THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

During the three months ending September 30, 1880, eight thousand five hundred and seventythree (8,573) permits were granted for burials. During the same period four hundred and eighte-(418) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and eightyone (581) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and thirty (930) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded ; five hundred and seventy-four (574) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and three hundred and thirty.six (336)transcripts of the records of deaths, seventy-five (75) of marriages, and forty (40) of births from said records were issued. There were three thousand nine hundred and fifty (3,050) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand one hundred and eighty-three (7,183)children were born during the same period.

If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is com-menced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.
