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## BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

June 18, 1907.

Present—Messrs. Warren A. Conover, Charles G. Smith, Lewis Harding, Charles Buek, Edward F. Croker and Henry R. Marshall.

Meeting called to order at 2 p. m.

On motion, Mr. Conover was designated to act as Chairman.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Mr. Buek made a motion that the resolution regarding the death of William J. Fryer, to be presented to his widow, be properly engrossed in book form at an expense not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25).

On motion, resolution adopted.

A letter from Mr. Moore, Superintendent of Buildings, Brooklyn, dated June 14, 1907, in relation to Appeal No. 32, was received, and in reply thereto the Clerk was directed to write to Mr. Moore stating that the intention of the Board was to require the omission of the roof covering only over the courts shown on balcony plan, and extending from proscenium wall to the bill room on one side and ladies' toilet on the other.

Appeal 34 of 1907, New Building 368 of 1907, premises Nos. 222 and 224 West Fifty-ninth street, Manhattan; Charles W. Buckham, appellant.

No. 3. "Counting the mezzanines as stories, the building will exceed twelve stories in height and should conform to all the requirements of section 105 of the Code, relating to the use of fireproof material." The provisions of the law do not apply.

Does the building exceed twelve stories in height within the meaning of section 105 of the Building Code?

First—The building does not exceed 150 feet in height.

Second—The building does not contain over twelve stories.

There are eight main floors in the front and fourteen mezzanines in the rear.

The total floor area in the building divided by the area of one complete floor shows less than twelve stories.

Mr. Buckham appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Appeal 35 of 1907, Alteration 3078 of 1906, premises Nos. 114 to 122 Greenwich street, Manhattan; the Equitable Life Assurance Society by Jardine, Kent & Jardine, architects.

No. 1. This was amended and complied with.

No. 2. Pent house walls are of unlawful construction.

No. 3. The addition of the pent house makes the building exceed twelve stories and 150 feet in height; same should conform to all the provisions of section 105 of the Code as to fireproofing.

Objections 2 and 3 were dated June 6, 1907.

The building will not exceed twelve stories. The small superstructure on roof covers less than 45 per cent. of area, and the height is less than 7 feet above the 150 feet limit. The roof house will also be built in strict accordance with requirements of section 105 so far as pent house is concerned. In addition to the above not exceeding two employees will use this room. It seems, therefore, a hardship to be compelled to change the entire building, and it is earnestly requested that the plans as submitted be approved.

That the pent house will be a great convenience to the owners and will not contravene the spirit of the law.

Mr. Jardine appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the southerly wall of the pent house be a 12-inch brick wall, and that the floor of the pent house be of concrete, and that all doors, windows and other woodwork be covered with metal, and the windows glazed with wire glass, and that the standpipes be carried up into the pent house.

Appeal 36 of 1907, New Building of 1907, premises northwest corner of Ralph avenue and Quincy street, Brooklyn; Herbert R. Brewster, appellant.

No. 1. The pitch of the aisles of the main floor exceeds one inch to the foot.

No. 2. The risers of the gallery seat platforms exceed twenty-one inches.

As to No. 1. The provisions of the law does not apply.

As to No. 2. An equally good and more desirable form of construction can be employed.

The increase of the pitch of the main floor aisles as shown in the submitted drawings.

The increase of the height of the gallery seat platform risers as shown in the submitted drawing.

As to No. 1. The gradient of the main floor, in order to provide a proper view of the stage, necessarily increases to the rear in the form of a dish, as the angles of vision from eye to top of head will be found to increase as the distance from the stage increases, and consequently, with the gradient as provided by the law, persons seated in the back of the Auditorium would not be able to see the stage, even with the greatest stepping up of the seat platforms which would be practicable.

As to No. 2. The same condition applies. Also, for a proper view of the stage from the galleries, it becomes necessary that the rise from platform to platform shall be greater at the sides than in the center. If this pitch were made the same at the sides as in the center, those persons seated at the sides of the center of the galleries could not see the stage.

Mr. Brewster appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over for one week.

That structure would be over height (forty feet) prescribed by section 146 of the Building Code.

That it may be classified as slow burning, for the reason that it is all open and constructed of heavy yellow pine timbers.

That it will be used as a "roller coaster," very few people will be accommodated at any one time.

That he be allowed to construct building fifty (50) feet high.

That this extra height is absolutely necessary on account of the length of ride, without this extra height it would be impossible for the cars to acquire sufficient momentum.

Mr. G. Falk appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 38 of 1907, New Building 551 of 1907, premises west side of Brook avenue, 150 feet north of One Hundred and Sixty-third street, The Bronx; George N. Reinhardt per Michael J. Garvin, architect.

Proposed structure is unlawful. See sections No. 81 and 142 and 146 of the Code. The Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, has no power to grant any modification on this class of building.

To allow me to construct these bins of frame covered with heavy corrugated iron, so as same will be practically fireproof.

These bins could be built along the water front within the fire limits entirely of frame.

The location of proposed bins are within 200 feet of the fire limits located on the railroad in a practically isolated location.

Furthermore, these bins are covered on the whole exterior with heavy corrugated galvanized iron which make them practically fireproof.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
