To Merchants, Manufacturers and all Taxpayers:

The Pennsylvania Tunnel franchise will be acted upon by the Board of Aldermen, Tuesday, October 7, at 1 p. m.

The Rapid Transit Commission prepared an agreement whereby the City receives its full share of the annual earnings of the tunnel, all its rights of ownership are safely guarded, and the interest of taxpayers completely protected. The Pennsylvania Company is willing to accept this agreement.

It is now proposed that, in addition, the company shall agree to a provision making eight hours a day's labor for all workmen employed in the construction of the tunnel. This will enormously increase the cost of the work and if insisted upon will prevent its construction, the Pennsylvania Company having refused to accept the franchise under such conditions. The defeat of this enterprise will inflict great harm upon the City and upon the taxpayers' interests. You are requested to sign and obtain signatures to a protest against such action. Herewith is a form of heading, to which please attach the sheets necessary for signatures, sign it yourself and circulate for signatures in your district or neighborhood. To be effective it must be forwarded by hand to the Aldermanic Chamber City Hall, and delivered to the Alderman representing your district by 1 p. m., Tuesday, October 7.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—As a citizen and taxpayer of this city I have the honor to request that your Board ask the Corporation Counsel what legal action The City of New

York might take, either alone or jointly with other cities, to obtain a sufficient supply of coal for the use of its citizens.

The people of this city are not alone in their apprehension of the continuance of the coal strike, but the entire country is becoming alarmed and uneasy about the fuel supply as the cold weather approaches and the scarcity and shortage of coal continues and as the coal strike is prolonged.

The increase of the price of coal now places it beyond the reach of the poor, and it will also be impossible for the rich to obtain it at any price if the strike is not ended.

The newspapers have recently published statistics which show that the public schools, hospitals and other institutions under the care of the City are short of fuel, and that a coal famine is threatened. Under these conditions it will be seen that there are good grounds for alarm and for a request to the City authorities to take some legal action to compel the owners of mines to provide an ample supply of coal for the needs of the public if they cannot be persuaded to do so.

Several legal and good suggestions have been made from time to time in the daily press to compel the mine owners to furnish a greater supply of coal, and the citizens of Massachusetts have instituted a suit in the United States Court which will, if successful, relieve the stringency and avert the threatened coal famine.

The strike has continued since May 15, and it is said to be for an increase of wages for men employed at piece work, a reduction in the hours of labor to eight hours a day, with the same pay as is now given for a day's work, and the legal ton to be 2,240 pounds.

The letter of Mr. Mitchell, which has been printed in the newspapers, states that "admitting that the average pay for a working day in one of the principal mines is \$1.80, as claimed by a mine owner, this would make an annual total of \$368 for an employe, or an average of \$7.05 a week, or only \$1.01 a day for a laborer in the mines." This letter of Mr. Mitchell appears to be a statement of the miner's position and his willingness to arbitrate, and the refusal of the mine owners to accede to his reasonable request has gained for his statement credence and the sympathy of the public for his cause.

While it is generally admitted that the manufactories, trade and transportation companies, and all kinds of business, are threatened with suspension, and this will include the United States war vessels, and the United States revenue and mail carrying service, and also the Government workshops and the various departments of the United States, if the predicted impending coal famine will take place, yet no successful official efforts have been made to obviate it.

Hon. O. P. Austin, the United States Government statistician, from returns received by him from the United States Geological Survey, shows that the output of coal during the year 1901 amounted to 292,240,758 short tons, and the valuation of this output, he states, was \$348,813,831. The entire output of coal stated represents about 97 per cent. of the coal production of the United States. This is equal to about 3.8 tons to every man, woman and child in the United States, and this ratio should be kept up.

Mr. Austin further states that the production of Pennsylvania anthracite amounted to 57,471,667 short tons in 1901 and that the average price of anthracite coal shipped to market or to the local trade, exclusive of colliery consumption, which amounted to 10 per cent. of the total, was \$2.05 per ton, which was the highest figure obtained since 1888. It is stated, however, that the output of anthracite coal would be greater if a sufficient number of cars to carry it could have been obtained.

It seems to the ordinary observer that the present condition of affairs should teach the State and nation a lesson not to dispose of their public lands unless they retain certain rights to their mineral lands. I remain,

AN ORDINANCE to change the lines of approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge:

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: That, in pursuance of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted by that Board on the 12th day of September, 1902, be and the same hereby is approved, viz:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the lines of the proposed approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the lines of the aforesaid approach as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the eastern line of Willis avenue with the northern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence running easterly along the northern line of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street for 575 feet; thence northerly and along the western line of Lots Nos. 97 and 78, on Block 2277, of the Map of The City of New York, 200 feet, to the southern line of the Southern Boulevard; thence westerly along the southern line of the Southern Boulevard for 575 feet, to the eastern line of Willis avenue; thence southerly along the eastern line of Willis avenue for 200 feet, to the point of beginning.

As stated by the Commissioner, the present quarters of Engine Company No. 41, located at No. 2801 North Third avenue, stands partly upon leased ground. The building is old and in very poor repair. The lot is only about 47 feet deep and not suitable for a new building and will be abandoned when the house in One Hundred and Fiftieth street is completed.

The Commissioner having expressed his willingness to defer the acquisition of a site for a hook and ladder company in the vicinity of Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, and new quarters for Engine Company No. 41 being necessary, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly authorize the transfer as requested by the Fire Commissioner.

That Mr. Herman Liebman, of Nos. 35 and 37 Nassau street, New York City, has offered to The City of New York, through the Department of Health, the foregoing described property, to be used by the said Department of Health in and for the Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of increasing the facilities for the care and treatment of persons ill with contagious diseases in said borough, the buildings which they now use having been found inadequate, for the sum of \$160 per lot.

On March 30, 1901, Judge Marean of the Supreme Court, in and for the County of Kings, appointed A. C. Wheeler, Joseph Manne and Peter Mahoney as Commissioners in the matter of the opening of Hawthorne street, from Nostrand to Albany avenue, and up to the present time about fifteen hearings have been had on the matter before said Commissioners, Assistant Corporation Counsel Breckenbridge of the Borough of Brooklyn representing the City. The Board of Estimate

and Apportionment, on July 28, 1902, passed a resolution in relation to said Hawthorne street, and on August 15, 1902, the title to the said Hawthorne street by reason of the proceedings thereunder vested in the City, for streets and highway purposes, the Department of Health cannot, therefore, use the ground in said street for any other purpose.

No. 963.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to whom was referred, on July 22, 1902 (Minutes, page 358), the annexed resolution, in favor of permitting the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York to build a tunnel under Cedar street, Manhattan, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York, its successors and assigns, to construct and maintain a tunnel under and across Cedar street, in the Borough of Manhattan, between Nassau and William streets, to connect the property controlled by the said Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York, on either side of said street, provided that the said the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as may be determined as an equivalent therefor by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and provided, further, that the said the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York shall stipulate with the President of the Borough of Manhattan to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of constructing the said tunnel, the work to be done and materials to be supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to whom was referred on July 22, 1902 (Minutes, page 362), the annexed ordinance in favor of requiring street surface railroad cars to come to a full stop at intersecting streets and thoroughfares, etc., on which are located schoolhouses and houses of the Fire Department, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE requiring street surface railroad cars to come to a full stop at intersecting streets and thoroughfares, etc., on which are located school houses and houses of the Fire Department.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. That each and every street surface railroad company operating cars for passenger service or otherwise shall cause each of its cars to come to a full stop before reaching the crossing of any street or thoroughfare on which there is located either a school house or house of the Fire Department, as follows: A northerly bound car shall stop on the southerly side of the street or thoroughfare intersecting the street or thoroughfare upon which it is operated, and in like manner a southerly bound car shall stop on the northerly side, an easterly bound car shall stop on the westerly side, and a westerly bound car shall stop on the easterly side of the street or thoroughfare intersecting the street or thoroughfare upon which it is operated. Wherever a school house or house of the Fire Department is located on a street or thoroughfare upon which is operated a street surface railroad each car operated thereon shall come to a full stop before passing either such school house or house of the Fire Department, whether the car is going in an easterly, westerly, northerly, or southerly direction.

Sec. 2. For each and every violation of either of the provisions of section one of this ordinance the company so offending shall incur a penalty of twenty-five dollars, to be recovered in the name of The City of New York, as in the case of other penalties.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York—Communication of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, Transmitting Resolutions Proposing Modifications to the Routes and General Plan—October, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, heretofore and on or about the 4th day of February, 1897, submitted to the Common Council of The City of New York, as then constituted, a report with respect to the proposed Rapid Transit Railroad in the said City. The said report contained a copy of the Routes and General Plan for the said Railroad, a copy of which Routes and General Plan is hereto annexed.

Since the said report was made the Routes and General Plan for the Rapid Transit Railroad above mentioned have been duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York and by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the First Judicial Department, and on the 21st day of February, 1900, a contract for the construction and operation of said Rapid Transit Railroad was duly made with John B. McDonald, Contractor, by The City of New York, acting by the said Board. The said Contractor is now engaged in the construction of the said Railroad pursuant to the terms of said contract.

The said Contractor desires, and the said Board, having duly made the inquiries and investigation proper in the premises, approves a modification of the Routes and General Plan for the said Railroad as heretofore adopted, and has determined and established the said modification by resolution adopted June 25, 1902, by the concurrent vote of six of its members, and for the purpose of the said modification has duly entered into an agreement with the said Contractor bearing date the 21st day of July, 1902. A copy of the said agreement is hereto annexed.

The said resolution of June 25, 1902, and the modification of the Routes and General Plan therein mentioned are now submitted to your Honorable Body for approval, if it shall see fit to approve the same.

The change in the route is approved by this Board because the change from tunnel to viaduct can be made with much less occupation of and obstruction to the use of the surface of the streets; because the change would make the operation of the road more practicable and transit over it quicker; because the location of the road as proposed is desired by many residents of The Bronx; and because it is estimated that the cost of the right of way for the road over and under private property will not be greater than the damages which the City will have to pay for the easements which the City will have to acquire in Westchester Avenue between Third and Brook Avenues.

Agreement made this 21st day of July, in the year 1902, between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (hereinafter called the Board), party of the first part, and John B. McDonald, of The City of New York (hereinafter called the Contractor), party of the second part:

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, the City, acting by the Board, entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation of a Rapid Transit Railroad in The City of New York and otherwise, as therein mentioned, the said contract being hereinafter styled the Contract for Construction and Operation; and

Whereas, The said Contract and the Routes and General Plan hereinafter mentioned have been since modified by agreement duly made between the City and the Contractor, with the consent of the sureties hereinafter mentioned; and

Whereas, The Contractor has deposited with the Comptroller of the City certain security for the performance of the said Contract for Construction and Operation on his part and has given certain bonds as further security for such performance, and upon such bonds there are sureties as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The City Trust Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Perry Belmont; and

Whereas, By written instruments bearing date the 10th day of July, 1902, the Contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said Rapid Transit Railroad for the term of years specified in the said contract and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the said contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said railroad, unto Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which Company also guaranteed the performance by the Contractor of the provisions of his said contract not so assigned to it; and

Whereas, The Contractor desires, and the Board approves, a further modification of the Routes and General Plan for the Rapid Transit Railroad referred to in the said Contract for Construction and Operation as set forth in certain resolutions adopted by the Board on 25th June, 1902, a copy of which is hereto annexed;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and subject to the consents hereinafter provided, it is agreed that the said Contract for Construction and Operation and the Routes and General Plan therein mentioned be, and the same hereby are, further modified as follows:

By striking from the said Routes the portion thereof in words as follows, to wit: "thence with a curve to the left and under Third Avenue to a point near its intersection with Westchester Avenue, thence with a curve to the right to and under Westchester Avenue."

And by inserting in the said Routes, instead of the portion thus struck out, the following words, to wit: "thence crossing Third Avenue and under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street and Bergen Avenue upon a curve to a point in the triangular block bounded by Bergen Avenue, Gerard Street and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street; at that point beginning to emerge from the ground, and thence upon a viaduct across Gerard Street and on or over private property in the block bounded by Westchester Avenue, Brook Avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Gerard Street and Bergen Avenue (crossing, if necessary, a part of Brook Avenue) to Westchester Avenue."

The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby substituted shall be as follows:

The tracks shall be placed in tunnel from the westerly end of such portion to a point on private property or on Gerard Street, between Bergen Avenue and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, and easterly over the rest of the portion of the route hereby substituted shall be carried upon a viaduct. The railroad may on the portion of the route between Third Avenue and Westchester Avenue occupy any portion of any of the streets of the route, but the railroad shall not at any place exceed thirty (30) feet in width. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

And it is further agreed that in all other respects the provisions of the General Plan of Construction set forth in the said Contract for Construction and Operation shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further agreed that the Contractor shall become entitled to additional payment for such additional work and materials as shall be made necessary by the changes hereby provided, and the City shall become entitled to abatement from the contract price by reason of the diminution in work and materials by reason of such changes, the amounts of such additional payments and such diminutions to be determined as provided in Chapter II of the said Contract for Construction and Operation:

Provided, however, and it is expressly agreed that this agreement shall take effect when and only when the following consents hereto and approvals hereof shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consents as subjoined of Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, The City Trust Safe Deposit & Surety Company of Philadelphia, The American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company, Perry Belmont and Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

2. The consent of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

3. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

4. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by this agreement proposed to be substituted as aforesaid, or if such consent cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three commissioners, to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

The plan hereto annexed is intended to show the modification of the routes as hereby proposed.

And by inserting in the said Routes, instead of the portion thus struck out, the following words, to wit: "thence crossing Third Avenue and under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street and Bergen Avenue upon a curve to a point in the triangular block bounded by Bergen Avenue, Gerard Street and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street; at that point beginning to emerge from the ground, and thence upon viaduct across Gerard Street and on or over private property in the block bounded by Westchester Avenue, Brook Avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Gerard Street and Bergen Avenue (crossing, if necessary, a part of Brook Avenue) to Westchester Avenue."

The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby substituted shall be as follows:

The tracks shall be placed in tunnel from the westerly end of such portion to a point on private property or on Gerard Street, between Bergen Avenue and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, and easterly over the rest of the portion of the route hereby substituted shall be carried upon a viaduct. The railroad may on the portion of the route between Third Avenue and Westchester Avenue occupy any portion of any of the streets of the route, but the railroad shall not at any place exceed thirty feet in width. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

In other respects the provisions of the said General Plan of Construction adopted on 14th January and 4th February, 1897, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

Resolved, That whereas this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said Routes and General Plan is necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York and should be established as hereinafter provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said Routes and General Plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

Resolved, That the said modification of the Routes and General Plan shall take effect only upon and after the following consents thereto and approvals thereof shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consent of John B. McDonald, contractor, and of his sureties, as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company; The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company; The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia; American Surety Company of New York; National Surety Company, and Perry Belmont.

2. The consent of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

3. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

4. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid; or, if such consents cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

And it is further

Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered _____, as showing in substance the modification hereby adopted.

And it is further

Resolved, That the President and Secretary of the Board be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute in the name of and on behalf of the Board a contract with the Contractor providing for the said modification of the Routes and General Plan.

"COPY ROUTES AND GENERAL PLAN.

"January 14, 1897.

"One route as follows: Its centre line shall commence at a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park Row; thence under Park Row and Centre street to a point at or near its intersection with New Elm street as proposed; thence under New Elm street, as proposed, to Lafayette Place; thence under Lafayette Place to Eighth street; thence across and under Eighth street, and thence under private property lying between Eighth and Ninth streets and east of the westerly side or line of Lafayette Place, produced, to Fourth avenue; thence under Fourth avenue and Park avenue to Forty-second street; thence turning from Park avenue into Forty-second street, and taking for the purposes of the curve, if necessary or convenient, private property at the southwest corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street; thence under Forty-second street to Broadway; thence under Broadway to Fifty-ninth street; thence under the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street; thence by viaduct along and over the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence under the Boulevard and

Eleventh avenue to a point on Eleventh avenue, situate north of One Hundred and Ninetieth street, and distant therefrom not less than one thousand and not more than one thousand five hundred feet, and thence under or over (as may be most convenient) private property to a point at the southeast end of Ellwood street, near Hillside street, and thence over Ellwood street to Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway; thence over Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway, as now proposed, to Riverdale avenue and thence easterly over Riverdale avenue to a point within five hundred feet of the present Kingsbridge station of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company.

"This route shall include a loop at the City Hall Park which shall connect with the portion of the route aforesaid along Centre street at or near the south end of that street, and thence proceed westerly and southerly under City Hall Park and Broadway, and thence easterly to again connect with the portion of the route aforesaid in Park Row. All of the said loop shall lie under City Hall Park, Park Row, between the south end of Centre street and Ann street, and the portion of Broadway adjoining the City Hall Park lying between Vesey and Murray streets. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the City Hall loop to the Postoffice, such tracks and connections being under the City Hall Park and under the portion of Park Row between the south end of Centre street and Ann street. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the portion of the route near the corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street to the yard and tracks of the Grand Central Station. All of the tracks and connections last mentioned shall be under Park avenue and Forty-second street and private property to be acquired. By private property in this description is meant property not forming part of the streets of The City of New York and not belonging to The City of New York.

"Also a route as follows: Its centre line shall diverge from the route aforesaid on the Boulevard, between a line parallel to and one hundred feet north of One Hundred and Third street and a line parallel to and one hundred feet south of One Hundred and Third street; thence under private property to a point in One Hundred and Fourth street, thence under One Hundred and Fourth street to and across Central Park West; thence under Central Park to the intersection of Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street; thence under Lenox avenue to a point near One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence curving to the east and passing under private property, One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets to the Harlem river at or near the foot of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; thence under the Harlem river and private property to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street at or near its intersection with River avenue; thence under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to a point near its intersection with Third avenue; [thence with a curve to the left and under Third avenue to a point near its intersection with Westchester avenue; thence with a curve to the right to and under Westchester avenue,] and thence by viaduct over and along Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard; thence over and along the Southern Boulevard to the Boston road, and thence over and along the Boston road to Bronx Park.

"The said General Plan of Construction hereby adopted is as follows:

"For the route under Park row and the said loop at City Hall Park, two parallel tracks; for the route from the point of connection of the City Hall loop with the route aforesaid at the southerly end of Centre street to the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard, four parallel tracks; for the route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard to the New York and Putnam Railroad Company's station at Kingsbridge, two parallel tracks; for the route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard to Bronx Park, two parallel tracks.

"All of the above-mentioned tracks shall be placed on the same level, except that wherever required by special necessities of surface or sub-surface structures or other special or local necessities and for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings at the southerly end of Centre street and the One Hundred and Third street junction, any one or more of the tracks may be depressed below the level of the other tracks to a depth of not more than twenty feet.

"The tracks shall be of standard gauge, that is to say, of a width of four feet and eight and a half inches between the rails. There shall be twelve and a half feet width in the tunnels and on the viaducts for each track, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and cross overs, the width may be increased to the extent permitted by the width of the tunnel. The tracks wherever passing over or under the streets shall be placed over or under the central part of the street, except that no tunnel or viaduct or any wall or part thereof under or along a street, shall, except at the stations, station approaches, curves and at places of access to sub-surface structures, as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five feet of the exterior line or side of the street. The tracks shall in all cases be placed in tunnels, except only that on the west side route on the Boulevard at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street the tracks shall emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct along the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and there be taken again into tunnel, and except also that on the west side route at a point at or near One Hundred and Ninetieth street the tracks shall again emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct over private property and the above-mentioned streets to the Kingsbridge station, and except also that on the east side from a point on Westchester avenue at or near Bergen avenue the tracks shall emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct over and along Westchester avenue and the other streets above mentioned to Bronx Park.

"Wherever the tracks change from tunnel to viaduct, or from viaduct to tunnel, the change shall be so made as to occupy or obstruct the use of the surface of the street to the least possible extent consistent with the proper gradient for the tracks.

"The roof of the tunnel shall be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit. The tunnel shall not be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear. The maximum widths of the tunnel in the clear shall be as follows:

"For the route under Park row and the City Hall Park loop, thirty-eight feet; for the route from, at or near the south end of Centre street and to the commencement of New Elm street, fifty feet; for the route from, at or near the commencement of New Elm street to Lafayette place, sixty-eight feet; for the route from, at or near the commencement of Lafayette place to the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street, fifty feet; for the west side route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street to Kingsbridge station, twenty-five feet; and for the east side route from, at or near the junction at One Hundred and Third street to Bronx Park, twenty-five feet; except that wherever the nature of the streets necessitates a curve that an additional width of tunnel may be added not exceeding three feet for each track, and except that on Fourth avenue, from Thirty-second to Forty-third street, the permissible width shall be sixty-five feet; and for the tunnel beneath the Harlem river and its approaches, the permissible width shall be thirty-five feet. At each cross street where accommodations for pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures have been provided within the tunnel, the tunnel may, in order to provide convenient access to such pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures, have, within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such cross street or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the route not to exceed fifteen feet, and the area of additional width on either side not to approach nearer than twelve feet to either side or exterior line of such cross street. Footways between the tracks shall be provided the whole length of the line and accommodations arranged for the convenience and protection of employees.

"Whenever necessary for the proper support of the street surface the roof of the tunnel shall be of iron or steel girders, with brick or concrete arches supported by iron or steel columns and masonry walls, or the roof shall be a masonry arch. Viaducts shall be built with a width of twelve and one-half feet for each track and with an additional width of three feet on each side for outside footways. Viaducts may be built of metal or masonry, or of both.

"Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections, and an additional track for siding accommodation may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway, but provided always that the side of the tunnel shall not, by the enlargement of the tunnel for that purpose, be brought within five feet of the exterior line or side of the street.

"Along Elm street, wherever the tunnel shall be in the clear not less than sixty-eight feet wide, the pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be placed in suitable galleries in the tunnel at the outside of the exterior tracks. But any such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures may be placed in suitable galleries beneath the tracks, or such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures may be placed in the ground above or at the sides of the tunnel, or at the outside of the exterior tracks, and whenever so placed beneath the tracks, or in the ground above or at the sides of the tunnel, the width of the tunnel on New Elm

street shall not be more than fifty feet. Pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall, at any part of the said routes, be removed or disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway, and, if removed or disturbed, shall be placed under the streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and buildings at any time.

"Station and station approaches shall, in general, be at the intersections of streets, and shall be built under, or, if the position of the tracks so require, over, the streets and immediately adjoining private abutting property, or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under or over streets and through private property as aforesaid, except that on the Boulevard stations and station approaches may be in the centre of the street. The streets under or over which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets, but no part of any cross street shall be used for a station or station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the street of the route. The word 'street,' wherever used herein, shall include an avenue or public place.

"Along the Boulevard there may be openings in the surface of the street from the tunnel for the purpose of ventilation and light; such openings shall be guarded by convenient and ornamental inclosures. The openings shall not exceed twenty feet in width and fifty feet in length. No two openings shall be within fifty feet of each other. No opening or part thereof shall be within the limits of, or opposite to, any street intersecting the Boulevard; and within the distance of any one block on the Boulevard between any two adjacent crossing streets there shall not be more than two such openings.

"The general mode of operation shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels or on the viaducts, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

"The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or open excavation; it is further

"Resolved, That plans be prepared to show the route and general plan, in so far as they are hereby adopted, which said plans, when formally adopted, shall be deemed to be incorporated herein and to form a part hereof.

"February 4, 1897.

"Resolved, That this Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York hereby adopts the drawings now produced and numbered from 1 to 60, both inclusive, as showing the route and general plan adopted by resolution of this Board on January 14, 1897, and that as provided in the said resolution the said drawings be deemed incorporated in and to form part of the said resolution; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said route and general plan, with the said drawings, and the said resolution of January 14, 1897, be, and they hereby are, adopted by this Board."

Resolution No. 1 for the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That the agreement of 21st July, 1902, made between The City of New York, acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and John B. McDonald, and the modification of the route and general plan of the rapid transit railroad, as therein set forth this day submitted, be considered at a meeting to be held on the 16th day of October, 1902, at 1 o'clock p. m., such date being not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt of said agreement of 21st July, 1902, and the modification of the route and general plan of the rapid transit railroad as therein set forth.

Resolution No. 2 for the Board of Aldermen.

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the City of New York did on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, enter into a contract with John B. McDonald for the construction and operation of a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, the routes and general plan of which were adopted by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners by its resolutions adopted on the 14th day of January and the 4th day of February, 1897, and later approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York and by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the First Judicial Department; and

Whereas, The said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners has, for The City of New York, entered into a further contract with the said John B. McDonald, the said contract bearing date the 21st day of July, 1902, and has thereupon transmitted to this Board a copy of said agreement of 21st July, 1902, and the modifications of the route and general plan of the rapid transit railroad as therein set forth, which agreement of July 21, 1902, and the modification of the route and general plan of the rapid transit railroad as therein set forth were received by this Board on the 7th day of October, 1902, and this Board having by resolution, duly adopted, fixed a day not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt of such plans and conclusions for the consideration thereof, and having duly considered the same,

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby does by a majority vote of all its members approve said agreement of July 21, 1902, and the plans and conclusions therein contained, and does consent to the construction of the railway or railways in accordance with the modification of the route and general plan as set forth in the said agreement of July 21, 1900, and that The City of New York does hereby approve said agreement and all such plans and conclusions and consents to such modification.

Which were severally referred to the Committee on Railroads.

The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have power to hear and determine complaints against any of the licensees hereunder and impose a fine of two dollars (\$2) for any violation of the regulations herein provided and subject to the approval of the Mayor shall have power to suspend the license pending payment of such fine. All such fines, when collected, shall be paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

Section 3. Horse-Troughs—Horse-troughs may be placed on sidewalks, adjacent to the curb, provided they be of a size and pattern approved by the President of the Borough in which they are located, and shall in no way prove an impediment to pedestrians. For each horse-trough the licensee therefor shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to pay as compensation such amount as shall be deemed an equivalent or as may be provided by the scale of water rents for the water supplied.

Section 4. No horse-trough shall be placed except as prescribed in section 3, and for each horse-trough so placed a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Section 5. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Public Education, to which was referred on March 4, 1902 (Minutes, page 1146), so much of the Mayor's message as had reference to our schools, would respectfully

REPORT:

That it has considered all the facts and suggestions therein contained and recommends for adoption the accompanying resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York is in hearty accord with the sentiments expressed concerning our public schools by his Honor the Mayor in his annual message to this Body;

That we recognize that the most important claim upon the resources of the City is to provide buildings and facilities for the education of the children of our citizens growing up among us;

That we pledge our aid and influence to increase the school accommodations until every child in the city shall have abundant opportunity to avail itself of the advantages of a common school education, believing, as we do, that education is the defence and the bulwark of our liberties.

On motion of Alderman Walkley this report received immediate consideration. The report was then adopted.

Resolved, That whereas, owing to the fact that a strike now exists in the coal mines of Pennsylvania, it is exceedingly difficult to purchase coal in large quantities except at exorbitant prices; and

Whereas, It is impracticable, under the circumstances, to make a contract for the future delivery of coal;

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be and he is hereby authorized to contract for and purchase coal without public letting, to be used in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, the amount thereof not to exceed twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000).

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was unanimously decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

At this point the Vice-Chairman again took the chair.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES AGAIN RESUMED.

Report of Joint Committees on Finance and Salaries and Offices—

No. 1094.

REPORT.

Your Committees on Finance and Salaries and Offices were jointly instructed by resolution of this Board to consider the question of equalizing the salaries of the Clerks in the office of the City Clerk and this Board. Your Committees have considered the matter and earnestly recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Your Committees realize that indiscriminate increase of salaries is not in accord with the policy of the Administration; and that the tendency is to rather reduce the annual budget than otherwise. While we are in sympathy with such general purpose, we nevertheless feel that the prevailing spirit of economy should not and will not prevent ample justice being meted out to faithful clerks who are admittedly underpaid.

From the character of the resolution devolving this work upon them, your Committees have not considered it was expected of them to consider decreasing any salaries, if such were possible or advisable. Nor have they supposed that they were to deal with the cases of the larger salaries. They have thought that the Board intended them to give attention to the insufficiencies in the way of salaries of those who now receive little for what is comparatively much work. They accordingly have confined themselves to cases of salaries now under \$2,000. They likewise realize that there is not much significance in the name of the individual's office, but that this Board desires to recommend pay according to the ability, knowledge, serviceableness and industry of the individuals.

It is probably the unanimous opinion of the Board that for what he knows about matters which concern the Board, the proper form of resolutions and the provisions of the Charter and the ordinances, what he does, his courtesy, industry and faithfulness, and his exceptionally good and useful advice, a salary of \$1,200 is ridiculously small for Frank J. Martin. Your Committees recommend that an increase to \$2,500 be asked. His title is that of Assistant Document Clerk, and he is engaged in the preparation of resolutions, ordinances and other documents for presentation to the Board; acts as Reading Clerk at the meetings; prepares for transmission to and receives from the Mayor the adopted papers; keeps the record book containing adopted resolutions and ordinances, showing final status of all papers; prepares for publication, weekly, in the "City Record" of all "Approved Papers"; aids in the preparation of and transmission to respective appropriate City departments of certified copies of adopted and approved papers, and makes searches for the Clerk, and performs such other clerical duties as may be assigned to him. He entered the City's service in January, 1895, and despite the increased volume of work which consolidation, growth and charter changes have brought, his salary has never been increased. Your Committees do not believe that the salary advocated is higher than usual for such a Clerk, and are confident that it is not high for the man.

The office of Librarian should at all times be treated as dignified and correspondingly compensated. The Library in the City Hall is in constant use by people who wish to look up official records. The present salary of \$1,000 is pittance for any one having charge of such a library. It compares unfavorably with the salaries paid other librarians, and should be greatly increased in the interest of equalization. The Librarian has held the office a number of years and worked faithfully, painstakingly and courteously. Your Committees recommend an increase to \$2,000.

Although the charter fixes the salary of the Commissioner of Deeds' Clerk at \$1,200, your Committees believe that that is insufficient compensation for the work performed by the present official, and they recommend that an increase to \$1,800 be requested.

Similarly should the pay of the Clerks W. E. Kurz and C. A. Glaser, both of whom have been in the City's service nearly eight years without any increase, and who are valuable employees because of their knowledge, faithfulness and courtesy, be increased to \$1,800 each, and that of Stuart Harris and C. R. Shopland, likewise both Clerks long in the City's employ, to \$1,500 each; that of T. C. Wassermann, also long in the City's employ, to \$1,350. They also recommend an increase in the pay of G. P. Osborn to \$1,200, and in that of James Cooney \$1,100.

Although she has not requested it, your Committees are of the opinion that the salary of Miss J. Appleboom, Stenographer and Typewriter, should be increased at least to \$1,000. Her salary is only \$750. Her work and faithfulness entitle her to the increase.

Your Committees desire to express their appreciation of the kindly and helpful spirit of the City Clerk in this matter and their belief that he will gladly do what the Board may ask of him.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS RESUMED.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity,
Commissioner's Office, No. 13-21 Park Row,
City of New York, October 7, 1902.

Hon. CHARLES V. FURNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Owing to the existence of the coal strike since prior to June 1, this department has been obliged to purchase coal upon emergency orders wherever and whenever the same could be obtained. The Comptroller has declined to honor the vouchers which have been duly certified for the amounts of these purchases unless your Board will give him authority to do so. Of course, if the dealers who have supplied the department in its time of need shall not receive payment for the coal supplied, it will greatly handicap this department in obtaining future deliveries. I, of course, do not need to call to your attention the vital necessity of being able to obtain coal in order to continue pumping water at the various stations under the jurisdiction of this department.

Will your Honorable Board kindly pass a resolution in the form I enclose? In this resolution I have specified each purchase of coal prior to the 18th of September, with the amount of such purchases. The purchases of coal made since the 18th of September will be taken care of by the resolution which your Board passed on that date authorizing me to buy coal upon emergency orders without public letting, to the amount of thirty thousand dollars.

Whereas, The offer of the President of the Mine Workers to submit the proposition to a tribunal to be named by the Chief Executive of the nation "to determine the issues that have resulted in the strike," and that if the operators "will accept the award or decision of such a tribunal the miners will willingly accept it, even if it is against their claims," is alike commendable and appeals with no small force to the people; and

Whereas, It is deplored that the operators of coal do not see or feel the situation in the light in which it will affect the masses of people, and decline to meet on common ground the overtures made for settlement by arbitration on behalf of the miners and the entreaty of the President to bring to an end, in an amicable way, an intolerable condition of affairs; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, commending and indorsing the action of the President of the United States for the laudable effort made in behalf of the people, does hereby urge him to continue said effort, with the hope and prayer that thereby a speedy settlement of the strike of the coal miners in Pennsylvania may be effected and the suffering which a continuance of the strike will entail may be averted; further

Resolved, That, in the event of non-compliance on the part of the several parties concerned in said coal strike to meet and amicably adjust existing differences, the President of the United States be and he hereby is requested to call a special session of the Congress, with a view to modifying or revising the tariff on coal, so that foreign operators of mines may be induced to transport coal to this country with some profit and thereby minimize, if not wholly avert, the threatened calamity which faces the general public.

Gentlemen—The strike of the miners of anthracite coal has resulted in conditions detrimental to the best interests and well being of all our citizens.

The near approach of winter means fearful privation to the poorer classes, and even the great inconvenience for the very rich. Coal has become a luxury and in a few days the local supply will be entirely exhausted. Wood can only be secured by the payment of exorbitant prices. Many manufacturers, and particularly small ones who produce the necessities of life, will be compelled to close their establishments, thereby depriving thousands of employment.

We view with dread the dangers which menace our fair city if this suicidal struggle continues. The sight of cold, hungry and sick women and children will make men desperate and add additional financial burdens on our people incurred in efforts to maintain peace and order.

There is no relief in sight. The coal mine operators have arrogantly refused to consider all the honorable overtures made by the United Mine Workers and they have even refused to submit their case to the President of the United States for arbitration, utterly ignoring his desire for a peaceful settlement in the interest of the whole of the citizens of these United States. By this action on the part of the Coal Barons it is apparent that they are determined to crush out that independent spirit that is inherent to all liberty-loving citizens, and their openly avowed determination to wipe out the United Mine Workers of America means to turn back the march of progress and enlightenment and return to the feudalism and chattel slavery when no man dare call his soul his own.

Therefore we, the undersigned, citizens of New York, in view of the terrible condition confronting us, appeal to you, our chosen representatives, and request that you take such action as you may deem necessary to prevent or alleviate suffering among the poor; and we further petition you to exert all efforts in your power to compel an honorable settlement of the dispute between the anthracite mine owners and their employees.

DEAR SIR—One December 13, 1901, I had the honor to apply to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for permission to construct a third track along the viaduct structure in The Bronx, and to be allowed for the same as extra work, as provided in the contract.

Your Chief Engineer, Mr. Parsons, has furnished us with the plans for the structure, showing three tracks; shop drawings have been made by the American Bridge Company for three tracks, and this company is awaiting our order for the structural steel, but no reply has been received to my application of December 13, last.

I beg, therefore, to renew my application.

The matter of the third track along the viaduct structure in The Bronx as requested by the Contractor in the letter above, dated July 22, 1902, was taken up and the following resolution was moved:

GENTLEMEN—The attack upon the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and its officers, contained in the letter presented to your Board by J. Edward Swanstrom on July 21 was a complete surprise to this company, as it doubtless was to your Board.

Since his letter was evidently intended to influence the award of the tunnel contract, and since his charges are absolutely without foundation, the Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company deem it due to you, as well as to themselves, that the inclosed complete refutation of Mr. Swanstrom's charges should be presented to your Board.

Immediately after the publication of the charges our Board of Directors requested a report in detail from its officers and that report, approved by the Directors after due investigation and discussion, is submitted herewith.

The Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company consists of A. N. Brady, A. R. Flower, H. H. Porter, E. H. Harriman, W. G. Oakman, R. S. Hayes, J. L. Greetsinger, August Belmont, Henry Seibert, J. G. Jenkins, D. H. Valentine, H. C. Du Val and T. S. Williams, and of these gentlemen the following were present at the meeting approving such data: A. To the Board of Directors, Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company:

GENTLEMEN—With reference to the letter of J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, read before the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, a copy of which is hereto attached, I desire to make the following statement:

On April 8 the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company received a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works requiring us to place in repair the pavement upon certain specified streets with the materials specified in his letter. This list of streets covered nearly three pages and embraced about four hundred different points. These defects had all appeared during the winter, when, of course, no work could be done.

On April 10, receipt of this communication was acknowledged, and the General Manager was instructed to have an Inspector go over the different streets named and make notes of their condition. His report of the total cost, which amounted to \$7,523, was received on April 30, and on the same date the General Manager was directed to proceed with the repairs required by the Commissioner's letter. This order was placed in the hands of the Engineer of Maintenance of Way, with directions to proceed with the work upon the streets named in the letter, and on May 13 the Commissioner of Public Works was informed that the inspection had been made and that our paving gang had been instructed to proceed with the work at the points named, giving a list of all points at which defects in pavement were found. This letter was acknowledged by the Commissioner of Public Works on May 17, and the repair of the pavement was commenced. At about that time it was found expedient

not to further prosecute this work until after the 1st of July. This decision was communicated to the Commissioner of Public Works and met with his approval.

On the 1st of July three paving gangs were put to work on the repairs required and have been steadily at work ever since. These repairs will be completed within a reasonable time and in accordance with the order of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Replying to his specific allegation, that on March 3, 1902, "this corporation was notified to have and keep in permanent repair, with granite block pavement, on concrete base, with tar and gravel joints, the pavement of Flatbush avenue, between their tracks and the rails of their tracks, from Malbone street to Fort Hamilton avenue. On June 27, 1902, they replied that no obligation rested upon the company to incur the expense of such repaving." We made application, on April 7, 1902, for permission to repair the pavement on Flatbush avenue at the points named with cobblestone. The franchise under which these tracks were laid specifically requires that a certain distance between the tracks and on either side shall be kept in repair with cobblestone under certain size. As this was practically a suburban street and the sides were paved with asphalt, so that carriages had a smooth driveway and there were but few crossings, I did not think it wise to expend the amount required to renew this granite block pavement, so long as the counsel of the company advised me that we were under no legal obligation to do this paving. The Commissioner of Public Works refused to grant us permission to make the repairs with cobblestone, as required by our franchise, and no work has been done upon that street.

The next allegation of his letter is that "they were ordered to have and keep in permanent repair, with granite block pavement, on concrete base, with tar and gravel joints, the pavement of Union street, between Fourth avenue and Court street. On June 27, 1902, they informed this Department that they would accede to the request. They began to lay this pavement on sand and were stopped. After a conference the company was permitted to repave on sand between Court street and Gowanus canal, and the rest on concrete. Of this work nothing has been done." This matter was taken up with the Commissioner of Public Works by Mr. Brackenridge. The Commissioner authorized the company to relay the pavement upon a concrete made of cinders and cement. Owing to the fact that but little hard coal was being consumed in power-houses we did not have sufficient cinders to proceed with this work further then. Mr. Brackenridge called upon Mr. Redfield and explained the situation, and Mr. Redfield stated that it would be entirely satisfactory to the City if we made the repairs as soon as we had cinders sufficient to do the work. This pavement was laid by the railroad company and was practically new, but was in some places uneven.

The next allegation is that we were "instructed in contemplation of the proposed paving with asphalt of Third avenue, from Sixtieth street to the Shore road, to repave the space between their tracks and between the rails of their tracks. They have neglected or refused to obey these instructions." This work, if done as ordered by the Commissioner, would cost about \$65,000, and under the conditions of the franchise for operating upon that street I was advised by counsel we were under no legal obligation to do the paving, or that at any rate, the matter was so uncertain as to that particular franchise that it was best to refuse at first to do this paving, and afterward, if found advisable, to conform with the Commissioner's instructions, to do the work, a portion each year. The City has not yet done its share of repaving upon Third avenue, and it is impossible for us to do the work there until the City contractor begins his work. This is thoroughly understood by the Commissioner of Public Works, and by Mr. Swanstrom and our Chief Engineer. Estimates are being made by the Chief Engineer as to the cost of readjusting the tracks to the grade of the street, which will be changed in some places, and we may find that it is advisable for us, in view of the fact that the grade of the tracks will be changed, to lay a part of this paving, agreeing with the Commissioner, perhaps, to lay the balance of it during the next year.

His next allegation is as to our failure to do the paving upon Gates avenue. Third avenue, Nostrand avenue and Flatbush avenue. During the regime of my predecessor I am informed by counsel that the obligation of the company to pave on the lines covered by the old Brooklyn City franchises was frequently discussed between the City and the company. On many streets, such as Fulton street, the company paid for the new granite pavement and kept it in repair. On some of the streets, such as Greene avenue, the company refused to do the paving, and Mr. Wells tells me that he asked the Corporation Counsel several times during the last four years to bring suit against the company upon a strip upon Greene avenue, in order to have the courts finally determine the legal question involved. This the Corporation Counsel neglected to do until this summer, but suit is now pending for the paving of two blocks on Greene avenue for about \$8,000, which the City claims it spent in relaying the pavement. I am advised by counsel that under these old Brooklyn City franchises the company is not under legal obligation to do the paving. The wording of the franchises is such that the company is obliged to keep the pavement between its tracks and three feet on each side in good repair with the best cobblestone. No court in this State has yet decided that where the conditions of a franchise are specific and clear, that the Legislature has power by general or other law to alter those conditions. The general railroad law does not require us to pave with whatever new material the City may determine upon, when the paving is specified by said franchises, and counsel advises me that this general provision of the railroad law does not apply to very many of our old franchises, including those of the Brooklyn City Railroad Company. Our company has never refused to pay towards the cost of any kind of pavement the City might desire, that part of the cost which would represent the expense to the company of laying the pavement required by its franchise, and it has frequently of its own volition contributed part, and in some cases the entire cost of repaving where it was advised by counsel that no obligation existed so to do.

The new paving ordered by the Commissioner of Public Works this year on the streets upon which I am advised by counsel we are not required to do the paving, will amount to nearly \$200,000. As the expense of repaving ordered upon streets where we are clearly obliged to do the paving must be about \$100,000, the directors felt that they should not for the present authorize the expenditure of the larger amount.

President Swanstrom's next allegation is as to the tearing up of tracks on Humboldt street. These tracks upon Humboldt street parallel about 200 feet distant our tracks upon Graham avenue. Mr. Rossiter determined that it would be better to build a single block continuing the Meeker avenue line to connect with the Graham avenue line than it would to put in repair both the Graham avenue and the Humboldt street lines. The estimated cost upon Humboldt street of doing the new paving required and of laying the new track was about \$28,000, and the line was practically of no use to us. The Corporation Counsel insisted that we had no right to build the connecting block on Meeker avenue, but our counsel advised us that we had perfect right to do so. Mr. Rossiter agreed with the City authorities at that time, that if they would grant permission to build this connecting block the company would remove the tracks upon Humboldt street upon obtaining the necessary authority. The permission so granted contains the following words:

"This permission is granted and accepted under agreement that upon all the necessary authority having been received for the removal of tracks upon Humboldt street, from Meeker avenue to Grand street, the company will remove the double track, overhead wires and poles thereon and restore the street to its former condition at the latter location."

This condition was understood by the company to refer to the consents of the Railroad Commissioners, the consent of the Brooklyn City Railroad Company, and the consent of the mortgagees of the Brooklyn Railroad mortgages. This condition was also understood by the City authorities to refer to these consents. On January 27, 1902, the situation was communicated to the Brooklyn City Railroad Company, and their consent to the removal of these tracks was requested. This they refused to give, and it therefore became unnecessary to apply either to the Board of Railroad Commissioners or to the mortgagees. The fact that we were unable to obtain this consent was communicated to Mr. Swanstrom on March 11, 1902. In that letter we informed Mr. Swanstrom of the situation and told him that if the City authorities were under the impression that the permit to construct the block upon Meeker avenue was granted in consideration of the agreement to remove the tracks from Humboldt street, we were entirely willing to have the question of right to construct on Meeker avenue tested in Court in any manner in which he might be advised without regard to the removal of tracks from Humboldt street, and upon the same basis as if the Meeker avenue tracks had not yet been built. Mr. Swanstrom

was also informed in that letter that it would be necessary to relay our tracks and repave between the tracks on Humboldt street and that if he would inform us when the City would repave the balance of the street we would arrange to have the tracks relaid and the pavement renewed. The tracks were at that time disconnected at both ends and in some cross streets and were in very bad condition. Notwithstanding this letter, Mr. Redfield ordered the tracks removed from Humboldt street and they were removed by the employees of the City without reply to my letter. Our company was lessee of these tracks and had no power to remove them without consent of the owner, which was well known to Mr. Swanstrom.

The next allegation of Mr. Swanstrom is that the company was notified on April 17, 1902, that by reason of the maintenance of the railroad cut over the south line of Thirty-eighth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, and the absence of a retaining wall upon the side of said cut, the said Thirty-eighth street between the points mentioned had fallen into the excavation; that we were requested to restore the said street and that on April 22nd we stated that the property in question belonged to the South Brooklyn Railway Company, but that our Engineer was preparing plans for the purpose of furnishing a permanent support to this street and that as soon as the plans and estimates were completed they were to confer with this Department in this matter. He says further that we had assumed a policy of absolute inactivity for now three months, and that the street still remains in a condition which menaces the lives and property of citizens. The fact is, that this cut, known as the "South Brooklyn Terminal Cut," has been in its present condition for eight or ten years. As soon as we acquired the property Mr. Swanstrom granted the adjoining lot owners permission to dump earth upon Thirty-eighth street, with the alleged purpose of bringing it up to grade. The slope of the cut upon that side of our right of way ran up so close to the street that when this filling was done, part of the filling rolled down the embankment on to our track. At the time that the letter was written to Mr. Swanstrom concerning this matter I asked my Engineer to prepare plans and estimates for a retaining wall along this cut. These plans were prepared and an estimate made of the retaining wall which would be necessary. It was found that the cost of such retaining wall, owing to the length, width and height necessary, would be prohibitory, and plans are now being prepared for constructing an arch over the tracks in order that the space may be filled in above. By doing so we will obtain lots fronting on Thirty-eighth street which will pay part of the cost of the arch and the filling. These plans are not yet so complete that we can submit them to the City authorities, but we expect to do so within a few days.

His further allegation is that the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company is financially indebted to The City of New York, that the former Department of Highways advanced the funds of the City to effect certain repaving which under the provisions of the general railroad law devolved upon the said railroad company, but which the said railroad company refused or neglected to do. This, and the next paragraph of this letter, in which he says that he has instructed the Law Department to commence legal proceedings, refers to the paving of two blocks of Greene avenue which I have mentioned above, and in which the City brought suit early this month.

Fred Cocheu, E. S. White, C. P. Harmon, C. M. Chadwick, D. H. Valentine, H. A. Meyer, John L. Wells, Mr. Bartlett and Mr. Litchfield spoke in favor of awarding the contract to John L. Wells; A. E. Sanders and August Belmont spoke in favor of making the award to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company.

President Orr then announced the hearing closed and Vice-President Starin moved the following resolution, which President Orr seconded:

Resolved, That the Board, in behalf of The City of New York, hereby accepts the proposal for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad made by the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the price of \$2,000,000, in addition to \$1,000,000 for terminals, and hereby authorizes the President and Secretary to execute in the name of the Board for and on behalf of The City of New York the contract for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, as heretofore approved by the Board and by such proposal; and it is further

Resolved, That the President of the Board, together with Messrs. Starin and Smith, be and they hereby are authorized as a committee to approve in behalf of the Board the securities, if any to be deposited by Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the said contractor, pursuant to the terms of the said contract, and to approve the sufficiency of the sureties upon the bond or bonds to be given by such contractor, pursuant to the terms of such contract and in behalf of the Board to approve the execution of such bond or bonds and in all other matters incidental to the execution and delivery of such contract to act for and on behalf of the Board and in its name.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

Carried.

In voting aye the Mayor said in part:

"I stand here as the representative of the entire City of New York, and my vote will be cast upon the best consideration that I can give to the general interest of the entire municipality. I propose to vote in favor of this resolution. In doing so I think it is due to my friends in Brooklyn that I should state clearly that it seems to me it is in their own interest that I should vote in this way. My old fellow townsmen will not believe, I know, that I would cast my vote against the best interests of my birthplace. Brooklyn twice elected me her Mayor, and again gave me a large majority last fall.

"I realize that at this moment the minds of the people of Brooklyn are somewhat clouded by fear. There are certain objections to the bid of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company which will be appreciated when they have been stated. This is the second franchise for a road that was planned for the entire city. If the Brooklyn Rapid Transit bid should be accepted it would be necessary to pay two fares to ride the length of this road. Every citizen would be outraged if he could not ride from one end to the other of a road built by the City for a single fare.

"In the second place, if the bid of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company should be accepted, all who came from Manhattan and The Bronx to the City Hall would have to pay a second fare in order to get to the Battery, and the multitudes of passengers affected would not be small. I think the people of Brooklyn will see that these are valid objections against a city official voting for the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company's bid, but they do not show why the Belmont bid is in their interest.

"The people of Brooklyn are claiming the right to come to Manhattan for a single fare. Is no resident of Brooklyn ever to come to Manhattan for a single fare, unless his destination is below the City Hall? Brooklyn has been made what it is by the East river. Population has gone largely north because of the difficulty in crossing this natural barrier. It is now proposed to create an artificial division at the City Hall, which would make it necessary to pay a double fare each way. I contend that the natural division should never be duplicated by an artificial one. I believe that the unification of the City depends on making it possible to go from one part to any other of it for one fare. If we don't make the first step sure, we shall fail.

"They say they cannot operate here for less than a five-cent fare, yet we know that in the cities of the West there are three-cent fares. It will be a great step in advance if we keep the tunnel system a unit. There are many persons in Brooklyn who can avail themselves of the tunnel if it is built by the Belmont Syndicate. The Belmont people want to build a line of tunnels on the east side of Manhattan. Construction will not stop there. The system will spread out wherever people want to go. The City will never allow more than one fare to be collected from one end of the tunnel to the other.

"Altogether it is in the interest of the whole City to accept the Belmont bid. The tunnel is not the only effort that is being made to relieve the congestion in traffic from Brooklyn. The second bridge should be finished by October 1, 1903, and engineers are at work on plans for connecting this bridge with the existing bridge. Unless the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company shall decide not to co-operate in a large way, this connection will give a single fare to the City Hall. My thoughts go forward to the time when the third bridge will be finished. I am firmly convinced that no greater mistake could be made in the interest of the people of Brooklyn than to permit this opportunity to pass."

The Comptroller in voting aye said he was heartily in accord with the resolution for the reasons which the Mayor had so well stated, and for two other reasons: First, that to accept the bid of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company would be to create another centre of congestion near the City Hall, and for the further reason

that he thought the City by reason of the low bid of the Belmont Company would now be in a position to build a second tunnel to Brooklyn.

President Orr then presented the following statement, which was read:

It was my earnest hope that the Brooklyn-Manhattan contract should include connections on a single five-cent fare basis, covering all of the Borough of Brooklyn which will be tributary to the proposed tunnel. It is impossible not to congratulate the City upon the exceedingly favorable terms included in the bid of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company. The price of \$2,000,000 is only one-fourth or one-fifth the estimated cost over and above the cost of terminals for which an additional and separate \$1,000,000 is bid. It is plain, besides, that the proposed contract with the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company will of and by itself be exceedingly advantageous to Brooklyn. If it had been possible for the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Railroad to have made a bid measurably near the very low bid of Mr. Belmont's Company, the Board, I am sure, would have approved giving the preference to the Brooklyn bid because of the most advantageous system of connections which it has proposed. In my opinion, the Board, having very properly awarded the contract to the Manhattan Company because of its exceptional advantages, is now under every obligation to at once consider the interests of Brooklyn. The City, including the Borough of Brooklyn, is bearing the burden of an expenditure of upwards of \$36,750,000 upon the Manhattan-Bronx Railroad. The Board had intended that the next \$8,000,000 or \$10,000,000 of rapid transit expenditure should go to Brooklyn. Under the terms of the bid which the Board has now accepted there is available, after providing Brooklyn with a substantial measure of rapid transit, a balance for rapid transit purposes of approximately \$6,000,000. In my opinion, that sum should be at once dedicated to Brooklyn. I therefore propose a resolution to the effect that before the Board proceed to lay out any other rapid transit route involving municipal expenditure, it shall lay out a direct route between the neighborhood of the City Hall, in Manhattan, and Borough Hall Park or other satisfactory point of distribution in Brooklyn. Such tunnel can be much shorter and much less expensive than the tunnel now contracted for. I therefore offer this resolution with the idea that the Board shall do its utmost to procure a contractor who is able and willing, upon reasonable terms, to provide on the basis of a single fare of five cents, connection facilities of the general character of those which the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system is able to offer.

President Orr moved the following resolution, which the Comptroller seconded: Whereas, It has been the hope of this Board that it might be able to execute a contract for the construction of the Manhattan-Brooklyn Rapid Transit Railroad with a contractor who could and would for a single five-cent fare provide extensive connections in the Borough of Brooklyn of the character in general of those controlled by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company; and

Whereas, The Board has felt constrained, by reason of the far more favorable terms to the City offered by the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, to reject the bid made by John L. Wells, acting in the interest of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Railroad Company; and

Whereas, It is the intention and desire of the Board that the amount of money for municipal rapid transit construction which has been saved to the City by the bid of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for \$2,000,000, instead of for the estimated actual cost of such construction, being the sum of about \$8,000,000, shall, if practicable upon reasonable terms, be applied to some rapid transit connection between the boroughs of Brooklyn and Manhattan which shall secure to the majority of citizens of Brooklyn who do business in Manhattan, and are not adequately served by other rapid transit facilities, rapid transit service between their homes in Brooklyn and the business section of Manhattan for a single fare per entire trip not exceeding five cents; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be directed to prepare and submit to this Board routes and general plan of a rapid transit railroad which shall, as directly as practicable, connect the general region of the City Hall Park, in the Borough of Manhattan, with the general region of Borough Hall Park or some other equally convenient passenger transportation centre in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

Carried.

The Mayor also seconded the resolution of President Orr. He said he did not believe in the idea of dedicating in advance a certain sum to rapid transit or any other purpose, but thought the City should get its finances in such a condition that all the much needed public improvements could be carried on without delay.

The Board then went into executive session.

The following letter of the Comptroller's Engineers was read:

July 24, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The work of laying a third track for the Rapid Transit Railroad, from a point at or near the north side of One Hundred and Third street to the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and Broadway, was authorized by a resolution of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, at a meeting held May 2, and an amendatory contract to that dated February 21, with John B. McDonald, Contractor, was executed defining such work as extra work under the terms of the original contract and specifying that the contractor should be paid the reasonable value of constructing such side work in addition to the amounts named in the original contract, viz.: \$35,000,000, exclusive of terminals.

The Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners have forwarded to this Department, for payment, ten (10) vouchers in favor of John B. McDonald, contractor, for said extra work, on account of third track, sections 11 and 12, in the total sum of \$308,000, for work done to July 1.

These vouchers have been presented one each month, since September, 1901, and have not been certified for the following reasons:

1st. That there is no money available for the payment of these vouchers.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 1, 1900, authorized the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$36,500,000, the estimated amount of the original contract, and the Comptroller's certificate to that effect is upon the said contract.

There is no Comptroller's certificate attached to the modified contract or agreement of May 2, 1901, and I know of no funds authorized for such extra work as the said contract and vouchers call for.

Again, there is no estimate of cost of the extra work or limit to the amount of work which the contractor shall put upon the third track, and be paid the reasonable value thereof.

In other words, in my opinion this amendatory contract, termed an agreement, is not a contract in the general acceptance of the term by this Department, but is an order from the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners for certain work, to an unlimited amount, for which no funds have been provided.

2nd. The partial payments called for in the vouchers are based upon the unit prices upon which the contractor is paid for construction upon the original contract.

I do not believe that these unit prices represent the reasonable value of his work, and even though this is but a partial payment on account, I believe that the reasonable value of such work can be agreed upon at the present time, rather than two years hence, at the completion of the contract, when prices and conditions may be much changed.

In company with Mr. Withington I have held one or two conferences with Chief Engineer Parsons, and under date of December 16, 1901, a communication from the Rapid Transit Commission was received by you, inclosing a copy of a letter addressed to the Rapid Transit Board by its Chief Engineer, which reads in part as follows:

"On May 2, 1901, by resolution of the Rapid Transit Board, John B. McDonald was authorized to construct a storage track between One Hundred and Third street and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, on Broadway, and such work should be done and paid for as extra work under the contract for construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad. This work has been in progress for some months, and at the present time the estimate stands as follows:

"These quantities have been included in the approximate estimates made during the last few months, and the prices at which these estimates have been made are the same as those of the original contract as reported to you on September 27, 1900. It is impossible at the beginning to fix cost prices, but it is possible that as the work proceeds they may be increased or diminished from time to time. For purposes

of estimating we can take the arbitrary unit prices used in computing the proportions of cost under the general contract. On completion of this extra work I reserve the right to adjust these prices to suit the conditions that may develop."

The letter of transmittal states:

"The Chief Engineer laid before the Rapid Transit Board at its last meeting his plan for estimating the value of the work done under this extra contract from time to time, so that monthly requisitions can be made by the contractor for payment. This plan was approved by the Rapid Transit Board, and the Secretary was authorized to transmit to you a copy of the same, which I do herewith."

In connection with this manner of payment, the Chief Engineer stated that the contractor had agreed to accept the unit prices as fixed for the original contract, for partial or monthly payments for extra work ordered.

While the original contract provides that the Commissioners may order the contractor to do extra work at the reasonable value thereof, it also provides that should any part of the line be changed with the consent of the contractor, diminishing the amount of work, then the reasonable value of such work shall be deducted from the sum bid, viz., \$35,000,000.

Under these provisions I submit that should the changes made in the line make reductions in the total sum of the contract, which would equal in labor and material the amount of the extra work, then no injury would result to either party to the contract by paying upon the basis of unit prices; and further, that if the amount of the reduction of the contract price was fixed and determined between the Rapid Transit Commissioners and the contractor, and an agreement to that effect made in writing between them, then I believe payment could be made for extra work by so much as the contract price is reduced.

However, so far as I can learn no definite figures are at present available for the saving in cost by reason of the following changes of plan:

1st. Omission of loop around Postoffice.

2d. Straightening of line from Fort George, north, and no exact figures have been agreed upon except as to laying a water main in Fortieth street, which was ordered April 11, 1901, at a cost not to exceed \$40,000.

The other additional work authorized which I have knowledge from the printed minutes of the Board, is:

1st. Third track One Hundred and Third to One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, May 2, 1901.

2d. Station at Jennings street, Bronx, February 6, 1902.

3d. Vitriified ducts for electrical conduits.

And there is now under consideration:

1st. Change of line at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Third avenue.

2d. A third track on the elevated structure in the Borough of The Bronx.

On December 13, 1901, Commissioner Rives offered the following resolution, which was adopted (Minutes, page 1317):

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the request of Mr. McDonald for an additional third track in the Borough of The Bronx should be granted, provided the same can be legally done, and that the Chief Engineer be instructed to prepare a report containing an estimated statement of the cost of the additional work already authorized over and above the original contract, and including the probable cost of the proposed extension to Brooklyn, and the saving made by certain omissions from the contract.

Ayes—The President, and Commissioners Langdon, Rives, Smith and Jesup.

Nays—None.

Carried.

—and on January 9, 1902, the following note appears in the Minutes, page 1348:

"The Chief Engineer made a verbal report to the Board as to the estimated cost of the extra work now in progress or already authorized."

The saving of cost to the City by the changes of line and the amounts of extra work authorized and ordered, are not matters of record, and in consequence, the liability of the City is undetermined, except as to \$36,500,000.

I would suggest to you the advisability of having these uncertain factors determined and fixed between the contractor and the Commission, and in all future orders for extra work, the advisability of having the authorization fix the amount.

It was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

The Comptroller brought up the matter of the easements of the Astor Estate at Forty-second street and Broadway. The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board, it is necessary to acquire, for the purpose of constructing and operating the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, real property easements and rights at the northeasterly corner of Broadway and Forty-second street in the Borough of Manhattan, and that the Counsel and Chief Engineer be requested to submit to the Board for its approval a form of deed from the trustees under the will of William Astor, deceased, of the said easement, the consideration on the part of the City for such easement to be the covenant to construct the Rapid Transit Railroad at such point in conformity with reasonable requirements of the Astor estate with respect to its buildings there, such extra construction not to exceed in cost the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

Carried.

The matter of the easement at the northwest corner of Broadway and Forty-second street, as to which an appraisal value of \$50,000 had been had, was referred to the Comptroller, it being the understanding that a comparative estimate of the value of the easements at this corner should be made.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer of this Board be instructed to prepare plans for an extension of the Rapid Transit Railroad on Broadway, from Forty-second street to Union square; and to report as to the advisability of continuing the construction down Broadway south of Union square.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon and Smith.

Nays—None.

The Secretary reported that maps of easements and right of way between Eighth and Ninth streets, to be acquired by condemnation proceedings, had been transmitted to the Corporation Counsel and President of the Borough of Manhattan for the institution of such proceedings. Secretary reported that the agreement authorized by the Board on April 10, 1902, had been executed by the President and Secretary, and by all the others interested, amending the contract with John B. McDonald as to the error discovered in the substitution of the word "less" for the word "more" in the contract.

Secretary reported that the President in accordance with authority conferred upon him by the Board had executed renewal of telephone contract for the main office and Chief Engineer's office.

Secretary reported that the President had signed a communication to the Board of Aldermen, as authorized by the Board, transmitting the certificate of the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, the same being delivered to the Board of Aldermen at its meeting of July 15, 1902. The communication was as follows:

BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
No. 320 BROADWAY, NEW YORK CITY,

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The New York and Jersey Railroad Company (hereinafter called the Tunnel Company) is a railroad corporation incorporated under the Laws of the State of New York, for the purpose of owning and operating the tunnel and railroad formerly of the Hudson Tunnel Railway Company and of constructing and operating a tunnel railroad in The City of New York, to be connected with a railroad or railroads within the State of New Jersey, and thereby forming a continuous line for the carriage of passengers and property between a point or points within and a point or points without the City, and more particularly a tunnel railroad having its eastern terminus in the block bounded by Christopher, West Tenth, Greenwich and Hudson streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and thence extending westwardly and to be connected with a railroad or railroads in the State of New Jersey, and thus forming a continuous line for the carriage of passengers and property between such easterly terminus of the railroad of the Tunnel Company within the City and points along the lines of such railroads in the State of New Jersey and other States.

The Tunnel Company, pursuant to section 32 of chapter 4, of the Laws of 1891, as amended by chapter 584 of the Laws of 1902 (which entire statute, as amended by various acts, and as now in force, is hereinafter called the Rapid Transit Act), made application to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (which is hereinafter called the Board) for authority to lay railroad tracks along a certain route within the City, and to have and maintain therein a terminal station and to acquire in the City terminal and other facilities necessary for the accommodation of the traveling public, and to construct and operate its railroad along the said route, and under lands, streets, avenues, waters, rivers, highways and public places in the City, with necessary sidings, platforms, stations, facilities for access to the surface and other appurtenances, and with the right to emerge to the surface, upon private lands at the terminus thereof in Manhattan Borough, all as set forth in the certificate dated July 10, 1902, hereinafter more particularly referred to, and to transport over the said railroad passengers or freight or both.

The Board, on the 10th day of July, 1902, by a concurrent vote of six of its members, as follows: Alexander E. Orr, John H. Starin, Woodbury Langdon, Charles Stewart Smith, Seth Low, Mayor, and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, fixed and determined the locations and plans of construction of said railroad of the Tunnel Company upon such route and of such tracks and facilities, the times within which they shall be respectively constructed, and the compensation to be paid therefor to the City by the Tunnel Company, and also prescribed such terms, conditions and requirements as to the Board appeared to be just and proper for the grant in question, including the terms, conditions and requirements provided by the Rapid Transit Act, and including among them a provision that the Tunnel Company shall, from the time of the commencement of the operation of such railroad, under the determination of the Board, annually pay to the City a sum or rental for a period of twenty-five years, beginning with such operation, and also providing for a readjustment of the amount of such sum or rental at the expiration of such period, and at compensation to the City, terms, conditions and requirements are fully set forth in the certificate dated July 10, 1902, a copy of which is transmitted herewith.

A copy of a written instrument, duly executed and acknowledged by the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, accepting the said franchise, and all the terms, conditions and requirements thereof, is annexed to said certificate, and is also transmitted herewith.

The views of the Board with reference to the aforesaid application and certificate are stated in the communication to the Board, dated July 1, 1902, made by a special committee of the Board composed of Alexander E. Orr, Chairman, Charles Stewart Smith and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, a copy of which is transmitted herewith. The Board believes that it is for the interest of the public and of The City of New York that the necessary constitutional consents to the construction and operation of the said railroad of the Tunnel Company should be obtained as soon as possible.

In witness whereof, the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York has caused its official seal to be hereto affixed and these presents to be signed by its President and Secretary this 15th day of July, 1902.

The Ninth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Pierce avenue, from East River to Lathrop street; the westerly side of Lathrop street, from Pierce avenue to Freeman avenue; the northerly side of Freeman avenue, from Lathrop street to East River, and East River.

The Tenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jamaica avenue, from East River to Lockwood street; the westerly side of Lockwood street, from Jamaica avenue to Pierce avenue; the northerly side of Pierce avenue, from Lockwood street to East River, and East River.

The Eleventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Fulton street, from East River to the Boulevard; the southerly side of Grand avenue, from Fulton street to Lockwood street; the westerly side of Lockwood street, from Grand avenue to Jamaica avenue; the northerly side of Jamaica avenue, from Lockwood street to East River and East River.

The Twelfth Election District is bounded by and within East River, the southerly side of Hoyt avenue, from East River to Boulevard; the westerly side of Boulevard, from Hoyt avenue to Remsen street; the westerly side of Remsen street, from Boulevard to Main street; the northerly side of Main street, from Remsen street to Grand avenue; the northerly side of Grand avenue, from Main street to Fulton street, and the northerly side of Fulton street, from Boulevard to East River.

The Thirteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Hoyt avenue, from the Boulevard to Van Alst avenue; the westerly side of Van Alst avenue, from Hoyt avenue to Newtown avenue; the southerly side of Newtown avenue, from Van Alst avenue to Marc place; the westerly side of Marc place, from Newtown avenue to Grand avenue; the northerly side of Grand avenue, from Marc place to Main street; the easterly side of Main street, from Grand avenue to Remsen street; the easterly side of Remsen street, from Main street to Boulevard, and the easterly side of Boulevard, from Remsen street to Hoyt avenue.

The Fourteenth Election District is bounded by and within the westerly side of Debevoise avenue, from Berrian's Creek to Newtown avenue; the northerly side of Newtown avenue, from Debevoise avenue to Van Alst avenue; the easterly side of Van Alst avenue, from Newtown avenue to Hoyt avenue, and the northerly side of Hoyt avenue, from Van Alst avenue to East River; East River, Flushing Bay and Berrian's Island.

The Fifteenth Election District is bounded by and within Berrian's Creek, Flushing Bay, the westerly side of Kouwenhoven street, from Flushing Bay to Potter avenue, the southerly side of Potter avenue, from Kouwenhoven street to Steinway avenue; the westerly side of Steinway avenue, from Potter avenue to Vandeventer avenue; the northerly side of Vandeventer avenue, from Steinway avenue to Debevoise avenue, and the easterly side of Debevoise avenue, from Vandeventer avenue to Berrian's Creek.

The Sixteenth Election District is bounded by and within Flushing Bay; westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Flushing Bay to Flushing avenue; the northerly side of Flushing avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Steinway avenue; the easterly side of Steinway avenue, from Flushing avenue to Potter avenue; the northerly side of Potter avenue, from Steinway avenue to Kouwenhoven street and the easterly side of Kouwenhoven street, from Potter's avenue to Flushing Bay.

The Seventeenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Flushing avenue, from Steinway avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Flushing avenue to Broadway; the northerly side of Broadway, from Old Bowery Bay road to Steinway avenue, and the easterly side of Steinway avenue, from Broadway to Flushing avenue.

The Eighteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Vandeventer avenue, from Debevoise avenue to Steinway avenue; the westerly side of Steinway avenue, from Vandeventer avenue to Broadway; the northerly side of Broadway, from Steinway avenue to Lockwood street; the easterly side of Lockwood street, from Broadway to Grand avenue; the easterly side of Marc place, from Grand avenue to Newtown avenue; the southerly side of Newtown avenue, from Marc place to Debevoise avenue; and the easterly side of Debevoise avenue, from Newtown avenue to Vandeventer avenue.

The Nineteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Broadway, from Lockwood street to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Broadway to Jackson avenue; the northerly side of Jackson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Freeman avenue; the northerly side of Freeman avenue, from Jackson avenue to Lathrop street; the easterly side of Lathrop street, from Freeman avenue to Pierce avenue; the northerly side of Pierce avenue, from Lathrop street to Lockwood street and the easterly side of Lockwood street, from Pierce avenue to Broadway.

The Twentieth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Rapelye avenue to Woodside avenue; the westerly side of Woodside avenue, from Jackson avenue to Middleburg avenue; the northerly side of Middleburg avenue, from Woodside avenue to Dickenson avenue; the westerly side of Dickenson avenue, from Middleburg avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road to Hunter's Point avenue; the northerly side of Hunter's Point avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to the canal; line through the centre of the canal, from Hunter's Point avenue to Thompson avenue, and the east side of Rapelye avenue, from Thompson avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Hunter's Point avenue, from the canal to Calvary Cemetery road; the easterly boundary line of Calvary Cemetery to Newtown Creek, Newtown Creek and the canal.

The Twenty-second Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Thompson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Betts avenue; the westerly side of Betts avenue, from Thompson avenue to Maurice avenue; the northerly side of Maurice avenue, from Betts avenue to Newtown Creek; Newtown Creek and the easterly side of Calvary Cemetery road and Old Bowery Bay road, from Newtown Creek to Thompson avenue.

The Twenty-fifth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Train's Meadow road to Junction avenue; the westerly side of Junction avenue, from Jackson avenue to Cook avenue; the northerly side of Cook avenue, from Junction avenue to Thompson avenue; the northerly side of Thompson avenue, from Cook avenue to North Side Division Long Island Railroad track; the southerly side of North Side Division Long Island Railroad track, from Thompson avenue to Broadway; the easterly side of Broadway, from North Side Division Long Island Railroad track to Woodside avenue; the northerly side of Woodside avenue, from Broadway to Train's Meadow road, and the easterly side of Train's Meadow road, from Woodside avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-seventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of the North Side Division Long Island Railroad track, from Junction avenue to Flushing Creek; the westerly side of Flushing Creek, from centre line of the North Side Division Long Island Railroad to Horse Brook; the northerly side of Horse Brook, from Flushing Creek to the division line of the land of D. Morrell Boroughs and Henry Euler; the easterly side of said division line to Court street, and the easterly side of Court street, from division line of the land of D. Morrell Boroughs and Henry Euler to the centre line of the North Side Division of Long Island Railroad.

The Thirty-third Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, from Newtown Creek to the Bushwick Branch Long Island Railroad; the southerly side of the Bushwick Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Metropolitan avenue to Mount Olivet avenue; the southerly side of Mount Olivet avenue, from the Bushwick Branch of the Long Island Railroad to a line through the Baker estate, and westerly side of the line through the Baker estate, from Mount Olivet avenue to William street, the westerly side of William street, from above line to a direct line on the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery to Woodward avenue; the westerly side of Woodward avenue, from a point midway between DeKalb street and Stockholm street to Harmon street; the northerly side of Harmon street, from Woodward avenue to a line dividing the former City of Brooklyn and Town of Newtown and along above mentioned line, from Harmon street to Metropolitan avenue.

The Thirty-fourth Election District is bounded by and within the westerly side of Fairview avenue, from Gates avenue to the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery; thence westerly to the easterly side of Woodward avenue, at a point midway between Stockholm street and DeKalb avenue; thence southerly on the easterly side of Woodward avenue to Harmon street; the south side of Harmon street to the line dividing the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown, and above mentioned line from Harmon street to Gates avenue; thence to Fairview avenue.

The Thirty-fifth Election District is bounded by and within the easterly side of Fairview avenue from Gates avenue to the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery, to William street; thence easterly in a direct line through the Baker estate from William street to Mount Olivet avenue; the southerly side of Mount Olivet avenue from line through the Baker estate to Fresh Pond road; the westerly side of Fresh Pond road from Mount Olivet avenue to Gates avenue (or Magnolia street); the northerly side of Gates avenue (or Magnolia street) from Fresh Pond road to Fairview avenue.

The Thirty-seventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, from the westerly line of Lutheran Cemetery to Grove avenue; the southerly side of Grove avenue, from Metropolitan avenue to the former division line of the towns of Flushing and Newtown; the easterly side of said division line to the former division line of the towns of Jamaica and Newtown; the northerly side of said division line, from the division line of the former Town of Flushing to Fresh Pond road; the easterly side of Fresh Pond road, from the former division line of the towns of Jamaica and Newtown to Cooper avenue; the southerly side of Cooper avenue, from Fresh Pond road to the highway leading to Cypress Hills Cemetery; the easterly side of the highway leading to Cypress Hills Cemetery, from Cooper avenue in a direct line north to the house of Rossinan; the easterly side of said line, from the house of Rossinan north to Metropolitan avenue.

The Thirty-eighth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, from Fresh Pond road to the westerly boundary of Lutheran Cemetery; the westerly side of the line of Lutheran Cemetery south to the house of Rossinan, from Metropolitan avenue to Myrtle avenue; the westerly side of the highway leading to Cypress Hills Cemetery, from Myrtle avenue to Cooper avenue; the northerly side of Cooper avenue, from the highway leading to Cypress Hills Cemetery to Fresh Pond road; the westerly side of Fresh Pond road, from Cooper avenue to the line of the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown; westerly and northerly along said line from Fresh Pond road to Cooper avenue; the southerly side of Cooper avenue, from the former division line of the City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown to Cypress avenue; the easterly side of Cypress avenue, from Cooper avenue to the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad; the southerly side of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Cypress avenue to Fresh Pond road, and the easterly side of Fresh Pond road, from the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad to Metropolitan avenue.

The Thirty-ninth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Gates avenue, from a line dividing the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown to Fresh Pond road; the westerly side of Fresh Pond road, from Gates avenue to Manhattan Beach Branch Long Island Railroad; the northerly side of Manhattan Beach Branch Long Island Railroad, from Fresh Pond road to Myrtle avenue; the northerly side of Myrtle avenue, from Manhattan Beach Branch Long Island Railroad to line dividing the former City of Brooklyn and Town of Newtown, and along the above-mentioned line from Myrtle avenue to Gates avenue.

The Fortieth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Myrtle avenue, from the division line of the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown to the centre line of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad; the westerly side of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Fresh Pond road to Cypress avenue; the westerly side of Cypress avenue, from the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad to Cooper avenue; the northerly side of Cooper avenue, from Cypress avenue to the former division line of the City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown, and the easterly side of said line, from Cooper avenue to Myrtle avenue.

W. Harway; thence westerly along said stream to the westerly side of Bell avenue; the westerly side of Bell avenue, from said stream to Bayside road; the northerly side of Bayside road, from Bell avenue to Whitestone road; the easterly side of Whitestone road, from Bayside road to Willett's road; the westerly side of Willett's road, from Sixteenth avenue to First street; the northerly side of First street, from Fourteenth avenue to Whitestone avenue, and the easterly side of Whitestone avenue, from First street to Eighteenth street.

The Third Election District is bounded by and within Long Island Sound, Powell's Cove, the westerly side of the Boulevard, from Powell's Cove to Eighteenth street; the southerly side of Eighteenth street, from the Boulevard to Whitestone avenue, the westerly side of Whitestone avenue, from Eighteenth street to Seventh avenue; the northerly side of Seventh avenue, from Whitestone avenue to Twenty-first street; the easterly side of Twenty-first street, from Seventh avenue to Sixth avenue; the northerly side of Sixth avenue, from Twenty-first street to Fifteenth street; the easterly side of Fifteenth street, from Sixth avenue to Fifth avenue; the northerly side of Fifth avenue, from Fifteenth street to Twelfth street; the easterly side of Twelfth street, from Fifth avenue to First avenue; the southerly side of First avenue, from Twelfth street to Thirteenth street; the easterly side of Thirteenth street, from First avenue to Avenue C; the easterly side of College avenue, from Avenue C to Long Island Sound.

The Fourth Election District is bounded by and within Long Island Sound; the westerly side of College avenue, from Long Island Sound to the centre line of Thirteenth street and Avenue C; the westerly side of Thirteenth street, from Avenue C to First avenue; the northerly side of First avenue, from Thirteenth street to Twelfth street; the westerly side of Twelfth street, from First avenue to Fifth avenue; the northerly side of Fifth avenue, from Twelfth street to Flushing Bay, and Flushing Bay.

The Fifth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Fifth avenue, from Flushing Bay to Fifteenth street; the westerly side of Fifteenth street, from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue; the southerly side of Sixth avenue, from Fifteenth street to Twenty-first street; the westerly side of Twenty-first street, from Sixth avenue to Seventh avenue; southerly side of Seventh avenue, from Twenty-first street to Twenty-third street; the westerly side of Twenty-third street, from Seventh avenue to creek; centre line of creek, from Twenty-third street to Flushing Bay, and Flushing Bay.

The Sixth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Seventh avenue, from Twenty-third street to Whitestone avenue; the westerly side of Whitestone avenue, from Seventh avenue to First street; the southerly side of First street, from Whitestone avenue to Willett's road; the easterly side of Willett's road, from First street to Whitestone road; the westerly side of Whitestone road, from Willett's road to Broadway; the northerly side of Broadway, from Whitestone road to Flushing Creek; the centre line of said creek, from Broadway to Twenty-third street, and the easterly side of Twenty-third street, from Flushing creek to Seventh avenue.

The Seventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly line of Broadway, from Flushing Creek to Main street; the westerly side of Main street, from Broadway to Amity street; the northerly side of Amity street, from Main street to Flushing Creek, and Flushing Creek.

The Eighth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Broadway, from Main street to Parsons avenue; the westerly side of Parsons avenue, from Broadway to Amity street; the northerly side of Amity street, from Parsons avenue to Main street, and the easterly side of Main street, from Amity street to Broadway.

The Ninth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Amity street, from Main street to Parsons avenue; the easterly side of Parsons avenue, from Amity street to Broadway; the southerly side of Broadway, from Parsons avenue to Sanford avenue; the northerly side of Sanford avenue, from Broadway to Jamaica avenue; the easterly side of Jamaica avenue, from Sanford avenue to Main street, and the easterly side of Main street, from Jamaica avenue to Amity street.

The Tenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Amity street, from Flushing Creek to Main street; the westerly side of Main street, from Amity street to Jamaica avenue; the westerly side of Jamaica avenue, from Main street to Hillside avenue; the northerly side of Hillside avenue, from Jamaica avenue to Flushing Creek; thence westerly and northerly along centre line of said creek to Amity street.

Bedell; thence southerly on the westerly side of the property of D. Bedell and A. Gerry to Loretta lane, Loretta lane, Public road and New York bay.

The Thirty-eighth Election District is bounded by and within Huguenot avenue to a point on the northeasterly side of the farm of B. V. Moise; thence westerly in a direct line to the southwest corner of the farm of P. Clarius, Bloomingdale road, to a point on the northeast corner of Strakosch's farm; thence westerly to the northwest corner of said farm; thence southerly on the westerly side of Strakosch's, Sharrott's and Weir's farms to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad; thence westerly to the westerly line of property of D. Bedell; thence southerly on the westerly side of property of D. Bedell and A. Gerry to Loretta lane, Public road, and New York bay.

The Thirty-ninth Election District is bounded by and within Staten Island sound, easterly side of Storer's farm line, Clay Pit road, Bloomingdale road to southwest corner of farm of P. Clarius; thence easterly in a straight line to the northeast corner of the farm of B. V. Moise, Huguenot avenue, Swaim's lane, Killy Fish creek and Staten Island sound.

Meeting called to order at 2 p. m.

Minutes of meeting of 30th ultimo read and on motion approved.

Appeal 287, New Building 513 of 1902, premises No. 198 Broadway, Walter H. Wickes, Esq., architect and appellant.

The substitution of cast iron round columns as shown on revised set of structural steel drawings filed as an amendment September 5, 1902, in place of the cast iron H columns as shown on revised columns schedule filed September 17, 1902.

We claim that as the proposed building has a six-story structure on either side of it, and high buildings on either side adjoining these, and in consideration of the fact that the wall on the south is a party wall to the sixth story, for purposes of calculation the curb line may be considered to begin at the sixth story, and under the law in a building of that height the wind pressure may be disregarded.

Mr. Rudolph P. Miller, representing the Superintendent of Buildings for Manhattan; Mr. R. E. Moss and Mr. Walter H. Wickes, appellants, appeared before the Board.

On motion, that the application to be exempted from the requirement of providing specifically for the effects of wind pressure be approved, on condition that the construction be otherwise found adequate by the Bureau of Buildings.

Appeal 281, New Building 865 of 1902, premises northeast corner Driggs and Metropolitan avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, Charles A. Sussdorf, Esq., architect and appellant.

Objection has been made for the reason that the elevator shaft is not inclosed with fireproof materials. It is desired to be released from this provision of the law, for the reason that the building is but two floors in height above the street, also for the greater convenience it would give in unloading in all directions. As it is a pork packing establishment, the floors will be constantly wet and the danger of fire reduced to a minimum. The number of men employed will not exceed six.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 282, New Building 416 of 1902, premises northwest corner of Westchester and Bergen avenues, Borough of The Bronx, Arthur Arctander, Esq., architect and appellant.

I respectfully request the modification of section 75 of the Code, for the following reasons: That the building is irregular in shape and has a street front of 190 feet and has two stairways provided and one elevator, and that there is hardly any place where a third stairway could be put in without serious damage to the property, and of very small advantage.

Mr. Arctander appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that both staircases be constructed fireproof, including the landings, and inclosed on all floors in fireproof partitions; and further, that the opening at the foot of the staircase leading to Westchester avenue be made seven feet wide.

Appeal 283, New Building 518 of 1902, premises No. 149 East Thirty-eighth street, Borough of Manhattan, Ralph S. Townsend, Esq., architect and appellant.

The Superintendent of Buildings for Manhattan having disapproved the construction of a storage room 10 feet 9 inches by 11 feet on the second story of stable, said disapproval being based upon section 8 of the Building Code, which requires that not more than 90 per cent. of the area of lot shall be covered by a dwelling house.

Appellant desires that said section 8 of the Building Code be waived so far as it shall relate to the construction of the storage room in the rear of second story in private stable building, for the following reasons:

First—This storage room will not be plastered and will not be occupied for living purposes, but for storage only.

Second—The coachman's apartment occupies only 50 per cent. of the lot area, and is provided with ample light, air and ventilation by means of windows on the street and interior light shaft, together with ventilating skylights in the roof over kitchen and bathroom.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 284, Fireproof Shutter Case 25 of 1902, premises Nos. 138 and 140 Centre street, Borough of Manhattan, Messrs. John B. Snook & Sons, architects and appellants.

On motion, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report.

Appeal 285, New Building 1689 of 1901, premises No. 26 Gramercy park, Borough of Manhattan, R. I. Blake Realty Company, appellants.

The erection of a pent house as herein described, the construction throughout to be similar to pent house approved by your honorable Board August 26, 1902.

We respectfully petition for a modification of the Building Code to be permitted to construct a pent house on the rear of roof of No. 26 Gramercy park, same to be inclosed with 8-inch wall properly supported, all as shown on plans herewith submitted.

The conditions imposed and included in approval of application of August 26 will be complied with in every particular in the construction of pent house on Twentieth street end of building.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 286, alteration premises east side of North Henry street, about 100 feet from the northeast corner of Herbert street, Borough of Brooklyn, Thomas Henry Poole, Esq., appellant.

The building is a frame church, now used as a hall. It is desired to enlarge and extend this present hall as follows: On north side a part frame and part brick extension, containing in basement two bowling alleys, main floor billiard room, gallery, promenade.

On south side and west front a small frame extension, brick filled, inclosing stairway to end of gallery of hall and to look out.

To extend on the rear or east end (the present stage and end of building to be removed) the depth of bays or sections, viz., about 27 feet. The principal object of this is to give the proper length to the bowling alley and also that the new brick extension in rear of proposed frame extension will not obstruct too much of the light from windows in south transept of new church.

Also in the rear of said frame extension at east end to build a brick addition, as follows:

Basement to contain swimming pool, dressing rooms, etc., lavatories and boiler house.

Main floor, stage or lecture hall, dressing rooms, etc.

Mezzanine floor, gallery on three sides, dressing rooms, etc.

Second floor, reading and club rooms.

Third floor, gymnasium.

It is also desired to build in front a one-story extension, containing main vestibule and ticket office and men's cloak and hat rooms.

Objection is made to these proposed alterations and additions, on the ground that the auditorium is not fireproof and could seat more than 300 people.

I therefore ask permission to build as per plans submitted, because

It is outside the fire limits.

It has ample exits.

It will be used for parochial business and recreation, and it is not at all likely that there would be, unless on some rare occasion, anything like 300 people in the building.

That only a limited amount of money can be used for this building, and so a new and completely fireproof building could not at present be undertaken and does not seem necessary, as with two or three exceptions all the buildings in the neighborhood are frame.

And finally as being an institution that is both advisable and necessary for the good and well-being of the young men and women of the parish and in not being intended for a general public theatre or place of amusement.

Mr. Poole appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

The Chairman presented a letter from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, which was ordered on file.

On motion duly made and seconded.

Resolved, That requisition be made (in regular form as provided) and filed with the Supervisor of the "City Record" for furnishing fifty (50) copies in pamphlet form of the minutes of this Board weekly; and further, that said Supervisor be requested to deliver said pamphlet copies of the minutes not later than Saturday following the regular Tuesday meeting each week.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or service for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise, in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by The City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done.
