The President announced that Alderman Weston had been excused from attendance.

The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of April 1, 1913, which, on motion of Alderman Dowling, were approved as printed.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Walsh asked and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

No. 3294.

Whereas, The grim reaper death has invaded the public life of The City of New York and taken from it the Honorable Patrick F. McGowan, for four years President of the Board of Aldermen, and for many years and at the time of his demise a member of the Board of Education, to whose activities he devoted much time and zeal; and

Whereas, During his period of service as a public official the sterling qualities of manhood and unswerving devotion to duty so strongly marked in the Honorable Patrick F. McGowan endeared him alike to his colleagues and all others whose good fortune it was to know him; and

Whereas, This Board feels real sorrow at the too untimely taking away of a painstaking, conscientious public official, one who was ever ready to render such duties as were required of him; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York extends to the members of the bereaved family their kindly sympathy in this the hour of their dire affliction.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the City Clerk, be presented to the family of the deceased.

Resolved, Further, That as an additional mark of respect the Board do now adjourn.

In speaking of the resolution Alderman Walsh addressed the Board as follows:
Mr. President—I think it opportune and fitting at this time to offer testimony of the regard and esteem in which our late president, your predecessor, was held in this Board. The reaper, Death, has been busy with this Board during this term; we lost the brave, estimable Willard, the unassuming, quiet McGrath, and the pure, clean-lived John Oakley, all within a few months, and to finish, we are now called together to remember that death is ever with us, and that it is always claiming a shining mark; and it now has taken from us a citizen who had no superior in all the essentials of pure manhood and citizenship. It is a solemn truth that God rules on this earth; there is no such thing as chance. Kings, monarchs, presidents come and go, but the directing finger of an Omnipotent Providence is ever manifest and present. Man sometimes assumes a power that he has not, and we read that subsequent to the flood he decided to build a tower to Heaven, but God, by a confusion of tongues, suppressed the folly, making manifest the impotence of man and the omnipotence of God.

McGowan was a typical example of what is possible to the American man, no matter how humble his origin. This life and career typified what is possible to the clean minded man with an honest ambition to achieve things. Born with only the inheritance of an ancestry of clean living men and pure womanhood, he achieved with the only weapon placed in his hand by a common school education in New England a position that might satisfy the best. Without education other than that secured in the public schools of his native state of Connecticut, a close student and a lover of acquired knowledge, he not only became a man of learning but a man of culture. His ideals were high. It is true he did not attempt to "hitch his wagon to a star," but he ever remembered in his days of achievement the motto *semper fidelis*. He held to that always and everywhere. "Faithful to friends" was the motto which guided Pat McGowan in his life, and he cleaved to the line and adhered to it as those who knew him best could recognize. In societies he always found his place in the front rank; indeed where McGowan sat was usually the head of the table. Everybody with whom he came in contact recognized the ability and sterling worth of the man. He knew the difference between character and reputation, character he understood because that was but knowing himself; reputation he tried to achieve because he loved to stand well in the estimation of his fellows. He did stand high in the estimation of his fellow men. He was as sensitive as a woman looking to her honor as to what others thought of him; he knew that a good reputation was the dearest possession a man could have. He valued gold as nothing, station as without dignity, beauty as without charm, age as without reverence, save only when allied with reputation clear and spotless, or might I not rather have said that he regarded money as a disadvantage, making only more apparent the evil deeds of the man who held it without a character and without a reputation that the people believed in. He had only that inheritance himself, the inheritance of an honest ancestry, and he clung to it through all his days.

Those were McGowan's ideals, and he clung to them and exemplified them in his everyday life. Loyal to his friends, nobody ever questioned McGowan's honesty of purpose. Men always knew where to find him. His positions in this City were many, his trials were severe; he believed in the truth, absolute truth, not in the letter alone but in the spirit in his dealings with every man, and in the day of trial in this town, as all of you will remember, when the cares, powers and responsibilities of the Mayoralty were placed in his hands, and while many close to him knew that he differed with many of the policies of the administration, and was tempted to divert from the policies of that administration, McGowan, with that sterling honesty of purpose would listen to no man, and the policies that the Mayor at that time believed to be the proper ones McGowan refused to depart from. That was McGowan. I will not take your time further, gentlemen, you all knew him; it was my fortune to be his intimate socially, in the privacy of his domestic relations; close as two men could be to one another. He was true in every relation.

A pure, simple, obedient Catholic, he, in common with those of his faith, believe that he is not dead. With us it is that beautiful dogma of the communion of souls, that when the grave closes on the worldly and material of our friends, it is but laying down the mortal and assuming immortality; they are not removed from us, they do not think when they are leaving that they are departing from us; it is not forever, the meeting is but deferred and we will meet again. In the fullness of that belief he has passed away; to-morrow his mother earth will encompass all that is mortal of him. May the earth rest lightly on him and his spirit find its refuge in the

home which through a life of sincere acceptance of God's truth and obedience to His teachings he labored to attain.

Aldermen Esterbrook, Downing and Dowling in extended remarks seconded the preamble and resolutions.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was unanimously decided in the affirmative by a rising vote.

And the President declared that the Board stood adjourned until Tuesday, April 15, 1913, at 1.30 o'clock p. m.

The Committee on Special Schools presented reports regarding three items referred to it on October 9, 1912, by the report of a Special Committee (Mr. Churchill) regarding reports received from members of the Board of Superintendents and others, and regarding recommendations contained in the report on evening schools made by District Superintendent Shiels.

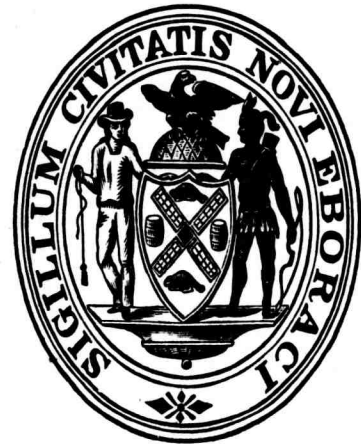

Second—That the undersigned, Commissioner of Assessment, has completed his estimate of benefit and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objection thereto, do file their said objections in writing duly verified, with him at his office, in the Municipal Building, Court House Square, Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, on or before the 16th day of April, 1913, and that the said Commissioner will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at his said office on the 18th day of April, 1913, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Third—That the Commissioner of Assessment

has assessed any or all such lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises as are within the area of assessment fixed and prescribed as the amended area of assessment for benefit by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 3d day of December, 1909, and that the said area of assessment includes all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate and being in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.:

Fourth—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Municipal Building, Court House Square, in the Borough of Queens, in said City, there to remain until the 16th day of April, 1913.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 27th day of May, 1913, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment or to either of them the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that a work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
