WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases and of the hospitals where patients afflicted with contagious diseases are treated; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools.

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 452,193, classified as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 11,546, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,436 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; and 2,846 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending September 30, 1899, the number of notices issued by the Board was 11,295. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 355, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING MARCH 31, 1900.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my charge and supervision during the quarter ending March 31, 1900.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION.

NORTH RIVER.

Barclay Street Section—Extended.

(Resolution of Board, December 30, 1897.)

This section was completed during the last quarter. A temporary plank roadway across the earth-filling was built during the present quarter.

Park Place Section.

(Resolution of Board, December 30, 1897.)

This section was practically completed during the last quarter. Some slight work of placing lacking-logs has been done during the present quarter.

The inner end of Pier, old 27, where removed to make way for the wall, is being rebuilt and earth-filling has been placed in rear of the wall by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under the supervision of this Department.

Pier, New 26, N. R.

The extension of this pier to the pier-head line of 1897 has been completed under a resolution of the Board and 428 feet of new wharfage-room made. The work was done at the request of the Old Dominion Steamship Company. The superficial area of the pier has been increased by 16,714 square feet.

Delmonico Street Section.

The wall at this section is being built by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under a permit from the Board of Docks. No work on the wall proper has been done during the quarter, but the railroad company has been engaged in removing the old ferry structure and placing new ferry buildings, in accordance with the terms of their agreement.

Watts Street Section.

(Resolution of Board, June 17, 1898.)

A temporary approach has been built across the earth-filling to Pier, new 31.

Watts Street Section—Extended.

(Resolution of Board, February 3, 1899.)

Filling has been placed in rear of the wall built at this section.

Pier, New 31, N. R.

A shed is being erected on the pier and bulkhead north of the pier by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Pier, New 32, N. R.

A shed is being erected on the bulkhead adjacent to the pier by the New Jersey Steamboat Company.

Pier, New 41, N. R.

An extension is being built to the outer end of the pier, under resolution of the Board, by the force of the Department.

Pier, New 45, N. R.

A shed is being erected north of the pier by the Clyde Steamship Company.

Improvement of Water Front between Piers, New 46 and Gansevoort Street.

The bulkhead-wall at the Gansevoort section was completed from about the northerly side of Perry street to the southerly side of Gansevoort street, during a previous quarter. Work has been in progress on the lower portion of this section during the present quarter, extending from the northerly side and inner end of Pier, new 46, to Perry street. About 135 linear feet of new wharfage room was made during the quarter, and about 64 feet of coping set.

A sewer overflow is being built at West Tenth street.

Pier, Seventeenth Street, N. R.

Considerable progress has been made in the construction of a new pier at the foot of the street by the force of the Department.

Pier, Thirty-ninth Street, N. R.

The work of constructing a new pier at the foot of the street has been fully completed during the quarter. The new wharfage room made was reported last quarter.

West Forty-second Street Section.

(Resolution of Board, June 27, 1899.)

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 27th of June, 1899, authorized the construction of the bulkhead-wall, between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, on the North river. Work was begun on this section, but was temporarily suspended on account of an injunction restraining the Department from proceeding with the work. Work was resumed during the last quarter, and during the present quarter considerable progress has been made.

West Forty-second Street Section—Extended.

This section is in the same condition as the preceding one. Progress has been made during the quarter.

EAST RIVER.

Broad Street Section.

The Board, at a meeting held December 22, 1899, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Whitehall street and Pier, new 7, on the East river, and the construction of two new piers.

Piers, old 5 and 6 have been removed, and work on the section is well under way. Contracts have been prepared for the construction of the new piers, and work will shortly be commenced on them.

Catherine Section.

Work on this section has been temporarily suspended. No work has been done during the quarter, the work having been completed as far as can be until further property is acquired.

Rutgers Section.

Substantial progress has been made in the work on this section. About 207 linear feet of new wharfage room being made during the quarter. Coping has been set on the wall and filling placed in rear of the wall.

Pier, New 32, E. R.

The work of constructing a new pier east of Pike street, under Contract No. 676, has been in progress during the quarter.

Pier, New 33, E. R.

The work of constructing a new pier west of Rutgers street has been in progress during the quarter, under Contract No. 667, and is rapidly approaching completion. Nine hundred and twenty-four linear feet of new wharfage room was made.

East Twenty-third Street Section.

Work has been in progress at both ends of this section, and about 118 feet of new wharfage room made during the quarter.

Pier, Twenty-second Street, E. R.

A new wooden pier is being constructed at the foot of the street by the force of the Department, under resolution of the Board of July 10, 1899.

Pier, Thirty-sixth Street, E. R.

A new wooden pier at the foot of the street was completed during the quarter by the force of the Department and about 267 feet of new wharfage room made.

Between Eightieth and Eighty-first Streets, E. R.

The construction of a crib-bulkhead has been completed under Contract No. 663 and filling is being placed behind the same. The wharfage room made by this bulkhead was reported last quarter.

Ninety-ninth Street, E. R.

A small platform has been constructed at the foot of this street for the Fire Department.

Fordham Landing.

The work of building a new pier under Contract No. 661 has been completed. The new wharfage room made was reported last quarter.

Railroad Avenue, H. R.

A platform has been built at the foot of the avenue under Contract No. 670. About 95 linear feet of new wharfage room was made.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited along the water front at these premises by Frank Bulkley, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Gerard Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Jordan L. Mott, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John Cronwell.

One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street and Lenox Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited to a grade of five feet above high water, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, and between Lenox and Seventh avenues, Harlem river, by J. D. Cramlin, under permit of the Board.

Spuyten Duvel Creek, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in the neighborhood of Broadway and a retaining structure erected to retain the same by J. C. Rodgers, all under permit of the Board.

Willis Avenue, H. R.

Extensive repairs have been made to the ferry rack by New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

Cabot Street, E. R.

A ferry transfer bridge has been erected by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, under permit from the Board.

Willow Avenue, H. R.

The filling at these premises is being extended and a retaining-wall erected by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

Westchester Avenue, H. R.

A temporary bridge is being erected across the river at this point by the Department of Street Improvement.

Oak Point, R. R.

Filling is being placed at this point and certain other improvements made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company.

Clason's Point, E. R.

The salt meadows at this point are being filled in and a pier is being built by Clinton Stephens, under permit of the Board.

Piers, New 1 and 2, Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn.

The work of building these piers has been actually completed during the quarter. The wharfage room made was reported in the last quarterly report.

Piers, New 3 and 4, Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn.

The work of constructing these piers has been begun during the quarter and substantial progress made, under Contract No. 669.

Bulkhead at Wallabout Basin.

A granite pavement is being laid in the rear of the wall under Contract No. 671.

Pier, North Second Street, Brooklyn.

Work of completing the recreation structure on this pier has been resumed, under Contract No. 610, and is in progress.

Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn.

The Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company are pumping sand and depositing same at Manhattan Beach.

Neptune Avenue, Coney Island Creek.

A bulkhead is being constructed by Dr. J. N. Hill under permit.

Bay Nineteenth Street, Bath Beach.

A dock is being erected by Henry Henjes.

Forty-second Street, Brooklyn.

An extension to the pier is being erected and a shed placed thereon by the Bush Company, Limited; a pier is also being constructed between Fortieth and Forty-first streets by the same company.

Pier 47, Brooklyn.

This pier is being extended and a shed erected thereon by the estate of William Beard.

This pier is being rebuilt by the Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company.

Pier 35, Atlantic Basin.

An additional pier is being built by the Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company.

Bond Street, Gowanus Canal.

An ice plant is being erected by Leonard Michel.

Union Street, Gowanus Canal.

A coal pocket is being erected by J. F. Schmadeke.

Wallabout Canal.

A bulkhead and transfer bridge are being erected by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company.

Newtown Creek, Borough of Queens.

Improvements are being made at the property of Cud Meyer & Co.

Bulkhead between Eightieth and Eighty-first Streets, N. R.

A small platform is being built along the bulkhead.

Foot of Seventy-third Street, E. R.

A dump is being built for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning.

Riker's Island, E. R.

A float stage has been built for the use of the Department of Charities.

RECREATION BUILDINGS.

All the recreation buildings on the North, East and Harlem rivers have been taken care of and maintained for the public use.

*PAVING MARGINAL STREET.**Piers, New 54 and 55, N. R.*

An asphalt pavement has been laid at these piers, under Treasurer's Order 30306.

Piers, New 57 to 60, N. R.

Granite pavement is being laid between these Piers, under Treasurer's Order No. 30319.

TIMBER BASIN, N. R.

At the timber basin timber received under various orders and contracts have been received, cared for and issued as required.

PILE BASINS ON THE NORTH RIVER.

The pile basins between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets, on the North river, have been maintained in good order and condition.

DEPARTMENT YARDS AT WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH AND EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREETS.

At the Department's yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material and the issuance of supplies for various pieces of work.

The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and has been repaired from time to time.

Work on the new steel propeller has been completed, under Contract No. 651.

SURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water-fronts and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been made.

A detailed survey of the easterly shore of the Bronx river, extending from Oak Point to Long Island Sound, is in progress.

An extensive survey of the water-fronts of the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

All the lines, levels, grades, surveys, soundings and examinations have been made and given as required.

DREDGING.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places, under order or permit from the Board of Docks.

Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties, under order or permit from the Board of Docks, have been supervised during the quarter.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief, the draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water-front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examinations of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general office work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 2,519 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased 32,559 square feet. The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties has been 461 linear feet. 218 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the City at the cost and expense of private parties.
