

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the Meeting held September 30th, 1884.

Present-Franklin Edson, Mayor; S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; Henry B. Laidlaw, Chamberlain; and Hugh J. Grant, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following communication from the "Armory Board," in relation to a site for an armory for the Twenty-second Regiment:


ARMORY BOARD, NEW YORK, September 25, 1884.

Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor, respectfully, to submit herewith, on behalf of the Armory Board, a request from the Commanding Officer of the Twenty-second Regiment, for the armory for said regiment to be located upon a plot of ground situated on Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, Ninth avenue and Boulevard, as shown on accompanying diagram. The Armory Board desires to represent that, after due consideration of the subject, it has unanimously approved of the site named in the above application as suitable and desirable, and hereby recommends to the Sinking Fund Commission that the plot of ground referred to be purchased, and immediate steps taken to obtain plans and specifications for the erection thereon of a suitable armory building for said regiment, and for division and brigade headquarters.

The Armory Board respectfully asks the concurrence of the Sinking Fund Commission in these recommendations, and that the sum of \$205,000 be designated and appropriated as the sum to be paid for the plot of ground located at Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, Ninth avenue and Boulevard, the Armory Board having obtained a written proposition from the owner thereof to sell it to the city for this amount.


Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I have the honor respectfully to submit herewith, on behalf of the Armory Board, a request from the commanding officer of the Eighth Regiment, for the armory for said regiment, to be located upon a plot of ground situated on Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, Madison and Fourth avenues, as shown on accompanying diagram. The Armory Board desires to represent that after due consideration of the subject, it has unanimously approved of the site naned in the above application, as suitable and desirable, and hereby recommends to the Sinking Fund Commission that the plot of ground referred to be purchased and immediate steps taken to obtain plans and specifications for the erection thereon of a suitable armory building for said regiment and for the Second Battery of Artillery.

GENTLEMEN—On behalf of the Eighth Regiment, I respectfully petition your Honorable Body for an armory to be erected on the east side of the Central Park for military purposes.

There is no place in my judgment equal to the plot of land between Fourth and Madison avenues and Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, New York City.

This land is on the highest elevation in the city, commanding the upper and lower parts. Within a very short time this plot (now vacant) will be surrounded with improvements and largely enhanced in value.

There would be no objection on our part, for a portion of the armory being set aside for the occupation of a Battery.

NEW YORK, September 30, 1884.

To the Honorable Body Sinking Fund Commissioners, City of New York:

On or about August 14, 1884, I made application to open an employment agency to be known as The Select Bureau for Trained Help, to be located at No. 149 East Forty-eighth street, this city. Soon thereafter I was taken sick and my physician forbids my undertaking the enterprise. The application has not yet been acted upon, and therefore no license has been obtained. The certificates of 684 births, 52 still-births, 288 marriages and 686 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 20, 1884. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 7; scardatina, 5; whooping cough, 7; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 9; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 6; diarrheed diseases, 75; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 3; phthiss pulmonalls, 1; pneumonia, 3; heart diseases of the brain and nervous system, 51; gastritis, enteritis and peritontis, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 18; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suickle, 1; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 7; croup, 8; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; bronchitis, 2; marasmus, tabes mesentenca and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; cirnosis and hepatitis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 3; surgical operations, 3; and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from convulsions was the same in the two successive weeks.
