THE CITY OF NEW YORK, April 4, 1904.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 o'clock P. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Printed copies of the minutes of the meeting held February 25, 1904, were presented and adopted.

Mr. Marsh, representing the Comptroller, was present, and, in response to advertisement in the CITY RECORD, of date March 18, 1904, bids and proposals were received for alterations and repairs to several of the armories of the N. G., N. Y., in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, as follows:

On motion of General McLeer, the bids were referred to the Secretary for tabulation and report.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by that body at a meeting held February 29, 1904, as follows:

(1) Authorizing renewal of lease of Lenox Lyceum, for use of Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y.

(2) Concurring in resolution of the Armory Board relative to work necessary in removing violations placed on certain armories and authorizing the issue of \$12,000 Corporate Stock to pay for the same.

(3) Concurring in the resolution of the Armory Board relative to bill of Clinton & Russell, architects, amounting to \$525, and authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock to pay for the same.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from John C. Shaw, attorney for Courtland Palmer Estate, in relation to party wall on the site for the proposed armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., as well as an opinion from the Corporation Counsel on the same subject.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from W. R. Jeffers, of date March 29, 1904, renewing the offer to sell the premises on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street and Franklin avenue for an armory site.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx. Notice of a violation filed against the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, of date February 29, 1904, transmitted by Colonel Bartlett.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized and directed to have the electrical installation in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory repaired and improved, so as to remove the violation of the rules of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, at an expense not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200), and that the expense necessary be charged to the appropriation "Care and Maintenance of Armories, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx—Repairs and Supplies, Contingencies," for the year 1904.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from John J. W. Stone, of date February 29, 1904, offering for sale, as an armory site, property situated on One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, extending from Grant to Sherman avenue; also one from William S. Kane, of date March 18, 1904, offering for sale as an armory site, property on One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, extending from Mape to Marmion avenue.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Secretary presented an application and affidavit for a payment to Kelly & Kelley, contractors, in the sum of \$2,502.40, on account of their contract for grading the plot for the proposed armory building for Troop C, N. G., N. Y., and the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay Messrs. Kelly & Kelley, contractors, the sum of two thousand five hundred and two dollars and forty cents (\$2,502.40), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for materials and work required in grading the plot for Troop C Armory, on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application and affidavit for a payment to the Fleischmann Realty and Construction Company, in the sum of \$74,800, on account of their contract for the erection and completion of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory building; and the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to the Fleischmann Realty and Construction Company the sum of seventy-four thousand eight hundred dollars (\$74,800), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the erection and completion of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, on Thirty-fourth street and Park avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for payment to Peter J. Ryan in the sum of \$788, for alterations to Armorer's quarters in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory; and the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Peter J. Ryan, contractor, the sum of seven hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$788), as per accompanying voucher, in full, for materials and work furnished in alterations to Armorer's quarters in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for payment by Clinton & Russell in the sum of \$33 for professional services in preparing plans and specifications, and superintendence of alteration to Lexington avenue doorway of the Seventh Regiment Armory, Borough of Manhattan; and the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense of Clinton & Russell, architects, amounting to thirty-three dollars (\$33), in full, as per accompanying voucher, for professional services rendered in preparing plans and specifications, and the necessary supervision, in the alterations to the doorway of the Seventh Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for payment, by Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, architects, in the sum of \$163.49, on account of their contract for plans and specifications and the supervision of the erection of an armory building for Troop C, N. G., N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, architects, the sum of one hundred and sixty-three dollars and forty-nine cents (\$163.9), as per accompanying voucher, on account, for their contract for materials and work required in the preparation of plans and specifications, and the supervision of the erection of an armory building for Troop C, N. G., N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented a communication from John Pullman, of date March 23, 1904, relative to renewal of the lease of the premises now occupied by the Second Battalion, Naval Militia, as headquarters.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to renew the lease of the premises known as No. 255 Sixth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the purposes of headquarters for the Second Battalion, Naval Militia, for the term of one year, beginning May 1, 1904; the other terms and conditions to be similar to the lease expiring at that time, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

At the request of the Secretary, the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to renew the lease of the room on the street floor of the Stewart Building, containing 426 square feet, and known as Room "L," for the use of the Armory Board for the term of one year, beginning May 1, 1904, the other terms and conditions to be similar to the lease expiring at that time, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, of date March 23, 1904; also, a communication from the Corporation Counsel, of date March 16, 1904, relative to the exclusive use of the pier and lands under water on the New York bay, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the Second Battalion Naval Militia.

Ordered filed.

The Secretary stated that, in view of the difference of opinion in reference to the charge of Messrs. Werner & Windolph, architects, for professional services in preparing plans, etc., for the work on various armories, he has hesitated about giving an order to them for the necessary plans and specifications for additional work required to remove other violations placed on several armories, and which was authorized by a resolution of the Armory Board at a meeting held February 15, 1904, and requested more definite instructions.

On motion of the Mayor, the matter was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen, for examination and report.

The Secretary reported the execution, since the date of the previous meeting, of the following contracts:

March 9, 1904—William Farrell & Son, for furnishing and delivering coal to armories in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.
March 9, 1904—Bacon & Co., for furnishing and delivering coal to the armories in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary requested certain transfers, to balance accounts of the Armory Board for 1903.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the several sums hereinafter named from the appropriations made to the Armory Board for the year 1903, entitled "Care and Maintenance of Armories—Repairs and Supplies."

THE CITY OF NEW YORK, April 11, 1904.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 2 o'clock P. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessment, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Copies of the minutes of the meeting of April 4, 1904, were presented and adopted.

The Secretary reported a tabulation of the bids for alterations and repairs to several armories, received at the last meeting, and stated:

That as to Item No. 1, the bid of Hahn & O'Reilly, No. 3311 Third avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for \$1,250, was the lowest; that the bid was formal and recommended awarding the contract to them.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bid of Messrs. Hahn & O'Reilly, No. 3311 Third avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for repairs and alterations to the Eighth Regiment Armory, Item No. 1, amounting to the sum of twelve hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,250), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work; that the same be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract in behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected and the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Y., in the Borough of The Bronx (Item No. 5), for ten hundred and seventy-four dollars (\$1,074), be accepted as being the lowest formal bid for said work; that the same be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected and the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

As to Item No. 6, the bid of T. Frederick Jackson, No. 592 Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for two hundred and seventy-four dollars (\$274), for alterations and repairs to the Thirteenth Regiment Armory, was the lowest; that the bid was formal, and recommended that the contract be awarded to him.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bid of T. Frederick Jackson, No. 592 Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for alterations and repairs to the Thirteenth Regiment Armory, Item No. 6 (electrical work), amounting to the sum of two hundred and seventy-four dollars (\$274), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work; that all the other bids be rejected and the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

As to Item No. 8, the lowest bid was that of James Halpin, No. 936 DeKalb avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for \$490; that the bid was formal and recommended that the contract be awarded to him.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bid of James Halpin, No. 936 DeKalb avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for alterations and repairs to the Twenty-third Regiment Armory, Item No. 8 (Leaders), amounting to the sum of four hundred and ninety dollars (\$490), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work; that all the other bids be rejected and the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

As to Item No. 9, that the bid of Peet, McAnerney & Powers, No. 255 Fourth avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for \$16,694 was the lowest; that the bid was formal, and recommended that the contract be awarded to them.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bid of Peet, McAnerney & Powers, No. 255 Fourth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the complete installation of a power plant in the Twenty-third Regiment Armory (Item No. 9), amounting to the sum of sixteen thousand six hundred and ninety-four dollars (\$16,694), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work; that the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence, and to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected and the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

A communication was received from Captain Oscar Erlandsen, commanding the First Signal Corps, N. G. N. Y., requesting the renewal of the lease of the premises at Seventh avenue and Fifty-ninth street, as an armory for his organization.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to renew the lease of the premises Nos. 926 and 928 Seventh avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, known as the "Central Park Riding Academy," for quarters and accommodation for the First Signal Corps, N. G. N. Y., for the term of one year, beginning May 1, 1904, the other terms and conditions to be similar to the lease expiring at that time, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Commander Forschew, of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, presented an application based upon a recent amendment to section 142 of the Military Code (known as Assembly Bill No. 50), to have the necessary water front between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, west of First avenue, set aside for the use of the Second Battalion Naval Militia. The Secretary reported that the Dock Department opened bids on April 8 for paying the filled-in land along the northerly half of Fifty-second street, west of First avenue, on the site of the proposed armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, and that upon a request of this Board had deferred awarding such bids.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens. The Secretary presented an application from Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, the architects for the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory, of date April 5, relative to the substitution of certain foundation walls below grade, together with a resolution.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the substitution on certain foundation walls of the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, below grade, rubble stone masonry, increased in dimension as called for by the Building Law, for the brick foundation walls shown on plans, be consented to; in consideration therefor the contractors are to use throughout the building a more expensive grade of cement than the grades provided for in the specifications; and also provided that the architects certify that such change will make an equally good construction, and is advantageous to the City.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Mr. Litchfield, representing Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects, presented a communication, dated April 11, respecting the employment of consulting engineers on the armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion of the Mayor, it was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The President of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the question of employment of architects, to remove violations on armories, reported that Messrs. Parfitt Brothers, No. 26 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, had offered to do this work for five per cent. of the cost; and offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to employ Messrs. Parfitt Brothers, No. 26 Court street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, to prepare plans and specifications and superintend the work of removing violations placed on armories, together with the additional gates, lanterns and storm-doors required in placing fire-escapes, and completing the work now in progress on the armories of Squadron "A," Eighth, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third Regiments and the Seventeenth Separate Company, in accordance with the resolution of the Armory Board at a meeting held February 15, 1904, appropriating \$12,000 for the same; at a compensation of five per cent. of the cost of the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from George Gray, No. 649 Fulton street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, of date April 9, relative to installing lights in the Thirteenth Regiment Armory.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary reported the immediate need of an Inspector for Armories now under construction.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That an Inspector be appointed at a salary of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per annum, subject to the recommendation of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Brigadier-General George Moore Smith offered the following preambles and resolution:

Whereas, The report of the Committee on the selection of a site in the Borough of The Bronx, for an armory for the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y., located on Franklin avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-sixth and One Hundred and Sixty-seventh streets, being 202.26 feet on One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street and 300.02 on Franklin avenue, with an exception of 29 feet by 120.71 feet, was received and adopted at a meeting held January 21, 1903; and

Whereas, The owners of the premises, by communication of date March 29, 1904, have renewed their offer to sell this plot for the sum of \$85,000, be it

Resolved, That this Board does hereby select said site beginning at a point at the junction of the easterly side of Franklin avenue with the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, running in a northeasterly direction, distance 301.52 on the easterly side of Franklin avenue; thence running in a southeasterly direction and parallel with East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, along the adjoining property lines, distance 202.63 feet; thence in a southwesterly direction, parallel with Boston road, distance 57.5 feet; thence in a southeasterly direction, parallel with East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, distance 29 feet; thence in a southwesterly direction, parallel with Boston road, distance 121.42; thence in a northwesterly direction parallel with One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, distance 29 feet; thence in a southwesterly direction, parallel with Boston road, distance 120.32 feet; thence in a northwesterly direction along the northerly side of East One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, distance 202.27 to the point or place of beginning, for an armory for the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y., and that the Secretary be directed to transmit this resolution, together with the survey map or plan, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A motion to adjourn was adopted.

 No proposal will be received or considered which is not accompanied by such deposit.
 All such deposits shall be returned by the Comptroller to the persons making the same within three days after the decision has been rendered as to who is or are the highest bidder or bidders, except the deposit made by the highest bidder or bidders.
- If said highest bidder or bidders shall refuse or neglect, within five days after service of written notice of the award to him or them, to pay to the City Chamberlain the amount of the stocks or bonds awarded to him or them at their par value, together with the premium thereon, less the amount deposited by him or them, the amount or amounts of deposit thus made shall be forfeited to and retained by said City as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal, and shall thereafter be paid into the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt.
- Upon the payment into the City Treasury by the persons whose bids are accepted of the amounts due for the stock or bonds awarded to them, respectively, certificates thereof shall be issued to them in such denominations provided for by the Charter as they may desire.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
 Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
 Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
