The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register," of October 23 and 24, 1882, showing due publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meetings held on October 3 and 10, 1882, were read and approved.

On motion of Mr. Charles E. Miller, attorney, the Corporation Counsel consenting, a certificate of award was directed to issue, in accordance with the decision in Matter of Haggerty, rendered September 7, 1882, in favor of Emil Walli, executor of Adolph Rusch (No. 3647), who had paid an assessment for Eighty-eighth street regulating, grading, etc., from Eighth to Tenth avenue.

In Matter of award in favor of John E. Caffrey, under decision made on September 7, 1882, Mr. T. H. Baldwin, attorney, filed affidavits on behalf of Emiline Austin et al., who contested the award, and asked for additional time in which to file a brief.

In Matter of award in favor of Robert Blair, assignee of Levi Adams, under decision made on September 15, 1882, Mr. T. H. Baldwin, attorney, filed affidavits on behalf of The Union Dime Savings' Institution, who contested the award, and asked for additional time in which to file a brief.

On motion of Commissioner Lord, the Commissioners proceeded to consider the Matter of Brower, assessment for Boulevard regulating, grading, etc., and superstructure, from Fifty-ninth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, confirmed, December 9, 1876.

Commissioner Campbell withdrew the resolution presented by him at meeting on October 10, 1882.

The question was then taken on the following resolution, presented by Commissioner Andrews, at the meeting on October 10, 1882, viz.:

Resolved, That the Legislature clearly manifested its purpose, "that not exceeding one-half" of the expense of this improvement (section 8, chapter 565, Laws 1865), should be charged upon the owners of property on and near the line. Satisfactory evidence has been submitted that the expense of the work was grossly extravagant and largely exceeded what would have been a fair cost therefor, and we believe that substantial injustice has been done the petitioner to the extent that the assessment exceeded that proportion, to wit, one-half the fair cost of the work, which proportion the Legislature enacted should be the limit of his liability to assessment.
