Dear Sir—The following transcript is taken from Volume II., 1904, pages 1591, 1592 and 1593, Minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"August 2, 1904.

"The President of the Borough of Queens presented the following communications from the United States District Attorney and the Acting Corporation Counsel, also resolution of the Board of Aldermen relative to an appropriation of \$5,000 special revenue bonds for the cost and expense of dredging Flushing Creek in the vicinity of Jones' coal dock, in the Third Ward, Borough of Queens:

"'Office of the United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York, \
"'Brooklyn, N. Y., March 22, 1904.

"Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

"'Sir-Complaint has been made to me by the War Department that there are certain deposits in Flushing Creek, made from a sewer maintained by the Third Ward, Borough of Queens, and emptying into Flushing Creek, near or at the lower end of a dock occupied by Messrs. D. S. Jones & Co., and C. W. Copp, which deposits are illegal and in violation of section 13 of the River and Harbor Act approved March 3, 1899. I have been requested to institute proceedings against the proper authorities of The City of New York, as provided in sections 16 and 17 of the said River and Harbor Act, but before taking any steps, I deem it but courteous to bring this matter to your attention, in order that, if possible, unnecessary litigation may be avoided.

"Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

"Sir—I am in receipt of a communication signed by G. T. Goldthwaite, Assistant Secretary, dated the 24th of March, 1904, inclosing a communication from W. J. Young, Esq., United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York, referring to certain deposits in Flushing Creek, Third Ward, Borough of Queens, made by a sewer emptying into Flushing Creek, at or near the lower end of a dock occupied by D. S. Jones & Co., and C. W. Copp.

"In answer, I beg to say that I am informed by the Deputy Sewer Commissioner of the Borough of Queens, that this sewer is a main sewer of the former Village of Flushing, and was constructed and in operation for a considerable period of time, in fact, some years before the construction of the dock, access to which it is claimed is impeded by the deposits from this sewer. It is claimed that the sewer has been in operation for over twenty years, and it is but recently that the amount of deposit therefrom has become in any wise a hindrance to navigation. For the purposes of this communication it is assumed that Flushing Creek is a navigable water. Vessels of considerable tonnage ply its waters at the higher stages of the tide for a distance of one or two miles above the point at which the sewer empties. The creek is the natural outlet for the flow of surface waters and drainage waters from the height of land upon which the Village of Flushing is located and is the natural depositary and only accessible natural depositary for the sewage of that place. Its waters empty into the tide waters of Flushing Bay, of which it is a tributary.

"So much of the United States laws as apply to this matter is found in section 13 of the River and Harbor Act, approved March 3, 1899, which reads in sub-

stance as follows:

"Section 13, That it shall not be lawful to throw, discharge or deposit, or cause, suffer or procure to be thrown, discharged or deposited from or out of any ship, barge, or other floating craft of any kind, or from the shore, walk, manufacturing establishment, or mill of any kind, any refuse matter of any kind or description whatever, other than that flowing from streets or sewers and passing therefrom in a liquid state, into any navigable waters of the United States, * * *

"'Section 16 provides that "a violation of the provisions of section 13 shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$2,500, or in the case of a natural person by imprisonment for not less than thirty days nor more

than one year, or by both fine and imprisonment."

"Undoubtedly from its context this act was passed to prevent the discharge of ashes, garbage, or other like materials into the waters of navigable rivers and harbors. In its language, however, it is capable of a construction similar to that claimed for it by the learned United States Attorney.

"'It may be said that its language does not forbid the emptying into such waters of the refuse from a sewer, so long as such refuse 'passes therefrom in a liquid state,' but it is evident that if such refuse held in solution in the liquid sewage is after its discharge the cause of the formation of a bar or obstruction to navigation, the statute applies.

"The City has no more right than a natural person to create or maintain a nuisance, and is liable for injuries occasioned thereby in any case where a private person would be liable under like circumstances.

"'Harper vs. Milwaukee, 30 Wise., 365.

"In my opinion if the deposits from this sewer have obstructed navigation the City is liable and should abate the nuisance. The trend of authorities and decisions

is along this line.

"'Although a municipality having the power to construct drains and sewers may lawfully cause them to be built so as to discharge their refuse matter into the sea or natural stream of water, yet this right must be so exercised as not to create a nuisance, public or private.

"'Dillon on Mun. Corp., 4th ed., vol. 2, sec. 1047.

"In Franklin Wharf Company vs. Portland, 67 Me., 46, Dickerson, J., treats the public right of navigation as paramount to the right of sewerage, recognizes both the wharf and the sewer as lawful and authorized structures, and concludes by holding that the City, under the statute empowering it to construct sewers, "has the right to construct their opening into the public docks and to use them in a reasonable manner for conducting and depositing therein refuse matters and impurities; but it is its duty to cause such docks to be cleared of such deposits whenever they become an obstruction to navigation or injurious to the public health."

"In Richardson vs. Boston, 19 How. (U. S.), 270, it was held that the City was liable for a drain at end of wharf. "The public right of navigation is not limited at common law by any private or municipal right of sewerage."

'Gould on Waters, p. 177.

"'I therefore advise that the City remove the deposits, if any exist, that form an obstruction to navigation.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested, in pursuance to the provisions of subdivision 8, of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), the proceeds thereof to be applied to the cost and expense of dredging Flushing Creek, in the vicinity of Jones' coal dock, Third Ward, Borough of Queens, in accordance with complaint of the Secretary of War.

"Unanimously adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 26, 1904, three-fourths

of all the members elected voting in favor thereof. "Approved by the Mayor, August 2, 1904.

"The following resolution was offered:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and concurs in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted July 26, 1904, and approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, in relation to the expenditure of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), for the cost and expense of dredging Flushing Creek, in the vicinity of Jones' coal dock, Third Ward, Borough of Queens, in accordance with a complaint from the Secretary of War and for the purpose of providing means therefor, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York, to the amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the years succeeding the year of their issue.

"Which was adopted by the following vote:

"Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens, the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn—16."

There remains an unexpended balance of this authorization of three thousand and thirty dollars (\$3,030), which we are desirous of expending for the purpose of remedying complaints received from residents of College Point as to a nuisance existing in the neighborhood of the outlet of the Fifth avenue 5-foot circular sewer. College Point, Third Ward, Borough of Queens.

The Engineer of Sewers proposes to remedy this condition by excavating a channel 5 feet deep, 50 feet wide and 400 feet long, beginning at the face of Kraemer Brothers' dock and extending to the channel east of the breakwater. His estimates are that it will require the removal of about 4,000 cubic vards of material, which will have to be loaded into scows, towed out to sea and dumped as provided for in the Federal statutes at an estimated cost of about three thousand dollars.

To that end, application is hereby made for a supplementary authorization of your Honorable Board to expend the balance of this authorization and to amend the original authorization to read: "Cost and expense of dredging Flushing Bay, in the neighborhood of the outlet of the Fifth avenue sewer, College Point."

Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, First Avenue and Twenty-sixth Street,

New York, May 20, 1910. Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City: Gentlemen-The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals begs to apply for an issue of revenue bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of fifty thousand

four hundred dollars (\$50,400), as follows: 207. Forage, Shoeing, Boarding Horses..... 6,000 00 Contingencies

The sum appropriated in the Budget for these items is insufficient. Submitted herewith is a schedule showing how the above figures have been obtained.

In preparing the departmental estimate for 1910 the amounts required for that year were based on the actual expenses for the first six months of the year 1909, as reflected by the expense ledger with what was considered a very conservative addition. It appears that our estimate was too conservative. Despite this, thirteen thousand and twenty-five dollars (\$13,025) were deducted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from our estimate No. 199, General Supplies, and the Budget allowance for the year 1910 for General Supplies was only nine thousand five hundred and thirty-five dollars and thirty cents (\$9,535.30) more than for the year 1909. The amounts estimated for 1910, figured at the 1910 price, show an increase of

thirty-six thousand nine hundred and thirty-four dollars and thirty-one cents (\$36,934.31) over that of the same amounts figured at 1909 price. Deducting from this the increased Budget allowance of nine thousand five hundred and thirty-five dollars and thirty cents (\$9,535.30), we have twenty-seven thousand three hundred and ninety-nine dollars and one cent (\$27,399.01) accounted for by increased prices alone. A schedule is submitted herewith showing in detail a comparison of the articles on contract chargeable to the General Supply appropriation for this year. calculated at both the 1909 and 1910 prices, showing the difference of thirty-six thousand nine hundred and thirty-four dollars and thirty-one cents (\$36,934.31), mentioned above. Of course, the increase in prices for 1910 is something that could not be gauged six months prior to the year.

It also appears that we were too conservative in estimating the amounts of articles required, and that it will be necessary to advertise additional contracts for the balance of 1910 to the extent of thirteen thousand five hundred and forty-two change the method of operation of about 116 fireproof kalameine iron doors indollars and eighty cents (\$13,542.80). The reason for this is that it is impossible to stalled throughout the college buildings, and as this item of expense, amounting to

gauge exactly the amounts required from one year to another, as the needs of the institutions vary considerably from year to year; furthermore, up to the time of the preparation of these figures the total daily census for 1910 shows an increase of 107 individuals over that of 1909. In other words, the Department has furnished care and maintenance for 107 more people daily.

In estimating the amount required for Contingencies, nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900) was estimated to cover the cost of special nursing where it was necessary to employ graduate special Nurses to care for isolated contagious cases, patients in extremis, sick doctors and sick nurses. This is a matter which could not be gauged with any accuracy and could only be estimated on the record of 1909. The actual cost for the first three months of 1910 was two thousand and sixty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.062.50), which is in excess of that allowed for the entire year. At this rate it is estimated that six thousand dollars (\$6,000) additional in Contingencies with which to meet the charges for special nursing will be necessary for the balance of the year.

Now, by adding the amounts represented by the increased cost of supplies, as mentioned above, twenty-seven thousand three hundred and ninety-nine dollars and one cent (\$27,399.01), the amount estimated to be needed for additional contracts; thirteen thousand five hundred and forty-two dollars (\$13,542), and the six thousand dollars (\$6,000) required for Contingencies, we account for forty-six thousand nine hundred and forty-one dollars and one cent (\$46,941.01) out of the fifty thousand four hundred dollars (\$50,400) requested. The balance of thirty-four hundred and tifty-eight dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$3,458.99) is easily accounted for under open market orders, there being an increase in the open market orders for the same reason that there is an increase in the contracts, due in the first place to the fact that our estimate was very conservative, to the fact that we are caring for an increased number and to increased prices for practically all articles of supplies.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, Borough Hall, New Brighton, May 18, 1910.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City: Gentlemen-Pursuant to a request which I made to you on February 4, you passed a resolution authorizing the purchase of coal for use in the various Bureaus of my office without public letting to the amount of \$3,000. This request was granted upon my explanation that we had no facilities for the general storage of a quantity of coal and that a great deal of our coal is used at various points, making it more economical to purchase, when required, from points near the work being done at the time with consequent short hauls, rather than the making of a general contract, on account of which deliveries would be called for wherever and whenever required. Our experience has proven that bids submitted for such contracts always carry high

prices. The statement was made in the letter above referred to, that for the use of the Borough Hall or other public buildings, our coal would be purchased by contract. The \$3,000 asked for was principally to cover coal used for other incidental pur poses, such as steam roller use and the heating of portable field offices, etc.

In pursuance of the intention expressed in that letter, bids were advertised for with a view to securing coal for the heating of the public buildings, but owing to new specifications which had been prepared no coal dealers put in bids. Being in immediate need of coal for the boilers of the Borough Hall, about 200 tons were purchased on order at once. This, in addition to the necessary small amounts of coal that have been purchased from time to time for the use of steam rollers, etc., has caused the \$3,000 authorized to be exhausted. It, therefore, becomes necessary for me to request that a resolution be passed authorizing the purchase of an additional \$2,000 worth of coal, without public letting, making in all coal to the amount of \$5,000 authorized for my office for the year 1910.

As soon as storage capacity is available, another attempt will be made to secure bids upon contract.

Sir-The Budget appropriation for this Department for the current year allows under the heading "Bureau of Superintendence, Special Contract Obligations, Item No. 164, Music," \$34,344.

The Department maintains nine recreation structures located at the foot of Albany street. North River, at the foot of Barrow street, North River, at the foot of West Fiftieth street, North River, at the foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street. North River, at the foot of Market street, East River, at the foot of East Third street, East River, at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, East River, at the foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem River, and at the foot of

Metropolitan avenue, East River, Borough of Brooklyn, Heretofore bands have been maintained on all of the structures each night throughout the entire Recreation Pier season. On the larger piers, namely, at the foot of Barrow street, West Fiftieth street, East Twenty-fourth street, mineteen men and leader are necessary; fourteen men and leader being sufficient for the remaining piers, these being the same assignments as have been in force in former years.

In the Budget appropriations for this year a reduction was made in the amount allowed for music on the piers, and with the amount available, as noted above, \$34.344. arrangements cannot be made for daily programs, and two or three days of each week on each of the piers would not be provided for.

Recognizing the good that these Recreation Piers do for the public during the summer season, I am anxious to provide music each night on all of the piers, and to do this it will be necessary to have one additional band of nineteen men and leader, and two additional bands of fourteen men and leader to each band. The cost of these three additional bands would amount to \$16,695, at the rate of \$3 per night for each player, and \$6 per night for each leader.

I respectfully request that pursuant to provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, a resolution be adopted by you requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$16,695, for the purposes stated, namely, to meet the cost of employing the three additional bands.

Dear Sir-Your attention is called to the necessity of keeping accurate records of all subsurface constructions. The Bronx is growing so rapidly and sewers, gas mains, water mains and conduits for telephone, telegraph and electric light and power lines are being constructed in such large numbers, that unless the work of preparing accurate maps is taken up at once, the opportunity will be lost.

The importance of such records can hardly be over-estimated. The location, size and character of all existing subsurface work should be determined as soon as possible, in order that new work may be properly located, that street openings for connections may be as small and as few as possible, that corporations and contractors doing work in the streets may have accurate information as to the conditions which they may expect to find, and, in general, that the City may be in a position to know what subsurface structures have been built, when, and by whom, and may direct where new structures may be built to the best advantage.

Work of this character is being done with success elsewhere, notably in Brooklyn, Philadelphia and Boston. In Brooklyn the Bureau has been in satisfactory operation for three or four years. In Philadelphia a large force is kept busy making and maintaining the records. The information is sold to interested parties, and the revenue derived from that source is sufficient not only to support the Bureau, but also to return a very considerable profit.

It is believed that such a system could be devised for this Borough, and that the Bureau could be operated without cost to the City. In order to properly inaugurate this work and to secure the locations, etc., of all existing structures, it will be necessary to immediately organize a force whose entire time would be devoted to the work. An approximate estimate of the annual cost is as follows

The necessity for the immediate organization of a bureau of this sort cannot be too strongly urged. Delay would not only increase the expense of gathering information relating to existing work, but would postpone the enjoyment of the advantages which such a bureau would bring.

Four months of 1910 being past, the estimate for carrying on the work for the remaining eight months of the present year, on the above basis, would be \$9,000, and request is hereby made that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen asking the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds for the purpose described to the amount of \$9,000.

Dear Sir-There are required by the Department, for the proper supervision of its works, seven (7) automobiles. These machines will be used principally by the Engineers. The Department is responsible for the correct administration of a territory of about 850 square miles, and the only means of transportation over a large section of this area is by horses and wagons.

To illustrate the necessity for these cars, I might mention the fact that on Long Island the Engineer who will be in charge of the pumping stations is required to visit about thirty (30) pumping stations located from Ridgewood to Massapequa, a distance of about twenty-three miles. This Engineer has to depend on train service, and considerable delay is often caused in making connections.

One of the machines will also be used by the Superintendent of Ponds and Con-

duits, his duty requiring visits to all of the streams and ponds. On the Croton watershed there is a considerable stretch of the City's property which must be inspected daily by the Engineer and his Assistants. The means of transportation across country is limited, and it is often necessary for the Engineer to go down on the Harlem Railroad and come up on the Hudson River Railroad in order

to visit the works under his charge. One of the cars will be used by the Deputy Commissioner and myself and will

replace an old car which is now of little service.

Six (6) of the automobiles which are credited to the Department I propose to

sell at public auction.

I believe the Board recognizes that it is impracticable, if not impossible, to pre pare specifications and contracts for the purchase of automobiles. Each part of these machines is covered by patents or special designs, I believe, and in the selection of any design one concern would naturally be favored and the Department could not consistently ask for competitive bids. I am satisfied that it would be a clear evasion of section 419 of the Charter which provides that there should be free competition for the furnishing of supplies where the expense will exceed \$1,000.

To avoid these complications, I would respectfully ask the Board's consideration to grant the necessary authority to purchase these machines without advertising for competitive bids or proposals.

Dear Sir-At the closing meeting of the Board of Aldermen, last year, a resolution was passed, authorizing the Commissioner of this Department to purchase on open orders two hundred and twenty-five high pressure hydrants from the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company. The resolution, however, failed to receive the approval of the former Mayor.

It is a matter of much importance to the Department that the hydrants for the system be of a standard pattern and, as the hydrants manufactured by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company are the only ones which stood the test prescribed in the original contract for the furnishing of hydrants, I beg to renew the application for authority to expend the sum of \$24,412.50 for the purchase of these hydrants without the formality of advertising for competitive bids.

On several occasions the Department has obtained authority from the Board of Aldermen to purchase, on open orders, the hydrants of this pattern. Contracts have already been awarded for the furnishing, delivering and laying of water mains in the new districts to which the high pressure service will be extended. No other part of the high pressure system deserved or has received more attention from the Engineering Bureau than the proper selection of a hydrant well adapted for the extraordinarily severe service for which it is intended, and on the unfailing record of which the efficiency of the whole system depends. Under the trying conditions of operation the requirements in this case are necessarily much more exacting than in that of the common and much simpler hydrant in use on our distribution system, and can only be made by high technical skill in the design and excellence of its material and work-

On the Department's invitation for bids for a suitable hydrant for this service in November, 1904, five (5) of the leading manufacturers submitted hydrants for test and the only hydrant to comply with all the requirements was the one submitted by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company. The contract was not awarded until June 27,

1905. This delay was due, principally, to the claim made by several of the unsuccess-

one which successfully passed the test. An injunction was issued, restraining the Commissioner from awarding the contract to the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, and two years elapsed before the final decision of the court.

Taking these facts into consideration, as well as the obvious advantage of uniformity in hydrants, and the agreement by the company to furnish these hydrants at the same rate which governed their bid which was submitted in competitive bidding, I would respectfully ask authority from the Board of Aldermen to purchase these hydrants on open order.

Whereas, Patrolmen are appointed in the seventh grade at a salary of \$800 a year In five years they reach the first grade and a salary of \$1,400. The compulsory expenditures for the first year total not less than \$140, leaving a net average of \$12.66 per week. Even this sum is still further greatly reduced by compulsory living expenses, such as two and sometimes three meals a day, imposed upon the new Patrolmen

by being assigned to duty in precincts away from home; and Whereas, The Municipal Civil Service Commission several months ago was compelled to advertise throughout the State for applicants for the position of Patrolman. The salary offered was \$800, yet those who accepted quickly found themselves undeceived when they came to pay some \$40 for a winter overcoat and trousers, \$30 for a summer blouse, dress coat and trousers, \$12 for a regulation revolver, \$2.50 for a summer helmet, nearly \$2 for a winter cap, \$1.50 for a rubber hood for cap, plus some \$15 for incidentals, such as clubs, whistle, rubber coat, handcuffs, etc. These figures provide for his equipment and place him on the street. There are other taxes, however, such as the purchase of bedding, linen, etc., for his use in the station house, the tax for bootblack and tax for bedmaker. Last, but not least, there is the 2 per cent. tax imposed upon him by the Charter as his contribution to the pension fund; and

Whereas, It has been found that the small pay and enormous expenses, which are out of all proportion to the total income of the first year, has resulted in an almost complete dearth of applicants at the offices of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. Since the first of the year when a new examination was announced only 390 applications have been filed. The present eligible list is practically exhausted and the current examination will not provide for enough men to round out the year. Therefore, unless something is done to make the conditions of the new Patrolman more attractive The City of New York will find itself without eligibles; and

Whereas, much that has been said of the new Patrolman can be said of the new Fireman. He is offered a salary of \$800 for the first year, and when appointed runs into an immediate expense of not less than \$100 for his uniform and equipment. He quested to place lights on Augusta place, the number of lights to be left to the disalso finds deducted from his pay about \$20 during the year for compulsory life in- cretion of the Inspector. surance. In addition to this there is the house tax, which runs from \$2.50 to \$3 a

month, and makes his total compulsory deductions \$156, thus leaving him a balance of \$644, or an average of about \$12.40 a week; and

Whereas, The new Fireman is invariably assigned to duty in the hardest working companies. It has been pointed out that owing to the young Fireman's inexperience he frequently has his new uniform ruined and must purchase another to comply with the inspection regulations. The Fireman is allowed no compensation for uniform or equipment destroyed in discharge of his duty. He undergoes the same risk, does the same work, suffers the same hardships as those who are getting the maximum pay; and

Whereas, Hon. William F. Baker, Police Commissioner, and Hon. Rhinclander Waldo, Fire Commissioner, personally favor such increase, and Edward F. Croker, Chief of Department, has recommended the same; and

Whereas, Not only have the new Patrolmen and Firemen not received an increase in many years, but their salaries were actually decreased by the first Greater New York Charter. Prior to 1898 new members of the Police and Fire departments received a minimum salary of \$1,000 per annum. Therefore, while the cost of living has continued to increase, the salaries of new Patrolmen are less by \$200 than what they were twelve years ago. Not only this, but the compulsory expenses of these new members of the two departments have increased materially; be it therefore

Resolved, That in view of the above facts the Board of Aldermen respectfully recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment fix the salaries of new

Patrolmen and Firemen at a minimum of \$1,000 per annum. Which was adopted.

General Order No. 26.

The most painstaking care has been given to the awards for 1909 of the Medal of the Police Department, and the several medals given by public-spirited citizens to mark their recognition of acts of valor performed by New York Policemen. It has not been easy to choose among the many admirable examples of bravery displayed during the past year by members of the Force, but an earnest effort has been made to name

as medal winners the men most deserving of that honor. The medal of the Police Department and the Brooklyn Citizens' medal for the year 1909 are awarded to Patrolman James A. Mulroy, shield No. 6649, One Hundred and Forty-sixth Precinct, who, although weak from the loss of blood, suffering

great bodily pain, and knowing that he was facing death, yet with indomitable courage risked his life in the faithful performance of his duty.

While on his post about 10 a. m., October 14, 1909, Mulroy was told that an Italian who had attempted to shoot some one the night before was now threatening others with a revolver. When Mulroy approached him, demanding his revolver, the Italian, one Vincenzo Avaricio, suddenly drew the weapon from his pocket, shot the officer twice, and ran. The first shot hit Mulroy in the face, shattering his jaw bone. He sank from the shock, and the second bullet gazed his hip. With the blood pouring from his wound, Mulroy staggered to his feet and pursued his assailant to a junkshop three blocks away, into which Avaricio ran. At the door of the junk shop Mulroy was joined by Patrolman Thomas Burns, One Hundred and Forty-sixth Precinct. Without hesitation both officers entered the place, in spite of a warning shouted at them that Avaricio, still armed, was behind a bale of rags. Both officers discovered the man at the same moment. He jumped at them, they shot him simultaneously, and he fell. Mulroy was in the hospital over two months as the result of his encounter. and is still under the doctor's care.

The Rhinelander medal for valor for 1909 is awarded to Lieutenant John F. Dwyer, shield No. 541, Harbor Precinct, Station A, and the Peter F. Meyer medal for 1909 to Patrolman James Hughes, shield No. 7002, Harbor Precinct, Station A, for an act showing bravery of a high type, quick wit, ready action, and disregard of personal

peril.

At 9.15 p. m., August 27, 1909, one Pietro Cardone, who was sleeping on the bulkhead, fell into the slip between Pier "A" and Pier 1. North River. Lieutenant Dwyer, hearing a cry for help, rant to the bulkhead and dived in fully clothed. Patrolman Hughes followed him instantly. Before either of the officers could reach Cardone, he had sunk. Both officers dived again and again trying to reach the drowning man. Lieutenant Dwyer finally got hold of him. The tide was running strongly, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the two Policemen managed to swim to a float and grading, building approaches, building drains, walls, etc., and erecting guard rails

and drag the unconscious man to safety. Had the officers shown the least hestitation their determination been an instant dashed by the difficulty of swimming, fully clothed, supporting a helpless man, in the darkness and with a racing tide, Cardone would undoubtedly have been drowned.

The Isaac Bell medal for bravery for 1909 is awarded to Patrolman John P. A. Taaffe, One Hundred and Forty-third Precinct, who, with dogged persistence, and under circumstances of the utmost difficulty, put his own life in peril to save the

lives of others.

At 11 p. m., July 27, 1909, the gasoline tank of a launch containing nine persons exploded opposite the Casino Pier, Bergen Beach, about 100 feet from shore. Of the several hundred who heard the explosion, Taaffe alone promptly went to the rescue of the crew who were struggling in the water. Throwing off his coat and shoes. Taaffe sprang into the water, and swimming out to the scene of the disaster, caught hold of George Himmerle, a one-armed man, weighing over 200 pounds, who was unable to swim. Taaffe got him ashore, and instantly plunging in again brought out a second man. In spite of the protests of those on the pier, who tried to restrain him, Taaffe swam out once more to the wrecked launch, but all the rest had by this time been brought to shore. Without a pause Taaffe began work on one of the unconscious men in an unsuccessful attempt to resuscitate him, and continued his efforts until completely exhausted. Patrolman Taaffe's actions throughout showed a total disregard of personal danger, and a high conception of the duties of a Police Officer.

The Automobile Club of America medal for 1909 is awarded to Patrolman Patrick McMahon, shield No. 3535, Fourteenth Precinct, for exceptional intelligence, prompt action, and a brave disregard of whatever serious consequences might follow the discharge of his duty.

On McMahon's post was a stable to which he had been giving particular attention in passing, because of threats that it was said had been made by strikers to burn or dynamite the building. At 11.40 p. m., May 6, 1909, McMahon, on reaching the stable, saw smoke coming from the stairway leading to the basement. Raising the wooden doors. McMahon saw a burning parcel, wrapped in newspapers, lying on the steps. Realizing the danger it threatened, McMahon seized the parcel and carried it out to the middle of the street. It exploded as he dropped it, cutting McMahon on the face, arms, legs and body, and tearing his clothes to shreds. As a result of this faithful discharge of his duty McMahon was in the hospital seven months

The Union Railway Company's buildings, Mr. Maher contended, were no more unsightly than was the iron structure of the Interborough Railway Company, and, as the owners of the property in question, they were not anxious to sell and do not want to sell at any price, as the property was of great advantage to the company and to the public.

A committee from the East Tremont Taxpayers' Association, composed of Messrs. J. R. Peterson, C. McRae and F. J. 

and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak ing the estimate that the several matters stated

herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless. as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
