



SIR.—Pursuant to section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department, for the three months ending March 31, 1877:

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The number of lodgings furnished by the "Refugee," corner Avenue D and Tenth street, for the quarter ending March 31, 1877, was 25,964. This number, added to those furnished at the several stations, makes a total of 53,985, a decrease from the corresponding quarter last year of 24,803. This large difference would seem to indicate that indigency has decreased correspondingly, and that poverty and its consequent suffering has been much less than is generally supposed. But it is believed that a vigorous enforcement of the laws against vagrancy has had the effect to deter the habitual lodger from applying for lodgings more than once at the same station. Many tramps have been forced to leave the city by reason of this enforcement, and in order to evade the arrest almost certain to follow repeated applications for lodging.

The number of arrests for vagrancy during the quarter covered by this report, was 1,123. For the corresponding quarter last year, 548, an increase of 575.

SIXTH PRECINCT.

On the 26th day of January, 1877, the Board of Police, by resolution, abolished the Sixth Precinct, dividing its territory, as follows: So much of the Sixth Precinct situated south of the centre line of Worth street was assigned to the Fourth Precinct; and the portion of said Precinct situated north of the centre line of Worth street, was assigned to the Fourteenth Precinct.

This measure was deemed wise because of the dilapidated and dangerous condition of the Sixth Precinct Station-house, and as one of prudence and economy.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the twenty-fourth day of April, 1877, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets, inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and 6 o'clock A.M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to Second avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and 6 o'clock A.M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street, through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-houses, upon the express condition, however, that the cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after 5 o'clock A.M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet, and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of any of the foregoing conditions.

7th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases, with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits to drive animals on other routes than those herein designated.
