Dear Sirs—The books of this office show unpaid bills amounting to one thou-
sand eight hundred thirty-nine dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$1,839.87) for the
year 1909, for services and attendance of expert witnesses, etc., as follows:

During the year 1909 there were a number of cases of exceptional difficulty, in-
cluding five cases of murder in the first degree, which added greatly to the expense
of running this office.

In the year 1909 there was no official interpreter or Grand Jury Stenographer, con-
sequently the charges for both the interpreter and the Grand Jury Stenographer had
to be paid out of the contingent fund. The fact that the County Court House is
located eight miles from the Borough Hall is an additional cause of expense, espe-
cially in mileage charges of witnesses who attend before the Court and Grand Jury.

In the year 1909 there was a balance in the salary account of this office amount-
ing to two thousand dollars and twelve cents (\$2,000.12), which I thought would be
transferred to the account of Witness Fees and Contingencies, but without my knowl-
edge this sum was transferred to the General Fund.

The bills are proper County Charges and should be paid. I therefore respect-
fully request your Honorable Board to authorize the Comptroller of The City of
New York to issue special revenue bonds to provide the means necessary to pay
the above-mentioned deficiency. Respectfully,

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Elementary Schools respectfully reports that it has given care-
ful consideration to a preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on
December 20, 1910 (see "Journal," page —), requesting that the Board of Education
fill vacancies for men teachers as soon as such vacancies occur, and that all vacancies
for men that now exist be filled by the appointment of men teachers when the next
appointments are made.

Your Committee finds, upon investigation, that there are at present only five
vacant positions in the public school system that may properly be filled by the ap-
pointment of men. The appointments, in any event, will not be made to take effect prior to
the beginning of the term in February next, and no assurance can now be given that
all the vacancies existing at that time will be filled by new appointments, for the
reason that the Board of Superintendents and the Board of Education must take into
consideration the consolidation of classes, to the end that the system be conducted on
as economical a basis as possible. In the circumstances, it is impossible for the Board
of Education to comply with the request of the Board of Aldermen as set forth in
the resolution summarized above, but your Committee desires to state that the matter
of the appointment of men to vacant positions which may properly be filled by men
will receive very careful consideration.

The Budget for 1911 has already established under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter the following grades of positions in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

Four of the requested grades of Orderly have been established under section 56 and now exist, so that the request of the Board of Trustees is already provided for except for the grades of Orderly at \$240, Waiter at \$300, Waiter at \$240, Waitress at \$300, Seamstress at \$192, Laundress at \$480, Hospital Helper at \$420 and the various grades of Wardmaid.

The title of Wardmaid is not recognized by the Civil Service Commission, that position being classified as Hospital Helper. There is no need to multiply titles to cover the same duties, and we recommend that the request for the position of Wardmaid be not granted. The grades requested for Wardmaid already exist in the Hospital Helper's Class.

In the Budget schedules for 1911 allowances are made in bulk for Orderlies, Hospital Helpers, Laundresses, Waiters, Waitresses and Seamstresses. There are many changes in these classes of employees, and they receive varying salaries. As they are provided for in bulk, it becomes necessary that the different grades be established and the rates fixed, and we recommend the adoption of the resolution hereto appended.

In accordance with an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated April 22, 1903, a resolution was adopted by your Board on June 2, 1903, providing for the transfer of certain City property from the Fire Department to other Departments.

Gentlemen—Under the provisions of the Code of Ordinances providing for maintenance and repair of sidewalks in the Borough of Brooklyn (Chap. I, Article 3), I ask your concurrence, by resolution, in directing owners of certain property fronting on defective sidewalks to make repairs and to obviate conditions which at the present time are dangerous to pedestrians.

The objectionable conditions, have continued at these locations for some time, and I would ask your early concurrence in issuing notices to the owners to make repairs which the ordinance provides for.

The locations are as follows:

Navy st., northwest corner of Myrtle ave. Flagging badly broken opposite cellar entrance on Navy st., evidently by dropping kegs upon same from wagons. Complaint received from Commissioner's office October 14, 1910.

238-240 Bedford ave. Runway opposite 238 and sidewalk opposite 240 partly laid with paving block with no bridging in runway. Complaint received October 26, 1910.

646 Pacific st. Two dangerous holes in cement walk driveway, each about 2 feet by 4 feet by 3 inches deep. Complaint directed to Borough President, dated October 26, 1910.

Southeast corner of High and Bridge sts. Sidewalk badly broken opposite side entrance to cellar on High st., evidently by dropping kegs on same. Complaint concerning this and other locations dated April 28, 1910, made to Bureau of Complaints.

Northeast corner of Myrtle ave. and Lawrence st. Sidewalks badly broken on Lawrence st. side at cellar entrance, evidently by dropping kegs on same. Complaint dated October 26, 1910, received through Superintendent's office. Very truly yours,

Sir—Acting in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, I respectfully request the Board of Aldermen to authorize the Comptroller to issue revenue bonds, if approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the amount of two thousand dollars to provide for certain expenditures necessary for the Department of Commissioner of Records of the County of New York for the year 1911.

Sir—I would respectfully ask that, pursuant to the provisions of section 188 of the Charter of The City of New York, your honorable Board will request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), for remodeling and repairing the building which has been assigned to this Department by the Sinking Fund Commission, to be used as a House of Detention for Women Prisoners, in accordance with section 77, chapter 659, Laws of 1910.

I would ask the careful attention of your Board to the enclosed report of the Department Inspector, showing the necessity for this appropriation.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your request, I have made a general inspection of the Old Municipal Court House, corner of Prince and Wooster sts., Borough of Manhattan, which was transferred to this Department by the Sinking Fund Commission, in order that the building might be used as a House of Detention for women prisoners.

In order to make the building tenantable, and to comply with the laws and regulations of the State Prison Commission, the National Board of Fire Underwriters, the New York Fire Department, the Building Department, and the Department of Water

Supply, Gas and Electricity, it will be necessary to make the following alterations, additions and improvements:

1. Repair all window frames and sash; renew all broken windows; repair and renew, where necessary, all doors, frames, trim, etc., to all entrances to building.
2. Repair roof, skylight, leaders, etc., and put same in first-class condition.
3. Repair and re-set stone steps, sills, etc., to all entrances to building; repair and point up front brick work of building, etc.
4. When necessary repairs are made to roof, cornices, leaders, skylights, and other repairs to outside of building, it will be required to paint same.
5. Iron window-guards and grille doors will be required to all windows and doors.

6. Changes will be required on the several floors in the interior of building, such as removing some of the present partitions, re-arranging the rooms, etc.

7. Fireproofing all floors, ceilings, partitions and stairways, to meet the requirements of the Board of Fire Underwriters, the New York Fire Department, etc.

8. Install a complete new electric lighting equipment throughout the entire building in accordance with the requirements of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

9. Remodel the plumbing and heating systems, to meet the requirements caused by the new use of the building.

10. Install complete kitchen and laundry outfits.

11. Make necessary changes and alterations in Janitor's living quarters.

12. Make two floors of the court room, and divide the space on each floor for individual rooms for detained prisoners.

13. Provide the necessary doctor's examining rooms, hospital ward, assembly rooms, chapel, offices, etc., to meet the purposes for which the building is intended.

14. The entire interior of building to be painted and decorated.

15. All floors and rooms in building to have a properly installed ventilating system, which shall meet all requirements of the Board of Health and the State Commission of Prisons.

The building is a four-story and cellar, brick construction, with approximately 12,500 square feet of floor surface, and practically the entire interior must be remodeled, to make it suitable for the purpose intended.

The following gives, in detail, what will be the approximate cost of the changes, alterations and additions:

Exterior of Building—Items Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, \$3,500; items Nos. 6 and 7, \$5,000; item No. 8, \$2,500; item No. 9, \$5,000; item No. 10, \$1,500; item No. 11, \$300; items Nos. 12 and 13, \$5,000; item No. 14, \$1,000; item No. 15, \$1,200; total, \$25,000.

These changes and repairs will put the building in first-class condition. When you so direct specifications covering the work will be prepared.

Office of the Commissioner of Jurors, Room No. 5, County Court House, Borough of Brooklyn, N. Y., January 6, 1911.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—In compliance with the requirements of the laws of the State of New York (article 2, title 4, chapter 10), chapter 48, I have the honor to submit the following report of the business of this Department from September 1, 1909, to August 30, 1910, both inclusive.

The Department of Taxes and Assessments of The City of New York, whose duty it is to furnish the names of persons for jury duty, residing within the County limits, failed to furnish such list to this Department until after the time set by statute.

According to chapter 1135, Laws of 1881, of the State of New York, I have selected 57,735 persons, all of whom were examined by me under chapter 601, Laws of New York.

After examination and correction, as to their qualities, etc., the following is the disposition of those examined: Qualified, 16,940; aliens, 3,039; non-residents, 2,467; over age, 1,064; females, 251; minors, 218; no property, 247; illiterate, 695; clergymen, 11; physicians, 42; pharmacists, 80; lawyers, 187; teachers, 61; public officers, 1,919; steam engineers, 208; pilots, 68; telegraph operators, 67; exempt military, 898; exempt firemen, 147; physically incapable, 1,386; not found, 9,139; duplicates, 489; deceased, 1,109; election officials, 169; dentists, 7; municipal jurors, 3,500; newspaper men, 88; absent from city and county, 447; embalmers, 15; special jurors, 94; no answers, 3,221; disqualified, 9,462; total, 57,735.

In accordance with chapter 451, Laws of 1907, I have submitted to the Municipal Judges of the First District, 500 jurors; Second District, 500 jurors; Third District, 500 jurors; Fourth District, 500 jurors; Fifth District, 500 jurors; Sixth District, 500 jurors; Seventh District, 500 jurors, making a total of 3,500 to serve during the year.

Under chapter 257, Laws of 1904, I have submitted to the Board for the selection of Grand Jurors a list of persons, who have qualified before me, to act as jurors during the then ensuing year. From this list the Board has selected and returned to me the names of 665 persons as being suitable for service as Grand Jurors.

During the year covered by this report, September 1, 1909, to August 30, 1910, both inclusive, there have been drawn from the qualified list of 16,940, 13,740 Trial

Jurors, and 480 Grand Jurors, all of whom were summoned to attend the several Courts held in the County during the time referred to above.

There were, also, drawn, under chapter 546, Laws of 1902, of the State of New York, 75 Special Jurors.

The number of jurors drawn, and the Courts to which they were summoned, the number who served, the number of persons fined, etc., are shown as follows:

For the Supreme Court of the State of New York there were drawn: Special Jurors, 75; Trial Jurors, 8,440; total, 8,515.

For the Kings County Court there were drawn: Grand Jurors, 480; Trial Jurors, 5,300; total, 5,780; making a total of 14,295.

By the returns to this Department, made by the Clerks of the Supreme and the County Courts, out of the total of 14,295 persons summoned as Trial Jurors, the following: Served, 10,380; excused by the Judges, 2,702; returned as having been fined, 64; returned by the Jury Notice Servers as not found, 1,149; total, 14,295.

From the official returns of the several Courts I have received the names of 64 delinquents, who were fined, and all of whom were examined by the Board for the Remission and Enforcement of Fines. Remitted, 41; could not be found, 20; awaiting action of Board, 3; total, 64.

On the date of my last report there were remaining on hand, awaiting the action of the Board for the Remission and Enforcement of Fines, 16 cases, which have been disposed of as follows: Remitted, 9; could not be found, 4; judgments were filed and docketed against, 3; total, 16; viz.: No. 4384, Thomas F. Clark, \$125; No. 3029, J. H. Raynor, \$125; No. 10,317, Leon K. Israel, \$125.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

At this point Alderman Walsh moved that the Board go into Committee of the Whole, in accordance with the provisions of resolution No. 2477 of December 20, 1910, as amended, on "the matters referred to in the message of his Honor the Mayor sent to this Board on December 13, 1910, both as to the charges against the Alderman therein referred to, and as to his qualifications for continued membership in this body, etc."

Which motion was adopted.

The President called Alderman Walsh to the chair, and the Board went into Committee of the Whole.

Subsequently, the Committee of the Whole arose, and Alderman Walsh, as Chairman, reported, and recommended for adoption, on the part of said Committee of the Whole, the following resolution:

No. 2596.

Whereas, Affidavits were submitted with the message of his Honor the Mayor, sent to this Board on the 13th day of December, 1910, which affidavits purport to show a prima facie case of misconduct on the part of Alderman Michael J. Volkman, which misconduct, if true, would render the said Alderman deserving of expulsion from this Board; and

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, 13-21 Park Row, New York, December 19, 1910.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—This department is frequently called upon to make inspections and tests of pipes, special castings, etc., which are to form part of the distribution system, but which are being manufactured for the account of other departments or corporations engaged in subsurface construction work.

Water mains are sometimes altered where they interfere with sewer construction work and the line of water mains is changed in railroad and subway work. While the department permits the alteration of the mains, it has usually been the condition that where necessary, new and larger mains shall be installed.

The salary now paid the Foundry Inspectors assigned to this work and to the regular inspection of the material being manufactured for the purpose of this department is from corporate stock. It is not proper or legal to charge the expense of these Inspectors, when assigned to the inspection and test of the materials being manufactured for other departments or corporations, to these funds.

I would respectfully request, therefore, that the Board of Aldermen recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the authorization of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$5,000, to provide for the payment of salary of Inspectors assigned to this special work. It is absolutely necessary in order that the ferry operation on the South Brooklyn ferry can be carried on that the charter of these two ferryboats be continued.

The Department after due investigation found these two boats to be the best available boats that could be obtained.

Extra boats are needed in view of the fact that some of the City's boats are out of commission undergoing repairs, but principally due to the fact that the three boats used on the 39th Street Ferry are to be remodeled to provide additional vehicle space on the lower decks. The money for the remodeling of the boats was included in the recent corporate stock allowance for this Department, and the alterations are now in progress.

It is estimated that outside boats will be required for three months, beginning January 1, 1911, or, say, ninety days.

Accordingly I hereby respectfully request and recommend that pursuant to the provisions of sub-division 8 of section 188 of the charter, a resolution be adopted by you requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$14,400 for the purpose indicated, namely the chartering of ferryboats for the Municipal Ferry service. Sir—On the 29th ultimo a request was sent to the Board of Aldermen asking an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$14,400 for the purpose of chartering ferryboats for the Municipal Ferry service, to take the place of the City's boats while they are out of commission undergoing alterations.

The 1911 budget provides an appropriation of \$5,000 for the chartering of ferryboats during the year. This sum of \$5,000 is the estimated amount actually needed as an emergency fund in connection with the chartering of ferryboats while the regular boats are undergoing any repairs as a result of collision, accident or otherwise, and also to take the place of the regular boats while undergoing annual inspections by the United States Steamboat Inspectors. The issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$14,400 is desired to provide funds for the chartering of ferryboats while three of the boats are being altered so as to furnish four team gangways on the lower decks of the boats (instead of two team gangways as at present) to accommodate the constantly increasing vehicle traffic on the 39th Street ferry; also while necessary extensive repairs on the "Richmond" and "Brooklyn" are being made, such as the lining of the shafts and stern bearings, together with all the spring bearings, installing new propellers, repairing and overhauling rudders, overhauling and lining up the main engines and a considerable amount of minor repairs.

We are at present chartering boats against the five thousand dollar appropriation. This appropriation will be exhausted on the 23d instant, and unless additional funds are provided on or before that date, it will, of course, be necessary to discontinue the further chartering of outside boats, and this necessarily would discontinue the operation of the 39th Street Ferry. It will, therefore, be seen that it is most urgent to have prompt action on the Department's request for the revenue bond issue.

Report of Committee on Codification—

No. 2085 (G. O. No. 95).

The Committee on Codification of Ordinances, to which was recommended, on November 1, 1910 (Minutes, page 592), the annexed report and proposed Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Code has been scanned line for line and such typographical or clerical errors as may have crept in, minor in their nature, have been eliminated. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses and the Commissioner of Weights and Measures have made slight suggestions which have been accepted and are embodied herein. The one apparent objection of his Honor the Mayor relating to the speed of vehicles, as expressed at a public hearing, it is believed has been met. The Committee has brought the Code up to the beginning of the current year by providing for insertion in proper place all ordinances adopted and approved since this Code was first presented.

It offers herewith for adoption an amendatory resolution and recommends that the Code, as thus amended, be adopted.

The Committee on Codification of Ordinances herewith submits a report of its labors. The Code, as adopted October 30, 1906, and approved November 8, 1906, was taken up, the amendments thereto, together with the ordinances of new character since adopted and approved, were collated and inserted in their appropriate places in the Code herewith presented.

Many of the existent ordinances have been found crude, inconsistent and in a number of cases sections were found which have become obsolete, serve no purpose whatever, and in the opinion of the Committee should be dropped. A table of such changes is hereto appended.

The Code herewith presented is in a strict sense not a revision. It is simply a collation or codification of the ordinances as they exist to-day, with minor verbal changes and recommendations that such matter as is purposeless be eliminated. In several subdivisions of the Code, namely, those provisions applying to outlying sections of the city and continued in force within the limits of said sections by the Charter, were found many repetitions, all aiming in the one direction, which, in the opinion of the Committee should be embraced in general provisions.

It is also recommended that hereafter all ordinances presented, whether new or of an amendatory nature, state specifically the section, article, chapter and part of the Code to be changed or added to.

It is further recommended that, because of their importance, the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be made a part of the Code, to be known as Chapter 17 of Part I thereof.

Table of Changes—The following subjects appearing in various instances in the old Code have been dropped and the several matters, with verbal changes, have been added to Part I of the Code embracing provisions which are styled "General Ordinances and Ordinances of a General Character."

Alarms, fire, false; Sales and Auctions in the Public Streets; Bathing in Waters Within Jurisdiction of City; Blasting of Rocks; Burning Combustible Substances in Streets; Hand Organs, playing of; Placards on Lampposts, etc.; Ball Playing and Throwing of Missiles; To Prevent Injury to Hose at Fires; and where rules and regulations existed in the nature of ordinances affecting the Volunteer Fire Department in sections of the city where the paid department has been substituted, said ordinances have been dropped as obsolete. It is the intention of the Committee in subsequent reports to reduce the number of ordinances affecting the outlying sections, where the same can be consistently done, so that the Code may be simplified.

In the second line of section 1, of chapter 1, of Part I, strike out the word "may" and insert in lieu thereof the word "shall."

In the first line of section 86, of article 1, of chapter 5, of Part I, strike out the first word "done" and insert in lieu thereof the word "work."

In section 113, of article 2, of chapter 5, of Part I, strike out the words "Police Magistrate or Justice" and "Police Justice or Magistrate," and in each instance insert in lieu thereof the words "City Magistrate or Justice."

In the ninth line of section 136, of article 4, of chapter 5, of Part I, strike out the word "account" and insert in lieu thereof the word "contract."

Insert in section 502, of Part I, the ordinance regulating matters provided for in section 1481 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, known as the "Greater New York Charter," approved December 19, 1907, with subheading thus:

Exhibitions on Sundays.

Sec. 502. It shall not be lawful to exhibit on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, to the public, in any building, garden, grounds, concert room or other room or place within The City of New York, the performance of any tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, farce, negro minstrelsy, negro or other dancing, wrestling, boxing with or without gloves, sparring contests, trial of strength, or any part or parts therein, or any circus, equestrian or dramatic performance or exercise, or any performance or exercise of jugglers, acrobats, club performances or rope dancers. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit at any such place or places on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, sacred or educational vocal or instrumental concerts, lectures, addresses, recitations and singing, provided that such above-mentioned entertainments shall be given in such a manner as not to disturb the public peace, or amount to a serious interruption of the repose and religious liberty of the community. Any person wilfully offending against the provisions of this section, and every person knowingly aiding in such exhibitions, except as herein provided, by advertisements or otherwise, and every owner or lessee of any building, part of a building, grounds, garden or concert room, or other room or place, who shall lease or let out the same for the purpose of any such exhibition or performance, except as herein provided, or assent that the same be used for any such purpose, shall be subject to a penalty of five hundred dollars, which penalty the Corporation Counsel of said City is hereby authorized, in the name of The City of New York, to prosecute, sue for and recover; and on the recovery of a judgment for the penalty herein provided for against any manager, proprietor, owner or lessee consenting to or causing or allowing, or letting any part of the building for the purpose of any exhibition or performance, prohibited by this ordinance, the license which shall have been previously obtained by such manager, proprietor, owner or lessee is of itself vacated and annulled.

Strike out paragraph 4 of section 511, of subdivision 12, of chapter 13, of Part I, and insert in lieu thereof the words "They shall state the amount in which security is required for the performance of the contract."

In the fourth paragraph of section 31 of the Building Code, beginning in the tenth line thereof, strike out the words "or steel columns and girders * * * when constructed fireproof" and insert in lieu thereof the words "and columns, or piers of masonry, for the support of the walls and ceilings over any room which has a clear span of more than 26 feet between walls, in such dwellings as are not constructed fireproof, nor to prohibit the use of iron or steel girders, or iron or girders and columns in place of brick walls in buildings which are to be used for dwellings when constructed fireproof."

In the seventh line of section 93 of the Building Code strike out the word "level" and insert in lieu thereof the word "level."

In the fortieth line of section 106 of the Building Code after the words "concrete or" insert the words "other fireproof composition."

Strike out the first section 71 of Part III, of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 70. The annual charge for a retail License to sell Black and Smokeless Powder such as is used as a propelling charge, shall be ten dollars."

Strike out the figures "142 to 166" at right of column beginning Part X. of the Regulations of Municipal Explosives Commission, they being superfluous.

In section 17 of the "Ordinances relating to that section of the City of New York formerly known as the Village of Rockaway Beach," strike out the sign and figure "\$5" and insert in lieu thereof the sign and figure "\$2."

Resolved, That the Code of Ordinances is hereby further amended by adding at this end of section 269, of subdivision 10, of article 10, of chapter 5, of Part I, the following words:

"No permit shall be issued by the Borough President or Superintendent of Buildings for the removal of any building or buildings where water will be required for the wetting down of the walls until payment has been made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the water to be used for this purpose."

In the first line of the third paragraph of section 263, of subdivision 8 of article 10, of chapter 5, of Part I, relating to "barber poles," strike out the figure "5," and insert in lieu thereof the figure "8."

In section 430, of chapter 11, of Part I, relating to the "discharge of firearms," insert the following:

At the end of the paragraph beginning "In the Borough of The Bronx," the words, "Pelham Gun Club, foot of E. Scofield st., City Island."

At the end of the paragraph beginning "In the Borough of Queens," the words, "Whitestone Gun Club, in Whitestone."

At the end of the paragraph beginning "In the Borough of Richmond," the words, "Westerleigh Men's Club, south of Main st., West New Brighton."

Resolved, That the Code of Ordinances is hereby further amended by striking out the seventeenth and eighteenth lines of section 308, of article 2, of chapter 7, of Part I, relating to "licenses and license fees," and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"For each public bowling place..... \$10 00"

"For each public billiard or pool place..... 50 00"

By striking out the word "licensed" in the first line of section 315, of article 3, of chapter 7, of Part I, relating to "drivers of licensed vehicles," and inserting between the words "express" and "shall" in the said line the words "requiring a license."

Resolved, That the Code of Ordinances is hereby further amended (in relation to weights and measures), as follows:

By inserting the words "or measure" after the word "weight" in the fourth line of section 390, of chapter 8, of Part I.

By inserting at the end of section 391, of chapter 8, of Part I, the following words:

"Any violation of this or the preceding section shall render the person, firm or corporation so offending liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for each offense."

Resolved, That the Code of Ordinances is hereby further amended by striking therefrom section 454, of article 2, of chapter 12, of Part I, relating to the "Rules of the Road," and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 454. Speed of Vehicles—The rate of speed, at which vehicles may be propelled or driven through the streets of the City shall be such as in the judgment of the Police Department may be safe and proper, and the Commissioner of said Department shall prescribe rules and regulations governing the same, keeping in mind the closely built up and congested sections, also such sections as are sparsely settled, in determining the rate of speed at which vehicles may be operated."

\$21,500,000 (twenty-one million five hundred thousand dollars) of corporate stock of The City of New York, to provide for the supply of water, payable on September 1, 1960.

\$8,500,000 (eight million five hundred thousand dollars) of corporate stock of The City of New York, for the construction of Rapid Transit Railroads, payable September 1, 1960.

Changes in the Electrical Rules and Regulations, Bureau of Electrical Inspection.

January 5, 1911.

It is purposed to effect on April 1, 1911, the following changes in Rules 40 and 41, relating to rubber covered wires. Meanwhile constructive criticism is invited thereon:

40-a. Add at the end of the second paragraph, and immediately preceding the table, the following:

"which applies to tinned conductors."

41. Insert the following fine print note immediately after the title, Rubber Covered Wire:

"All tests required by this rule shall apply on all wire at the time of manufacture as well as up to and including the time of installation."

41-b. Substitute for the sentence preceding the table the following:

"Must consist of rubber or other approved compounds, homogeneous in character, adhering to the conductor, and of a thickness not less than that given in the following table."

41-c. Substitute for the present rule the following:

"Every length of completed wire or cable must be tested after ten hours' immersion in water, temperature to approximate 60 degs. Fahr. (15.5 C.), and results of insulation tests at different temperatures to be reduced to a basis of 60 degs. Fahr. by using factors in the following table.

These tests must be made after an electrification of one minute and with a voltage of not less than 100 volts.

Any length may be tested after 30 days' immersion in clear water and must show not less than 50 per cent. of insulation resistance required after 10 hours' immersion.

41-d. Change to read as follows: "Any one foot length, etc." instead of "Each foot."

In the fourth line of the second paragraph, change "4,000" to "3,000."

41-h. Substitute for the present rule the following:

Test for Hardness of Insulation—The rubber or other approved compounds used

as an insulation, must, after the braid has been carefully removed, be sufficiently elastic to permit all wires smaller than No. 7 B. & S. gauge to be wrapped at least five times around a cylinder of diameter as specified, and left so wrapped for twenty-four hours without injury to the insulation.

The diameter of cylinder used for any size wire shall be as follows:

Nos. 8, 9, and 10, B. & S. gauge, equal to twice the diameter of wire measured over the insulation, after removing the braid.

No. 11 and smaller, B. & S. gauge, equal to the diameter of wire measured over the insulation, after removing the braid.

Test for Softness of Insulation—The rubber or other approved compounds used as an insulation, must present sufficient resistance to crushing or tension to withstand the following two tests:

Samples while being prepared for these tests shall have a temperature between 50 and 90 degrees Fahrenheit and shall be kept within these limits during the tests.

Test A—A sample of wire of sufficient length for test, about 20 inches, shall have the braid and insulation removed for about two inches at each end, leaving the braid and insulation on balance of sample. One end of the bare copper shall be fastened to a clamp on a shaft of the diameter given below, and a ten-pound weight attached to the other bare copper end of the wire. The shaft shall then be revolved ten times in ten seconds, wrapping the sample in a close, even wind around the shaft. With the tension left on the sample, it shall then be immersed in water at a temperature of 60 degrees F. for twenty-four hours, immediately after which time it shall, while still immersed, be subjected to 1,500 volts alternating current for one minute and shall show an insulation resistance equal to at least half that required by 41-c.

Diameter of Shaft, No. 14 Wire, 170 mils.

Diameter of Shaft, No. 12 Wire, 190 mils.

Diameter of Shaft, No. 10 Wire, 275 mils.

Diameter of Shaft, No. 8 Wire, 375 mils.

Test B—Sample to be tested shall have braid carefully removed for at least one inch from one end. The wire itself shall be connected to one terminal of an electric circuit, of which a testing tool, described in the following paragraph, shall be the other terminal. This circuit shall have a potential of at least 100 volts alternating or 140 volts direct current and a resistance of at least 1,000 ohms.

The portion of the wire with braid removed shall be placed on a flat surface and subjected to a pressure, vertically applied by means of the edged tool mentioned above, of five pounds for fifteen minutes. The tool edge shall be sharp and the sides of the edge shall form an angle of 90 degrees with each other. During this period the tool edge when placed transversely to the insulation shall not sink through sufficiently to touch the copper wire and complete the electric circuit.

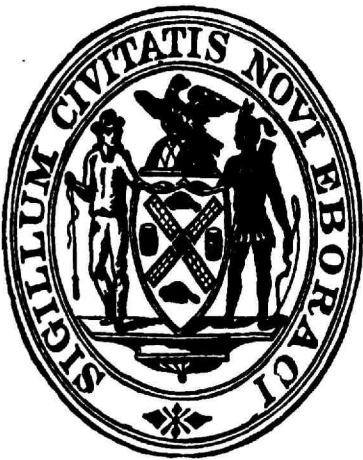

of the Sinking Fund April 4, 1907, in the Bor-
ough of Manhattan, City of New York; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the
Greater New York Charter as amended by chap-
ters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide
for the manner and procedure of making such
grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this
Board adopted a resolution on October 28, 1910,
fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as
November 25, 1910, at which citizens were en-
titled to appear and be heard, and publication
was had for at least two (2) days in "The
Commercial" and the "Morning Telegraph,"
newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the
City Record for ten (10) days immediately
prior to the date of hearing, and by resolution
adopted by the Board November 18, 1910, such
hearing was adjourned to December 9, 1910, and
was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to
the money value of the franchise or right applied
for and proposed to be granted to the Conron
Bros. Company, and the adequacy of the compensa-
tion proposed to be paid therefor; now there-
fore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the res-
olution for the grant of the franchise or right
applied for by Conron Bros. Company, contain-
ing the form of proposed contract for the grant
of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced
and entered in the minutes of this Board, as fol-
lows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Ap-
portionment hereby grants to Conron Bros. Com-
pany the franchise or right fully set out and
described in the following form of proposed con-
tract for the grant thereof, embodying all the
terms and conditions, including the provisions as
to rates and charges, upon and subject to the
terms and conditions in said proposed form of
contract contained, and that the Mayor of the
City of New York, and he hereby is author-
ized to execute and deliver such contract in the
name and on behalf of The City of New York,
as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of
19 , by and between The City of New York
(hereinafter called the City), party of the first
part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and
in the name of said City, under and in pursu-
ance of the authority of the Board of Estimate
and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter
called the Board), and Conron Bros. Company
(hereinafter called the Company), party of the
second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and
agreements herein contained, the parties hereto
do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Com-
pany, subject to the conditions and provisions
hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to
construct, maintain and operate certain conduits
with the necessary branches and extensions
therefrom, leading directly into private property,
for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration
to consumers, provided that no conduit be of a
greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches,
including insulation or other covering; the same
to be constructed and operated only beneath the
surface of such of the streets, avenues and high-
ways situate within the Borough of Manhattan,
City of New York, as are included within the
district bounded and described as follows:

On the north by the centre line of West 134th
street, west of the centre line of 12th avenue,
and the centre line of West 132d street, east
of the centre line of 12th avenue; on the west
by the easterly line of the marginal street, wharf
or place, as adopted by the Commissioner of
Docks February 27, 1907, approved by the Com-
missioners of the Sinking Fund April 3, 1907,
and laid down on the maps of the Department of
Docks and Ferries; on the south by the centre
line of West 129th street, west of the centre
line of 12th avenue, as extended to the centre
line of West 129th street, and the centre line of
West 130th street, east of said centre line of 12th
avenue as extended; on the east by the centre
line of 12th avenue, from the centre line of
West 134th street to the centre line of West
132d street, the centre line of Broadway from
the centre line of West 132d street to the centre
line of West 130th street, and the line which
would be formed by the extension of the centre
line of 12th avenue from the centre line of West
130th street to the centre line of West 129th
street. Said district being more particularly
shown by red lines on a map, entitled:

"Map showing district applied for by Conron
Bros. Company to accompany petition dated
May 25, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and
Apportionment, City of New York."

—signed by Joseph Conron, President, a copy of
which is hereto annexed and made a part of
this contract.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject
to the following conditions, which shall be com-
plied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain
and operate said conduits shall be held and en-
joyed by the Company for the term of fifteen
(15) years from the date upon which this con-
tract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege
of renewal of said contract for the further period
of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such
right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise
its privilege of renewal it shall make application
to the Board or any authority which shall be
authorized by law to act for the City in place
of the Board. Such application shall be made
at any time not earlier than two (2) years and
not later than one (1) year before the expiration
of the original term of this contract. The de-
termination of the revaluation shall be sufficient
if agreed to in writing by the Company and the
Board, but in no case shall the annual rate
of compensation to the City be fixed at a less
amount than the sum required to be paid during
the last year prior to the termination of the
original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach
such agreement on or before the day one (1)
year before the expiration of the original term
of this contract, then the annual rate of com-
pensation for such succeeding ten (10) years
shall be reasonable and either the City (by the
Board) or the Company shall be bound upon
request of the other to enter into a written
agreement with each other fixing the rate of
such compensation at such amount as shall be
reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate
so fixed be less than the sum required to be
paid for the last year prior to the termination
of the original term of this contract and if
the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what
is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a
written agreement fixing such annual rate and
at such amount as shall be determined by three
disinterested freeholders selected in the follow-
ing manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen
by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall
be chosen by the Company; these two shall
choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the
three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall
make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers
shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior
to the expiration of this original contract, and
their report shall be filed with the Board within
three (3) months after they are chosen. They
shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators.
They may base their judgment upon their own
experience and upon such information as they
may obtain by inquiries and investigations, with-
out the presence of either party. They shall
have the right to examine any of the books of
the Company and its officers under oath. The
valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined
shall be conclusive upon both parties but no
annual sum shall in any event be less than the
sum required to be paid for the last year of
the original term of this contract. If in any
case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to
the termination of the original term of this con-
tract, then the Company shall pay the annual
rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate
shall be determined, and shall then make up to
the City the amount of any excess of the annual
rate then determined over the previous annual
rate. The compensation and expenses of the
said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City
and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City
for the privilege hereby granted, the following
sums of money:

(a) The sum of six hundred and fifty dollars
(\$650) in cash within one (1) month after the
date on which this contract is signed by the

Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise
of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an an-
nual sum which shall in no case be less than two
hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), and which shall
be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual
receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum
of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the second term of five years, an an-
nual sum which shall in no case be less than two
hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), and which shall
be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual
receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum
of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the third term of five years, an an-
nual sum which shall in no case be less than five
hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal
to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual re-
ceipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum
of five hundred dollars (\$500).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be
the total receipts from all business of furnishing
refrigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents
(\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit con-
structed within the limits of any street, avenue
or highway, excepting, however, such conduits
as are constructed within the vault space or vault
spaces of any building or buildings used or oc-
cupied exclusively by the Company for the pur-
pose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for
each manhole constructed within the limits of any
street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the
date upon which this contract is signed by the
Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into
the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each
year and shall be for the amount due to Decem-
ber 31, next preceding. Provided that the first
annual payment shall be only for that proportion
of the first annual charge as the time between
the date upon which this contract is signed by
the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear
to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid
shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then
such sum over and above such minimum shall be
paid on or before February 1 in each year for
the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights conferred are
exercised by the Company and within one (1)
month from the date on which this contract is
signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to
the City the sum of seven hundred and fifty
dollars (\$750); said amount being due the City
by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the
streets by the Company or its predecessors.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms
of this contract to the City by the Company
shall not be considered in any manner in the
nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made
in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever
kind or description, now or hereafter required to
be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolu-
tion of the Board, or any law of the State of
New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall
continue throughout the whole term of this con-
tract (whether original or renewal), notwith-
standing any clause in any statute or in the
charter of any other company providing for
payments for refrigerating rights or franchises
at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or
sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted
(whether original or renewal), or of any part
thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues
mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall
be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the
said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain
a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee
that the same is subject to all conditions of this
contract, and that the assignee or lessee as-
sumes and will be bound by all of said condi-
tions, and especially said conditions as to pay-
ments, anything in any statute or in the char-
ter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary
notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or
lessee waives any more favorable conditions
created by such statute or its charter, and that it
will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise ex-
emption from liability to perform each and all
of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be
deemed to affect in any way the right of the
City to grant any individual, firm or other cor-
poration a similar right or privilege upon the
same or other terms and conditions, in the
same streets and avenues, or within the dis-
trict hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted
shall not be assigned either in whole or in
part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor
shall the title thereto, or right, interest or prop-
erty therein, pass to or vest in any other person
or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of
the Company or by operation of law, whether
under the provisions of the statutes relating to
the consolidation or merger of corporations or
otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting
by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under
seal, anything herein contained to the contrary
thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the
granting, giving or waiving of any one or more
of such consents shall not render unnecessary
any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original
contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the
termination of the said renewal term, or upon
the termination of the rights hereby granted for
any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Com-
pany before such termination, the conduits and
appurtenances of the Company constructed pur-
suant to this contract within the streets and
avenues shall become the property of the City
without cost, and the same may be used or dis-
posed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever,
or the same may be leased to any company or
individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract
as above, the Board shall so order by resolution,
the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice
from the Board, remove any and all of its con-
duits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to
this contract and the said streets and avenues
shall be restored to their original condition at
the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject
to whatever right, title or interest the owners of
abutting property or others may have in and to
the streets and avenues in which the Company is
hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made
under this grant shall be done in a manner solely
upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be
imposed by the President of the Borough of
Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Sup-
ply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective suc-
cessors in authority. The said Company shall
submit a working plan of construction to the
said President and to the said Commissioner,
which shall include and show in detail the
method of construction of said conduit line, con-
nections, manholes and other appurtenances, and
the mode of protection of all subsurface con-
struction under the streets and avenues in which
the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—The Company shall be bound to construct
a drainage system, or to any other subsurface or
to any surface structures in the streets, required
on account of the construction or operation of
the conduits of the Company, shall be made at
the sole cost of the Company, and in such man-
ner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—Any alteration to the sewerage or
drainage system, or to any other subsurface or
to any surface structures in the streets, required
on account of the construction or operation of
the conduits of the Company, shall be made at
the sole cost of the Company, and in such man-
ner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby
granted shall not be in preference or in hin-
drance to public work of the City, and should
the said conduits in any way interfere with the
construction of public works in the streets and

avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

During the term of this contract, the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

11. Number of feet of conduit now laid.

12. The total amount expended for same.

13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.

14. The total amount expended for same.

15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.

16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.

17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.

18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.

19. Number of outside consumers supplied.

20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within

a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the street shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-third—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal. The purchaser shall be responsible for the removal for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
