Dear Sir—The Municipal Civil Service Commission presents its report for the quarter ending March 31, 1903, in accordance with the provisions of section 1544 of the Charter.

and will also tend to relieve the Commission of considerable correspondence which has heretofore been necessary in answering inquiries from candidates. Experience has shown that it is unwise to print with it sample copies of questions, which gave it a saleable value in the hands of any one procuring it. The result was that within six months the entire issue of 15,000 copies was exhausted.

Sample questions in single sets are now published in conjunction with the manual, and are so marked that the public may know that they may be obtained free of cost.

During the recent session of the Legislature the Commission received from time to time copies of pending bills affecting the Civil Service system, and has given them careful consideration. Its opinions concerning them have been communicated to the Corporation Counsel for his aid in assisting or opposing their passage.

In the early part of the year the Court of Appeals decided, in the case of Allison vs. Welde, that the office of Commissioner of Jurors was a County office. The Com-

mission thereupon discontinued the certification of the payrolls of that office, and forwarded the roster of employees to the State Civil Service Commission.

Public hearings have been held upon all requests to add to the exempt or the non-competitive class. These requests with the action of the Commission taken thereon, have been as follows:

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals—

To include in the exempt class two chapleins. Granted

To include in the exempt class two chaplains. Granted.

Court of Special Sessions—

To include in the exempt class the position of female probation officer. Granted.

Department of Correction—
To include in the exempt class seven chaplains. Granted.
Departments of Public Charities, Health, Correction, and Bellevue and Allied Hos-To include in the non-competitive class the position of apothecary. Granted.

Police Department-To include in the exempt class three Deputy Commissioners. Granted.

To include in the exempt class Clerk of the Children's Court, Second Division. Deputy Clerk of the Children's Court, Second Division.

To include in the exempt class twenty Clerks for the Borough.

A public hearing was also held upon the proposed amendment to Rule 54, relating to promotions in the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments. Notices of all these hearings were sent to the Civil Service Reform Association, the Association of Civil Employees, the heads of the departments affected and the employees affected. The hearing upon the amendment to Rule 54 was attended by representatives of the associations referred to, and also of the associations connected with the Police and Fire Departments. with the Police and Fire Departments

Two investigations have been held by the Commission under section 125 of the Charter.

A Clerk employed by the Board of Coroners, Borough of Manhattan, in the competitive class, was removed for lack of appropriation. He protested against his removal, and claimed that persons occupying positions in the exempt class had been assigned to perform the duties of his position. The Commission thereupon investigated the general status of Clerks in the Coroner's office with the result that it concluded that there was not sufficient evidence to warrant the Commission in withholding its certificate from the payrolls of the office.

Louis M. Sonnenberg, attorney and counsellor at law, protested against the payment of any salary to certain persons employed as Coroners' physicians, on the ground that their respective terms of offices expired with the terms of the Coroners who had appointed them, and claimed that their successors should be appointed from the eligible list. The Commission concluded that the question was one which should be determined in the courts and dismissed the complaint.

The Commission is now conducting an investigation with reference to the failure of some of the City Departments to comply with the provisions of section 1543 of the Charter, which provides that the name of a person suspended for lack of work or lack of appropriation shall be transmitted to the Civil Service Commission, and that such person shall be entitled to reinstatement in the same or a similar position in the order of his original appointment. In previous years, some 5,000 persons have been laid off during the winter season. During the corresponding period in the years 1902 and 1903, however, not over 500 names have been forwarded to the Commission in compliance with the section referred to, though the Commission is informed that a much greater number have been suspended. Requests to hold examinations for promotion have become so numerous that the Commission had found it necessary to establish a system of holding examinations for pro

such examinations at any other time.

A number of Departments requested that examinations for promotion in which they were interested be confined to particular bureaus or offices, but under the advice of the Corporation Counsel, the Commission declined the requests, and such examinations are open to all employees of the Department desiring to make the promotion, who are otherwise eligible to compete. As far as possible, the Commission seeks to secure the practical result of the promotion of persons especially skilled in the duties of the position in which the vacancy existed by the character of the examination

The method of marking the seniority of candidates for promotion in the Police and Fire Departments has been changed. It is now as follows:

Eligibility for promotion, six months in the grade..... 84

2 per cent. for each additional year of service up to six years.................. One half per cent. for each additional year of service up to eight years...

The records of such candidates are marked on the following plan:
Assume 85 per cent. as the starting point.
For each day's fine during the four years preceding the date of the mental examination deduct one.

examination deduct one.

For each reprimand during the same period deduct one-half.

For each day's fine during the next preceding 14 years deduct one-half.

For each reprimand during the same period deduct one-quarter.

For each day's fine prior to the date last fixed deduct one-quarter.

For each reprimand during the same period deduct one-eighth.

For commendation add three.

For honorable mention add five.

For medal add seven.

The Commission has made extensive efforts to advertise its examinations. Examinations are now advertised for at least two weeks in the "City Record" and notices are posted in the various municipal buildings. Through the courtesy of the postoffice authorities and the Treasury Department the notices are also posted in the general postoffices of the City and in the stations thereof. Through the Board of City Record advertisements are also published in at least two issues of the official papers. the official papers.

The number of applications filed for the position of Patrolman in the Police Department on the day of , on which date the receipt of applications closed was . The examination of these candidates has been progressing as rapidly as possible and the Commission intends to have the eligible list ready about July I. Applications are now being received for another examination, which will be held as soon as the next list is established. In former examinations for Patrolman about 75 per cent. of the applicants failed in the physical examination, and of the remainder 40 per cent. passed the mental examination, entitling them to be placed upon the eligible list. Each applicant for this position is now given a printed statement showing the physical requirements and the percentage of successful ones will be greatly increased.

During the quarter 79 transfers have been authorized under the provisions of Civil Service Rule 40. There have been 35 reinstatements under the provisions of Rule 43, and there have been 67 temporary appointments; 15 of these have been for a period not to exceed two months, pending the preparation of an eligible list, 41 have been for a period not to exceed one week, in emergencies, 8 have been in positions requiring services of a professional or expert character with compensation not to exceed \$250 in one year, and in three cases this limitation of compensation has been removed with the consent of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission.



Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1, in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railway, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or re-

newal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or franchises hereby granted, whether original or frenewal, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.
