## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

## REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1914.

The average daily census of patients and inmates in the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the Department for this quarter has been 12,947, as against 11,116 for the corresponding period of the preceding year.

The average census of employees in the Department during the quarter was 3,421, including therein the nurses of the different institutions, their average daily census being 394.

On October 31st, 1914, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granted this Department in the Budget for 1915 the sum of \$4,008,889.16, or only \$285,905.80 in excess of the amount allowed the Department for the year 1914.

By courtesy of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company indigent mothers and their children were transported free of charge to Bronx and Van Cortlandt Parks during the hot summer season, these excursions beginning on June 9th and ending September 15th; 653 churches, societies and associations throughout the city taking advantage of the generous offer, the large number of 50,006 being transported, consisting of 2,638 mothers, 44,250 children and 3,118 attendants.

The second semi-annual payment of the blind was the sum of \$23, and was distributed in all boroughs beginning December 14th, 542 being paid in Manhattan on said date, 465 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens beginning December 16th, and on the same day 17 were paid in the Borough of Richmond. The blind had previously been paid their first semi-annual sum of \$31 in Manhattan on July 14th, 533 receiving this amount, 443 from July 15th to September 28th in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens and 15 on August 11th in the Borough of Richmond.

The first and second quarterly reports for the year 1914 were submitted to his Honor on September 22nd, and published in the City Record, respectively, on October 31st and November 6th. The third quarter was submitted on October 21st and was published in the City Record on January 4, 1915.

There were five general and nineteen special orders issued during the quarter and five propositions accepted and awarded for work costing not over \$1,000 in each case.

During the quarter 2,828 changes occurred, among an average of 3,421 paid employees, as follows: Appointments, 1,332; promotions, 118; resignations, 638; transfers, 172; dismissals, 568.

There were 2,156 orders registered amounting to \$423,129.26. There were 2,750 invoices registered, classified as follows: Affecting appropriations, \$547,685.43; affecting corporate stock funds, \$63,969.51; affecting revenue bond funds, \$17,193.22. Total, \$628,848.16. There were 1,997 vouchers registered, amounting to \$1,050,260.94.

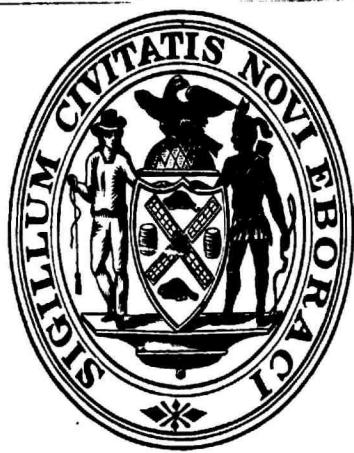

## PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION.

### Invitation to Contractors.

Part of the Eastern Parkway Rapid Transit Railroad.

The Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 1 of Route No. 29, a part of the Eastern Parkway Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

SECTION No. 1. Beginning at a point under Eastern Parkway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, about one hundred and ninety-two (192) feet west of the westerly building line of Nostrand Avenue, curving thence southerly under Eastern Parkway and private property into Nostrand Avenue and extending thence southerly under Nostrand Avenue to a point about two hundred and twenty (220) feet south of the southerly building line of Church Avenue.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having two tracks.

The Contractor will not be required to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast nor to do station finish work.

The work under the contract will include the care and support of buildings, vaults, sewers,

pipes, railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures, the maintenance of traffic and the restoration of pavements and other surfaces.

The method of construction will be partly by trench excavation under cover and partly by open trench excavation without cover, as set forth in the form of contract.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications and contract drawings; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the conditions along the line of the work and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the work.

A fuller description of the work and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are given in the form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. Copies of the forms of contract, bond and contractor's proposal and of the contract drawings may be inspected and purchased at the office of the Commission, 154 Nassau Street, Borough of Manhattan, New York City. The forms of contract, bond and contractor's proposal and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City") and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between the City and said Company for additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five per centum (95%) of the total estimated amount to be paid to the Contractor under the contract.

Partial payments to the Contractor will be made as the work proceeds as provided in the contract.

The Contractor must within twenty-one (21) months from the delivery of the contract complete the Railroad and such other work covered by the contract as may be necessary to put the Railroad in condition for operation and must complete all other work covered by the contract within twenty-five (25) months from the delivery of the contract.

At the time of the delivery of the contract the Contractor must furnish security to the City by depositing a bond, cash or securities in the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000). As further security fifteen per centum (15%) of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal ten per centum (10%) of the total estimated amount to be paid to the Contractor under the contract. Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, protecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to dictate the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
