MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, October 14, 1914, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Competitive Class, Part IV. (The Inspection Service), Group 1 (Inspectors of Public Works), the title "Inspector of Sewers and Basins." There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," by changing the line "Cook (female), \$720 per annum (with maintenance)" to read, "Cook (female), \$900 per annum (with maintenance)." Dr. George O'Hanlon, Gen-

eral Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. George T. Keyes, Esq., Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also appeared. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Competitive Class, Part IV. (The Inspection Service), Group 1 (Inspectors of Public Works), the title: Inspector of Sewers and Basins.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Non-Competitive Class of the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by raising the limit of compensation of the position of Cook (female), appearing under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," from \$720 per annum, with maintenance, to \$900 per annum, with maintenance.

Mr. Edward J. McNerny, President of the Interborough Association of Eligible Male Attendants, appeared and filed a brief in connection with his request that the Commission reconsider its decision denying the request of certain Female Attendants that they be placed on a preferred list for permanent appointment as Attendants. The matter was referred to the Certification Clerk for a report.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

Resolved, That the disqualification appearing against the name of John F. Struse on the eligible list of Assistant Fire Marshall be and the same hereby is removed.

Resolved, That the name of Andrew Dear be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list of Elevatorman and certification of his name to the President of the Borough of Manhattan be and the same hereby is revoked for the reason that he was under the minimum age at the time of filing his application for that position; and the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to notify the President of the Borough of Manhattan that the services of said Andrew Dear must terminate at once.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Special and Temporary Appointments, the Commission denied for lack of power the request of the Department of Public Charities under date of October 5th, 1914, for authority to continue the services of Henry Wilkins as Inspector of Repairs and Supplies at \$1,650 per annum beyond the thirty days allowed by clause 4 of Rule XII.

The action of the Committee on Provisional Appointments in adopting the recommendations of the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation in the following reports was approved:

Report dated October 6 recommending that James J. Courtney be marked "Qualified" on the non-competitive eligible list for appointment to the position of Inspector, Board of Water Supply, under clause 3 of Rule XII.

Report dated October 7 recommending that John D. Russell and Edward F. Ziegelman be marked "Qualified" on the non-competitive list for appointment to the position of Alienist in the Department of Public Charities under clause 3 of Rule XII.

Report dated October 7 recommending that Herman S. Geist be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list for appointment to the position of Topographical Draughtsman in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under clause 3 of Rule XII.

Report dated October 6 recommending that the papers of Asa C. Hammond, a candidate on the non-competitive list of Rodman, Board of Water Supply, be filed for the reason that the said person was separated from the city service on September 30, 1914.

Report dated October 13 recommending that Anna Bowen be marked "Qualified" on the non-competitive eligible list of Attendant for employment in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, under clause 3 of Rule XII.

Report dated October 13 recommending that Laurence R. Pardy be marked "Qualified" on the non-competitive eligible list of Farm Instructor for employment in the Department of Correction under clause 3 of Rule XII.

After consideration of a report dated October 8 from the Chief Examiner, the eligible list for promotion to Storekeeper, Bureau of Street Cleaning, office of the President of the Borough of Queens, was promulgated.

After consideration of reports (3) dated October 9 from the Chief Examiner, the following promotion eligible lists were promulgated: Mechanical Draughtsman (Electrical), Grade C, Fire Department; Chief Marine Engineer, Department of Docks and Ferries; Chief Efficiency Examiner, office of the Commissioners of Accounts; Lumber Inspector, Department of Docks and Ferries.

A report dated October 9 was presented from the Chief Examiner, transmitting the request of the Executive Secretary of the Committee on Taxation for authority to employ Miss Elsie Simpson, of 313 West 124th Street, New York City, a Stenographer and Typewriter, as Assistant to Dr. Robert Murray Haigh, under the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII., in the preparation of a report to be made by him for the Committee on Taxation. The Chief Examiner recommended certification of the eligible list of Stenographer and Typewriter or Typewriter Accountant. The Secretary was instructed to certify the first-mentioned list.

A report dated October 5 was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation recommending that Francis M. Gorman, a candidate for appointment to the position of Examiner of Charitable Institutions in the Department of Public Charities, under clause 6 of Rule XII., be summoned before the Commission in connection with his employment record. The recommendation was adopted.

The following reports were presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner:

Report dated October 6 recommending that all appointing officers be informed that requests for examination for promotion in Part II. (the Clerical Service) and Part III. (the Engineering Service) should be filed not later than November 14, 1914; that such requests should specify the position and grade for which the examination is desired and also the bureau or other subdivision of the Department; that requests should not be made when there are in existence eligible lists promulgated within two years from which it would be reasonable to believe all vacancies for the year 1915 could be filled.

Report dated October 5 recommending that the Commission deny the request of the Board of Water Supply, under date of September 22, for approval of the promotion of John H. McManus, an Assistant Engineer in the Bureau of Claims, to a salary of \$2,400, under the provisions of clause 23 of Rule XV., for the reason that more than four years had elapsed since the promulgation of the list from which he was appointed.

Report dated September 17 submitting the following recommendations relative to the examination for promotion to Captain of Police:

"1. A date should be set for the mental examination. When such date has been set the Police Commissioner should be notified that applications for examination will be received from all men who have served for not less than three years as Lieutenants on this date. (Rule XV., paragraph 11.) (Section 288 of the Charter.) The Police Commissioner should be informed that it will be necessary to transmit to this Commission in advance of such examination a complete record of each candidate for promotion. (Section 288 of the Charter.) In this connection, it is necessary, in my opinion, that the records of all candidates while serving in the ranks of Sergeant and Lieutenant be transmitted in the application for examination. It is not necessary that the record as Patrolman be included.

"2. I beg to suggest as the dates for the examination Tuesday, November 10, and Wednesday, November 11, 1914, and that the candidates be examined on two of the four subjects on each day."

Report dated October 8 recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to Foreman Bricklayer, Grade 3, in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to be open to all Bricklayers and Masons eligible under clause 17 of

Rule XV., in accordance with the request of the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, Manhattan, dated September 30.

The recommendations were adopted.

The following reports were presented from Mr. Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner:

Report (P-1) dated October 8 stating that the report of the Coroners' Office, Borough of Richmond, upon the efficiency and punctuality of its employees for the third quarter of 1914 had not been prepared in accordance with the provisions of clause 22 of Rule XV., as amended, and recommending that the same be returned to the Coroners' office with a request that a report be properly prepared.

Report (K-295) dated October 7 recommending that the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Manhattan, be furnished with a copy of the definitions of Laborer and Attendant recently adopted by the Commission with the request that the laborers and cleaners in his department performing the duties of attendants in the comfort stations and the public baths be assigned to duties appropriate to their titles without unnecessary delay.

Report (K-294) dated October 7 relative to the complaint of Honorable Herman H. Torborg, New York State Senator, against the assignment of four laborers to the duties of Drivers in the Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, and recommending that the Park Commissioner be directed to assign George Werner, William Hinton, John A. Coffey and John Gill, Laborers, to duties appropriate to their titles, and that the complainant be informed of the Commission's action in the matter.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report (K-301) dated October 9 was presented from Mr. Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, making the following recommendations with the view of conserving the appropriation of the Commission for monitor service:

That the use of examination books at some of the examinations be authorized.

That for the balance of the calendar year the Chief Examiner be requested to call only the most efficient monitors.

That when an examination closes at one o'clock the monitors be paid a compensation of less than five dollars and that they be permitted to return home.

The recommendation relative to the use of examination books was referred to the Advisory Board and the other recommendations were approved, the compensation in the instances where an examination should close at one o'clock to be three dollars.

On the recommendation of the Certification Clerk, in reports (4) dated October 9, the Secretary was instructed to proceed with examinations for the following positions in the Labor Class: Boilermaker's Helper, Part 3; Cleaner (Male), Borough of Richmond; Decorator, Part 3; Well Driver, Part 2; Carpenter; Horseshoer (Fireman); Horseshoer (Floorman); Plasterer; House Painter; Cleaner (Male), Borough of Queens; Coal Passer, Borough of The Bronx; Coal Passer, Borough of Brooklyn; Coal Passer, Borough of Manhattan; Coal Passer, Borough of Queens; Coal Passer, Borough of Richmond; Coal Passer, Nassau County; Deckhand; Driver, Borough of Queens; Driver, Borough of Richmond; Driver, Bureau of Street Cleaning, Borough of Richmond; Electrician's Helper; Glazier; Licensed Fireman, Borough of The Bronx; Licensed Fireman, Borough of Manhattan; Licensed Fireman, Borough of Queens; Licensed Fireman, Borough of Richmond; Licensed Fireman, Nassau County; Marine Stoker; Scowman; Sewer Cleaner, Borough of Richmond; Stone Mason; Water Tender; Cleaner (Male), Borough of Manhattan.

A report dated October 9 was presented from the Certification Clerk recommending that physical re-examinations of the candidates on the eligible lists of Automobile Machinist, Saw Filer and Sheet Metal Worker be held for the purpose of extending their eligibility for an additional period of one year. The recommendation was approved.

After consideration of a memorandum from Miss M. B. Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, the employment of Miss Estelle Ellisson as Civil Service Examiner in the office of the Commission from August 10 to September 2, 1914, was approved under clause 4 of Rule XII.

Communications (2) dated October 12 were presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission stating that at a meeting of that board held October 10 the following resolutions of the Municipal Commission had been approved:

Waiving the limitation of compensation (\$2,250) fixed in the case of Albert J. Frohock, serving as Efficiency Expert in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts under clause 6 of Rule XII., and fixing the same at an amount not to exceed \$3,000.

Waiving the limitation of compensation (\$750) fixed in the case of Ralph Van Name, serving under clause 6 of Rule XII. as Stenographer and Typewriter, with special knowledge of tabulating, in the office of the Mayor's Commission on Pensions, and fixing the same at an amount not to exceed \$1,800.

The communication was ordered filed.

Hon. Meyer Wolff, State Civil Service Commissioner, appeared in connection with all matters affected by clause 6 of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. The following resolutions were adopted, there being no opposition on the part of Commissioner Wolff:

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6 of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Charles Tiernan, of 407 East 88th Street, New York City, be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan as Elevator Constructor for the period from October 3rd to 24th, inclusive, with compensation at the rate of \$5.50 per diem.

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6 of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the voucher presented in favor of R. P. Bolton Company, Consulting Engineers, in the amount of \$250 for services rendered the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on May 7 and 8 and June 4 and 5, 1914, be and the same hereby is approved.

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6 of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the employment of Philip C. Finn as Veterinarian in the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys during the year 1914 be and the same hereby is approved, and the Secretary is hereby authorized to approve the vouchers presented in payment of such services in the amount of thirty-seven dollars.

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6 of Rule XII., voucher in the amount of \$349.70 in payment of Charles G. Armstrong & Son, of 149 Broadway, New York City, Architects, for services rendered the President of the Borough of The Bronx, be and the same hereby is approved.

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6 of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and with the approval of the Mayor, William Jacobus, of Paterson, N. J., be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts as Scrap Metallurgist and Salvage Expert in connection with the sales of old material by city departments at public auction; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

The following reports were presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation:

Report dated September 29 recommending that Marion E. Lee, Joseph B. Walton, Elizabeth H. Woodward and Emma H. Phinney be noted as "Qualified" for temporary employment as Examiners of Charitable Institutions in the Department of Public Charities and that Mathilda White be summoned before the Commission.

Report dated October 6 recommending that Jennie M. Shannon be noted as "Qualified" for temporary employment as Examiner of Charitable Institutions in the Department of Public Charities.

The Secretary was instructed to summon Mathilda White before the Commission, and the case of Joseph B. Walton was referred to him for investigation as to the candidate's qualifications for the position, and the following resolution was adopted, Commissioner Wolff of the State Civil Service Commission dissenting:

Resolved, That the following named persons be and they hereby are excepted from examination, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII. of the Civil Service Rules, to be employed as Examiners of Charitable Institutions in the Department of Public Charities for the period ending December 31, 1914, for services requiring special and peculiar training in social work; provided, however, that the total compensation shall not exceed \$750 in each case: Jennie M. Shannon, Elizabeth H. Woodward, Marion E. Lee, Emma H. Phinney.

The following requests, considered at previous meetings of the Commission, were again laid over:

Requests of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, for

approval of the employment of Elmer Noyes, Thomas F. Henson, Jason F. Stearns, P. Kurscheidt and Allan O'Keefe as Expert Inspectors of Public Works.

Request of the Commissioner of Accounts that the limitation of compensation fixed in the cases of Louis Ortner, Fuel Expert and Efficiency Engineer, and James Etc. (confirmed February 28 Fuel Expert, and Efficiency Engineer, and James J. J. Pearson, Expert Investigator, be waived.

Hon. Henry Bruere, City Chamberlain, and George T. Keyes, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in connection with the request of the Commissioner of Accounts for authority to employ Frederic R. Leach as Efficiency Engineer under the provisions of clause 5 or clause 6 of Rule XII. State Commissioner Wolff stated that he would not object to the employment of Mr. Leach under the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII. provided that the period of employment would not exceed one year. The matter was laid over.

A communication dated October 9 was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Queens, requesting that the Commission certify an eligible list of Clerk, salary \$1,050 per annum, from "which to make a Temporary or Permanent appointment" in the place of a Clerk who had not reported for duty at the expiration of his vacation period and whom he had been unable to locate for the purpose of serving charges upon him. The Secretary was instructed to state that the Commission had lists either for temporary or permanent appointment and would certify either upon request.

After consideration of a communication dated October 2 from the Secretary of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, the Secretary was instructed to restore the name of Nicholas J. Provenz to the eligible list of Cleaner and re-certify it to the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan.

The Secretary stated in connection with the complaint made against the assignment of Attendants under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII., in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, that the temporary preferred list of Attendant had been certified under date of September 25 to both departments for the purpose of filling the temporary vacancies; that under date of September 30 a letter had been written by the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, stating that in about a week (October 11) he would dispense with the services of all the temporary attendants and that, therefore, it would not be practicable to make appointments from the list; that the Park Department had reported under date of October 6 that no one on the temporary preferred list certified would accept appointment owing to the low rate of compensation offered. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was instructed to certify the payroll of the temporary attendants up to October 9 in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and up to October 11 in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan under a special certificate in each case.

A communication dated October 8 was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning stating that he had restored to his original standing in the department as of June 12, 1912, Luke Quinn, an Extra Driver. The Secretary was instructed to note the fact on the records.

A communication dated October 3 was presented from the Police Commissioner, stating that in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424 of the Laws of 1914, he had appointed Harry Griffin, a member of the Police Force of the Board of Water Supply, to the position of Patrolman of the Fourth Grade in his department. The Secretary was instructed to note the fact on the records.

A communication dated October 8 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, stating that the name of a nurse in his department had been changed, through marriage, from Susie L. McGloin to Susie L. Boyle. The Secretary was instructed to note the fact on the records.

A communication dated September 15 was presented from the Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting approval of payroll of Miss Ruth Levy, Emergency Stenographer and Typewriter, for the month of July (time in excess of the thirty days allowed by clause 4 of Rule XII.), and stating that her retention had been caused by the fact that the department had been unable to obtain anyone from the eligible list for that position. The Secretary was instructed to attach a special certificate to the payroll setting forth the facts in the case.

A communication dated October 5 was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, stating that he had revoked the appointment of Louis Cascarelli, an Extra Driver, assigned March 7, 1912, for the reason that he had not been a citizen of the United States at that time. The Secretary was instructed to note the fact on the records.

A communication dated October 5 was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting certification of a list from which to appoint a Second Grade Clerk (male) with knowledge of stenography and typewriting. The Secretary was instructed to certify the eligible list of Clerk, Second Grade (Male).

A communication dated October 6 was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, requesting authority to continue the temporary employment of the Junior Chemist serving in his department until November 7, 1914. The action of the Secretary on October 9 in denying the request and certifying the remainder of the eligible list of Junior Chemist (Asphalt), consisting of twelve names, was approved, the additional names having been certified to anticipate declinations on account of the short period of employment offered.

A communication dated October 7 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, relative to a proposed change in title of the following-named persons to Supervising Nurse: *New York City Home, Brooklyn*—Stephen Bender, Supervisor. *Kings County Hospital*—William D. Hart Assistant Supervisor; John Maydl, Supervisor, Second Assistant; Catherine M. Gildea, Supervisor, Second Assistant. The matter was referred to the First Assistant Chief Examiner for a report.

A communication dated October 6 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, requesting that the title of Watchman for the Tuberculosis Sanatorium be classified in the Non-competitive Class. The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing in the matter.

The Secretary was instructed to note on the records the following reassignments to duty, in accordance with notification from the several departments, on the dates specified:

October 6, 1914—William H. Lorenzo, in the position of Park Laborer in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

October 6, 1914—Henry B. Hall, Chief Clerk in the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The report of the Departmental Board of Examiners for Positions in the Non-Competitive Class of the Department of Public Charities, dated October 6, was approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

The request of Rose A. McCann, of 316 West 116th Street, New York City, for permission to amend her statements as to date of birth, where in error in her papers in the examination for Clerk, Card Indexer, was granted.

The requests of the following-named persons for restoration to the eligible lists specified were granted, their reasons for failure to reply to notices regarding appointment or their declinations of such appointment having been satisfactory to the Commission: James Gray, Stationary Engineer; Mary J. Connolly, Examiner of Charitable Institutions; John W. Miller, Attendant; Reuben M. Levanion, House Painter; Henry O. Degenhart, Inspector of Carpentry and Masonry; Joseph P. Lynch, Stationary Engineer, for temporary work; Charles L. Carver, Stationary Engineer; Joseph Goldberg, Transitman, Grade D; George A. Morris, Axeman, Grade B; Morris Isaacs, Gardener; Francis Israel, Clerk, Second Grade; George W. Mann, Attendant, Male (Preferred); Joseph P. Routh, School Farm Attendant.

The declination of appointment of Annie E. Early (in July, 1914) to the position of Nurse in the Department of Health was approved, and it was ordered that her name be restored to the eligible list for that position.

After consideration of a communication dated October 1 from Jacob Klein, of 137 Goerck Street, New York City, the Secretary was instructed to record him on the eligible list of Clerk, First Grade, as ineligible for further certification.

The Secretary was instructed to note the change of address of Gertrude M. Sulender, a candidate on the eligible list of Finger Board Expert, from 206 St. James Place, Brooklyn, to 601 West 185th Street, Manhattan, in accordance with a communication dated October 7 from the candidate.

A communication dated October 6 was presented from Mary S. Kauer, of 53 Vanderveer Avenue, Woodhaven, L. I., requesting that her name be restored to eligibility for certification at \$900 per annum from the eligible list of Stenographer and Typewriter. The request was denied, she having declined appointment at less than \$900 per annum.

A communication (undated) was presented from James Marsh, of 598 St. Mary's Street, New York City, suggesting that the receipt of applications for Gardener be reopened. The Commission ruled that such action would be inadvisable.

The Secretary was instructed to summon Arthur C. Kerwin before the Commission in connection with his request that his name be removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City service.

After consideration of a communication dated September 24 from Leo J. McDermott, addressed to the Commissioner of Public Charities, the Secretary was instructed to record him on the eligible list of Inspector of Supplies and Repairs as having declined appointment on account of salary (\$1,650 per annum).

Matters Not Upon the Calendar Considered by Unanimous Consent.

Upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner, in a report dated October 13, the request of the Secretary of the Committee on Taxation, dated September 29, that Wallace McClure be excepted from examination to assist in preparing a statistical report on taxation was denied.

A communication dated October 13 was presented from the Chief Examiner, requesting approval of the emergency appointment of C. J. Cronin, of 55 Henry Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., as Monitor on September 28, 1914. The appointment was approved under Clause 4 of Rule XII.

After consideration of a report dated October 13 from the Chief Examiner, promotion eligible lists for Third Grade Clerk for the following departments were promulgated: College of The City of New York, Municipal Civil Service Commission, Office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, City Record, Department of Finance, Department of Docks and Ferries.

A report dated October 10 was presented from the Chief Examiner stating that no list had resulted from the examination for promotion to Foreman Machinist, Department of Bridges, held October 10, 1914. The Secretary was instructed to record the fact.

A report dated October 10 was presented from the Chief Examiner, returning an application for appointment to the position of Psychologist under Clause 3 of Rule XII, with a request for instructions, as the position did not appear in the classification. The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Competitive Class, Part XII (the Medical Service), the position of Psychologist.

After consideration of a report dated October 10 from the Chief Examiner, it was Resolved, That the eligible list for promotion to Third Grade Typewriter Accountant in the Department of Finance be and the same hereby is promulgated.

A report dated October 13 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board, recommending that the Board of Water Supply be requested to transmit an official report, in writing, as to the exact condition of affairs relative to Inspectors, Board of Water Supply, the Commission having been unofficially informed that all employees serving under that title were to be laid off in about a week, and requiring correct information in connection with certification of appropriate lists. The recommendation was adopted.

Reports (2) dated October 13 were presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board submitting the following forms of advertisement for the examination specified: "Superintendent of Employment Agency (Male and Female).

Applicants must be citizens of the United States. The subjects and weights for this examination are: Experience, 4; written test, 4; oral test, 2.

Applications for this examination are to be filed on the special blank, Form C. * * * 70 per cent. is required on experience; 70 per cent. on the written test, and 70 per cent. on the oral test.

The written test will consist of two papers, one on duties and one on organization. Candidates failing to qualify in any part of the examination will not be summoned for the ensuing test. A physical examination will precede the mental.

The person selected as a result of the examination will be required:

1. To formulate working plans, including equipment, layout, rules and regulations, card indexes of applicants, systems of investigation, of advertising and other methods of securing business.

2. To make such plans effective, to organize and manage a public employment bureau on lines of business efficiency, co-operate with employers, those seeking employment, and with Federal and States agencies for the purpose of preventing involuntary idleness.

The following kinds of experience will be considered qualifying:

1. Managerial experience in connection with public employment agencies.

2. Managerial experience in connection with semi-public or philanthropic employment agencies.

3. Managerial experience in connection with the employment department of large organizations.

Experience equivalent to the above will receive due consideration. The age limits are 25 to 50 years.

"Director, Bureau of Food Inspection, Department of Health.

Competitive examination to be open to all citizens of the United States. Subjects and weights: Experience 4, 70 per cent. required; to be filed on a special blank; technical 4, 75 per cent. required; this paper to be divided into two parts, one on organization and administration of a food inspection force, and the other on the technical knowledge of food inspections and trade conditions; oral, 2; 70 per cent. required; this test to be conducted by experts.

Administrative experience and technical knowledge of food inspections and trade conditions will be required for admittance to the examination.

It was ordered that the paper be rated in accordance with the plan submitted and that the said examiners make a full report to the Chief Examiner at the conclusion of the rating.

Report dated October 7 recommending that Mr. Isabel M. Dando be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Nurse.

Report dated October 13 recommending that Mary E. D. Frazier be "Qualified" on the eligible list of Attendant.

Report dated October 6 recommending that Austin P. O'Neill be marked "Qualified" on the eligible list of Court Attendant.

The recommendations were adopted.

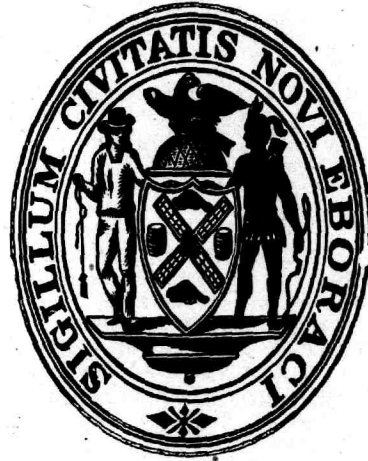

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock, or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
