This involves an increased cost in doing the work, as all material heretofore dumped at Pier 12 has now to be carted to the Rutgers street or Canal street dumps. It also involves a loss to the City in the amount received for trimming scows, the contractor claiming a rebate on account of the

In December last an agreement was made by the City involving the payment of \$1,200 per quarter, in advance, to the owners of the easterly half of the pier, as a condition to their consent to the use of the dumping board.

The amount so agreed to be paid has not been paid, and it is for that reason that the injunction was served. It will be recollected that when the appropriation for this Department for the current year was made, I asked the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to include in the appropriation the amount necessary to pay for the use of this dump for this year, and that my request was refused upon the ground that such payment would be otherwise provided for, and for that reason I have no authority to make such payment out of the moneys appropriated for the purposes of my Department. purposes of my Department.

The Counsel to the Corporation has informed me that the matter must be brought before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such determination as it may make. At a meeting of this Board held December 26, 1893, a resolution was adopted authorizing the issue of bonds to the amount of \$1,370,421, to provide for the payment of the awards for the lands in the Seventh Ward, acquired for the purposes of a public park, at or near Corlears Hook, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 529 of the Laws of 1884.

Owing to the peculiar provisions of this act, which directed that the bonds issued under its authority should be redeemed by designating by lot one-tenth of the total amount thereof in each year, and owing to the fact that interest thereon was limited to the rate of three per cent., it was found impossible to dispose of these bonds, and much hardship has undoubtedly been suffered by property-owners who have been unable to secure payment for their property thus acquired by the City. But for this unfortunate state of affairs neither the City authorities nor your subscriber could properly be held accountable—a fact which has been recognized by the opinions of two of the Justices of the Supreme Court, before whom attempts were made to punish the Comptroller for contempt of court in not obeying a mandamus directing the payment of the award made to the relator in that proceeding.

At the earliest possible opportunity, however, I forwarded a draft of the bill to the State Legislature, the effect of which was to permit the Comptroller to issue bonds for the expenses mentioned in chapter 529 of the Laws of 1884 under such terms and conditions as to make the same readily salable. This bill was promptly passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor, and a certified copy thereof is herewith submitted.

I offer the following resolution, approving an issue of bonds under the authority of this act, and to the amount above mentioned, for the payment of these awards.

CHAPTER 251.

An Act to amend chapter five hundred and twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-four, entitled "An act to make provision for a public park in the seventh ward in the city of New York, including therein all necessary alterations of the map or plan of said city, the acquisition of land for said park and the payment of all expenses connected therewith, from moneys to be raised by bonds, taxes and assessments for local improvements," passed June fourteenth, eighteen hundred and eighty-four.

Became a law April 4, 1894, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section I. Section four of chapter five hundred and twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-four, entitled "An act to make provision for a public park in the seventh ward of the city of New York, including therein all necessary alterations of the map or plan of said city, the acquisition of land for such park and the payment of all expenses connected therewith from moneys to be raised by bonds, taxes and assessments for local improvements," is hereby amended so as to

read as follows:

§ 4. For the payment of the expenses of acquiring the said lands, the comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue bonds of the said city, which shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding four per centum per annum, and shall be redeemable in not less than ten nor more than fifty years, as the said comptroller shall determine; and it shall be the duty of the clerk of the common council to countersign the same and affix thereto the seal of the said city. Such bonds shall not be disposed of at less than the par value thereof.

§ 2. Nothing contained in this act shall operate to invalidate or affect any bonds which may have been heretofore issued by the comptroller of the city of New York to provide for the payment of the expenses of acquiring the said lands or of any part thereof; but said bonds shall be a charge upon the said city, and shall be payable in like manner and as though this act had not been passed. It shall be lawful, however, for the owner of any such bonds heretofore issued, to surrender the same at their par value to the comptroller of the city of New York for cancellation and to receive in the place thereof bonds issued under the authority of this act to a like amount, and bearing the same rate of interest.

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of the letter of 3d instant from the Clerk of your Board, stating that the communication of 7th instant from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner in regard to the proposed repavement of Sixty-third street, between Lexington and Third avenues, was referred back to this office for further information relative thereto.

The facts are as follows:

Early in the year a petition from property-owners on that block was received, asking that the street be repaved with granite blocks, and, in accordance therewith, such repavement was recommended by me to your Board, and was authorized by the Board. Subsequently another petition was received from residents and house-owners on the block, that the street be repaved with asphalt, and it appeared that this petition was signed by a majority of the house-owners and residents. When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein describe

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
