#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 9, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,737.  
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,008.



During the past week 225 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 95 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 11 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 12 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 40 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 274 visits were made, and 217 disinfections and 42 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 11.

The number of vaccinations performed was 2,414, of which 372 were primary, and 2,042 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 19,340 pounds of meat, 5,875 pounds of fish, 2,500 pounds of tripe, 50 pounds of figs, 2 boxes of oranges, 2 barrels of apples, and 1 barrel of pickles.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 25, the number of analyses of same made was 2.

The certificates of 589 births, 63 still-births, 160 marriages and 771 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 9, 1887. This shows a decrease of 47 births and 46 marriages, and an increase of 4 still-births and 9 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 36 births, 8 still-births and 70 deaths, and a decrease of 61 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 5; scarlatina, 4; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 2; inamtion, 8; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 28; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; apoplexy, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suicide, 3; and drowning, 3; while the deaths from croup increased 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 1; pneumonia, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; premature and preterm births, 3; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from typhoid fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 141 were in institutions, 456 in tenement-houses, 157 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc., 8 were on the basement floor, 134 on the first, 120 on the second, 133 on the third, 106 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 753 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 18 non-residents; 120 were stated to be single, 207 married, 112 widowed, and the condition of 332 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 771; still-births, 63; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 71 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 589 burials; 160 marriages; 63 still-births; 771 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 117 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 13 of marriage, and 68 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 9, 1887, was 43.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.077, the mean humidity was 51, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,125, and the total amount of rain-fall was — inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
