WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending March 31, 1901.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

Beginning on the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, at a point which would be intersected by a line drawn at right angles with Meadow street and distant 200 feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly line of Gardner avenue with the northerly side of Meadow street, and running thence southerly along said line, and also on a line parallel with Gardner avenue and distant 200 feet easterly therefrom to the northerly side of Flushing avenue; running thence northeasterly along Flushing avenue to a point distant 169 feet 1 1/2 inches, more or less, northeasterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Johnson avenue with the northwesterly line of Flushing avenue, and running thence northerly on a line at right angles with Flushing avenue 138 feet 7 3/4 inches to a point; running thence northerly on a line parallel with Scott avenue, and distant 200 feet easterly therefrom to the centre of Newtown creek; thence northwesterly as said Newtown creek winds and turns, to Metropolitan avenue, and thence westerly along Metropolitan avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 23d day of October, 1901, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
