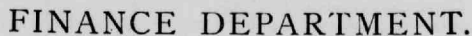

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, February 20 1878.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday afternoon, February 20, at the hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Beardsley, Bell, Cohen, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Katzenberg, Kelly, Manierre, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wheeler, and Wickham—19.

The minutes of the session held on February 11 were approved. The minutes of February 13 were amended and approved.

Communications from the Trustees of several wards were presented, as follows :
From the Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-third Wards, relative to the salaries of several Principals under the new By-laws. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Nineteenth Ward, relative to the salary of a teacher. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Also, relative to closing Grammar School No. 27, in consequence of the death of the Janitor. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

Also, to transfer and exchange certain furniture in Grammar School No. 53 and late Primary School No. 33. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

Also, to pay a teacher for certain service in Evening School No. 59. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, to excuse absence of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Twenty-second Ward, to relieve premises of Primary School No. 17. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twenty-fourth Ward, for an appropriation of \$183.26 to pay for Croton water connections Grammar School No. 63. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The President laid before the Board a report from the City Superintendent for the month of January. Entered in the minutes.

Also, relative to promotions in Grammar School No. 12. Entered on the minutes, and referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Also, relative to a violation of the By-laws prohibiting corporal punishment. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Also, relative to the suspension of pupils by principals. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, and entered in the minutes.

The President laid before the Board several bills for work unauthorized and unusual, with his objections. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The President laid before the Board a resolution of the New York House of Assembly, calling for information relative to salaries of teachers and employees of the Board, the College of New York, Normal College, etc. On motion, the Clerk was directed to transmit said information.

Also, from Hon. W. C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation, relative to the transfer and deed of certain premises occupied by Grammar School No. 49, in East Thirty-seventh street, and bill for expenses. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From several Principals, relative to their salaries under the new By-laws. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From a Teacher, relative to her position and salary under the new By-laws. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

Reports from Standing Committees were presented as follows:

By Commissioner Halsted, from the Committee on Teachers, dismissing the appeal of Miss Elizabeth Foley, Primary School No. 31. Adopted.

Also, denying the application of the Trustees of the Twelfth Ward to remove a teacher. Adopted.

Commissioner Hazeltine presented a report from the Committee on Nautical School, recommending the organization of a class for instruction in duty as mates, in the Nautical School. Adopted.

By Commissioner Beardslee, to pay the Janitor of Evening School No. 16 for twenty-nine nights' service. Adopted.

Also, to accept the resignation of Mr. Charles Roberts, Jr., as Instructor in the Evening High School. Adopted.

Also, fixing the salary of Janitor of Evening High School at \$2.50 per night. Adopted.

Also, to pay sundry teachers for registration in Evening Schools. Adopted.

By Commissioner Dowd, from the Auditing Committee, recommending the payment of sundry bills for the incidental expenses of the Board. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, relative to the judgment in the case of James P. Isaacs against the Board. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Jelliffe presented a report from the Committee on Sites and New Schools, authorizing the Trustees of the Tenth Ward to organize a branch of Primary Department Grammar School No. 42. Laid on the table and entered in full in the minutes.

Also, to appropriate \$500 and expenses, to pay for strip of land eight inches, occupied by Primary School No. 13, in Downing street. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Watson presented a report from the Committee on Buildings, recommending an appropriation of \$1,850, in lieu of placing premises in East Seventy-fifth street, recently vacated in original condition, and \$300 for removing iron stairway, and transferring to another building. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Also, relative to retaining premises Nos. 15 and 17 Third street. Not adopted.

Also, relative to the last payment due on the contract for Primary School No. 41. Adopted.

Also, adverse to erecting a building in East Forty-sixth street. Adopted.

Commissioner Vermilye presented a report from the Finance Committee, recommending appropriation to the amount of \$239,300 to meet maturing obligations. Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$4,955.40, to pay sundry bills for extra work on buildings for account of 1877. Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$1,850 for repairs to buildings, lately occupied by Primary School No. 33, transferred to Grammar School No. 70, and \$300 for transferring iron stairway. Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$625.67 for judgment in case of James P. Isaacs, in addition to \$1,473 heretofore appropriated to pay costs, etc. Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$577.25 for eight inches of land, occupied by Primary School No. 13, in Downing street. Adopted.

Also, relative to sundry bills for work and materials, etc., done and furnished in 1877, by Trustees of several wards; denying the application of the Sixth Ward, and directing bills from the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Wards to be paid from the allowance to said wards. Adopted.

Commissioner Vermilye offered a resolution authorizing the Trustees of the Seventeenth Ward to re-hire premises Nos. 15 and 17 Third street, until the 1st of May. Adopted.

On motion the Board adjourned.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Thursday, February 21, 1878, at 4.15 o'clock P. M.

Present—John Kelly, Comptroller, William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held February 14, 1878, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors with communications dated February 20, 1878, viz.:

1. Fifty-sixth street—Flagging sidewalks on north side of, between Sixth and Seventh avenues.
2. One Hundred and Twentieth street—Flagging sidewalks on north side of, between Avenue A and First avenue.
3. Fifty-eighth street—Flagging sidewalks on north side of, between Eighth and Ninth avenues.
4. Seventy-ninth street—Flagging sidewalks on south side of, from Ninth avenue to Boulevard.
5. Fifty-eighth street—Flagging sidewalks on south side of, from Broadway to Seventh avenue.
6. Forty-third street—Flagging sidewalks on north side of, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.
7. Seventy-sixth street—Setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, between Avenue A and East river, and between First and Second avenues.
8. One Hundred and Eighteenth street—Fencing vacant lots on both sides, between First and Second avenues.
9. James slip at South street—Alteration and extension of sewer.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

On motion, Mr. Montgomery A. Kellogg, late Engineer of the Department of Public Works, was further examined in the matter of the assessment lists for the improvement of the Eastern Boulevard, viz.: regulating, grading, etc., and paving with Telford-macadamized pavement, Avenue A, from Fifty-seventh to Eighty-sixth street; regulating, grading, etc., and superstructure of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, from Avenue A to Sixth avenue, and regulating, grading, etc., and superstructure of Seventy-second street, from Avenue A to Fifth avenue.

The examination of Mr. Kellogg was conducted by Messrs. Anderson, Wakeman, George C. Genet, and by the Board.

Mr. Kellogg explained in regard to the origin and progress of the several works, stating the prices paid for material and wages of labor, the general management of the men employed, and the character of the different kinds of work performed, referring to maps showing the grades and profiles of the streets and avenue.

On motion, the further hearing was postponed until Monday, February 25, 1878, at 4 o'clock P. M.

At 5.50 o'clock P. M., the Board adjourned.

Resolved, That the following sections of the Sanitary Code be and are hereby annulled:

Section 33. That no person shall, in the built-up portion of the City of New York, or adjacent thereto, sell or have for sale any fish in or from any vehicle, or in any street or public place, from which all parts which are not usually cooked for food have not been removed.

Section 62. That no person shall become, or continue, or engage as, or in the business of a butcher, at or in any public or private market or stand in the City of New York, without a permit therefor from this Department.

Section 66. That no person engaged in the selling or keeping for sale of any fish, meat, birds, fowl, fruit, or vegetables, shall, without a permit from this Department occupy or encroach upon any portion of any street or sidewalk, or public place in the City of New York.

And Section 168 amended so as to read as follows: Section 168. That every car used for the transportation of passengers in the City of New York, shall be so constructed as at all times to provide and secure good ventilation.

The minimum rate for which the ferry franchise or license to operate such ferries shall be used or enjoyed has been appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at five per cent. per annum upon the gross receipts for ferrage collected at the New York landing-place for the ferry as now established from the foot of Roosevelt street, New York, to South Seventh street, Brooklyn, and at two and one-half per cent. per annum upon the gross receipts collected for ferrage for the ferries from Peck Slip, New York, to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Third avenue, Harlem; and from Fulton Market slip, New York, to Mott Haven, such percentage to be paid quarterly to the Corporation, and a covenant will be contained in each lease requiring the lessees to make and deliver to the Comptroller of the City of New York, quarterly, a statement in writing, verified by oath or affirmation of the lessee, or of such proper officer of the lessee as may be designated by the Comptroller, of the actual total gross receipts for ferrage received by such lessee during the preceding three months, and also, that the lessee shall keep regular books of account, showing the daily gross receipts of the ferry lessee, and allow said Comptroller, or any person designated by him, to examine such books.

The franchise will be put up and knocked down to the person offering to pay the largest percentage.

All moneys received for the conveyance of passengers, animals, vehicles, or freight from New York to be collected at the landing place in New York, or, if collected elsewhere, to be included in the receipts upon which such percentage is to be calculated and paid.

No bid less than such percentage on such gross receipts will be entertained.

The successful bidder will be required to pay to the Collector of City Revenue the sum of fifteen hundred dollars immediately after the franchise shall have been struck down to him, as security for the execution and performance of the lease, such amount to be credited on the rent when the same becomes due.

Security, satisfactory to the Comptroller, will be required for the punctual performance by the lessees of the covenants of the lease of the franchise in their behalf.

Each purchaser of a lease will be required, at the time of the sale, and in addition to the auctioneer's fees, to pay to the Department of Docks twenty-five per cent. of the amount of the annual rent bid for the wharf property, as security for the execution of the lease, and which twenty-five per cent. will be applied to the payment of the rent for such property first accruing under the lease, when executed, or forfeited if the lessee neglects or refuses to execute the lease and bond after being duly notified that the lease is prepared and ready for signature, or, in case the bid be finally rejected, will be returned to the bidder.

Lessees will be required to pay their rent for the wharf property quarterly, in advance, in compliance with a stipulation therefor in the form of the lease adopted.

The franchise and the lease of the wharf property, if any, of each ferry will be put up and sold together to the highest bidder, subject to the condition hereinafter expressed, and subject also to the right of the Comptroller and the Board of the Department of Docks to reject any or all bids, if deemed to be for the interest of the city.

The right to reject any bid, if deemed to be to the interest of the City of New York, is reserved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.
