*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending December 16, 1876.*

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby requested and directed to draw a warrant in favor of Koster & Green for the sum of forty dollars, for draping the chamber of the Board of Assistant Aldermen in mourning, on the occasion of the death of Assistant Alderman Henry A. Linden, the payment to be made from an unexpended balance of the City Contingencies for the year 1875.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, December 13, 1876, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby requested to pay the bill of Mrs. Rosanna Reynolds, amounting to two hundred and sixty-two dollars, for services rendered as Cleaner of the Sixth District Civil Court, and charge the same to the appropriation for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices."

### GAS COMMISSION.

The officers designated by section 73, of chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, met in the Mayor's Office at 12 M., November 28, 1876.

All were present, viz.:

William H. Wickham, Mayor; Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, and Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works.

The Commissioner of Public Works presented a form of specifications and agreement, which, being amended, was, on motion, approved.

The Comptroller moved that an advertisement, calling for proposals for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the city with gas, from the 1st day of January, 1877, to December 31, 1877, be published in the CITY RECORD, daily, until December 11, 1876, inclusive, which motion was adopted.

The meeting then adjourned.

The officers designated by section 73, of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, met in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works at 12 M., Monday, December 11, 1876, for the purpose of opening bids for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the city with gas, from January 1, 1877, to December 31, 1877, both days inclusive.

All were present, viz.: William H. Wickham, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; and Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works.

The Mayor presented an affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, that the notice, inviting proposals, had been duly published for ten consecutive days.

DEAR SIRS—You will observe by our accompanying proposal, that this company has accepted the terms and conditions as set forth in your specification, and submitted its proposal in conformity with your requirements.

I am, however, authorized to state that if the clause in the specification on page 8, requiring the gas companies to have the repaving done by the Department of Public Works, and the expense thereof charged to the companies, be entirely stricken out, and the repaving be done as heretofore, by the company, then this company will light, clean, etc., each lamp at \$2 less than in the proposal, viz., \$32, for the year 1877.

P. S.—During this year not one complaint about the pavement done by this company has been received from the Department of Public Works. The company is now lighting about 3,720 lamps, which, if lit at \$2 a-piece less, would save the city during the year about \$7,440.

NEW YORK, December 13, 1876.

Hon. Wm. H. Wickham, Mayor:

DEAR SIR—I have examined the proposals made by the various gas companies, and in reply to the inquiry addressed me by your Commission, whether there is legal power in your Board to reject the bids made, I beg to say that you have such power.

In this case, the bids would seem to furnish conclusive evidence of collusion between the various companies, by which the city is mapped out and divided up between them, and the city is deprived of all competition.

SIR—The Globe Gas-light Company of the City of Boston beg leave to submit the following proposition to your Honorable Board, viz.: Said company will affix their "Patent Gasoline Attachments" to all the street lanterns now in use in your city, or any number of the same, not less than (1,000); will supply material, and cause the same to be lighted every night in the year, giving a light in accordance with your specifications lately advertised; keeping the lanterns clean and in repair to the satisfaction of your Board; painting the lanterns and posts at least once in the year, in the best manner. For this service the City of New York to pay the said Globe Gas-light Company the sum of twenty-six dollars and forty-eight cents per annum, in monthly installments, for each and every lamp so lighted and cared for. A sufficient guarantee to be given by the Globe Company for the faithful performance of this work.
