PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, MARCH 23, 1905.

There were present:

Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Mayor George B. McClellan, Comptroller Edward M. Grout and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Morris K. Jesup and John Claffin.

Commissioner Charles Stewart Smith sent word asking to be excused on account of absence from the City.

Albert B. Boardman, of Counsel; George S. Rice, Acting Chief Engineer, and Alfred Craven, Acting Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

Minutes of the preceding meeting, that of 16th of March, 1905, were read, and it was moved they be approved.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Morris K. Jesup and John Claffin.

Nays—None.

Carried.

President Orr reported progress in behalf of the Committee on Plans and Contracts, saying that the Committee hoped soon to be able to make final report on this matter.

The following correspondence was read and referred to the Committee:

INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY,

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners,
No. 320 Broadway, New York:

MY DEAR SIR—The original plans of the Rapid Transit Commission contemplated separate East and West Side lines extending from the southern end of Manhattan Island to the northern limits of the City. Owing to the borrowing capacity of the City at the time these plans were adopted it was found impossible to complete the comprehensive system as at that time projected by the Commission, and it is a matter of record that in order to accommodate the plans to the financial capabilities of the City the East Side line north of Forty-second street and the West Side line

south of that same street were omitted, and the plan as at present constructed was given out, but with the general understanding that such plan was but a partial realization of what the Commission deemed proper, and that as soon as occasion demanded and opportunity offered the originally conceived plan should be carried out. The traffic that the subway has already developed indicates that the time is now at hand when such completion should be undertaken.

The Interborough Rapid Transit Company is prepared to enter into a contract and construct under the terms of the Rapid Transit Act the complete system as originally conceived, and in addition thereto to make extensions to the boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn, completing a comprehensive system of the rapid transit lines that will carry passengers from the northern extremity of the Borough of The Bronx through the Borough of Manhattan and to various points in the Borough of Brooklyn, and give the inhabitants of these boroughs a continuous ride without change of cars for a single fare of five cents without regard to distance over both subway and elevated lines.

This company is in a better position to accomplish this most desirable result than any other company, as it already owns the existing rapid transit systems of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and can provide the additional facilities required in less time and with a smaller outlay of capital.

In addition to completing the subway system in the Borough of Manhattan this company is also prepared, as previously indicated to your Board, to extend and enlarge the elevated system belonging to the Manhattan Railway Company, now leased by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company. In order to reach the end outlined above, we beg leave to submit to your Board the following plan:

First—To extend the present subway from Forty-second street and Park avenue under Forty-second street and such private property as may be necessary to Lexington avenue, and thence under Lexington avenue and Harlem river and Third avenue in the Borough of The Bronx to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, all with four tracks.

Second—To extend from a junction with the subway at Forty-second street and Broadway two express tracks south under Seventh avenue to Twenty-fifth street, providing at Thirty-third street a station giving facilities to the Pennsylvania Railroad Station at that point, and under Twenty-fifth street to Broadway; to extend from the same junction at Forty-second street two local tracks under Broadway to Twenty-fifth street at which point they join the above-described express tracks, and thence to carry the four tracks under Fifth avenue and West Broadway to Barclay street, where a loop should be constructed as a terminus for the local tracks and to continue the express tracks under West Broadway and Greenwich street to a terminal loop at Battery Park.

The work outlined under plans Nos 1 and 2 will necessarily involve a delay of several years in securing the necessary legal consents and in carrying out construction. In the meantime, additional facilities are urgently needed for the east side of the Borough of Manhattan and the rapidly growing Borough of The Bronx. To furnish these facilities we propose, in addition to the subway extension, the following, which can be built in one-half the time required for the construction of a large subway and will afford early relief while awaiting the subway completion:

Third—Beginning at One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx, to add two tracks to the present elevated structure on Third avenue and private property across the Harlem river and along Second avenue to a point on First avenue, between Third and Fourth streets; thence over right of way to be acquired in that block to Second avenue, in which distance two additional tracks can be brought beneath Second avenue, and thence southerly under Second avenue to Chrystie street to Canal street, to Centre street, to Chambers street, and westerly under Chambers street with a terminal loop at West street, providing for free transfer to the elevated lines and subway lines.

In order to provide additional lines to the Borough of Brooklyn we propose the following:

Fourth—From a connection with the loop track under City Hall Park to carry two tracks beneath Beekman street to the East river, to Pineapple street, in Brooklyn, to Fulton street and under Fulton street to a connection with the present subway now under construction under Contract No. 2, and make the present subway a four-track line from Court street, under Fulton street and Flatbush avenue to Atlantic avenue, but so arranged that junctions can be made without grade crossings at Fulton and Court streets, at Flatbush avenue extension and Fulton street, at Lafayette and Flatbush avenues and at Fourth and Flatbush avenues.

Fifth—To extend from Lafayette and Flatbush avenues a two-track subway under Lafayette avenue to Sumner avenue, under Sumner avenue to Broadway, and thence under Broadway and over the Williamsburg Bridge to a subway under Delancey street; thence under Delancey street to Chrystie street; thence under Chrystie street with two additional tracks added to the express subway tracks of the Second Avenue Line described under plan No. 3, and thence under Chrystie, Canal and Centre streets to William street, where a connection can be made with the tunnel beneath Beekman street to Brooklyn. This plan provides for a continuous loop passing through the business and residential portions of Brooklyn and Williamsburg and the commercial districts of Manhattan, between Delancey and Beekman streets, and a complete subway connection between the Manhattan ends of all three of the bridges.

Sixth—From the junction at Fulton and Flatbush avenues, in Brooklyn, to carry a two-track subway under the Flatbush avenue extension to the Manhattan Bridge, and thence across the Manhattan Bridge to a connection with the Second and Third Avenue Elevated lines in Manhattan.

Seventh—From a junction with the line already authorized by the Board and approved by the Board of Aldermen and the Mayor at Prospect Park Plaza, to extend a subway easterly under the Eastern parkway to East New York avenue.

We understand the Board is contemplating the laying out of a cross-town route under Thirty-fourth street for the moving platform. We beg leave to point out to the Board that if this plan is finally adopted and carried into execution, there will be provided a connection between the Pennsylvania Railroad terminus and all the underground and elevated lines in the Borough of Manhattan. This terminus will afford an express connection by the line above proposed under Seventh avenue, carrying passengers both north and south, and also a connection by the moving platform with the local rapid transit lines of this company on Broadway, Sixth avenue, Fourth avenue, Third avenue and Second avenue.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Commission, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I beg to submit herewith a map showing the underground routes which I desire an opportunity to construct in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for operation in connection with the surface railway lines. These routes are in the main those which your Committee has proposed. The minor changes suggested are intended to improve the means of receiving and distributing the traffic from the steam and suburban railways now in operation in the City, and those preparing to enter the City, and from the various ferries and bridges on the East and North rivers.

By reference to the map it will be seen that the East Side lines begin for their northern terminus at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue where seven surface lines of the Union Railway Company converge. From this point extensions can be made into The Bronx as well as connections to receive the suburban traffic of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and of any other suburban lines which may hereafter enter The Bronx, thus affording suburban passengers facilities for reaching all sections of The City of New York with dispatch. The lines then extend with four tracks under the Harlem river into Lexington avenue and Third avenue and south under Lexington avenue and Third avenue with four tracks on each avenue to Thirty-fourth street, connecting with the Grand Central Station at Forty-second street. From Thirty-fourth street the Lexington avenue line extends westerly under Thirty-fourth street to Fifth avenue and thence south under Fifth avenue and Broadway via Union Square to Vesey street, with a loop at City Hall Park, thence westerly under Vesey street, with two tracks to Church street, south under Church street to Battery place, with terminals under Battery Park.

The line under Third avenue continues south from Thirty-fourth street with four tracks under Third avenue to the Bowery at Fifth street, thence south with four tracks under the Bowery to Chatham Square, thence south with two tracks under Park Row and Nassau street to Broad street; four tracks under Broad street to Pearl street, two tracks under Broad street to South street, two tracks under South street to

and around Battery Park to a connection with Battery Park terminal and the Church street and Greenwich street west side lines. From Chatham Square south with two tracks under New Bowery and Pearl street to Broad street, connecting with the Broad street line.

West Side Line.

From Battery Park with four tracks under Greenwich street and West Broadway to Washington Square, thence diagonally under Washington Square Park and under private property to Greenwich avenue, Greenwich avenue to Seventh avenue, Seventh avenue to Fifty-ninth street, diagonally under the southwest corner of Central Park to Eighth avenue, and under Eighth avenue to the Harlem river, with terminals south of the river.

Thirty-fourth street connecting line from Seventh avenue and Thirty-fourth street easterly with four tracks under Thirty-fourth street connecting the West Side and East Side lines, thus affording facilities for the distribution of the traffic from the Pennsylvania station to all sections of the City.

From the terminals, Eighth avenue, south of the Harlem river, the line can readily be extended under the Harlem river to Jerome avenue, and north under that avenue to the City line. Also provision can be made near High Bridge to receive the suburban traffic of the New York Central lines.

It must be conceded that whilst north and south lines afford rapid transit for the longer distances and between Manhattan and The Bronx, they do not reach sections east and west which can only be reached by distributing lines. Such distribution is afforded by the lines of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, whose officers have considered and approved these routes.

DEAR SIR—In the informal petition of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, filed with your Board some days ago, asking to place two additional tracks upon its leased Manhattan Elevated lines from One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, in The Bronx, across Harlem river, and on its Second avenue line to City Hall station, Clause 8 of the petition may properly call for some fuller details as to the advantages which will accrue to the public from these additional facilities if provided.

That portion of the subway route which has a physical connection at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Third avenue with the leased lines of the Manhattan Elevated Railroad is provided with a third track from One Hundred and Forty-ninth to One Hundred and Eightieth street. By the addition of the two tracks petitioned for, from One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street to City Hall, an express service can be established from the present terminus of the subway lines at One Hundred and Eightieth street by a more direct route than that of the present subway lines, which will permit of a time schedule between City Hall station and One Hundred and Eightieth street of about 30 minutes, while the present subway route—40 minutes from between One Hundred and Eightieth street and Brooklyn Bridge—can hardly be improved upon. This, owing to the absence of any express tracks from Brook avenue to Ninety-sixth street, and an advantage of about 1½ miles in distance in favor of the first route.

The operation of an express service from One Hundred and Eightieth street by the first route would also relieve the present two-track subway from One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Lenox avenue to Ninety-sixth street, of The Bronx travel above One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Third avenue, to an extent that will permit of increased service for the growing travel between One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Lenox avenue and the downtown district.

The increased suburban traffic delivered to the subway lines by the additional tracks about to be provided by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad on the Harlem and Port Chester Branch, and the construction of the New York, Boston and Westchester line to a connection with the subway lines near One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, will call for reduced time and more frequent trains, which will be provided by the construction asked for.

With the rapid growth of The Bronx District along the line of the subway and the connections just referred to, the two-track line from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to Ninety-sixth street will soon be congested and require the relief which this will offer. The construction of the two additional tracks can be completed in two years from the time the work is authorized, so it would seem that the quickest relief possible could be had for the long distance travel located in The Bronx, and for relief of the over-crowded Third avenue elevated line, by the authorization of the construction petitioned for.

The plans accompanying the petition show fully the form of construction both for track and stations, and we should be pleased to have our engineers go over these plans with your engineers at any time and have the suggestions of your engineers as to possible changes for improvement in these plans.

The application of your petitioner, the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, under and pursuant to chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, respectfully shows as follows:

First—Your petitioner, the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, is a corporation duly incorporated, organized and existing under and by virtue of the Railroad Law of the State of New York and said chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and amendatory and supplemental acts.

Second—The Manhattan Railway Company is and at all the times hereinafter mentioned was a corporation duly incorporated, organized and existing under and by virtue of chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto. Said Manhattan Railway Company did, on or about the 1st day of January, 1903, make a lease of all its railways, including the routes hereinafter mentioned, to your petitioner for the period of 999 years from and after the 1st day of November, 1875, and your petitioner, on the 1st day of April, 1903, took possession of the leased property, and since that date has had continuously, and now has, possession thereof and is operating said leased railways.

Third—At and prior to the date of the aforesaid lease by said Manhattan Railway Company to your petitioner, the Manhattan Railway Company owned and operated as a part of its elevated railway system a certain elevated railway or railways in The City of New York upon the following route or routes:

Commencing at the intersection of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Third avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, extending thence southerly along said Third avenue to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; thence over property owned by said Manhattan Railway Company to the southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, and crossing at right angles, or nearly so, said One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-second street, and the intervening streets and avenues; thence across property owned, leased or controlled by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to the northerly side of the Harlem river; thence across the Harlem river upon the bridge owned by the said Manhattan Railway Company to Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; thence southerly along said

Second avenue to Twenty-third street; thence easterly along said Twenty-third street to First avenue, thence southerly along said First avenue to First street or Houston street; thence southerly along Allen street to Division street; thence along Division street to Chatham square; thence across Chatham square and along Park row to a point at or near the terminus of the Brooklyn Bridge, in said Borough of Manhattan, as said route more fully appears upon the maps or plans filed herewith and made a part of this petition.

Fourth—Your petitioner owns and operates as a part of its railway system, a certain elevated railway or railways in The City of New York, upon the following route or routes, viz.:

From the intersection of Westchester avenue and Brook avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, in said City, extending thence southwesterly to Third avenue at or near its intersection with One Hundred and Fiftieth street, and there connecting with the elevated railway leased by your petitioner as aforesaid from said Manhattan Railway Company as more fully appears upon the maps or plans herewith filed and made a part of this petition.

Fifth—The title of said Manhattan Railway Company to the several portions of said leased route was duly acquired from predecessor companies as follows, to wit:

The portion of said route from One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Third avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Second avenue, from or through the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, a corporation organized under chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto.

The portion thereof from One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Chatham square from or through the Metropolitan Elevated Railway Company, a corporation organized under chapter 885 of the Laws of 1872, chapter 837 of the Laws of 1873, chapter 275 of the Laws of 1874, chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto.

The portion of said route extending from Chatham square to the terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge was acquired by said Manhattan Railway Company, from or through the Metropolitan Elevated Railway Company as aforesaid, and from or through the New York Elevated Railroad Company, a corporation organized under chapter 140 of the Laws of 1850, chapter 697 of the Laws of 1866, chapter 489 of the Laws of 1867, chapter 855 of the Laws of 1868, chapter 595 of the Laws of 1875, and chapter 606 of the Laws of 1875, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto.

Sixth—Your petitioner is a railway corporation actually operating the said elevated railway or railways, upon each of the routes above described, which said railway or railways are wholly within the limits of The City of New York.

Seventh—Your petitioner hereby makes application to your Honorable Board to fix, determine and establish the route or routes, by which it may connect with other steam railways and the stations thereof and with steam ferries, and may extend its lines within The City of New York and may lay its tracks and operate its railways to terminals within said City as follows, viz.: For authority to lay additional tracks on, above, under and contiguous to that portion of the route or routes of its railway or railways within The City of New York above described, and also hereby makes application for authority to acquire terminal and other facilities necessary for the accommodation of the traveling public on streets and places on which said railway or railways are or shall be located as hereinafter stated, to wit:

Two additional tracks on or contiguous to all portions of the above-described route of the existing railway or railways of said Manhattan Railway Company, upon which it is at present authorized to maintain its railroad, the purpose being to make a four-track railway upon the entire route above described.

Terminal and other facilities necessary for the accommodation of the traveling public on streets and places on which the said railways are or shall be located as follows, to wit:

The additional stations, platforms, stairways and approaches, including removal of, restoration of and additions to existing stations and such other incidental structures, appliances and facilities, all as more fully shown on the maps or plan or set forth in the specifications filed herewith and made a part of this petition.

Also, wherever the existing structure is not of sufficient strength and capacity or otherwise suitable, to permit of the laying of such additional tracks that the existing structure shall be reconstructed or enlarged for the purpose of receiving such additional track or tracks, either on the level of the two or more existing tracks, or above the two or more existing tracks, as the case may be, such reconstruction to be made in accordance with the specifications and requirements under which said original structure was erected and such further requirements as your Honorable Board may prescribe, the foundations and columns to be in substantially the same positions as at present.

Also at any or all necessary crossings or junctions upon said route or routes, to connect the additional track or tracks herein applied for with the existing railway or railways or with intersecting railways by means of crossings and tracks above or on the same level as the existing structure.

Eighth—Your petitioner further shows that the convenience and safety of the traveling public will be greatly served by the granting of the prayer of this petition. Your petitioner will begin to construct and will complete such additional track or tracks and terminal and other facilities with due diligence and as soon as thereunto lawfully authorized, reserving the right to alter or amend this application or any part thereof at any time before the same shall have been granted or authorized by your Honorable Board and accepted by this company.

Specification for four-tracking the Second avenue line and extending the two additional tracks from Chatham square to the City Hall, at the south end, over the present City Hall Branch of the Third avenue line, and from One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Second avenue to One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Third avenue, over the Suburban line, with connection with the Suburban line at One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Third avenue, and with the Westchester Branch at Westchester and Brook avenues, as shown on three drawings numbered as follows:

No. 4337, City Hall to First avenue and First street.

No. 4345, First avenue and First street to Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-second street.

No. 4218, from Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-second street to Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Westchester and Brook avenues.

The two additional tracks will be proportioned for removing load of present subway cars 52 feet long, weighing, loaded, 26,500 pounds per axle at the motor end and 19,000 pounds per axle at the trailer end.

At City Hall all tracks will be placed at a level of the mezzanine floor of the proposed new Brooklyn Bridge terminal.

Through Division and Allen streets the structure will be double-decked with two tracks at each level, the present main tracks being placed 12 feet closer together than at present, thus allowing 6 feet greater clearance from cars to the faces of abutting buildings.

From First avenue and First street the upper tracks will descend on a two per cent. grade to the level of the present tracks, and all tracks will continue on the same elevation to One Hundred and Twenty-second street and Second avenue, except at the proposed express stations at Forty-second, Eighty-sixth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, where the interior tracks will be raised to permit of platforms being built over the outer tracks, as shown in drawings.

From One Hundred and Twenty-second street northward the interior tracks will rise on a two per cent. grade to permit of an express station at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and thence continuing over the Harlem river on a double-decked bridge, and to One Hundred and Fiftieth street, at a sufficient elevation to permit passenger platforms to be built over the exterior tracks.

Connection will be made with the present tracks on the Third avenue line at about One Hundred and Forty-seventh street between northbound tracks, and at One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street between the southbound tracks; a connection will be made with the Westchester Branch by replacing the present structure, west of Brook avenue, with a structure which will permit the tracks to rise and pass over the present tracks of the Third avenue line, thus removing the grade crossing at One Hundred and Fiftieth street.

The structure columns on Third avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-fifth street to One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, will be made 15 inches square. At all other parts of the line the outside dimensions of the columns in the streets will be retained practically as at present.

DEAR SIR—We are in receipt of a letter from the Secretary, dated the 20th inst., transmitting copy of a communication from Warren C. Crane, Chairman of a Committee of the West End Association, dated the 13th inst., with respect to the station entrance to the subway at Broadway and Seventy-second street. Mr. Crane criticises the Seventy-

second street station as dangerous and unsightly. He says: "With the station moved south 10 to 15 feet, the danger will be very slight." He states that on January 5, 1905, the Acting Chief Engineer estimated the cost of removal of the station at \$20,000.

It is difficult for us to understand how the removal of this station entrance 10 or 15 feet to the south can be of any considerable consequence, either from the standpoint of danger or unsightliness; but assuming that the proposed new location would be an improvement, the question arises: What legal authority has the Board for spending \$20,000 of the City's money for this purpose? It seems plain that the contractor cannot be required to pay this expense. This would not be an administration expense of the Board. We are of the opinion that there is great doubt whether the Board has any authority to spend the City's money for this purpose.

We suggest that before acting upon Mr. Crane's letter, the Board refer the matter to the Comptroller with request that he obtain an opinion from the Corporation Counsel with respect to the authority of the Board in the premises.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
