Resolved, That the Board of Police hereby consents to the transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars from the appropriation made to the Bureau of Elections for the year 1891, entitled "Election Expenses—For Compensation of Inspectors, Poll Clerks and Ballot Clerks," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the Health Department for the year 1892, entitled "Health Fund—For Salaries," which is insufficient for the uses thereof, the said sum of two thousand five hundred dollars being required to pay the salaries of twenty-five additional Medical Inspectors for one month.

Resolved, That the Board of Police hereby consents to the transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the sum of ten thousand dollars from the appropriation made to the Bureau of Election for the year 1891, entitled "Election Expenses—For Compensation of Inspectors, Poll Clerks and Ballot Clerks," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the Health Department for the year 1892, entitled "Hospital Fund—Hospital Supplies, Improvements, Care and Maintenance, etc.," which is insufficient for the uses thereof; the said sum of ten thousand dollars to be used in fitting up and maintenance of the hospitals in use by the Health Department, to pay the salaries of such Physicians, Nurses and other employees as may be required in connection therewith, and for the ambulance service which may be necessary in connection therewith.

Resolved, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Comptroller for the sum of seven thousand five hundred and eighty-three dollars and sixty-three cents, to enable the Police Department to make the second payment to John H. Deeves and Richard H. Deeves, on contract to build a station-house, lodging-house and prison on East One Hundred and Fourth street, appropriation therefor having been made in the year 1891, and that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the same on receipt of the money from the Comptroller—all aye.

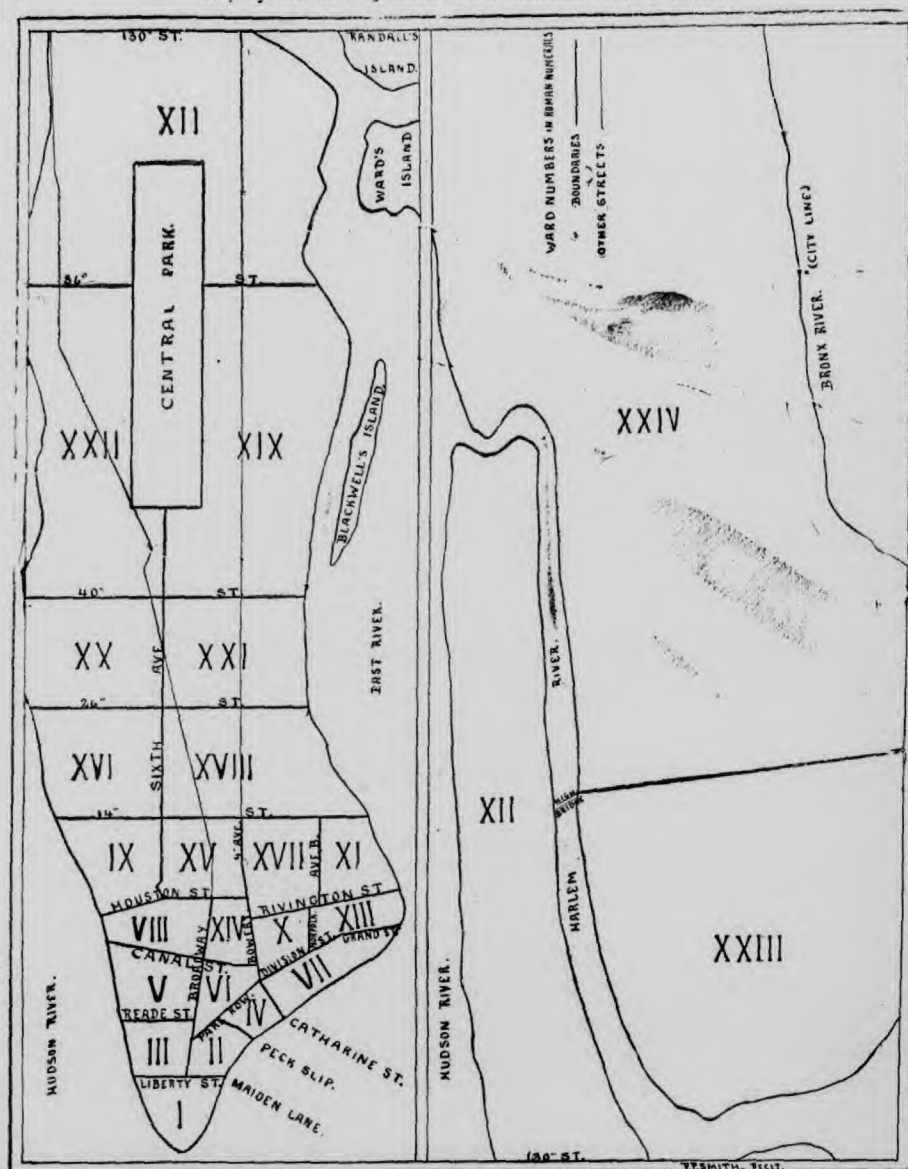

The 744 deaths represent a death-rate of 21.07, against 21.48 for the previous week and 25.00 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 53, 24, 52, 64 and 10, against 79, 37, 44, 58 and 6 for the previous week, a total of 203 against 224. Diphtheria increased slightly in the Tenth and markedly in the Nineteenth Ward, while the decrease was most noticeable in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards. There was a slight increase of measles in the Fourteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards, but a general decrease, which was most marked in the Seventh Ward. There was a considerable increase of scarlet fever, which has been increasing now for a month, the increase being well distributed, but most marked in the Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, while there was a considerable decrease in the Eighth Ward; 9 of the 10 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and 7 of them were in the annexed district. Asiatic cholera—2 deaths were reported, 1 from the steamship "Nevada" and 1 from No. 14 First street.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, September 15, 1892, at 11 o'clock A.M.

Present—President Cram.

Commissioner Phelan.

Absent—Commissioner Post.

The minutes of the meeting held the 8th instant were read and approved.

A representative of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey appeared respecting a lease of the Pier foot of Fifteenth street, North river. He was informed that it would be included in the next sale.

W. J. Van Arsdale, on behalf of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, applied for permission to erect a temporary bridge across the Harlem river at Fourth avenue.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to erect a temporary bridge across the Harlem river, commencing at or about the north end of Fourth or Park avenue and extending across said river to the Mott Haven side. The said bridge to be constructed under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, to remain thereat only during the construction of the new bridge and to be built in accordance with the act providing for the Harlem River Ship Canal.

The communication from John W. Flaherty, requesting an extension of time for the completion of the work of building a new dumping-board on the Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, East river, was tabled, and the application of W. D. Munson for permission to erect a temporary shed on Pier, new 15, North river, and the resolution in reference to the construction of Pier, new 22, North river, were tabled for one week.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Approving specifications and form of contract for dredging at various dumping-boards on the North and East rivers, under Contract No. 424, and for dredging at Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, under Contract No. 425.

From the Department of Public Works—Stating that a fire-hydrant will be placed at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Madison avenue, as requested, September 1, 1892.

From the Fire Department—Requesting that a berth be set aside for the fire-boat "William F. Havemeyer," at Pier 55, East river.

On motion, the permit granted the Fire Department January 30, 1884, to berth their fire-boat on the south side of Pier 48, East river, was revoked, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Fire Department of the City of New York to use for the berthing of the fire-boat "William F. Havemeyer" the outer one hundred and twenty-five feet on the south side of Pier 55, foot of Grand street, East river, and to place and locate on said pier a structure about six feet square for the use of the necessary telegraph apparatus to connect the said boat with the fire-alarm system, the same to be located and placed under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; the permission hereby granted, and the maintenance of the structure on said pier, to continue only during the pleasure of this Board.

From the Department of Buildings—Recommending that hereafter in the construction of piers, the under side of the deck, together with the piles and stringers, be covered with galvanized iron.
