The Hons. Seth Low, Mayor; George L. Kives, Corporation Counsel, and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, met this day.

The Comptroller presented the following report from Duncan MacInnes, Expert Accountant, Department of Finance, in reference to certain books required for the use of the Bureau of City Revenue and Markets for the year 1902.

DECEMBER 31, 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—On November 29, 1901, Mr. Butler, Supervisor of the City Record, placed an order with the "Martin B. Brown Company, printers and stationers, Nos. 49 to 57 Park place, New York City," on an estimate said to have been received by him from said company, proffering to furnish for the use of the Bureau of City Revenue and Markets certain supplies consisting of:

- 124 lithographed market stand rent receipt books;
- 40 lithographed (miscellaneous) receipt books;
- 400 lithographed market wagon fee ticket books;
- 1 lithographed market stand permit book;

—and certain other specially ruled books for office use, such as cash books, registers, etc.

The said supplies were and are required by the City Revenue Bureau, beginning with the first week in January, 1902, hence the reason of the order having been placed during November, as heretofore stated.

The Martin B. Brown Company were furnished with samples of the various receipts, forms, etc., that were to be furnished by them, all the text on which was to be lithographed from the stone superimposed on a lithographed safety tint base. Proofs of the market stand rent receipt, miscellaneous receipts, and market wagon ticket were furnished on Friday and Saturday, respectively, the 27th and 28th instant, and in each case the work consists of the text thereon being printed from type (not lithographed as required by order), on a photo-lithograph or lithograph-tint base.

The contract requirements have been violated in the most essential features, and the protection against successful imitation or false duplication of these receipts and tickets would be greatly impaired, if not altogether destroyed, by the acceptance of such work as has been indicated in the proofs submitted by the Martin B. Brown Company.

The other bidder for this work was The Franklin-Lee Bank Note Co., who furnished the lithographed receipt books and tickets used by the City Revenue Bureau during the year 1900.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, COMMISSIONERS of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to all persons interested in this proceeding, and to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of all houses and lots and improved and unimproved lands affected thereby, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—That we have completed our estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, Nos. 92 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on or before the 17th day of January, 1902, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 19th day of January, 1902, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 92 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said city, there to remain until the 21st day of January, 1902.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Lind avenue, and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; running thence northerly along said parallel line and its continuation northwesterly, parallel to and at same distance southwestwardly from East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street to its intersection with the southwestwardly prolongation of a line drawn parallel to the northerly side of Lind avenue and distant 100 feet northwesterly therefrom; thence northeasterly along said southwestwardly prolongation and parallel line and its continuation northwesterly parallel to and at same distance northwesterly from the northerly side of Aqueduct avenue to the southwestwardly boundary line of the public place on the southwestwardly side of Undercliff place; thence southeasterly along said southwestwardly boundary line and its prolongation southeasterly along the southwestwardly boundary line of the public place at the junction of Aqueduct avenue and Bosobel avenue to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of Ogden avenue and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; thence southerly along said parallel line to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street; thence westerly and northwesterly along the northerly and northeasterly sides of East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Ogden avenue and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; thence northerly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; thence westerly along said parallel line to the point or place of beginning, as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of The Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York; excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads, or portions thereof heretofore legally opened, as such area is shown upon the benefit maps deposited as aforesaid.
