bids received on fresh meats, poultry and smoked meats; and it was further

Resolved, To defer action on all other bids, pending their tabulation.

The minutes of the meeting of June 3, were approved.

Bills amounting to \$27,959.52 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A request has been received from the Auxiliary Committee at Fordham Hospital for permission to provide a Nurse for the Children's Clinic in the dispensary for a period of five months. As the Committee has sufficient money to pay the Nurse for this period, the approval of the Board is requested.

The attention of Dr. Healy, President of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, has had to be drawn to the condition of the histories at that hospital. It will be recalled that more than a year ago one of the arguments for increasing the staff at that hospital was the inability of the Medical Board to insist upon complete histories, because of the pressure of work upon the house staff. The number was accordingly increased to twelve. As a result of personal investigation, and also from the report of one of the present investigating committees, it is found that little or nothing has been accomplished in improving upon or completing the histories.

For the information of the Trustees, it is reported that the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Medical Board, as reorganized, had its first meeting on Wednesday, the 11th inst. The provision of having the General Medical Superintendent a member of this body promises to be so helpful for the administration of the hospital, that it is suggested that some provision be made for such membership or representation in the Medical Boards of the allied hospitals.

The resignation of the Rev. P. P. O'Dwyer, Catholic Chaplain at Bellevue Hospital, to become effective on the 21st day of June, is reported with regret.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointment by the Auxiliary Committee of a Nurse for the Children's Clinic at Fordham Hospital, for a period of five months, was approved.

It was resolved to write a strong letter to the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, calling attention to their failure to heed repeated admonitions to have the histories kept in a more complete form, and it was further

Resolved, To direct the General Medical Superintendent to secure copies of a number of histories and to go over them in an effort to determine the reason for their incompleteness; it was

Resolved, To appoint the General Medical Superintendent to full membership in the Medical Board of each of the allied hospitals.

The resignation of the Rev. P. P. O'Dwyer was accepted with regret, and the Secretary was instructed so to inform him.

Report of Committees.

The Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Louis L. Goldblatt as Assistant Physician to Out Patients (stomach class). This report was approved and Dr. Goldblatt appointed accordingly.

The special committee, composed of Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Paulding, appointed to confer with a committee from the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board in regard to the reorganization of that Board, presented an amended plan, which had been agreed upon at their conference.

After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To approve of this plan of reorganizing the Medical Board and Executive Committee, to become effective at once.

Mr. Robbins, Acting Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that a site had been selected for the new set of

scales at Fordham Hospital; this report was approved.

The President reported in regard to the changes which had been proposed in the organization of the house staff of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, and stated that the list of nominations had been revised so as to make the services the same as last year. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the corrected list of nominations was approved.

Communications.

A communication was presented from John T. Brady & Co., requesting an extension of time to May 1, 1914, in order to complete their contract for the construction of Pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital, and setting forth as their reasons stormy weather, the difficulty of securing structural steel and the condition of 29th st. during October and November, 1912. A communication dated June 17, was also presented from McKim, Mead & White, recommending for the reasons set forth by the contractors, that the contract time be extended by 145 calendar days. On the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to grant John T. Brady & Co. an extension of one hundred and forty-five (145) calendar days on their contract for the erection of Pavilions L and M.

A communication dated June 12, was presented from J. M. Knopp, contractor for the additional balconies on Pavilions A and B, requesting an extension of time to and including June 21, 1913, on account of delays due to inclement weather and the character of this construction. A letter dated June 17, was submitted from McKim, Mead & White, stating that in their opinion forty days would cover all the delays which the contractor had experienced from conditions beyond his control, and recommending an extension of time to that amount. On motion, duly seconded and carried, in accordance with the recommendation of the architects and of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To grant J. M. Knopp an additional extension of forty (40) calendar days to the time already allowed for the completion of his contract.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Harlem Hospital Medical Board held on June 6, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of Drs. Frank P. Boyd and Lawrence D. Roche, to complete the unexpired terms of the house staff of Drs. Sale and Coban, from June 7 to July 1, 1913, was approved. The request for the appointment of a salaried Admitting Physician was considered, and it was

Resolved, To include this position in the departmental estimate for 1914. The recommendation that a salaried Pathologist be appointed for the Clinical Laboratory, was denied on account of lack of funds, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to appoint a salaried employee for the care of the laboratory.

A communication dated June 14, was presented from the Secretary of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, giving the names and time and place of graduation of the men who were successful in the examination for Internes, and who were recommended by the Medical Board for appointment on May 6. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these nominations were approved.

A communication dated June 9, was presented from the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co., applying for a renewal of their contract for fire protection for the six months beginning July 1, 1913, on the same terms as heretofore. It was reported that this company performs similar services for the Department of Public Charities at a cost of \$950 per annum, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To direct the General Medical Superintendent to negotiate a contract with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Co. for fire protection in this Department at a cost not to exceed \$950 a year.

A communication dated June 9, was presented from McKim, Mead & White, in regard to structural glass for Pavilions I and K, and requesting approval of the color of the sample submitted. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To inform the architects that the approval by the Trustees of this glass last fall did not carry with it approval as to color, and as the architects considered the sample furnished by Seamon, Bach & Co. to be satisfactory at that time, to insist that the glass installed shall be equal to the sample in quality, and in color a pure white.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead and White dated June 10, in regard to installing gas ranges in the new Bellevue Hospital, and assuming that no changes are to be made in the kitchen equipment of Pavilions I and K. After

consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to direct the architects to change the kitchen arrangement of Pavilions I and K, so that all cooking may be done by gas, provided the coal range has not already been installed.

A communication was presented from Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, recommending to the Trustees the adoption of measures to provide for the performance of Wassermann tests on all cases in the hospital and Out Patient Department, and suggesting if funds are not available, that an arrangement might be made with the Department of Health, who have had certain funds placed at their disposal for this work. 

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
