

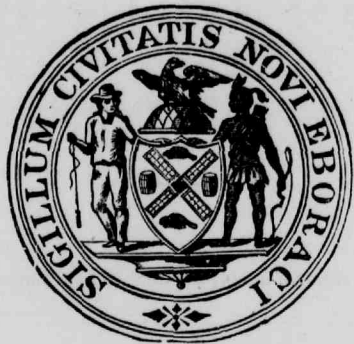

HEALTH DEPARTMENT,
NEW YORK, January 28, 1879.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; on slaughter-houses; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on application for relief; on contagious diseases; on overflowed lands in Twenty-third Ward.
From the Consulting Architect: In respect to certain plans of tenement houses.
From the Attorney and Counsel: Weekly report and statement discontinuing certain actions.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the Register of Marriages:

Robert Struthers, Jr., married December 31, 1877, instead of Robert Struthers; and Sabina Redmond Wood instead of Sophie Redmond Wood, the same being clerical errors.

Resolved, That the following ordinance, known as section 175 of the Sanitary Code, be and is hereby annulled, viz.:

Section 175. That no person shall, except according to a permit or the regulations of this Department, set off or fire any gun or fire-arms, or rock blast in any public street, alley or place within the built-up portions of said city, whereby any human life may be imperiled.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to publish the above annulled ordinance, as required by law.

Resolved, That the services of Gilbert F. Ludington be dispensed with from December 3, 1878, he having failed to report for duty since that date, and having failed to appear before the Board and show cause why he should not be dismissed when duly notified to do so.

Resolved, That E. W. Addis be and is hereby appointed a temporary clerk, with salary at the rate of \$90 per month, from February 1, 1879, vice Ludington dismissed.

Resolved, That W. Craig be and is hereby appointed a temporary clerk, with salary at the rate of \$90 per month, from February 1, 1879.

Resolved, That the recommendation of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Comfort in respect to the time for the removal of obstructions of the overflowed lands in the Twenty-third Ward, on south side of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, west of the Southern Boulevard, be and is hereby approved, and the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to see that the removal is made.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 25, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,688, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 824 tenement-houses, 166 private dwellings, 69 other

dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 38 stables, 1 mill, 39 slaughter-houses, 1 fertilizing works, 2 lodging-houses, 1 lime kiln, 1 lard rendering establishment, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 8 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 ash dump, 20 sunken and vacant lots, 37 yards, courts and areas, 47 cellars and basements, 153 waste-pipes and drains, 118 privies and water-closets, 11 street-gutters and sinks, 2 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 4 smoky chimneys, 12 other nuisances, together with 90 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 432.

During the past week 119 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 64 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

35 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 178 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 147 houses, 147 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of scarlet fever was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 493 births, 37 still-births, 128 marriages, and 639 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 25, 1879. This shows a decrease of 65 births, 4 still-births, and 17 marriages, and an increase of 7 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 57 births and 5 still-births, and an increase of 2 marriages, and 162 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 8; erysipelas, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; inanition, 2; cancers, 6; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 7; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; apoplexy, 2; enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; deaths by suicide, 3; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 1; croup, 3; whooping cough, 12; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; alcoholism, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; pneumonia, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 4; diseases of brain and nervous system, 13; premature and pre-natural births, 3; surgical operations, 2; deaths by drowning, 1.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 115 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 174 under two years; 250 under five years, and 55, seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 7 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 39.12 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 98 were in institutions, 337 in tenement-houses, 196 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 151 on the first, 181 on the second, 131 on the third, 51 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 636 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-resident. 70 were stated to be single, 176 married, 87 widowed, and the condition of 306 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 639; still-births, 37; bodies in transitu, 28; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 50 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 493 births; 128 marriages; 37 still-births; 639 deaths, 28 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 24 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 25, 1879, was 28.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer 29.834, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,186, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 594 deaths and still-births, or 87.87 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 249; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 65; Greenwood (undenominational), 56; Lutheran; (undenominational), 99; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 7; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 7.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality), for the week ending January 18, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 17; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 10; Ninth, 30; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 37; Twelfth, 46; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 20; Fifteenth, 13; Sixteenth, 23; Seventeenth, 42; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 118; Twentieth, 49; Twenty-first, 48; Twenty-second, 55; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 10.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 18, 1879, was 651; this is 181 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 128.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.02 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,091,181.

SIR—There were 639 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 25, 1879, which is an increase of 7, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 162 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending January 18, 1879, was 651, which is 128.6 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.02 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,091,181.

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The following petition for writ of certiorari was received on December 30, 1878, and ordered to be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation: New York Supreme Court—The People of the State of New York, ex rel. Chesebrough Manufacturing Company vs. The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments of the City and County of New York.

The petition of Robert A. Chesebrough respectfully sheweth:

That he is one of the Trustees, and Secretary and Treasurer of the Chesebrough Manufacturing Co., the petitioner herein.

That the said Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. is incorporated pursuant to the laws of this State, that the certificate of incorporation herein was filed on or about the 13th day of November, 1874. That said certificate certified amongst other things as follows:

That the following are the names of the trustees who will manage its concerns for the first year, to wit: Chas. Edward Fougere, of Brooklyn, King's County, New York, and Robert A. Chesebrough & Sons; L. Coudert of the City and County of New York, and we do further certify that the operations of the said corporation shall be carried on in the City of New York, section 6, of article 1, of title 2, of chapter 13, of part 1, of the New York Revised Statutes, provides that "all the personal estate of every incorporated company liable to taxation on its capital shall be assessed in the town or ward where the principal office or place for transacting the financial concerns of the company shall be, or if such company have no principal office, or place for transacting its financial concerns, then in the town or ward where the operations of such company shall be carried on."

That though the principal office of the said Company is in New York City, and though New York City is the place where the said Company carry on their financial transactions, the manufactory of said Company is situated in the City of Brooklyn, that the assessors of the City of Brooklyn have annually assessed the said Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. upon the real estate belonging to said Company, upon which said manufactory was situated, which said real estate is as aforesaid in the City of Brooklyn, that the assessors of said Brooklyn have not assessed a tax upon the personal property of the said Company until this year, but that on or about the first day of June, 1878, the said assessors for the City of Brooklyn did assess the personal property of the said Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. at the sum of ten thousand dollars.

That the said Company is also assessed for the same personal property by the Commissioners for the City and County of New York, as more fully appears from the statement of same annexed hereto and marked "Exhibit K."

That by the 27th section of the second article of title XIV of the XVIII chapter, part 1 of the Revised Statutes, it is provided, "That no Company organized under the provisions of said act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical, or chemical purposes shall be deemed or taken to have a principal office or place for transacting its financial concerns other than that at which the operations of said Company are carried on, unless within the month of May, in each year, the president and treasurer, or a majority of the trustees shall make duplicate certificates stating the amount of the then capital of said Company, and the portion of such capital not invested in real estate, and stating that such Company then has a principal office for transacting its financial concerns in a county other than that in which the operations of said Company are carried on, stating the town or city and county in which such financial office is located, and that the president and treasurer, and a majority of the trustees of said Company are then actually residents of the town or city in which such financial office is then located, which duplicate certificates shall be signed and sworn to by the persons making the same, and filed, the one in the Clerk's office of the County where the operations of said Company are carried on, and the other in the Clerk's office of the County in which such financial office shall be."

That no such certificate has been filed by or on behalf of the Chesebrough Manufacturing Co., wherefore your petitioner is informed by Counsel and believes that under the provisions of said section 27, the Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. will not be deemed to have a principal office for the purpose of transacting its financial concerns in the county other than that in which its operations are transacted, viz.: in the City of Brooklyn. That no such certificate could be so filed, because the President of the said Company, viz.: Charles Edward Fougere, does not reside in New York, but resides in the City of Brooklyn.

That your petitioner is informed by counsel and believes, that under the provisions of the said section 27, of article 2, of title 14, of chapter 18, of part 1, of the Revised Statutes, no certificate having been filed as aforesaid, the Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. is liable for taxation on its personal property to the assessors for the City of Brooklyn, and County of Kings, and not to the Commissioners for the City and County of New York.

That on or about the 15th day of November, 1878, a warrant was issued to the Collector for the County of Kings for the purpose of levying a tax upon the said personal property of the said Chesebrough Manufacturing Co., amounting to \$278.87. That your petitioner is informed by counsel and believes, that the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the City and County of New York erred in assessing the personal property of the said Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. not being a resident of the City and County of New York, under the provisions of section 27, of

article 2, of title 14, of chapter 18, of part 1, of the Revised Statutes of the State of New York.

Wherefore your petitioner prays this Court that a writ of certiorari issue to the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the City and County of New York, commanding them to certify to this Court all proceedings, books, papers, documents and things pertaining to their decision and action, whereby, in the year 1878, they assessed a certain personal tax upon the said Chesebrough Manufacturing Co., and for such further relief as to this Court shall seem just.

Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in writing from this Department shall be required, and no person in the City of New York shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this Department, an application for which shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health by the person or persons who propose to use the same. The air space allotted to each person in such lodging-houses shall not be less than three hundred cubic feet, unless methods for free and adequate ventilation exist in such houses, approved by the said Board of Health.
