

Whereas, The return of Admiral George Dewey to his native land, after his glorious and successful achievement in Manila Bay, has been definitely set for September 28, 1899; and Whereas, The City of New York and its inhabitants are preparing to make his home-coming an event in history and have determined that his welcome shall be such as to fire the patriotic heart; therefore be it Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks in The City of New York be and the same is hereby suspended from September 25 to October 1, 1899, in order that our citizens and residents may, by displays, add their share to the splendid arrangements being made officially, in the name of our City, to welcome home the hero of our Navy, Admiral George Dewey. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 5, 1899. Adopted by the Council, September 20, 1899. Received from his Honor the Mayor, October 10, 1899, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.
