Commissioner's Column



In the past several weeks, we have fought a steady stream of snow and ice storms. Across the Department, I have been impressed again and again by the continued dedication of our employees. As I have said before, we are the front lines in the fight against winter storms, and I am so proud of the great work we have done this winter.

But that is not the only work happening at the Department; today we opened the first Marine Transfer Station (MTS) at North Shore. The first load was dumped by S/W **Michael Vella** early in the morning. This \$200 million state-of-the-art facility will manage more than 1,750 tons of residential waste per day from eastern Queens. North Shore MTS is one of the cornerstones of the City's comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP), and it is the first of four converted marine transfer stations that will open over the next three years. Like at the Staten Island Transfer Station, DSNY employees will load waste into sealed shipping

containers, which will be transported by barge and rail by our contractor, Covanta, for final disposal at energy-from-waste facilities in Pennsylvania and Upstate New York. I would like to thank Deputy Director of Solid Waste Management Operations **Thomas Killeen**, Director of the Bureau of Building Maintenance **Neil Gallaher**, and all of the Department staff who worked tirelessly over the past several months to prepare the facility for opening day. DSNY continues to construct the other three MTSs at East 91st Street, Hamilton Avenue and Southwest Brooklyn, which together with the construction of rail access at the Review Avenue Transfer Station will complete the implementation of the SWMP. The Department, along with the Department of Design and Construction, also recently began the design process for the Gansevoort MTS, which will accept recyclable material for transport to Sims and Pratt.

Also this month, the rules enforcing the State electronic waste disposal ban and illegal clothing bin law take effect, allowing the Department to begin enforcing both rules and issue violations. The City Council passed the clothing bin bill last November, and the law authorizes the Department to immediately
