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## DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

### Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1905.

Office of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, Litchfield Mansion, Prospect Park, Brooklyn, October 1, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to submit to you herewith, in accordance with the provisions of section 1544 of the Charter, a quarterly report of the proceedings and finances of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, from July 1 to September 30, inclusive, 1905.

Statement of Work Performed by the Department of Parks of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens During the Three Months from July 1 to September 30, 1905.

The quarter just ended was characterized by more work of a constructive character than ever in the history of the Department. Many new buildings are in process of erection, including the new boat-house, a shelter-house on the parade grounds for the athletes, a golf-house at Forest Park, and comfort shelter-houses in Fort Greene Park, Bedford Park, Irving Square Park, Bushwick Park, Carroll Park and Cooper Park. In most instances the buildings will be completed before the end of the year.

The paving with asphalt of Pitkin avenue, for which a contract was awarded, is well under way; the contract price being about thirty-five thousand dollars.

The new wall on Ninth avenue, from Fifth to Fifteenth streets, has been started and will likewise be completed before the cold weather sets in.

#### Prospect Park.

Prospect Park has been beautified in several places. Among the work accomplished was the construction of a driveway flanked by new brick gutters in the rear of the flower garden shelter, the replacing of 6,300 feet of cobblestone and tar gutters laid on a brick foundation, the raising of the low portion of the park drive near the Ocean avenue gate, and the installation of a number of new sewer basins and a considerable amount of drain pipe. The roads were repaired and partly resurfaced where necessary, and several thousand yards of top-soil were deposited in various parts of the park. The wall at the foot of the flower garden has been partly reconstructed and otherwise repaired, and a new ornamental bronze railing placed upon it. A cement sidewalk was laid along the easterly side of Prospect Park, West, from the main entrance to Fifth street, and the borders have been sodded, seeded and otherwise improved. As soon as the new ornamental boundary wall now being constructed from Fifth street to Fifteenth street is completed, it is the intention to continue the cement sidewalk along that portion.

The greenhouses have been enlarged by the erection of four new sections which are nearly completed. All the summer flowering plants throughout the park system have been taken up, and those worth saving reserved for next year's planting. The flower beds have been prepared and gotten ready for the planting of the bulbs, which will occur during the month of October. The improvement and the rebuilding of the shore line of the lake was continued and has been completed for a distance of about 4,000 feet. The waters of the lake have been kept in good condition.

The new bear cage and bird cage have been surrounded with an asphalt tile walk, and suitable connections with the older walk system have been made.

#### Fort Greene Park.

At Fort Greene Park considerable work in the line of improvement has been done. A quantity of soil has been secured and spread where most needed; preparations have been made for the planting of a large number of flowering shrubs to replace those which have died or been destroyed. About thirty-five hundred linear feet of new grass borders were laid and the same have been trimmed, watered and now present a fine appearance.

#### City Park.

Besides the regular work of maintenance, such as cleaning walks, cutting grass, cutting out dead wood, etc., much work of a permanent nature was done in this park during the quarter just past. The slopes and lawns adjoining walks were regraded, partly covered with top soil, seeded and the edges sodded. Two new basins were built and properly connected. The space between the new sidewalks and the fence surrounding the park was graded, covered with top soil and otherwise improved.

#### Williamsburg Bridge Park and Playground.

Williamsburg Bridge Park and Playground was further improved and put in good condition. Thirty loads of good top soil were spread, a large area was seeded, the borders where worn were resodded and the trees pruned. About three hundred feet of wire fence were erected and the iron picket fence surrounding the playground scraped and painted. The gymnasium was equipped, put in operation and is well patronized.

#### Sunset Park.

The improvement of this park was continued. The sidewalks on Forty-first street and on Seventh avenue were graded, and the slopes adjoining same modified. An area of about three acres was graded, plowed, covered with top soil, seeded, the edges sodded and the walk system further extended. The borders of the lake were repaired and improved.

#### Highland Park.

A great amount of work in the line of permanent improvements was done in this park. The road leading from the main portion of the park down to Jamaica avenue was practically rebuilt and is now in good condition. The portion of the road leading to Cypress avenue was widened and the roads in general gone over and resurfaced. The sod gutters were repaired, tamped and rolled. About five thousand three hundred square feet of sods were laid, and a fair area covered with top soil and seeded.

The flower garden received a great deal of attention, some of the flowering stock being taken up and replaced by autumn flowers. Several hundred tulip and hyacinth bulbs were planted for the spring display.

#### Forest Park.

Besides the usual maintenance work, the golf links were continued, the course and the greens were further improved and are now in excellent condition. The sidewalk on Woodhaven avenue, leading from the park, was graded and covered with limestone screenings. The roadway from Woodhaven avenue to Metropolitan avenue, a distance of a mile and a half, was resurfaced and rolled, and the section known as the "Horseshoe" macadamized.

The work in the nursery comprised the propagation of over seventy thousand plants which will be used for the spring and early summer planting in the various parks throughout the system.

#### Bushwick Park.

Bushwick Park is being practically rebuilt. A large quantity of deformed and dead trees have been taken up and will be replaced early in the fall. Quite a quantity of shrubbery has been moved and is being displayed to better advantage. Gaps in the privet hedge surrounding the park have been filled, and it is my intention to resoil the entire park at the earliest opportunity. The growth of trees, shrubs and flowers has been greatly retarded on account of the poor quality of the soil.

#### Winthrop Park.

Winthrop Park, lying in the section of the city known as Greenpoint, likewise suffers from lack of good, nourishing soil, and preparations are now under way to treat it in the same manner as Bushwick Park. During the term it was well maintained, and throughout the warm weather was a boon to the people of the neighborhood.

#### Seaside Park.

Seaside Park, lying at the foot of the Ocean parkway, fronting the Atlantic Ocean, has been a source of delight to its visitors. The floral display during August and early September was superior both in size, quality and color of flowering plants than ever before attempted. A considerable quantity of top-soil or garden mould has been delivered already and will be used in the fall and in early spring to raise some of the lower portions of the park and form an embankment along the Coney Island Concourse so as to keep out the dirt and sand. The embankment is to be planted with a privet hedge, and it is expected will add materially to the attractiveness of this popular park.

#### Small Parks in Brooklyn.

The smaller parks, such as Carroll, Red Hook, McKinley, Fort Hamilton, Bensonhurst, Bedford, Lincoln Terrace, Saratoga Square, Irving Square and Cooper Parks have been maintained in a manner entirely satisfactory to the public.

#### Small Parks in Queens.

The parks in Long Island City, College Point, Flushing, Corona and Jamaica received careful attention and a number of smaller improvements made wherever advisable.

#### New Parks.

The two new parks, McLaughlin Park and Fulton Park, are rapidly nearing completion. The grading is finished, the drainage and irrigation systems are practically installed, and a large quantity of top-soil has been delivered and spread in Fulton Park which will soon be planted. McLaughlin Park will be used as a playground and will fill a long felt want in that densely populated section.

#### Parkways.

Shore Road—The work of widening the Shore road has been substantially completed. It presents an attractive appearance. A new fence along the top of the banks is in process of erection; the trees and shrubs growing on the banks of the lower portion of the road near Fort Hamilton have been carefully gone over, dead trees have been removed and the others pruned and kept in good condition.

Ocean Parkway—The rebuilding of the westerly traffic road between Coney Island and Kings Highway was continued and completed. The bridle path was resurfaced with fine gravel and loam from Kings Highway to Prospect Park. The bicycle paths and the main drive were repaired where necessary. The traffic road between Kings Highway and Prospect Park was repaired in numerous places and thoroughly cleaned. The Speedway was harrowed daily, sprinkled and maintained in good condition. Arrangements have been made to resurface the main drive between Parkville and Prospect Park.

Bay Parkway was repaired in several places, sprinkled in dry weather and kept clean. The gutters were freed from weeds and other objectionable matter; the walks trimmed and otherwise taken care of.

Fort Hamilton Avenue—Repairs to the roadway were continued throughout the quarter, and the entire driveway was kept in a clean and neat condition. Cement sidewalks were laid on both sides of the parkway between Fort Hamilton and Gravesend avenues.

Eastern Parkway Extension—The resurfacing of the main roadway with limestone and Hudson River road gravel was continued, and it is expected that the entire parkway will be in first class condition before the cold weather sets in.

Pitkin Avenue—A contract has been let for the repaving of Pitkin avenue, between Stone avenue and the Eastern parkway, and work thereon is progressing in a satisfactory manner as reported above.

#### The Parkway System.

Glenmore avenue has been repaired and kept clean, and the same is true of Bushwick avenue, Highland Boulevard, Stone avenue and Pennsylvania avenue.

The roadways throughout Dyker Beach Park have been resurfaced and are now in good condition.

The pavement on Pennsylvania avenue, consisting of vitrified brick laid in 1895, shows serious signs of disintegration and must be renewed before long. I intend to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for funds to repave the same with asphalt blocks.

The mechanical department has been kept busy throughout the quarter making repairs to rolling stock, sprinklers, steam rollers, as well as building fences, etc. The addition to the greenhouses in Prospect Park, the greenhouse in Forest Park, the gutters in Prospect Park, the walks around the bear and bird cages, and all the work of construction in Fulton Park were carried on by the forces of this Department.

The Arboriculturists and their forces besides attending to their duties in the parks and on parkways in cleaning, spraying, pruning and maintaining shrubbery and trees, were called upon to attend to trees throughout the city streets in both boroughs, although there was no special amount granted for that purpose in this year's Budget. The courts having decided in several instances that the City owned the streets from building line to building line, it was held that this Department is responsible for their condition.

#### Concerts in the Parks.

The concerts in Prospect and the smaller parks, after a most successful season, closed on September 24. Music was given every Sunday in Prospect Park during the months of July, August and September, in addition to those in June noted in my last report. Altogether thirty-one (31) concerts, attended by close on to half a million people, were given in Prospect Park, and fifty-two (52) in the smaller parks. A concert was given every Sunday during the same period at Highland Park. To say that these concerts were highly appreciated by the people of Brooklyn and visiting boroughs, is no exaggeration. This was notably the case at the closing concert in Prospect Park, when the United German singers of Brooklyn, numbering over four hundred (400), rendered a fine programme in conjunction with Shannon's Twenty-third Regiment Band. It is estimated that between fifty thousand (50,000) and sixty thousand (60,000) people were present. I desire to extend my thanks to the members of the various singing societies, comprising the United German Singers, for their efficient services.

#### Revenue from Parks and Parkways.

During the three months from July 1 to September 30, 1905, inclusive, the sum of three thousand four hundred and sixty-four dollars and forty-five cents (\$3,464.45) was received from rents of houses and revenue from park privileges, bay windows and sale of park property, which amount was turned over to the Hon. Patrick Keenan, City Chamberlain, for deposit to the credit of the "Revenue Fund."

The following communication of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and draft of agreements were presented and the following resolution was moved:

RAPID TRANSIT SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION COMPANY,  
No. 23 NASSAU STREET,  
NEW YORK CITY, October 2, 1905.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners,  
No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—A portion of the rapid transit railroad under construction pursuant to the contract between this company and The City of New York, dated July 21, 1902, viz.: The line from City Hall to and including the South Ferry station, is now being operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in connection with the road included in Contract No. 1, pursuant to permission granted by resolutions of your Board adopted June 29, 1905.

It has always been in contemplation that the lease part of that contract, including the obligation to provide the equipment, should be assigned to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company—Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company being only a business corporation, and designed as a contracting company, not as an operating company. I, therefore, hand you a form of assignment from Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company to Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and also the form of agreement between The City of New York (acting by your Board), Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which instruments are intended to accomplish the assignment of such leasing part of Contract No. 2, including the obligation to provide equipment. These instruments are in the same form which was adopted in transferring the lease part of the McDonald contract to Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and which had the approval of your Board.

I beg to request that your Board will authorize these agreements to be executed, and upon being advised of the adoption of a resolution to that effect by your Honorable Board these companies will execute the same.

Agreement made this day of August, 1905, by and between The City of New York (acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners), party of the first part, Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, party of the second part, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, party of the third part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company heretofore entered into contract with The City of New York (acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York), bearing date the 21st day of July, 1902, for the construction, equipment and operation of a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, which contract (hereinafter called Rapid Transit Contract No. 2) was thereafter modified by certain agreements supplemental thereto and amendatory thereof; and

Whereas, The said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company has assigned, or is about to assign, unto Interborough Rapid Transit Company, by an instrument bearing even date herewith, with the consent in writing of the sureties upon the bond given by said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, pursuant to said contract, so much of the said contract as provides for the maintenance and operation of the railway therein described, including the obligation to provide all equipment for the same, subject to all the terms and conditions in said contract contained with respect to such maintenance and operation, and with respect to the equipment of the said railroad, to which assignment reference is hereby had, and the said parties have requested the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners to consent to the said assignment, as provided by law; and

Whereas, The said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners is willing to consent to such assignment, but only upon the execution and delivery to said Board for said City of this instrument;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the covenants hereinafter contained, The City of New York, by its said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, hereby consents to the said assignment to Interborough Rapid Transit Company and to the execution of the said instrument bearing even date herewith.

And the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company hereby covenants to and with The City of New York that it is and shall hereafter in all respects be bound to The City of New York with respect to the equipment of the said railroad mentioned in the said instrument and every portion thereof, and all obligations whatsoever of the contractor under or by reason of the leasing provisions of said Rapid Transit Contract No. 2, and all obligations thereof or thereunder which relate in any way to the maintenance or operation of the railroad in the said rapid transit contract described, and does hereby agree to carry out and perform each and every of the said obligations as fully as the contractor has been or is bound to do in and by the said Rapid Transit Contract No. 2. And the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company further covenants to and with the City that the said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, its successors and assigns, shall fully perform all the obligations and comply with all the provisions and terms of said contract which are not assigned to and assumed by said Interborough Rapid Transit Company in and by the said instrument bearing even date herewith.

This agreement shall bind the parties hereto, their respective successors and assigns.

Provided further, and it is expressly agreed that this agreement shall take effect when, and only when, the following consents hereto and approvals hereof shall be duly had, to wit, the consents as subjoined of the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the National Surety Company, the Aetna Indemnity Company and the Empire State Surety Company.

In witness whereof the party hereto of the first part has caused these presents to be duly executed by its said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners under the seal of the said Board, and the parties of the second and third parts, respectively, have caused these presents to be duly executed by their proper officers under their corporate seals the day and year first above written.

This agreement made the day of August, 1905, by and between Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called the "Contractor," party of the first part, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called "Interborough Company," party of the second part; witnesseth:

Whereas, The contractor heretofore entered into a contract with The City of New York (acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York), bearing date the 21st day of July, 1902, for the construction, equipment and operation of a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, which contract was thereafter modified in certain particulars by agreements between the said parties supplemental thereto and amendatory thereof, which agreements bear date the 23d day of December, 1904, and the 9th day of June, 1905, respectively, the said contract and agreements amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto being together hereinafter referred to as rapid transit contract No. 2; and

Whereas, Interborough Company was duly organized under the Railroad Law of this State for the purposes, among other things, of maintaining and operating the

said railway, and has been approved in writing by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 4 of the laws of 1891, as amended by chapter 544 of the Laws of 1902, and the contractor desires to assign and transfer unto Interborough Company, and Interborough Company desires to accept an assignment of so much of rapid transit contract No. 2 as provides for the maintenance and operation of the said railway, including the obligation to provide the equipment for the same, subject to all the terms and conditions in said contract contained with respect to such maintenance and operation, and with respect to the equipment of the said railroad.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, and for a valuable consideration by Interborough Company to the contractor in hand paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, the contractor has sold, assigned, transferred, conveyed and set over, and does hereby sell, assign, transfer, convey and set over unto Interborough Company so much of rapid transit contract No. 2 as provides for the maintenance and operation of the said rapid transit railroad in said contract described (including the equipment thereof), and does hereby assign unto Interborough Company the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said road or roads in rapid transit contract No. 2 described, for and during the remainder of the term of years specified in such contract, and all rights with respect to such maintenance and operation, or included in the leasing provisions of such contract, subject to all the terms and conditions therein stated, together with all obligations assumed by the contractor in and by the said rapid transit contract No. 2 with respect to the equipment of the said railroad; and from and after the execution hereof Interborough Company shall be entitled to have and receive all sums of money due or to come due from The City of New York under said contract for the equipment of the said railroad or any part thereof, and for the maintenance and operation of the same, and shall have and enjoy all the rights, privileges, emoluments and benefits arising under or because of the provisions for the equipment of said railroad, and for the maintenance and operation thereof as in said contract provided, as fully as the contractor might or could have and enjoy if this assignment were not made.

Interborough Company on its part does hereby assume all of the obligations of the contractor under or by reason of rapid transit contract No. 2 with respect to the equipment of the said railroad and every portion thereof, and all obligations whatsoever of the contractor under or by reason of the leasing provisions of said contract; and all obligations which relate in any way to the maintenance and operation of the said railroad in said contract described, and does hereby agree to carry out and perform each and every of the said obligations as fully as the contractor has been or is bound to do in and by the said contract.

Interborough Company further agrees to well and truly indemnify and save harmless the contractor of and from any liability, claim or demand arising under such portions of the rapid transit contract No. 2 as are hereby assigned, or any portion thereof.

This agreement shall bind the parties hereto, their respective successors and assigns.

It is, however, understood and agreed that this assignment shall not take effect until the same shall be consented to in writing by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and such assignment and consent shall in no respect affect the security or securities for the performance of the rapid transit contract No. 2 or any part thereof by the contractor.

Provided, further, and it is expressly agreed that this agreement shall take effect when, and only when, the following consents hereto and approvals hereof shall be duly had, to wit, the consents as subjoined of Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, National Surety Company, the Aetna Indemnity Company and the Empire State Surety Company.

In witness whereof the party hereto of the first part has hereunto set his hand and seal, and the party hereto of the second part has caused these presents to be duly signed by its proper officer under its corporate seal the day and year first above written.

SIR—Please take notice that the Realty Company of America, a corporation organized and doing business under the Laws of the State of New York, has a claim against The City of New York for the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars, as damages sustained during the period from June 20, 1900, to August 1, 1902, under the following circumstances:

During the said period and thereafter the Realty Company of America and Herbert Dongan, the assignor of said Realty Company of America, were successively the owners in fee of the premises on the west side of Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, extending from Eighty-fifth to Eighty-sixth streets, and being in depth 105 feet 1 inch on Eighty-fifth street, and 119 feet 6 inches on Eighty-sixth street, and the owners of the building and improvements upon the said premises, such building and improvements consisting of a seven-story modern, high-class elevator apartment house.

In pursuance of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, to provide for rapid transit railways, and the construction thereof, and the several acts amendatory thereof, and supplemental thereto, on or about February 21, 1900, The City of New York entered into a contract with one John B. McDonald, for the construction on behalf of the said City, of a rapid transit subway and railway, which subway and railway was to be constructed partly under and through Broadway, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-sixth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York. During the said period, the said contractor, John B. McDonald, through his sub-

contractor, William Bradley, caused large excavations to be made in and around the highway on Broadway, adjacent to the said premises, and caused rocks, dirt and other material to be removed from the said highway, and to be piled along the same, and caused building material, structures and various kinds of other property to be placed and kept along the said highway adjacent to the said premises, and maintained the said highway in an open, excavated and dangerous condition during the said period from August 1, 1900, to August 1, 1902. During the said time, the tenantability of the said premises owned as aforesaid was greatly impaired and interfered with, owing to the impassable condition of the highway, the odors and dirt caused by its said condition, the vibrations caused by improper blasting; that the foregoing condition of affairs constituted a serious and harmful nuisance and the said work thus being conducted was negligently, carelessly, improperly and unlawfully carried on; that the said highway was kept in the said open, dangerous and offensive condition for a much longer period than the nature of the work, or the conditions under which the same was carried on, required, and the duration of the same exceeded the length of time within which, under the contract between The City of New York and the said contractor, the said work was required to be finished. The City of New York failed to avail itself of its rights under the said contract to abate and terminate the condition of affairs above described. The duty of The City of New York as to the said highway adjacent to the premises so owned by the Realty Company of America, and by Herbert Dongan, the assignor of the said the Realty Company of America, was a matter of public and general concern, and its duty was to prevent the existence of, or continuance for an unreasonable length of time, of the condition of affairs above mentioned.

That by reason of the foregoing, the said owners of the said premises sustained loss of rentals and income from the said property, and other damage to property rights, amounting to the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars.

That the title to said premises and buildings was vested in the said Herbert Dongan from the 20th day of June, 1900, to the 21st day of February, 1903, on which date a deed of the said premises, made and executed by the said Herbert Dongan to the Realty Company of America, was duly recorded in the office of the Register of the County of New York. That thereafter the title to the said premises was vested in the Realty Company of America. That the said Herbert Dongan for value received, duly assigned and transferred to the Realty Company of America any and all claims, demands and causes of action of every nature that he might have against The City of New York, or against John B. By reason whereof the Realty Company of America demands the payment of the sum of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars, and hereby signifies its intention of instituting suit to enforce its rights, unless an adjustment or payment thereof is made.

Preliminary report of George A. Soper, Ph. D., as to sanitary investigation of the air in the subway was presented as follows, and it was understood that a copy of the same would be transmitted to the Board of Health, and that the Chief Engineer would communicate with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company concerning such matters therein as seem to require its immediate attention:

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF A SANITARY INVESTIGATION OF THE AIR OF THE NEW YORK RAPID TRANSIT SUBWAY, COVERING THE MONTHS OF JULY TO SEPTEMBER, INCLUSIVE.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York:

SIR—In order to convey a clear idea of the results so far obtained in my investigation of the sanitary condition of the air of the subway, it will be desirable first to consider briefly the scope of the investigation and then proceed directly to the conclusions. A more detailed account of the methods and data and a full interpretation of them will be reserved for my final report.

#### Scope of the Investigation.

The principal questions investigated have been the temperature, humidity, odor, bacteria and dust of the air of the subway. In studying each of these subjects the plan has been to obtain an accurate knowledge of, first, the conditions which actually exist; second, the causes of these conditions; third, what, if any, is the remedy required.

No attempt has been made to devise a comprehensive system of ventilation or cooling, this being understood to be beyond the scope of the service desired of me. My single expression of opinion in this direction has been that considerable benefit would result if provision could be made for larger and more direct openings from some of the subway stations to the outside air. In the present report this statement is repeated and supplemented by the opinion that the ultimate solution of the problem of a cool subway must lie in mechanical improvements which will prevent the production of the heat through a more economical employment of the power used to operate the road.

Experiments with fans and other ventilating devices, carried on under Mr. Rice's direction, have been observed by me, and their effects, as far as determinable by my analyses of the air, have been reported to him.

#### Principal Results of the Investigation.

Regarded as a whole, the results so far obtained contain little cause for alarm concerning the sanitary condition of the air of the subway. During the period of my observations the air has been renewed with sufficient frequency to assure an ample supply of oxygen and prevent the detection of unpleasant odors due to the large number of people who have been present in the subway. Odors from other causes have, however, occurred. The principal objection to the air has been its high temperature. The sanitary significance of the presence of black dust and of the bacteria which are contained in the air, however, still remains to be settled.

Heat and Humidity—Throughout the period of this investigation the subway has been decidedly warmer than the outside air. The average temperature for the daytime for the three months was, for the subway, 79.8 Fahrenheit, and for the air in the streets, 72.8 Fahrenheit; difference 7 Fahrenheit. The highest temperature observed in the subway was 90.6 Fahrenheit.

The hottest week was that of August 4 to 10, inclusive. The average daily temperature for the subway during this time was 83.1 Fahrenheit. For the outside air it was 73.2 Fahrenheit, the difference being 9.9 Fahrenheit. The maximum temperature observed in the subway this week was 88.5 Fahrenheit; in the streets, 88.2 Fahrenheit.

The air of the subway has generally been less humid than the air of the streets. The average humidity for the three months was 56.2 per cent. The hottest week was also the most humid in the subway, the percentage of relative humidity having been for the week of August 4 to 10, 75.2 per cent.

The high temperature of the subway is due chiefly to the amount of power which, in one way or another, is converted into heat in operating the road. Most of it comes from the motors and friction brakes on the cars. Theoretically, it represents wasted energy. No remedy seems ready to hand for this trouble. It is a new difficulty in the operation of subways, and is attributable to the large amount of electric power used on the road. The most hopeful direction to seek immediate relief from the heat lies, in my judgment, in the alteration of some of the stations so that greater benefit will result from the combined ventilating effect produced by the movement of the trains and the breezes of the streets. Had it not been for the flushing action which was produced already in this way the subway would undoubtedly have been much warmer last summer.

It would seem that the ultimate solution of the difficulty of overheating must lie in mechanical improvements which will prevent the production of so much heat through the great loss of energy which now occurs when the trains are stopped and started. A subject which seems worthy of consideration in this connection is the idea of regenerative control. Again, a lower speed from station to station would prevent the production of so much heat from the motors and brake shoes. This should be possible without sacrificing the actual running time, by improved means of loading and unloading the cars.

Ventilation—There has been, on an average, far more fresh air in the subway than is necessary to satisfy the standards established by sanitary authorities for theatres, halls and other places of assembly. The air in the cars has been somewhat less satisfactory, depending on the amount of crowding. The test employed to measure the amount of ventilation has been the estimation of carbon dioxide present by the method of Pettenkofer. The average of 721 analyses gave, for the air of the subway, 4.58, and for the air of the streets, 3.45 parts of carbon dioxide per 10,000 volumes of air; the difference being 1.13. The largest amount found on any occasion in the subway was 7.81.

There was so slight a difference between the amount of oxygen present in the subway and outside air that the employment of this test as a routine procedure was discontinued after about eighty analyses had been made. The difference between the smallest amount of oxygen found in the subway and the greatest amount found out of doors was .7 per cent. The average for the subway was 20.6 per cent., and for the outside air 20.71 per cent.

The frequency with which the air is changed in the subway is attributable, in my view, to the currents set up by the action of the trains and breezes above ground coming through stairways and other openings to the stations and streets.

Odors—The air of the subway has at nearly all times and places possessed a noticeable odor. There is not, in reality, a single odor, but a number of them. The odors of the subway are attributable principally to conditions due to the newness of the structure and its equipment and are largely susceptible of elimination. They are traceable principally to volatile substances given off by paints, cements, lubricating oil, hot boxes and a chemical deodorant used in the toilet rooms. The presence in the air of black dust is also accountable for a part of what is generally taken to be odor.

Dust—The amount and character of the black dust in the subway is a matter of considerable importance. Chemical analysis of this dust shows that it contains 62.78 per cent. of metallic iron. Microscopic analysis shows that the particles range from fragments which can almost be seen with the naked eye to pieces less than 1-25,000 of an inch in diameter. Most of this pulverized iron is due to the grinding up of brake shoes, the daily loss in weight of which is surprisingly large. Dust of the same kind has made at least one other subway dark and grimy in appearance. In another case the gradual accumulation of iron dust is said to have seriously interfered with the insulation of the electric current.

It is important, in my view, to take notice of the presence of this iron dust, both because of the possibility of its affecting the health of persons who must continually

breathe it, and on account of the black stain which it imparts to the light-colored portions of the subway structure, cars, booths and other furniture, and the persons of the employees and passengers.

Because of the presence of about 1 per cent. of oil which the dust contains it gains secure lodgment upon all surfaces, and, being of a black color, forms an unsightly smudge which is difficult to remove. An amount of this dust which is too small to be weighed with accuracy is capable of producing a black mark upon white linen which can be seen at a distance of twenty feet. If this linen is moistened with perspiration or water, a yellow stain is produced. Straw hats and the light-colored garments worn by passengers of both sexes in summer are therefore liable to be soiled by coming in contact with even small accumulations of the dust. The actual weight of black dust in a cubic foot of the atmosphere at any time is slight. It would undoubtedly be greater if the ventilation of the subway was any less effective. Mainly because of the possibility that it may be injurious to health when breathed continually through long periods of time, the subject of dust and its prevention is now receiving my special attention. It would appear that in order to prevent the formation of the dust a less heavy use of the friction brake would be required.

**Bacteria**—There have generally been fewer bacteria in the air of the subway than in the air of the streets, but occasionally there have been more. A study of the results of 2,600 tests shows that the average number of bacteria which were deposited per minute upon a square foot of surface and were subsequently capable of growing at the temperature of the human body was, for the subway, 750, and for the air of the streets, 1,200. Although it is not improbable that the bacteria in the subway belong for the most part to the same species as those above ground, the study of this subject has not yet reached a point which will justify a positive statement concerning its sanitary significance.

**Other Sanitary Observations**—A number of sanitary observations of less importance than the foregoing have been made. As a result of these, the three following suggestions are respectfully submitted as especially worthy of your consideration at the present time.

1. That the ballast of the roadbed, which has become saturated with oil from the machinery of the cars and has accumulated a quantity of small refuse from the stations and passengers, should be renewed at the stations, or better, replaced with a smooth concrete surface which can easily be cleaned. In order to protect the roadbed against oil in the future, the use of larger drip pans beneath the cars and more frequent inspections are suggested.

2. That the stations be cleaned and cared for in a more systematic and thorough manner. The suggestions made by the Board of Health with respect to this matter are strongly recommended for adoption, except as to the use of disinfectants; with strict cleanliness these should not, in my judgment, be necessary. A copy of the Board of Health suggestions is herewith appended.

3. That the toilet rooms be equipped with suitable means of ventilation, and that they be kept in a more strictly sanitary condition.

Communication of counsel was presented as follows, the president reporting that in the interval between the meetings of the Board he had instructed counsel to take the appeal referred to therein:

No. 32 NASSAU STREET, NEW YORK, }  
October 20, 1905.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Commission, No. 320 Broadway:

DEAR SIR—On February 9, 1905, the Board directed us "to take appropriate action to compel the removal of all slot and weighing machines from the stations of the Rapid Transit Railroad." (Minutes, page 3135.)

At about the same time, an action was begun by the Interborough Company against The City of New York and Mr. Ahearn, the Borough President of Manhattan, to restrain the latter from carrying out certain threats he had made to remove this property by force. A temporary injunction was obtained in that case, and a motion was made to continue it until the trial of the action. The Board, in view of this, authorized its counsel to defer any action until a decision on that motion had been handed down. (Minutes, page 3205.)

About the first of May, Mr. Justice Bischoff decided the motion in favor of the Interborough Company upon two grounds: First, that the Rapid Transit Board and not the Borough President had control of the railway; and second, that a doubtful question existed which ought not to be decided against the company before the trial of the action. This decision, of course, left the Interborough Company in undisturbed possession, and it became to their interest to delay all further proceedings in reference to the machines in question. No appeal was taken from Judge Bischoff's order, nor has any effort been made to bring that case to an early trial. If it were tried, the City would very probably be defeated upon the first ground mentioned in the Judge's opinion.

The Board and its counsel, at the time when Judge Bischoff's decision was rendered, were engrossed in the preparation of the new routes (Minutes, page 3363); but as soon as this urgent work was out of the way, an action was begun by the Rapid Transit Board against the Interborough Company to test the right of the latter to maintain the slot machines and weighing machines complained of.

When the action begun by the Board was on the day calendar for trial, the Interborough Company applied to the court for an order staying the trial until the first case had been finally disposed of. This motion was granted by Mr. Justice Stover, although it was fully explained to him that the decision of the case against Mr. Ahearn might very well turn upon the want of power of the Borough President to interfere with the railway.

If Judge Stover's order is allowed to stand, the decision of the merits of the controversy will be seriously delayed and embarrassed.

An appeal will lie to the Appellate Division from the order staying the trial; but as the subject is one that rests largely in discretion, we cannot predict the result with any great confidence. But even if the appeal should prove unsuccessful, we should be no worse off than at present, and the only expense to the Board would be for costs and printing, amounting probably to less than one hundred dollars in all. If, on the other hand, the appeal should prove successful, our printing bills would be repaid by the Interborough Company and we should be able to proceed at once with the trial of the case.

Under these circumstances, we think an appeal is advisable.

Report of Counsel and Chief Engineer, as to computation of rental, Contracts Nos. 1 and 2, was presented as follows, and a copy ordered transmitted, with the schedules inclosed, to the Comptroller:

November 1, 1905.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with the communication from the Comptroller, dated September 14, 1905, and October 9, 1905, requesting information as to the rent accruing on Contract No. 1 to June 30, 1905, and September 30, 1905, respectively, which were referred to Counsel and the Chief Engineer, we hand you herewith sheets 1604-A and 1604-B, which give this information. It should be noted that while the method used in these sheets is correct, these figures are subject to change, as they are based on tentative figures, which will probably be changed when the final adjustments are made, and hence the acceptance of these present statements by the City and the contractor should be understood not to commit either party to the figures provisionally used in ascertaining the rental due to June 30, 1905, and September 30, 1905, respectively.

The Comptroller also asks to be advised whether any rental is payable to the City under the terms of the contract for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan section of the Rapid Transit Railroad. The facts in regard to this matter are as follows:

The entire Brooklyn-Manhattan railroad is still far from completion. A portion of the road extending from the northern terminus to the Fulton street station, and including the eastern platform of that station, was opened for operation on January 16, 1905. The portion lying between Fulton and Rector streets, including both the east and west sides of the Wall street station, and also the west side of the Fulton street station, was opened for operation on June 12, 1905. The portion lying south of the Wall street station, to and including the South Ferry station, was opened for operation on July 10, 1905. In each case the opening of the several portions of the road was approved by the Board, "subject to the payment of rental as provided in the said contract."

On turning to the contract we find no provision which governs the case where a portion only of the road is put in operation. It is provided that the term of the lease shall run from the date on which the railroad "shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation" (p. 159).

Rental is to be a sum "equal to the annual interest payable by the City upon all bonds which shall be issued by it to provide means for construction," with certain additions; and its amount is to "be ascertained as of the time when the railroad shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation, or, if the Board shall so direct, the time when passenger traffic on the railroad shall begin" (p. 160).

The Brooklyn extension is all one section—thus differing from the road contracted for under Contract No. 1, which provided for four sections. In relation, however, to each section provided to be built under Contract No. 1, provision is made in that contract similar to the provision in Contract No. 2, above quoted—for it is provided that the term of the lease as to each of the several sections shall commence when that section shall be "declared by the Board to be ready for operation," and rental is to be ascertained as of the time when the Board shall declare that "such section is ready for operation."

No provision was attempted to be made in either contract for the case when a portion of the entire road (in Contract No. 2) or a portion of an entire section (in Contract No. 1) was declared ready for operation, or where passenger traffic was commenced upon such portion.

Our conclusion is that the subject can only be dealt with as a similar subject was dealt with under Contract No. 1. That is, by the execution of a supplemental contract, clearly defining the rights of the City and of the contractor. In respect to Contract No. 1 such an agreement was executed under date of November 3, 1904, and will be found in the Minutes, pages 2888 to 2891. This supplemental contract, after reciting that the original contract failed to provide fully for ascertaining the rental to be paid in case less than an entire section was declared to be ready for operation, provided in substance that the cost of the portions of sections put in operation should be taken to be such a proportion of the contract price as the total length of single track contracted for might bear to the length of single track put in operation, plus the cost of all extra work included in the part operated, minus the cost of all work omitted therefrom. It seems to us that the rental in respect to the portions of the Brooklyn-Manhattan road now in operation might be ascertained upon the same principle, except that a modification of this method should perhaps be made in respect to the first portion of the road put in operation, in view of the fact that only one platform of the Fulton street station was put in use.

We have verbally consulted with the representatives of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, and are informed that they will be willing to make an arrangement as to the rental substantially as outlined above.

If satisfactory to the Board we shall be prepared to take up with the representatives of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company the preparation of a supplemental agreement.

SIRS—We have already reported to you the decision of the Appellate Division upon the application to confirm the report of the Supreme Court Commissioners with respect to the easterly tunnel section under Park avenue. The order of the Appellate Division entered on September 7, 1905, appointed the Hon. Alton B. Parker referee, and prescribed a somewhat summary method of ascertaining the damages sustained by the property-owners, and we now submit a copy of the order. The claimants will undoubtedly call, as their witnesses, experts of the very highest professional standing, and, in our opinion, to successfully present the case to the City it will be necessary that our witnesses should be of standing equal to that of the claimants'

witnesses, and that we should employ an architect and engineer of the very highest standing. The architects for Mr. Barney, whose claim is the largest, are Messrs. McKim, Mead & White. We do not feel like going to the expense of employing such experts without first ascertaining the views of the Board upon this subject.

The beginning of the hearing before Judge Parker is set for the 14th of November, and we are hopeful that we may have a report before the 1st of January, the time limited by the order.

A communication, with copies of reports submitted by the Assistant Director of the Hygienic Laboratory of the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service, under the United States Treasury Department, relative to a deficiency in the number of antitoxic units contained in a vial of diphtheria antitoxin prepared by the Department of Health and purchased in the open market, and of an inspection of the vaccine and antitoxin establishments operated by this Department, disclosing certain facts involving an alleged violation of an Act of Congress, approved July 1, 1902, were received from the Acting Surgeon-General of the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service, and ordered on file.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The room on the first floor of Bellevue Hospital, used as a supply room, is too small to suit the purposes, and a larger space is needed. It is also desirable to secure a room that can be used by the Secretary to the President of the Board of Trustees, who is very inconveniently located at present in the General Medical Superintendent's office, which is too greatly crowded. It is recommended that the Protestant Chaplain be informed that the room that he occupies is needed for hospital purposes, and that that room be used as a supply room. It is much more spacious than the one in use at present, and will materially facilitate proper storing of all supplies that are kept in that room and also the distribution of such supplies. The present supply room could be used by the President's Secretary.

The contractor in charge of the work of moving the old Pavilion 4, used for phthisis cases, is completing his work, and the pavilion will soon be in a new position and its occupation resumed. Work has been begun on the preparation of the new dormitory in the old boiler house.

Attention is invited to the fact that frequently during the year it is necessary that substitutes take the place of members of the house staff on vacation, and much of the trouble that has existed in the past has been due to the misconduct of these temporary members of the house staff. It is recommended that the Medical Board be communicated with relative to the advisability of increasing the number of physicians on certain divisions so that it will be possible to eliminate largely the number of substitutes.

#### Communications.

A communication was received from Dr. W. Gilman Thompson, Acting Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board, inclosing the minutes of the Committee for the meeting held on Wednesday, September 13, 1905.


