BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL, WEDNESDAY, APRIL 30, 1902.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Seth Low, the Mayor; Edward M. Grout, the Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Jacob A. Cantor, the President of the Borough of Manhattan; J. Edward Swanstrom, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Cassidy, the President of the Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held January 28, February 7, 14, 21, 28, March 4, 7, 14, 21, 25, 26, 31, April 1, 2, 3, 4, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 14, 15, 16, 17, 21, 23, 25 and 28, 1902, was dispensed with.

The Comptroller presented the following:

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of your request to advise you as to the proper form of the budget which is to be made up by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under section 10 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 436 of the Laws of 1902.

There are, of course, only two cases which need be considered: (1) The case of a decrease in the amount of the new budget to be made up from the amount of the budget adopted last fall for the present year. (2) The case of an increase in the amount of the new budget to be made up over that of the budget adopted last fall, already mentioned.

In my opinion the form of the new budget to be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment must be in either case the same, namely, a budget composed of first, the appropriations of the former budget which may be left unchanged; second, of the items which are changed from the figure at which they were allowed in the former budget, and third, entirely new appropriations, if such there be.

This process will necessarily involve an entire recasting of the budget; and the result will be a budget entirely new in form.

I see no legal difficulty in making up the budget in the manner prescribed.

If the new budget shall be less in amount than the one made up in the fall of 1901, then, of course, its amount as decreased will be raised by taxation.

In case the amount of the budget now to be made up by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall exceed that of the budget made up last fall, then the amount to be raised by taxation will only be the amount of the budget of last fall, namely, \$97,994,541.83. The excess over that amount will be provided for by the issuing, under section 10 of the Charter as amended, of Special Revenue Bonds, redeemable from the tax levy of the year 1903. If the issue of Special Revenue Bonds is necessary that issue must be authorized before May 1, although the bonds themselves need not be actually issued until the time when it is necessary to raise the funds to be provided for by their issue.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution and the altered, modified and amended budget for the year 1902:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 10 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 436 of the Laws of 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby alters, modifies and amends the Budget of the year nineteen hundred and two, and makes this the Budget of The City of New York for said year; said Budget being, first, the estimated amounts required to pay the expenses of The City of New York for the year nineteen hundred and two, including State taxes; and, secondly, the estimated amounts required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight million six hundred and nineteen thousand six hundred dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$98,619,600.88).

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All Institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as, from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

That is to say, if the Budget adopted last autumn had been in other respects entirely adequate, the actual saving on the Budget would have been \$727,000. The actual saving, indirect as well as direct, would have been \$1,100,000.

But this direct saving of \$727,000 has been reappropriated, plus an additional sum of \$645,000 for the following purposes:

The last five items, amounting to \$535,000, admit of no discretion and would have to be included in the budget next autumn, if not included now. With the exception of the rents, \$22,000, they should have been included in the budget last autumn. The remaining items might have been omitted had the Board of Estimate and Apportionment been content to allow the City's poor and sick to be insufficiently housed, fed and clothed; the harbor to remain with fewer fire-boats than it has had for several years; the public libraries to be insufficiently supplied; the Street Cleaning Department in Brooklyn to be as inadequately manned as at present; and the mapping and care of Queens and Richmond boroughs to be insufficiently provided for. This Board prefers to accept the verdict of the community on the making of these provisions rather than upon their omission. In the meanwhile it will be observed that although the Board has made up deficiencies in the budget of last autumn to the extent of more than \$500,000 and has provided for work not contemplated by last autumn's budget to the extent of \$825,000, the budget now presented is larger than that of last autumn by only \$645,000. The foregoing summary, indeed, has by no means exhausted the provisions made for the better service of the City. A branch office of the Water Register's Bureau has been provided for in the Borough of The Bronx, and additional force for the inspection of hotels, theatres and other public buildings in the Borough of Manhattan, while many other small improvements have been secured in various directions.

It only remains to explain the item of deficiency on account of the "City Record." The appropriation last autumn for the City and all the counties, reads: Publication of the "City Record," including arrearages

In view of the fact that the appropriations of last autumn were made in all cases with the addition of the phrase "including arrearages," it is impossible to say how much the last Budget intended to assign to the actual expenses of the year. The following facts, however, throw some light upon the subject:

The actual expenditures of the Board of City Record in 1901 were \$738,000. The total appropriation for 1902, "including arrearages," was \$731,000; or \$7,000 less than the amount of last year's expenditures.

The present Board of City Record believes that it is saving from \$150,000 to \$200,000, as compared with the actual cost of this Bureau last year.

To sum up, the apparent increase in the Budget of \$645,000 represents, to the amount of \$500,000, deficiencies for which this Board is not responsible. The remainder of the increase is offset by the savings effected by the Board of City Record alone.

The economies exercised in other directions have enabled this Board, without otherwise increasing the Budget, to add substantially to the sums before appropriated for the care of the City's sick and poor, additions imperatively demanded in order to secure for them humane treatment; to provide for largely increased fire protection for the shipping in the harbor; to increase the appropriation for street cleaning and for libraries; and to make substantial additions to the sums appropriated for the care and development of Queens and Richmond boroughs; besides bettering the work of administration at many points.

In addition, the City will get the benefit of savings that do not appear in this Budget to the amount of \$198,000, in the Comptroller's Department and the cost of maintaining the Brooklyn Water Works.

Y., to change the route of the Teatown road so as to throw it farther away from the New Croton Reservoir, at or near the junction of roads Nos. 11 and 11½.

The attention of the different departments who have charge of matters affecting taxes has been heretofore repeatedly called to the necessity of filing vouchers in this office at a sufficiently early date to enable this department to make payment before the time at which the additional fee is added.

If the request mean that I shall transmit to the Aqueduct Commissioners as my own, the maps, plans, forms of contracts, specifications and bonds which were prepared under their exclusive direction and submitted to me, I decline to do so.

NOTICES TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by The City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done.
