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### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
WEDNESDAY, October 26, 1887—12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Abram S. Hewitt, the Mayor; Edward V. Loew, the Comptroller; Henry R. Beekman, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Michael Coleman, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held October 25, 1887, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented the following:

Whereas, It has become apparent from the report of Engineer M. A. Kellogg that the condition of the Central or McComb's Dam Bridge is such that a great outlay of money will become necessary to place it in a safe and proper condition; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that it would be more advisable under the circumstances to provide for the construction of a new bridge or tunnel at this point; therefore be it

Resolved, That under the powers vested in it by sections 675, 676 and 677 of the Consolidation Act, this Board invite Gen. John Newton and Messrs. E. R. Van Winkle, G. W. McNulty and Thomas C. Clarke to examine the locality, this Department furnishing them with such information as they may require, and report to this Board whether in their judgment it would be most advisable to construct a draw-bridge, a fixed bridge or a tunnel as a means of transit across the river at or about this point, giving their judgment as to what its least possible height should be if a fixed bridge is determined upon, and if a tunnel what its dimensions shall be, and if a draw-bridge, its height above tide water to be not less than required by the law, viz.: Twenty-four feet, giving also an approximate of the cost of such a construction as they may recommend.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—By chapter 576 of the Laws of 1887 the Commissioner of Public Works is authorized to improve and regulate the use of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, by the construction of an elevated iron roadway, viaduct or bridge from St. Nicholas place to McComb's Dam Bridge, provided that nothing shall be done under the act without the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The act further makes it the duty of the Commissioner of Public Works to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of the improvement, to be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment before the letting or doing of the work. The work of preparing the plans, specifications and estimate for the improvement, though not yet completed, is sufficiently advanced to say that the probable cost will be \$750,000. The matter is therefore submitted to the Board for its consideration and action.

General JOHN NEWTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

DEAR SIR—There has been passed through a Navarro meter 100,000 cubic feet, equal to 748,000 gallons of water under a pressure of 15 pounds to the square inch, with no repairs.

They are not as reliable or durable a meter as others at present manufactured, but with 9,500 of them on hand, I do not think it good policy to throw them away or to keep them without further trial, especially as a large amount of waste of water can be stopped by their use.

GENTLEMEN—We, Gilbert J. Burnet as President; William C. Smith and Robert Rutter as Vice-Presidents; James J. Burnet as Treasurer and Stephen M. We respectfully declare that the said library is owned and maintained solely by the said General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen as a free public library; that it is opened for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of the City of New York, from 8 o'clock A.M. until 9 o'clock P.M. every day in the year, except Sundays and holidays, that the number of volumes contained in the said library exceeds ten thousand, and that the aggregate number of volumes actually withdrawn from the said library by the inhabitants of the said City of New York for use in their own homes or places of business during the twelve months next preceding the first day of October, 1887, exceeded one hundred and seventy-five thousand.

We further respectfully declare that the value of the real estate owned by the said General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen, and used solely for said library, exceeds twenty thousand dollars, and is free from any encumbrances.

We further respectfully declare that the foregoing application is made by direction and under the authority of the said General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen, and is based upon the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed June 15, 1886, entitled "An act to encourage the growth of free public libraries and free circulating libraries in the cities of the State," and recorded in chapter 666, Laws of 1886.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 15, 1887:

There were 6,317 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.  
There were 521 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 247 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 67 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 58 permits.

The certificates of 712 births, 67 still-births, 402 marriages and 640 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 15, 1887. This shows a decrease of 35 births and 4 still-births, and an increase of 134 marriages and 7 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 108 births, 5 still-births and 119 marriages, and a decrease of 75 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; diphtheria, 4; croup, 1; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 12; alcoholism, 2; heart diseases, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 14; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; suicide, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 1; mania, 6; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; bronchitis, 11; pneumonia, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 8; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preterm births, 4; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from measles, rheumatism and gout, aneurism, cirrhosis and hepatitis and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 128 were in institutions, 363 in tenement-houses, 122 in houses containing three families or less, 14 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 92 on the first, 151 on the second, 136 on the third, 83 on the fourth, 39 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 624 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 16 non-residents; 93 were stated to be single, 164 married, 81 widowed, and the condition of 302 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 640; still-births, 67; bodies in transit, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 75 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 712 burials, 402 marriages, 67 still-births, 640 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 153 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage, and 112 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 15, 1887, was 53.3 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.888; the mean humidity was 60, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,104, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.15 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 621 deaths and still-births, or 87.84 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 26; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 277; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 90; Greenwood (undenominational), 22; Lutheran (undenominational), 69; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 22; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 13; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 19.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 8, 1887, was 634; this is 47 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 38.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.07 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,493,971.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Albany street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Old slip, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Broadway, Dey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Broadway, Reade street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within North Moore street, Hudson street, Harrison street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Hubert street, Hudson street, North Moore street, and Hudson or North river.
