

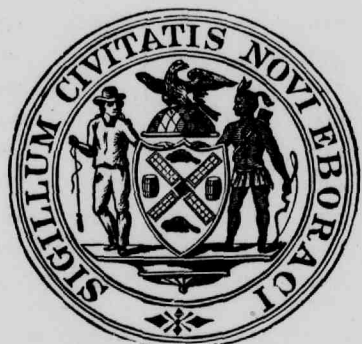

THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 22,210; the number of causes of complaint was 8,363; as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,200, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,306 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,975 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 80 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 254 permits to transport manure; and 18 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending September 30, 1880, eight thousand five hundred and seventy-three (8,573) permits were granted for burials. During the same period four hundred and eighteen (418) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and eighty-one (581) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and thirty (930) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; five hundred and seventy-four (574) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and three hundred and thirty-six (336) transcripts of the records of deaths, seventy-five (75) of marriages, and forty (40) of births from said records were issued. There were three thousand nine hundred and fifty (3,950) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand one hundred and eighty-three (7,183) children were born during the same period.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, 1880, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,904; these notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
