MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, held at the offices of the Commission, 299 Broadway, on Thursday, March 2, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present: President John C. McGuire and Commissioner Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Rules and Classification, as advertised in the CITY RECORD on February 27 and 28 and March 1.

Mr. Thomas W. Whittle, Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx; Mr. Lewis H. Pounds, Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn; Mr. William R. Patterson, Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, and Mr. M. Altmann, Executive Clerk to the President of the Borough of Richmond, addressed the Commission in opposition to the proposed transfer of the position of Automobile Engineer from the Non-Competitive to the Competitive Class. Mr. Edward A. Cadley, Chief Clerk in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment to paragraph 4 of Rule XII. Mr. Richard B. Aldcroft, Jr., member of the Board of Education; Mr. Edward B. Shallow, Superintendent in Charge of the New York Parental School (Department of Education), and Mr. J. McKee Borden, Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, appeared with reference to the positions in the Non-Competitive Class in their respective departments.

Mr. Robert W. Belcher, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared and requested that the hearing be adjourned until March 9. The request was granted.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held March 1 were approved.

The Secretary presented the appeals of the following-named persons to be permitted to finish their examinations for Interpreter (Italian), they having been disqualified by the Chief Examiner: Antony J. Mature, 287 Bleecker street; Anthony Villone, 397 Bushwick avenue, Brooklyn; Alfred F. Caridi, 362 Broome street; Torquato T. Castellano, 264 Court street, Brooklyn. The appeals were referred to the Committee on Appeals, with instructions to direct the candidates to appear before the Commission on Tuesday, March 7, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That paragraph 13 of Regulation X. of the Municipal Civil Service Regulations be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

"13. All conversation or communication between candidates during the examination is strictly forbidden. Instances of speaking to a neighbor on any pretense or replying to him if he speaks, must be reported to the Commission and may result in the disqualification of the candidate."

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated March 1, stating that at a meeting of that Board held on February 25, 1911, the following resolutions of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York had been approved:

1. Amending the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals by striking therefrom the following:

2. (a) Amending Rule XIX. (the Labor Class) by including in clause 3, under the line "Part III.—Mechanics registered for employment in any Borough subject to trade examination," the following:

"Part IV.—Laborers and Mechanics registered for employment in hospitals."

(b) Striking from the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Hospitals for Contagious Diseases, Department of Health," the following: Captain, Engineer (Stationary), Boatman, Deckhand, Fireman, Watchman, Electrician, Carpenter, Driver, Gardener, Laborer, Hospital Clerk, Elevatorman, and further, by placing the following positions in the Labor Class, Part IV.—Positions in Hospitals: Boatman, Deckhand, Fireman, Carpenter, Driver, Laborer, Elevatorman.

3. Amending the classification of positions in the Competitive Class, as follows:

First, by striking therefrom, under the heading "Part VI.—The Attendance Service," the following grades: Grade 1, \$600 annually; grade 2, \$900 annually; grade 3, \$1,200 annually; grade 4, \$1,500 annually, or over, and substituting therefor the following: Grade 1, \$600 annually; grade 2, \$1,200 annually; grade 3, \$1,800 annually, or over.

Secondly, by striking therefrom, under the heading "Part IX.—The Prison Service," the following:

"The positions under the above titles are graded according to the amount of the annual compensation, or its equivalent, attaching to each, as follows: Grade A, \$600 annually; Grade B, \$900 annually; Grade C, \$1,200 annually; Grade D, \$1,800 annually; Grade E, \$2,400 annually, or over."

4. Amending the classification of positions in the Exempt Class by including therein, under the heading "Department of Docks and Ferries," the following: Chief Confidential Inspector.

5. Amending the classification of positions in the exempt class by including therein, under the heading "Department of Docks and Ferries," the following: Expert Accountant.

6. Amending the classification of positions in the Competitive Class by including in Group 5 of Part IV.—The Inspection Service, the following positions: Transit Inspector, Master Mechanic.

7. Amending the classification of positions in the Labor Class, Part II., by including therein the following: Clock Repairer.

8. Amending the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Parks," by striking therefrom the line: "2 Assistant Superintendents of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond," and substituting therefor the line: "1 Assistant Superintendent of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond," also by including therein the following title: "Supervisor of Recreation, Manhattan and Richmond."

9. Amending the classification of positions in the Labor Class by striking from Part I., after the title "Stableman," the words "Department of Street Cleaning."

10. Amending the classification of positions in the Competitive Class by striking from Part VIII.—The Fire Service, the title "Fire Marshall," and including the same in Part I, group 3.

11. Amending the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals," etc., by including therein the following: "Attendant, with compensation not exceeding \$4.80 per annum, without maintenance."

12. Waiving the limitation of compensation fixed by paragraph 6 of Rule XII. in so far as it applies to Messrs. Lozier and Mowen, employed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx as Experts in making asphalt tests, and fixing their total compensation at an amount not to exceed \$1,450.

13. Waiving the limitation of compensation fixed by paragraph 6 of Rule XII. in so far as it applies to Mr. F. A. Ross, Fire Expert in the Department of Public Charities, and fixing his total compensation for the year 1911 at \$1,000.

Upon motion, it was resolved, with the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to authorize their transfer to the Street Cleaning Department, in order that they may be assigned to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

The President reported that after consultation with the Comptroller he had requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an appropriation of \$5,000 in Corporate Stock to meet the cost of preliminary fees for architects for the new Gouverneur Hospital dispensary. This action was approved.

The President reported that, in order to avoid the delay in waiting for the is-

sue of the new Corporate Stock Budget, he had requested authority to charge the cost of changing the flooring of the Harlem Hospital balconies against a balance in the building fund. Upon motion, this action was approved. Adjourned.

It was resolved to authorize the issue of an order to Blake & Williams to continue to supply temporary heat to the pathological building and men's dormitory from the new boiler house at a cost of \$25 per day, pending the acceptance of the latter building from the general contractors, or until some other arrangement can be made by the Trustees for the supply of heat. 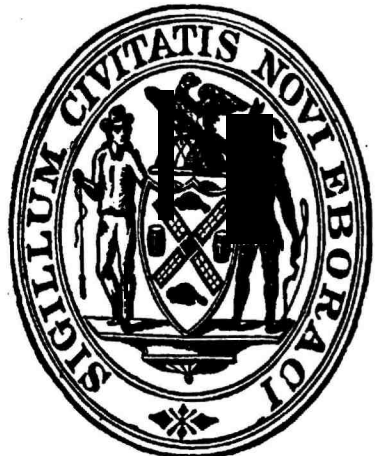

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
